Handling Asparagus After the Cut-ting Season.

Handling of beds of asparagus after the cutting season is comparatively simple. The first thing neces-sary is to stop all cutting no later than the first of July. At this time give the bed a thorough cultivation and a heavy coat of manure to the depth of about four to six inches. The addition of commercial fertilizer at the rate of 800 to 1,000 pounds per acre made up largely of nitrogen and phosphorous will be a great help to it. Then allow the bed to grow until the fall, being sure that it is kept sprayed with poison Bordeaux Mixture to keep down the asparagus rust and destroy the asparagus bee-tle, both in the adult and larval stage. To this poisoned Bordeaux should be added a sticker made of resin or soap as the spray will not adhere to the smooth surface unless this is done. In October when the berries are turning red all the tops berries are turning red all the tops should be cut off and burned to re-move and danger of asparagus rust or harvae being carried over to next year. The final preparation in the fall is by ploughing toward the row. This will give drainage during the winter time, thus drying out the soil much earlier in the spring when the burrows will be throw back and the burrows are a much earlier start. bed gets a much earlier start. from the middle of July until the following spring. It is quite easy to select varieties for any part of old Ontario which will do this satisfactorily. The varieties selected should come into bearing early, should produce annually, and should be as free as possible from diseases of all kinds, so that they may be handled with a minmum of expense and care Throughout this article the varieties mentioned are listed in the order of their season of use, so that intend ing planters may be guided in making a selection to cover the season.

In order to simplify the selection of varieties for any given district a classification of the most desirable varieties is given herewith based or their relative hardiness, which is their ability to withstand cold win-

ters successfully. Hardiest:—Transparent, Duchess, Dudley, McIntosh, Hibernal, Crabs. These, are hardy as far north as Parry Sound, and can be grown suc-



Keep Potato Rot From Spreading, When harvesting potatoes, more especially in damp seasons, it is es-sential to pick them over and discard any specimens that are diseased, particularly those that show any indica-tion of rot. If this is not done, the disease is liable to spread through the whole mass during storage. If wilt or dry rot (Fusarium) or black

percentage of the tubers will be in-fected. These diseases may be found in all stages of development in the tubers produced by an affected plant. These are the diseases most liable to spread to a greater or less extent through a pile or bag of stored tubers if any of them are affected at the time they are stored away. Consequently, the greatest care should be taken when harvesting a crop that has shown diseases when growing in the field. These diseases show themselves on

the tubers, either as a dry moldy rot or a wet slimy rot, or as brown or blackish discolorations. On some fairly well advanced and conse fore any pupil or student will be ad-mitted to further attendance; and no tubers the disease may be of recent development and not easily seen. Where practicable it is desirable such certificate on demand shall be to pick out all tubers in which the disease is readily seen and then to wash the remainder either in a tub of water or by turning a hose on to

Unless better rates were given in the manner suggested by the applicants, he said it would be a serious matter for the Ontario millers.


