The interruption of the telegraph lines is particularly regrettable at this time, when the war situation is pregnant with all kinds of possibilities and any day may bring tratling surprises. Particularly in Roumania are events moving with great rapidity and it is impossible to estimate the position any length of time ahead. Two or three days ago the Germans claimed to be in Craiova, which would threaten the complete conquest of Wallachia, but nothing further has been heard from that quarter or the more mysterious one of the Dobrudja. #### Largest Telescope is Near Victoria, B. C.

World is Now Located in Canada.

J. S. Plaskett, Chief Astronomer of the Dominion of Canada, that the finest observation station in the world is

It ranks in size as the world's lar gest telescope, and weighs fifty-five tons, and rests on massive piers of reinforced concrete. The tube is thirty-one feet long and weighs twelve

Enormous Mirror.

over all, twelve inches thick at the edges, and is pierced by a hole ten and one-half inches in diameter. It is ture can distort the surface which must nowhere deviate from the theor etical curve more than a two-hundred thousandth of an inch. The silvered upper surface is a parabola to bring the reflected light to a focus thirty feet above the mirror.

In three different ways this telescope is designed to be used, but what is known to astronomers as the Cassegrain focus will be used most frequently. When so employed the light striking the large mirror is reflected back to the upper end of the telescope tube to a 19-inch convex mirror, and thence back through the central hole in the large mirror to an eye-piece.

Every attachment that will add to the convenience and accuracy of operation has been provided. The telescope is moved from one position to another and set and guided wholly by electric power.



After watching hundreds of men fall, from either side of me, I was hit with an explosive bullet through my right forearm; I was no more good to fight as both bones in my arm were badly smashed and I was bleeding quite a lot, so I was compelled to fall the enemy's barb wire and had to stay there for some twenty hours, I thought six of us in and around the one little shell hole, so we did not have room to move in any way, no, not even our feet, bits of lead was flying in bundance in every direction which was possible to come from the enemy's lines; that was not all, shells were urtling through the air and dropping verywhere around us, hundreds of ur wounded were sent hurtling in the ir after falling in some shelter; yes undreds were killed by the enemy' shell fire after they had been hit with ook delight in shelling the wounded e up I nearly bled to death, and when tried to stand on my feet to walk ack to our trenches the next morning I fell down twice through weakness, but the third time I succeeded.
