**A NORMAL SCHOOL SEN- SATION.**

We regret to have to refer here to an incident which is said to have taken place in the Normal School yesterday, and which has given rise to no little talk on the streets. How the rumor runs is, that yesterday Mr. H. C. Creed, one of the teachers in the Normal School made some remarks which were construed by certain pupils as insulting to them, being members of the Roman Catholic denomination. As small matters like these have often before embroiled communities and converted warm friends into bitter foes, we have in this instance been at some pains to ascertain the facts, and publish them with misgivings. A student in attendance at the Normal School, in answer to our enquiry, writes us—

"Mr. Creed was reading about the siege of Louisburg, and remarked that said siege might be attributed to the Catholics, and then supplemented this statement by saying he thought it served the Catholics right to tear down their images. He said that in those days the Catholics were hated worse than the devil. After having thus delivered himself, he said he hoped his remarks had given offence to no one in the room. He then ceased speaking and stood up by the desk. Immediately a young lady, who is, I believe, a Catholic, arose and said: 'I can assure you that your remarks were quite insulting to every Catholic in the room, and I think you should be thoroughly ashamed of yourself.' She then sat down and Mr. Creed returned, 'Miss —, I think if you have anything to say to me in this way, you should say it privately.' At this the whole room burst out into laughter at the ridiculous figure Mr. Creed was cutting, and the young lady further said, 'I think, sir, from the attitude of the school at the present, you ought to be able to understand how the position you have taken is considered.' These may not have been the exact words, but in substance they will be found correct. I am not a Catholic myself, but I regard Mr. Creed's attack as unwarranted, indefensible, and characteristic."

Mr. Creed is unfortunately one of those pious persons who cannot be extremely religious himself without assailing the religious opinions of others. No one pretends for a moment that a Roman Catholic is as pious a Christian or as good a man as a Calvinist Baptist; but for all that a Baptist teacher in a public school maintained by the Province—the very school which contains the genius and the germs of the Free-Non-Sectarian system—ought to respect his feelings. The question here, however, is not between Baptist and Catholic, because in the days, say of—Constantine, the Baptist Kings and the Baptist people were more pious than the Roman Catholic Kings and Roman Catholic people—but the question is between a public teacher and the public. If Mr. Creed is guilty of what is charged against him, and we hope he is not, the quicker he is packed off again to Nova Scotia and another man put in his place the better. If Mr. Creed has religion so strong he ought to take the pulpit and not suffer his services to be lost to heaven by insulting those who differ from

him, in a public school. This religious intolerance is a failing with Mr. Creed at any rate. He has often before given offence to students differing from him in religious belief in the same school, and it is not more than two years ago since he read a selection in the City Hall which caused a large portion of the audience to retire. Mr. Creed is too strong a Baptist to be a good school teacher, and we must repeat, that the sooner he goes back to Nova Scotia, the better for all concerned. At any rate as a teacher he is a pronounced failure, as an intolerant he is shown to be a success.

It must be borne in mind that we are not dealing with this outrage from sectarian ground. As a journalist all sects to us are alike, so far as their rights are concerned. The Mohammedan should, under the same circumstances, get the same treatment as the Catholic, and the Quaker as both. A question of religious belief is one thing, the rights which in this age belong to every man, whether he be Jew, Turk or Christian, are quite another.

It is not the duty of the press to trumpet abroad Catholic doctrines or Protestant doctrines: let the ministers do that, for they are paid for it. Acting upon this principle, we have no hesitation in denouncing the unfortunate bigot who insulted those Roman Catholics in the Normal School yesterday. We shall enquire further, and have more to say.

**THE CINCINNATI CONVEN- TION.**

CINCINNATI, 24th. The agony is over at last. English has been nominated Vice President by acclamation. The result was received with tremendous satisfaction throughout the Democratic ranks.

LATER. The Presidential nomination has been made, and contrary to outside expectation Hancock, who may be regarded as another Dark horse, has taken the nomination. The following are the four highest in the concluding ballot:—

- Hancock 319.
- Bayard 107.
- Field 54.
- Randall 12.

The result of the nomination gives great satisfaction among the Democrats, and Hancock it is thought will have an easy victory.—*Special to Star.*  
Thus has burlesque No. 2 concluded itself. Where such a system of selecting nominees prevails, it would be an absurdity to hope for any other result than a Garfield at Chicago, and a Hancock at Cincinnati. The great, the able men of the country, under the system, stand no chance, but some obscure and worthless politician who has no friends and no enemies, is jointly chosen as a go-between by two or three parties led by two or three men who may have the nerve of a Stone wall Jackson, and the mind of a Washington. Garfield is not the Republican choice no more than Hancock is the choice of the Democracy. Both are sorrowful examples of degraded compromises. It is like two boys who have a sweetmeat they cannot divide: and rather than any one should have it they mutually decide to throw it to the dog.

**FEAST OF "ST. JEAN BAP- TISTE."**

This was a great day at Quebec. The Acadian remembers the days of old and for a few hours lives over again in that time before Wolfe and his followers crept noiselessly up the steep that leads to the Plains of Abraham. Several French noblemen and distinguished scholars from Paris are at the festival. Hon. P. A. Landry was one of those invited to give an address. Military Mass with the most impressive ceremonies was celebrated this morning on the Plains of Abraham. The city is full of strangers, flags fly, and Quebec has not been so happy for many a day.

A large number attended the closing exercises of the term at the College to-day. The oration by Professor Rivet was a scholarly effort, and that by Mr. Herbert Lee is pronounced a very able paper. Our space prevents us from giving both these excellent papers; as well as Mr. Wilkinson's excellent essay on Agriculture, and which gives him the Douglas gold medal.

Mr. Edward Jack, C. E., of the Crown Land Department, who has just returned from a visit to Quebec and travelled over the Intercolonial from Point Levis to St. John, informs us that the road, so far as he had an opportunity of observing it is in excellent condition; and that the trade on it is increasing fast.

REV. JOHN MORSE, Methodist, was drowned yesterday near Stroud's wharf, St. Stephen. It is thought he fell out of a little boat he was rowing, though the statement of the case would seem to bear another interpretation.

The power of Tammany at the Cincinnati Convention, even though John Kelly shouted like a ruffian, was at a sad discount. The charm to wield has fled this infamous ring.

LADY TILLEY and family are now at St Andrews, where they will remain for the summer.
