A Good Record

June 14, 1905

Editor of the Athens Reporter:

As our township has purchased a new stone crusher, and as the Stone Road boys have got to help pay for it, they concluded to give it a trial; so on Monday last E. C. Bulford called on the boys to perform their statute labor. They all responded with a right good will, and in two days, with eight hours to each day, ten men and five teams drew and piled up ready for the crusher two hundred and forty loads of stone. They gathered them up on the road side and from the stone piles in the vicinity. From the beginning to the end of the time, every hour saw fifteen loads added to the pile. The average was twenty-four loads for each team per day. Our longest haul was about one quarter of a mile.

As this is our first experience on this kind of work, we think it ought to pass, and we would like to hear from some other road division that has done some piling. Perhaps we would get a few pointers that would be a future benefit.

Our road beat is three miles long, with lots of heavy wear, and only forty-six days' work to keep it in repair.

Our road is good, as travelers know, the best the Township owns, we always do our work on time and always mend with stone.

We are the boys that do not shirk when on the King's high ways, we doff our coat and stick to work on Statute Labor days.

A FROLIC IN MEXICO

BREAKING THE PINATA DURING THE CHRISTMAS FESTIVAL.

This Mirth Provoking Pastime is the Great Social and Fun Making Feature of the Season—Dressing and Filling the Olla.

Christmas in Mexico is not the typical Christmas of cold and snow and ice, but one of bright, warm sunshine, cloudless blue skies, flowers in profusion, trees in full foliage and a life of out of doors.

At least a week before Christmas in the principal streets of Mexico arches are erected from sidewalk to sidewalk, festooned with wreaths of flowers and bunting in the national colors—red, white and green.

In every Mexican house great preparations are made for what is called the "pinata." Every child begs and scrapes and saves the centavos for weeks and months ahead.

The pinatas are large or small, as the purse of the purchaser permits. They are round, pot belied and very large at the top. They are sold from door to door on the streets and in the markets.

The body of the olla for a woman is covered with tissue paper; then a crinkled paper dress is fashioned; then a bodice is built up draped to represent a loose white waist, and above this is placed a false face.

A flower pinata is decorated with large paper flowers in every color of the rainbow. Red, white and green ribbons, forming long streamers, and silver and gold tinsel, glass balls and colored lights all help to make the flower pinata very beautiful.

Christmas night the pinatas are carried in great state into the sala and suspended from the ceiling one at a time. All the relatives of the family are present, and as cousins of the fifth and sixth degree are recognized and children are very numerous there is generally a large gathering.

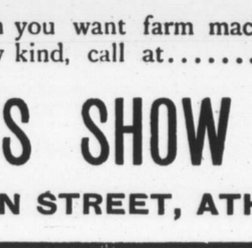

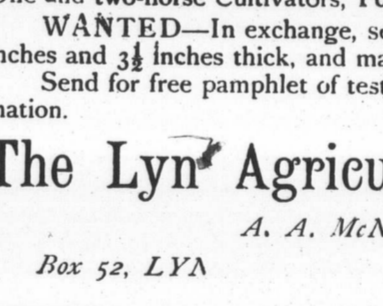

Toll Roads Purchase

In speaking on the subject of the toll roads in Frontenac county, the Whig quotes Prof. Campbell as saying: "In the event of the county purchasing these toll roads, the provincial government will pay one-third the cost, and in addition will pay one-third the original cost of extending these roads to those townships wherein toll roads do not exist, but which will be called upon to bear a portion of the financial burden involved in the purchase of those now existing. The council would have to extend these roads by taking over certain roads in outlying townships and maintaining them as county roads. Arbitrate the value of these toll roads and take them over. Get the township reeves to come together and talk the matter over and formulate a scheme. To compensate back townships, a cash bonus towards roads could be made by the county, or the county could assume certain of the township roads and maintain them as county roads. The council has the right to borrow money up to two per cent of the total taxable value of property in the county, to purchase these roads, and a direct appeal need not be made to the ratepayers for permission."

