

GUILTY.

It must not be forgotten that following the Lusitania tragedy of May 7th, 1915, a coroner's jury at Queens-town, Ireland, brought in this verdict: "This appalling crime was contrary to international law and the conventions of all civilized nations, and we therefore charge the officers of the submarine which sank the Lusitania, and the German Emperor and Government of Germany, and whose orders they acted upon, with the crime of WILLFUL AND WHOLESALE MURDER before the tribunal of the civilized world."

And this verdict stands on record as the verdict of humanity, and some day, be it early or late, the ex-German Emperor and the late Government of Germany must stand before the bar of the world's justice to receive sentence, not alone for the crime of the Lusitania, but for all those which followed the deliberate and murderous sinking of that ship. The Arabic, the Hesperian, the Ancona, the Sussex, with their precious cargoes of humanity, were in turn torpedoed by German submarines and their helpless passengers and crews left to perish or have themselves as best they could. By the orders of the same individuals, viz. the German Emperor and the German Government of the day, hospital ships were sent to bottom, notwithstanding that the marks of their calling were plainly exhibited by night as well as by day. The British, the Gloucester Castle, the Lanflec, the Donagel, and the Queen, all bearing the sacred Red Cross symbol of mercy, were openly and shamelessly sunk by the underwater pirates of the German Navy, contrary to all the recognized rules of the General Convention. Liners, tramps, fishing craft, easy prey for the voracious submarine, were destroyed by torpedo or gun fire, and the crews abandoned to their fate. The brotherhood of the sea was no longer so far as Germany was concerned, but that brotherhood has got to be reckoned with. That brotherhood demands that the guilty murderers of non-combatants receive the penalty due them. The coroner's jury at Queens-town rendered a verdict of guilty. Therefore the guilty ones have to be brought to punishment. William Hohenzollern, residing for the time in Holland, is the arch-criminal. After him come his advisers in crime, beginning with Admiral Von Tirpitz. Shall these go free when the outbreak of the stain calls for the vengeance of the law? Civilization calls for punishment of the German homicides, and no matter how much English propaganda may protest, punishment must be meted out. The Lusitania was hatched to make a German holiday, and until swift justice is meted to the butchers, the world will be unsatisfied. An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth. Man for man, ship for ship, town for town, must be demanded of Germany, and her governments, present and future must be required to deliver up for judicial punishment, those amongst her leaders who have distinguished themselves by special barbarities and brutalities. Amongst these the ex-Kaiser has to be included. His name is particularly mentioned in the verdict of the coroner's jury. He is the chief violator of the laws of nations, and his punishment must fit the crime. He has experienced many changes of mind, but none of heart. Though abdicated, in his heart he still considers himself the Emperor of Germany, the Kaiser by Divine right. He has waded through slaughter, not to a throne, but to a gallows, followed by the dying groans and shrieks of his millions of victims. His bloodstained hands can never be washed white, his guilty mind never cleansed of the horrors which he brought upon the world. Mental punishment, some might say, will suffice, but not so. The ex-Kaiser must be

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES. NOON.

OLYMPIAN DEEDS. NEW YORK, Nov. 16. Bertie Hayes, of the British transport Olympic, which sails this afternoon for Liverpool, won the Distinction Service Order for sinking two U-boats on May 12, 1918, in the English Channel, off Portsmouth. For this exploit \$10,000 was given by the Admiralty to the captain, officers and crew. Both submarines were destroyed at daylight, and the survivors were picked up from them by the American destroyer Davis, which was about a mile away on the port quarter. One submarine came up on the starboard bow of the Olympic, as the mist cleared away, and was rammed immediately. As the bow of the 5,600-ton ship was cutting her in two, another U-boat appeared on the port quarter, half a mile away, and was sunk by a shell from the six-inch stern gun. Twenty-seven of her officers and men were rescued by the Davis, with five from the U-boat that was rammed. The Olympic sank another U-boat in June, 1916, by gun fire, but as there were no survivors it was not counted as official. The Admiralty, Capt. Hayes has commanded the Olympic since the end of October, 1914, when she figured in the unsuccessful attempt to tow the battleship Audacious after she had been mined. The Olympic has carried nearly three hundred thousand troops since she was ordered to Alexandria, and from Canada and the United States to England and France, without accident. She has had many narrow escapes from torpedoes, some missing her by barely five feet.

A friend of mine has recently bought the site for a summer home. She selected a piece of land half way up a high hill. Her friends cannot understand why she did not buy on the top of the hill. "There is the most beautiful view there," they say. "You can see for miles around."

She Liked The Vista Better. My friend is not ignorant of their state of mind. But she has no regrets. She took me to her lot last summer and showed me her main view—a section of the landscape framed between two tall birch trees. It is not a quarter of what she could see from the hilltop, and yet I agree with her that, in its exquisite frame, her view has double the beauty and significance of that wonderful view of "everything for miles around."

I love vistas, don't you? I think it gives any bit of landscape a distinction and a new beauty, to be set apart in some sort of natural frame.

The Pictures Framed In Barn Doorways. Take, for instance, the pictures framed in the big barn-doorways which one of our American essayists has so beautifully celebrated. I remember how pleased I was when I found he had made artful selections that sense of beauty and delight I had always felt when looking at some view of summer orchard or autumn hillside framed in a wide-fung barn door.


In the place where we spend our summers there is an ugly garage and beyond it a weather-beaten house; between them one sees, from the road, a narrow strip of sunset river. In our nightly walk to the post-office we have wide-ming views from hilltop and moor and bridge; and yet nowhere do we pause more often for a second look than where we see this little vista of sunset river and green moors between the ugly garage and the weather-beaten house.

