NEW CANAL ON PLANET MARS. Prof. Lowell Reports Discovery

Mars, a thousand miles in length has been discovered by Prof. Perciva Lowell, of the Flagstaff Observatory, in Arizona. This is evidence, accord ing to the astronomer, that the planet is inhabited. The announcement of the discovery was made yesterday to Prof. S. W. Burnham, of the Yerkes Observatory.

Not only did Prof. Loweli see th new canal, but he photographed it. Previous photographs of this region, made as late as last May, failed to show any trace of the new canal. The fact that it developed between May and September, when it was first ob-served, prof. Lowell regards as positive proof that it is artificial and therefore that living beings exist on







In the vote to make a selection of site for the new market building the hay market property was chosen in preference to the present Rice street block This leaves the latter unobstructed for the erection of a city hall and if advisable other civic buildings in the future.