MARRIED UNDER DIFFICULTIES

Many residents of Athens and members of the A. H. S. class '98 have pleasant memories of Miss Bertha Gile of Harlem, who went as a missionary to Bolivia and was married shortly after her arrival in that country to Mr. A. G. Thompson, an English merchant. They have been visiting friends in Leeds county for some time. Recently, while in Toronto, Mr. Thompson gave to the News the following account of his marriage:—

"Some months ago I wanted to get married to a lady who was, like myself, a resident, though not a citizen of Bolivia. According to the laws of the country, no marriage could be performed but by a Roman Catholic priest, and of course, that was out of the question, as both my intended wife and myself are Protestants. The neighboring Republic of Peru had recently passed a law permitting of civil marriages, and we determined to take advantage of the legislation. To reach Peru necessitated a two days' trip over some of the highest mountain passes in the world, but there was no other course open to us, and we determined to make the journey. Before setting out on our expedition I obtained a powerful letter from the brother of the President of Bolivia, and armed with such an epistle we felt everything would be serene.

"Upon arriving at our destination, an Indian village, we repaired immediately to the residence of the mayor, and presented our credentials and informed him of our wishes. The official in question had probably never heard of any such statute, and he appeared to be somewhat amazed at the nature of our request, and for some hours it looked as if we would have to continue our journey to some town more in touch with the laws of the country. We kept pressing our case, however, and finally after consulting his law books and some of his friends he announced that he would perform the ceremony that night. The priests in the meanwhile had got wind of the story, and we were somewhat afraid that they might work up a riot, for the Roman Catholic church in South America is a deadly enemy to civil marriages, and some of the priests consider themselves justified in taking strong measures to prevent them. Not to be daunted, however, the mayor determined to perform the marriage in spite of the priests, for the official class and the priests are on the worst of terms. The house was barricaded and a company of soldiers put on guard to prevent any trouble. With a crowd of people struggling to break in to view the scene, and a number of priests in an angry mood behind them, we were that night married according to civil law of Peru. Next day we set out for the coast happy in the knowledge that not even mountain walls and Roman Catholic priests could prevent our marriage in that little isolated Indian village on the borderland of Peru and Bolivia."

House of Industry

On June 15th, after a lingering illness, John Cochrane, a tailor by trade, died, aged 68 years. Deceased was a very useful man in the Home, working at his trade until a few days previous to his death. Was committed from township of Kitley July 1st, 1898.

Samuel Chartars, a moulder by trade and blind for several years, died June 16th, aged 75 years. He was committed from township of Kitley July 4th, 1898. His remains were interred in the Toledo cemetery at the expense of his friends. In the absence of Rev. R. B. Patterson, Church of England, and also Rev. I. N. Beckstedt, Presbyterian, the funeral services were conducted by S. B. G. Wright, divinity student, Toronto.

There are at present in the Home 24 males, 27 females, and 2 children. There have been 5 deaths in 1905 so far.

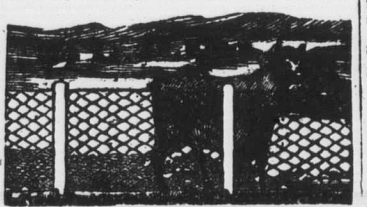

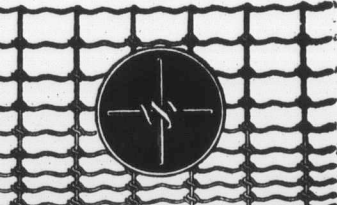

RUSSIAN PRESS ON THE WASHINGTON CONFERENCE.

Want the Ablest Men Available to Represent Russia at the Convention.

Plans of the Washington Diplomatic Corps Disarranged by Holding the Meeting There.

The Rainy Season in Manchuria is Beginning Sooner Than Usual and May Stop Hostilities.

