Tomb of Wellington.

Although just sixty years have elapsed since the death of the great Duke of Wellington, it is only within the last fortnight that the splendid tomb designed for him by Alfred Stevens a few months after his departure, and commenced in 1857, has been completed by the placing on the memorial of the bronze equestrian statue, which it was to be crowned. The sum voted for the work, \$50,000, proved quite inadequate, and Stevens, after spending much of his personal money on the work, died broken in health, in 1875.

The heartbreak was due partly to annual work, but largely also to his troubles with the well known Duke of Devonshire, the Very Reverend Henry Milman, who, supported by the Chapter of the Basilica, absolutely refused to sanction the equestrian statue, which was one of the features of the monument, on the ground that a horse, even in statuary, could not be admitted to the Cathedral. Hepeated attempts were made, after Duke Milman's death, to overcome this objection on the part of the Cathedral Chapter, but without avail, and in fact it was not until the admission to the chapter of the broad-minded Canon Lang, now Archbishop of York, that the objections to the equestrian features of the memorial were by degrees overcome, at his instigation.

Duke of Connaught Coming in August.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL WILL SEND TEN DAYS OR SO IN NOVA SCOTIA.

His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor has received a letter from His Royal Highness, the Governor General, informing him that he proposes to pay a visit to several places in Nova Scotia from about August 7th to ten days or so.

This will include a visit to Halifax for the purpose of dedicating the Memorial Tower on the 15th. His Royal Highness will also probably spend the day of the 14th at Halifax.

Agriculture and Better Roads.

The announced policy of the Ottawa Government to assist and co-operate with the Provincial Governments in the creation and maintenance of better roads and the advancement of agriculture is commendable. Hitherto enormous sums have been contributed by the Dominion for building of railways, canals, and the subsidizing of railways, in dredging the harbor works, in bonuses to the steel industry, for militia and defence, to the entire neglect of the means by which the products of the farms should reach the railway stations or shipping ports on the way to market. And yet farming is the principal industry of the Dominion, and the largest body who contribute to the revenues of the country are the farmers.

It is high time, therefore, that the great farming industry should receive a larger measure of consideration from the powers that be at Ottawa, not forgetting what has been done and attempted in the way of providing instruction in agriculture, horticulture, dairying and other branches, in developing cold storage and in other ways. Co-operation and money aid together for better agriculture and better roads comes in as a timely, appropriate and well deserved forward step at the present time. Better roads are a necessity for our farmers and will benefit them more than any other class.

One of the strongest points in favor of the application of the new 'simplified spelling' to newspaper work is that it does away with the necessity of proof-reading.

The Reid Newfoundland Co. will commence their daily Sydney Newfoundland service on May 1, the steamers Bruce and Inverness going on the route. It is announced that the Reid Company have placed an order with a Glasgow firm for another steamer of the Bruce's type with a greater freight capacity.

The Nova Scotia Clay Works, Ltd., capital \$600,000 is being organized by F. B. McCurdy & Co., and J. R. McLeod of that Company has the matter in hand. This new Company will purchase the clay works at Fugwash, Shubenacadie, Elmstale, Avonport, Middleton, Bridgetown and Annapolis Royal and other places, and the headquarters will likely be at Annapolis.

Some years ago the citizens of Wolfville generously contributed a handsome sum of money towards the purchase of an equipment for a town band. The band has been carried on at times since with more or less success, and should be a permanent institution. Some provision should be made, however, for the custody of the instruments so that they might be available at any time for use in the public interest. They are not the property of individuals who happen to have them in their possession, but belong to the community.

One of the best bills presented in the Local Legislature this session is the one by Mr. Kalston, of Cumberland, allowing all registered voters in towns to vote whether their taxes are paid or not paid. The system of only allowing those to vote at civic elections whose taxes have been paid, has led to a vast amount of extra corruption and deception. The bill has had its second reading, and will no doubt become law. This bill when passed will make the town authorities more alert in collecting taxes and be instrumental in giving more representative civic government.

It is expected that a conference of Premiers of all the Provinces of the Dominion will be held next summer to decide the question of Maritime representation. This was forehandedly owned by Mr. Hazen during the debate on the Manitoba Boundaries Bill. Mr. Hazen said he had never changed his views that action should be taken to give the Maritime Provinces an irreducible minimum representation, irrespective of party. He said: 'We feel that New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, two original Provinces which made confederation possible, should not have their pride humbled by loss in representation at every decennial census.'

During the coming summer we hope to see more attention than usual paid to road-making in this country. Good roads make easier for country children to attend school and enable them to do so with greater regularity. Nothing so much concerns the life of the people in the rural districts as the means of communication between communities, towns and railroad stations. Good highways make it possible to centralize schools and churches. When a doctor is needed he is needed quickly and sometimes often. This is unfortunate necessity arise what a boon it is to have good roads and what distress bad roads may cause.

It is a peculiarity of the voting on the question of church union between the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Churches that the rural districts as a rule appear to be more favorable to union than the urban communities. This is probably due to the fact that the urban communities having stronger congregations under each sect do not feel the burden of the maintenance of rival congregations to the same extent as do the rural districts or smaller villages. Some towns possibly therefore vote against church union, because they feel little of the inconvenience of disunion, whereas the rural districts vote for union because they feel all the inconvenience of disunion. This is apparently the strongest factor in the consideration of the question of union.

