Farm and Household.

November days are at hand and the poultry houses should at once be put in order for winter. If eggs are wanted while prices are high there must be an approach to summer condition, both in temperature and in feed, especially the latter. Not warm but comfortable. buildings are wanted, where the windows are tight. Vegetables and sound grain, meat and pure fresh water, and clean pens and pure air are the essentials with every breeder. Supplying these in proper proportions there will be eggs

in the basket all the year. It is very desirable that strawberry plants should be covered in winter. They are very much stronger in the spring for so doing, and the covering prevents the frost from lifting them or throwing them out of the ground. The best cultivators always cover the plants. This covering does not need to be heavy. Coarse stable litter is undesirable from the fact that it is almost sure to carry weed seeds to the bed, which will prove troublesome the following summer. Well-rotted stable manure spread be-

tween the plants is the best material of all for the purpose. The general advance in value of products of the farm, stimulating as it is to the industry, is not all gain writes the Maine Farmer. 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


