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Vernon River Bridge Board From

A meeting of farmers residing in this locality was held in the Seal River Schoolhouse on Wednesday, the 18th inst., for the purpose of discussing the proposed bridge across the Seal River.

Mr. Robert C. McNeil was called to the chair, and the undersigned appointed secretary.

The subject was ably discussed from the various standpoints, and the views of the different speakers were given freely and to the point.

After a full and lengthy discussion by the leading farmers of the district, the following resolution was moved by Mr. Owen Sullivan and seconded by Mr. John McMillan, and carried by a large majority of the meeting, there being only four dissenting voices:

Whereas, Several public meetings have been held in different sections of the country in reference to the best method of shipping potatoes, viz: by weight or measure; and

Whereas, At some of those meetings resolutions were adopted which do not fairly represent the general feelings of the farmers of this locality; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this meeting that a measure of capacity can be made to give justice and satisfaction to both farmer and trader;

That in view of the limited time which the farmers have to do their shipping in the fall of the year, especially in the northern and western country, it is materially in their interest to secure the speediest way of discharging their potatoes; and

Whereas, We believe, in the interest of farmer and trader alike, a measure of capacity would best serve their purpose, and be far less liable to abuse, therefore

Resolved, That it is the firm opinion of this meeting that a measure of capacity containing imperial gallons, would be a just and fair measure, to contain two and one-half bushels.

After an unanimous vote of thanks had been tendered the Secretary for his impartial conduct in the chair, the meeting was brought to a close.
