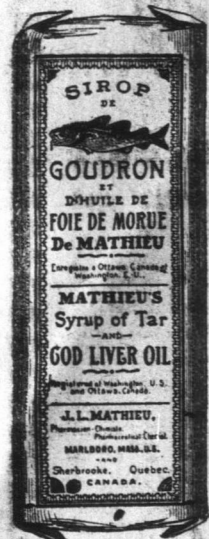

The Ordination Service was held at 8 p.m., when Rev. Isaac French was set apart for the work of the ministry. His testimony was clear and touching and impressed all who heard it.

The second document was gone into minutely, and the preacher called attention to many directions suitable for young preachers in our day. The charge was well received and will long be remembered.

Tuesday, 9:30 a.m.—Conference reassembled and received reports from class leaders, local preachers, etc. committee and from the General Conference Committee; then the Conference listened to the parting words of Rev. A. Carman, D.D., General Superintendent.

Rev. W. T. D. Dunn then moved a resolution which was carried by a standing vote, expressing the gratitude of the Conference for the spared life and presence of the General Superintendent and expressing the fervent hope that many long years might yet be his.

The Lord's Day Alliance, through Rev. James Bell, Mr. Phiscent and G. W. Gushie, presented its claims to the Conference. The delegation all gave interesting addresses, which were well received, and the Conference pledged itself to the great movement toward a more perfect day of rest in this country.

Rev. J. W. Aitken, Associate Secretary of Temperance, then addressed the Conference on the work of the department, and his address was an inspiring and illuminating presentation. "Defeat," said the speaker, in reference to the late local option campaign in St. John's, "defeat is not outward but inward. The men who were defeated were not the local option men, but those who voted to keep the drink."

She punctured herself and sank at about 2 o'clock. Only one anchor and a few fathom of chain held the vessel at all, and it seems surprising that more care had not been taken to have her moored safely, as it was plainly evident on Wednesday that a violent storm was brewing. The schooner was practically a new one—Captain Barbour purchased her at Twillingate last spring. The schooner alone was valued at \$4,000, and as far as I can at present discover was not insured. On board were a cod seine, two traps, one hundred and twenty hogheads of salt, and a large amount of clothing belonging to the crew. From this it can be seen that the loss is tremendous. 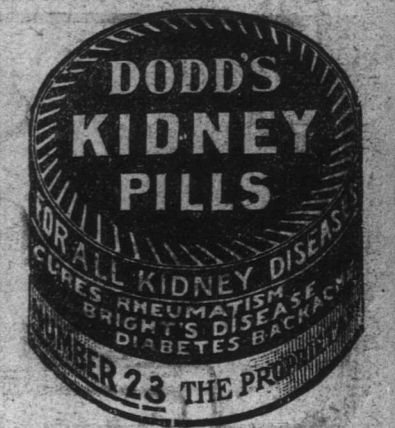