St. Petersburg, June 19, 12.25 p.m.—The announcement that Emperor Nicholas has accepted the resignation of his uncle, Grand Duke Alexis, as high admiral, created a great sensation when it became known to-day, but the announcement came too late for comment in the morning papers.

Commenting on the selection of Washington as the place of meeting for the peace plenipotentiaries, the Novoe Vremya calls upon Russian diplomacy to prepare to struggle seriously and not repeat the drifting policy which the Russian diplomats followed before the war, to decide what Russia wants.

The Bourse Gazette demands that men representing "New" and not old Russia shall be sent. The paper adds: "The other powers are already expressing fears that Russia and Japan will arrive at a rapprochement which will decide the destiny of Eastern Asia. These fears should be a powerful instrument in the hands of the Russian plenipotentiaries."

The Listok says the world formerly manifested alarm at "the Russian advance" eastward but seems now to be indifferent to "Japan's advance" westward through Corea and Manchuria.

IN A HOPELESS CONDITION.

Russian Army Certain to be Decisively Defeated. A London cable: A despatch to the Daily Mail from Seoul, Corea says that the movements of the Japanese armies against Gen. Linovitch are progressing rapidly.

Still Ordering Ammunition. Berlin, June 14.—Russia has ordered 200,000,000 cartridges of the Ludwig Loewe arms factory, Berlin, and intends to give the same firm a large order for rifles.

THE WASHINGTON CONFERENCE.

Plans of Diplomatic Corps All Upset by the Meeting. A Washington despatch: Already the epoch-making meeting to be held between the plenipotentiaries of Russia and Japan to discuss means of ending the war, as Russia tentatively expresses it, has received a name. In despatches to Europe from the embassies and legations where it is briefly termed "The Washington Conference."

RUSSIAN PRESS

Discuss the Situation—Say Indemnity is Out of the Question. A St. Petersburg cable: With the publication of the government's communication on the status of the peace negotiations, the newspapers are filled with the discussion of the situation. The Russ, which most nearly reflects the views of the foreign office, points out clearly that in consenting to President Roosevelt's appeal for a conference of plenipotentiaries of the two powers, Russia in no wise engaged herself to conclude peace except on the condition that the proposed terms, when ascertained, proved to be on an acceptable basis.

A Washington report: Pressure is being brought to bear upon Japan to induce her to fix the sum which she will demand as an indemnity for the pending war with as low a figure in cash as is possible in the circumstances. This pressure is being exerted especially by European Governments, but President Roosevelt has already advised the Japanese Government that moderation in her cash indemnity would not only facilitate peace negotiations, but would be regarded by the powers with particular favor.

NEW SUBMARINE BOAT.

Mystery About it, but Small Enough to be Carried on Warship.

New York, June 19.—The Herald prints the following despatch from its European edition: In the ship building yard of Forrest & Company, at Wivenhoe, on the River Colne, near Colchester, Essex County, England, under conditions of greatest secrecy, there has just been completed a new type of submarine boat which carries two torpedo tubes and will have a crew of three men.

World. Indeed, it has been suggested that such a payment, to all intents and purposes, might render Russia a practical bankrupt. Thus far, the Japanese Government has refrained from indicating the precise form of her terms.

During the past ten days President Roosevelt has had conferences with Baron Kamekichi, the Japanese financial agent in the United States. In him Japan reposes implicit confidence in all matters pertaining to the fiscal policy of the empire. His conference with the President yesterday, there is reason to believe, concerned the subject of Japan's cash demands upon Russia.

THE HAGUE.

May Be Selected for the Peace Negotiations. A St. Petersburg cable despatch says: The place of meeting of the peace plenipotentiaries has not yet been determined upon. The Hague as the seat of permanent court of arbitration now appears to be the most likely city if the conference occurs in Europe.

LOVED WIDOW'S PICTURE.

More About the Hungarian Who Shot Himself at the Falls. Niagara Falls, Ont., June 19.—The mystery of Sunday's suicide was cleared up to-day by the visit of Alice Hood, the cousin of the dead man, who lives in New York. She positively identified the remains, and directed that they be taken to Buffalo and cremated.