In the Canadian Magazine for March there is a first-class survey of the powers of the King of England. The author, Edward St. John-Benson, deals with this intricate subject in a clear and concise manner, leaving the reader with an intelligent understanding of just what the King of England in all seasons may or may not do. Britton B. Cooke, in 'The Lights of New York,' contributes a charmingly descriptive article on one of the striking features of this great city. There are sketches by Joseph Pennell to illustrate the text. Norman S. Reagin has a fine descriptive biological sketch entitled 'Brown's Fairy,' which shows what one man has accomplished in the Columbia Valley, B. C. Francis A. O'Connell contributes an interesting account of the 'Royal Heals,' Norman P. Landon gives an account of 'The Railways that the People Built,' W. Lacey says in 'The Eye,' 'Liberator's' persecuted population, and John S. Walker reports on 'The Old Farmers,' which is a most interesting study.

Parliament.

The Liberal press, as well as the rank and file among the faithful, are much dejected these days because of the coming to naught of their fondest hopes and nicely laid plans and prophecies. For weeks they have been certain that Borden's cabinet would be defeated. Columns have been written, and eagerly devoured, to show that Borden's downfall was simply a question of hours. That Borden and the Nationalists would turn tail upon the ministry because of their refusal to consent to a clause in the Manitoba Boundary Bill, ensuring separate schools in that locality being added to the little province of Manitoba. Every possible means have been exerted by the present opposition to bring about this hoped for condition at Ottawa, without avail.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his French lieutenants have utterly failed in their endeavor, and besides have weakened themselves among their Liberal supporters in Ontario and the west. Sir Wilfrid would have been delighted to have raised another religious war, in order to secure the support of his own race because of the government's refusal to bow to the behests of the Nationalists and other fire brands from the province of Quebec, but there confronted him the Liberals of Ontario who would have none of these things added to the Boundary Bill. And hence the dejection now abroad.

The Borden government has come through with flying colors. Mr. Borden, would appear to be bolting, but in reality he is nothing of the kind. A local election is soon to be held in the province of Quebec. Mr. Borden is literally the leader of any present opposition to the Liberal government of that province. The Premier of the Quebec government is the ablest and most astute Liberal in that province, and under normal conditions the Opposition led by Borden, has not a slim chance of coming to much added strength. But with a religious crusade in protest against all Protestants, and in behalf of separate schools in all Canada, his only chance seems favorable.

The Borden government, in accordance with pre-election promises, has introduced the outlines of a policy for the assistance of the different provinces in the betterment of the public highways. At once this policy was introduced, the Liberal members from Nova Scotia, supported by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, sought to block the Bill upon the ground that any money appropriated for the betterment of our highways should be handed over to the local government, and by them to be expended. The Liberals of Ontario, and the other provinces blessed with Conservative local governments, could not agree with E. M. MacDonald, M. P., and his helpers. And so, from one end of Canada to the other, the Liberal members are fighting among themselves utterly unable to agree upon any constructive policy with which they can all unite. Sir Wilfrid has the core worn look of a leader utterly paralysed because of failure and disappointed hopes. Premier Borden is an ideal leader of whom his party in Parliament are justly proud. His quiet, patient regard for friends and opponents is fascinating. By all odds he is the ablest debater in Parliament, of either party. His challenge to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, that 'he delighted to wound but dare not strike,' was characteristic and effective.

The Liberals still had pursuit of reciprocity with the United States, their impotency in attacking the government in Parliament and the adroit waiting influence and power of Sir Wilfrid, all point to a long reign on a Conservative government at Ottawa.

On the 13th inst. the third reading of Manitoba boundary extension bill passed the House of Commons on a strict party vote of 52 Liberals to 107 Conservatives, a majority of 55. It was not a happy Liberal party that heard the resounding cheers from Conservative throats, hailing Manitoba's transition from a postage stamp province.

At a cost of \$6,000 the town of Anherst has just added to their already efficient fire protection a combination chemical and steam trunk motor. This is a very attractive apparatus, has a 30 h. p. engine with speed capacity of fifty miles an hour, and is really a fine piece of equipment. It is being furnished with ladders, axes, five hundred feet of water hose, two hundred and fifty feet of chemical hose, two tanks containing thirty-five gallons each of chemicals, two gallon hand chemicals. This with the recent expensive fire alarm system and the regular equipment gives Anherst the best fire equipment to be had in the Dominion.

Bill it must be admitted that the Liberals have no one to take his place, and that his personal magnetism and buoyant optimism helped to keep the party together.

It happened that George Graham, the victor, met Martin at a dinner, the vanquished, in the corridors of the House of Commons the other day. The former Minister of Railways was paying a visit to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and when he spied McCreedy his hand stuck out.

'Hallo, Martin, how are you?' was Graham's cheery greeting. 'We had a pretty cold campaign, didn't we?'

'Fine, George, thank you,' was the reply of the manly Eggarville Doctor. 'Congratulations and good luck.'