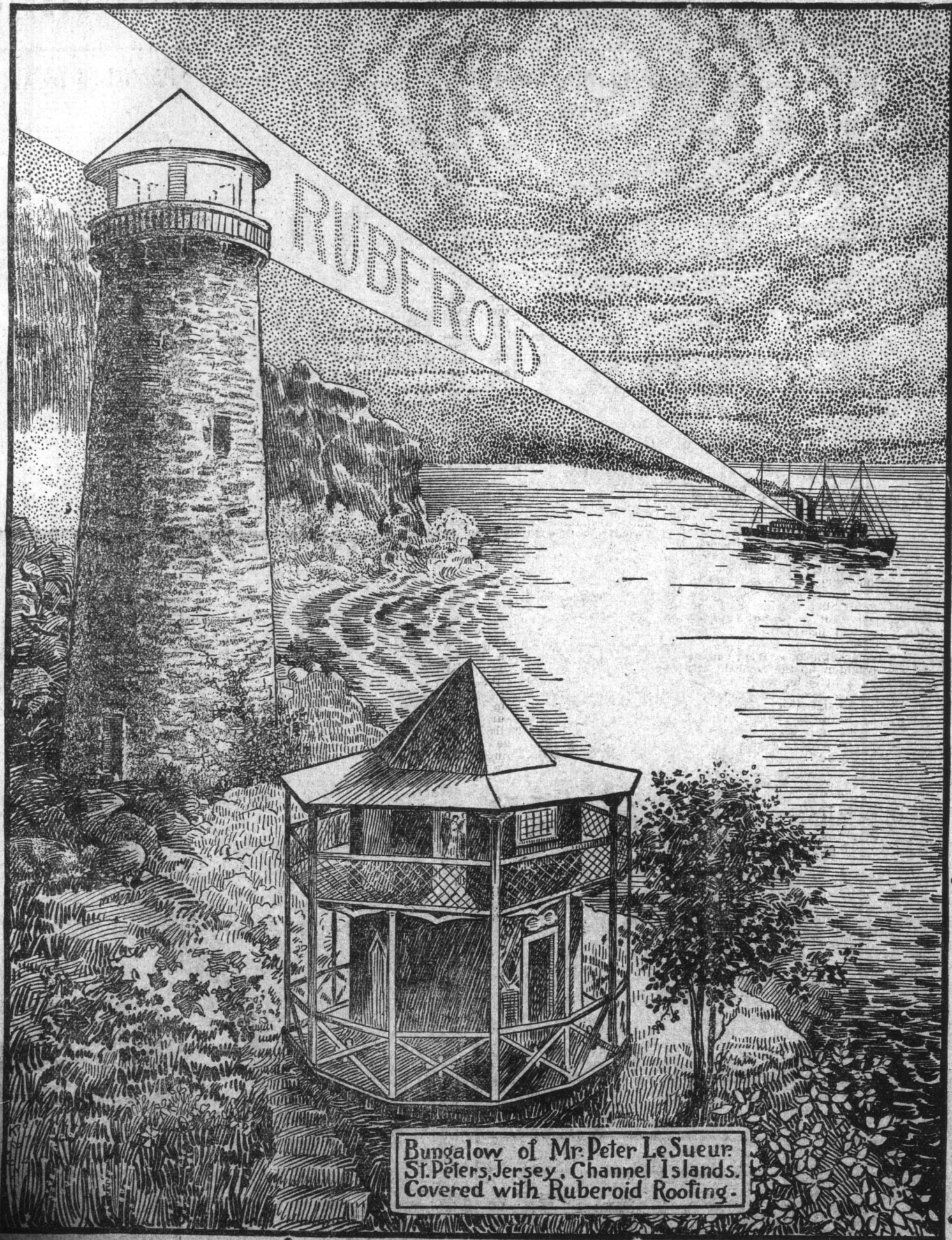

## Cable News.

### PERILS OF THE AIR.

Zeppelin's Deutschland With 20 Journalists Aboard Meets With Disaster.

Special to Evening Telegram.

RUSSELDORF, Germany, June 28. Count Zeppelin's passenger airship Deutschland, the highest developed of all the famous aeronaut models, lies tonight on top of the Teutoburgian forest, pierced with pine tree stems, a mass of deflated silk and twisted metal. The 33 persons aboard, after a wild contest with the storm, escaped unhurt. Herr Coleman, general manager of the new company, and 20 newspaper men sailed from Dusseldorf at 8.30 this morning for a three hour excursion. The objective point was Dersmann, about 25 miles away, but a high head wind prevailed and an effort was made to reach Munster, a garrison town, so that a landing might be made on the parade ground by the aid of the soldiers, as it was realized that it would require a large number to hold it down against the wind. It was dangerous to try to land in an open field as the storm was likely to pound the machine to pieces. In the high wind one of the motors refused to work, and the other three were not powerful enough to make progress in the gale. The airship drifted away, swaying in the violent gusts, and all the while the engineers were at work trying to repair the disabled motor. When this was done all four screws were driven at their full power, under which in normal conditions the airship was capable of attaining a speed of 40 miles an hour; but the helmsman was unable to keep his course and the great craft was swung about at the mercy of the wind. Coleman did not dare to turn her round for fear of capsizing, and he decided to drift in the gale, which was now blowing at the rate of 50 miles an hour, towards Osnabruck, which is also a garrison town, and if he missed that he would continue on to Senne. Suddenly he saw a whirlwind coming, and he turned to a height of nearly 4,000 feet to avoid the worst of it. With this came a downpour of rain. After half an hour she came down to permit of observation, and it was seen that the Teutoburgian forest lay below. The forward motor again stopped, and Coleman sent 5 of the newsmen to the after-compass to balance the craft. The Deutschland sank rapidly, having lost much gas in the high altitudes, and dragged along the top of the dense forest. Here fragments of the tree ripped through the gas compartments and the whole great structure settled down 30 or 40 feet and was pounded to pieces.

### EGYPTIAN ASSASSIN HUNG.

Special to Evening Telegram. CAIRO, Egypt, June 28.—Ibrahim Wardani, the assassin of Boutros Pasha, the Egyptian Premier and Minister of Foreign Affairs, was hanged to-day. Wardani was an Egyptian student and a member of the Nationalist party. On Feb. 20, 1908, he shot the Premier as the latter was leaving the ministry. His victim died on the following day. At his trial the murderer said his motive was to avenge various acts of the Government which the Nationalists attributed to Boutros personally.

### RUMOR OF BANK MERGER.

Special Evening Telegram. MONTREAL, June 28.—In financial circles interest is being evinced by the rumor of the likelihood of a merger being arranged between the Royal Bank of Canada and the Union Bank of Halifax. The advance in the price of the securities of these institutions recently has had much to do with the circulation of the story.

### WILL FIGHT TRUSTS.

Special to Evening Telegram. WELLINGTON, N.Z., June 28.—Sir Joseph G. Ward, the Premier, in a speech to-day foreshadowing the Government's anti-trust legislation says that it possessed clear evidence that a powerful American Company was exercising a restrictive and prejudicial influence in New Zealand. He added that it had created a monopoly of the worst kind, which must be stopped. He did not name the company.

### Complains About Smoking.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—I am requested by a young lady to bring to the attention of those responsible for the comfort of ladies who frequent football matches, etc., at St. George's Field, a practice that shows either forgetfulness or very bad breeding on the part of gentlemen on the grand stand. Especially was this the case at last night's football match, when a young lady was forced to leave the grand stand on account of the utter disregard shown by one of the so-called gentlemen who was smoking—I suppose—a twenty-five cent cigar. I am sure we like to see all ladies at football matches, and if such is the case we should treat them with the respect they deserve. Yours truly, DRAW. June 29th, 1910.

### Dangerous Pastime.

People who go into the country near the Sand Pits say that there is much danger there owing to the practice of boys using rifles and firing at targets. ### Battered Down Johnson's Camp.