NEWS IN BRIEF

Civic census figures now being taken for the city of Winnipeg show indications of a population of 160,000.

Professor E. M. Kierstead, Ph. D., has accepted the appointment to the chair of systematic theology and apologetics in McMaster University.

Mr. and Mrs. James Pringle, two of Stratford's most popular and respected citizens, celebrated their golden wedding Thursday by a family reunion.

At the annual convention of the Women's International Union Label League held in Chicago, Mrs. Darwin, of Toronto, was elected Second Vice-President.

Charges are made that the Chicago Team-owners' Association paid \$50,000 in bribes to labor leaders to prevent strikes.

Jacob Knittel, proprietor of the Carlyle Hotel at Carlyle, Man., was found dead beside his bed. He apparently died from an apoplectic fit.

President Loubet has appointed Gabriel Faure to be Director of the French National Conservatory of Music, succeeding Theodore Dubois, who has retired.

There is an epidemic of measles at Kingston, and the hospital accommodation at the Royal Military College had to be enlarged to accommodate all the patients.

Two large fivory barns owned at Binscarth, Man., by J. S. Murray and Johnston were burned to the ground yesterday. All the horses were saved, but all the other contents were destroyed.

After a conference with the representatives of the telegraphers, General Manager Hays stated the Grand Trunk did not consider itself bound by the arbitrators' finding, as it had not consented to the arbitration.

Gifts recently made to Princeton University include 3,336 acres of land almost contiguous to the university property, more than doubling its present holdings, an annual income of \$100,000, and a recitation hall to cost about \$300,000.

John Muldoon, a Nationalist and a lawyer of Dublin, was elected without opposition to represent the north division of Donegal County in the House of Commons, in place of William O'Doherty, who died, May 18.

Baron Nathaniel De Rothschild (brother of the Austrian branch of the firm) who died on June 13, left the sum of \$4,000,000 to be distributed for various charitable purposes.

The annual report of the President of the University of Toronto shows a deficit of \$30,207.64 as between the revenues and expenditures of the faculties of arts, medicine and applied science and engineering.

The Provincial Government has appointed P. W. Ellis, Toronto, and Lieutenant-Col. Clarke Raymond, Welland, to the Queen Victoria Niagara Falls Park Commission, to succeed A. W. Campbell, Deputy Commissioner of Public Works, and James Bamfield, Niagara Falls, who have resigned.

106 YEARS OLD.

A VETERAN AND THE FATHER OF TWENTY CHILDREN. Detroit, June 19.—A Marquette, Mich., despatch says Jos. Croisfiter, or Crusilla, is dead there. He was born near Ottawa, Ont., on July 4, 1799, and was therefore nearly 106 years old. He was for many years a woodsman in Northern Canada, and a man of wonderful strength and endurance.

THE DROWNING SEASON.

George Laing, of Wroxeter, Sank While Bathing—Another at Pickering. Wroxeter, June 14.—A sad drowning accident occurred here about 8 o'clock, when George Laing, second son of Mrs. Robert Laing, was drowned while bathing. He is supposed to have taken a cramp. The body was recovered about twenty minutes later, but all attempts to resuscitate him proved futile.

Pickering, June 14.—Little Francis Dufferin Williamson, aged three years last seven months, was drowned at Roselank this morning. The child fell off the wharf into the lake. The body was soon recovered, but all efforts to restore life failed. Mr. Williamson, the child's father, is connected with the Bradford starch works.

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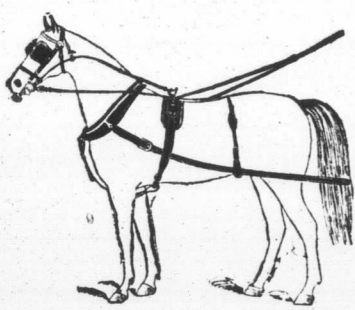