Even In The City. Even city streets sometimes yield exquisite vistas. I remember when I was a newspaper woman in Boston how I loved the vistas one caught down the quaint little alleyways that thread the Back Bay. One night especially

I remember, when everything had gone wrong and a sense of defeat was overwhelming me, how I caught a glimpse of a beautiful, smoky, city sunset with two fretted church spires against it and a single budding lilac bush in the foreground, and how I stood gazing at it until the sense of defeat slipped away and I was comforted by all the beauty that is in the world.

Of course you remember Lucy Larcom's lyric to the bit of sea she could barely glimpse from her window. Very touching it is, and yet I venture to wonder if, had that "glimpse of blue immensity, my little strip of sea," been a broad, untrammelled view of open ocean, she would have loved it any better or as well.

Household Notes

All oily fish should be broiled. Flavor cream before whipping. Fruitcake can be baked in a fireless cooker. Never let silver stand over night without washing. All yellow flame on the gas range is practically wasted. Keep dry groceries in glass jars; it is very convenient. Cheese is one of the very best substitutes for meat. In dressing a fowl always wash it thoroughly inside and out. Excellent gingerbread can be made with rice and rye flour. In view of the scarcity of sugar, use salads instead of desserts. The feverish patient enjoys fruit juices chilled with cracked ice. Left-over fish may be creamed, baked and served in ramekins. To prevent white silks from turning yellow dry in a dark room. The often the dough is rolled, the tougher the crullers will be. Mince will not trouble a hole filled with any mixture containing lye. Peanut butter creamed with lemon juice may be used for date filling. A hot shovel held over varnished furniture will remove white spots. Turpentine put in corners of the wardrobe will do away with moth. Save every drop of kerosene as carefully as you save every lump of coal. Excellent succotash can be made with canned beans, corn and tomatoes. Fly specks on window panes may be rubbed off with the edge of a penny. A rather hard, rich American cheese can be used instead of Parmesan. If your Turkish bath mat slips, haste a strip of sandpaper on the under side. A medium sized paint brush is excellent for dusting out the corners of the stairs. Steamed puddings and steamed breads can very well be cooked in the fireless cooker. Seventeen minutes for each pound of meat is the usual allowance for roasting turkey. To save gas never light it until the dish to be cooked has been placed on the burner. It improves mashed turnip to beat it with an eggbeater until it is creamily smooth.

War Monuments

When the war is over monuments will spring up in many parts of the world, to commemorate the sacrifices which men have made. Among those monuments which are at present being discussed in this country is one to typify our sea-power. What form should this take? Herein lies a pretty problem for the patriotic sculptor. Shall it be a statue of some great seaman, or a group, or the depiction of some historic incident, or a symbolic design? After the Napoleonic wars, the great English artist, Flaxman, tried to induce Parliament to erect a monument on which to represent Britannia, and the statue was to be two hundred feet high. Some idea of what this means may be obtained by a comparison with the Nelson monument at Trafalgar Square. The figure of Nelson is only 17 feet tall, and the granite column on which it stands is 146 feet. The idea was not carried through. As the design is said to be still preserved at the Sloane Museum, perhaps Greenwich Hill will receive the statue yet.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir:—I read with interest to-
day your editorial on the appointment
of a representative for this Dominion
at the coming conference to be held in
London.

I am entirely in accord with your
views. The occasion is a unique one
in the world's history, the issues are
momentous; the fate of nations must
be decided, and the foundation of the
whole civil fabric rebuilt on founda-
tions equitable, just and permanent.

The nations that will have a right
to sit at that solemn Board will send
the worthiest and ablest of their
citizens, and this Dominion, mindful
of her right as well as her duty,
should make such a selection as
would meet the approval of every
honest and patriotic Newfoundlander.

I am not "on the fence" nor on either
side of it. I have no interest in politics
at present, and I regard men in
the Opposition and in the Government
as citizens only. I have nothing
against Dr. Lloyd on personal or political
grounds. He came to his posi-
tion by fortuitous circumstances, and
he should be commended for doing his
duty to the best of his ability. I have
no brief for Sir Robert Bond, but in
view of the present occasion—one in-
deed of inestimable gravity—and writ-
ing with many years of experience in
men and events, I would select Sir
Robert Bond. I have other men in my
mind of splendid ability, irreproch-
able character, and holding high office
by merit; but I think that even these
would cede their right to Sir Robert.

There are several grounds on which
we should consider the fitness of Sir
R. Bond, but it is not necessary to
place them. There is hardly any citi-
zen so ignorant of his career as a pub-
lic man as not to know that he is best
qualified to represent us, and I hope
there is no one so base who, in the
pressure of the needs of the hour,
through any personal motive would re-
fuse to acknowledge his fitness and
gain say the wisdom and justice of his
selection, should it be made.

I am writing this in the saddest
hour of my life. My kindred have
fallen in the battlefield—they fought to
the moment of victory and died, and
the relatives with whom they parted,
through an invincible heroic sense of
duty, have been left the legacy of an
unquenchable sorrow, soothed only by
an envious pride in their heroism of
the glorious dead.

But remembrance of the price paid
for our freedom need not kill in us
sentiments of further loyalty to our
country. We, and those who shall
come after us will share in the bene-
fits of their death; and we would be
unworthy the gifts of the future
should we all remain callous under
present exigencies.

Neither my voice nor pen can now
count for much; but influential, hon-
est, patriotic citizens will take up the
matter of our representation at the
approaching conference, and make
Newfoundland honored in her choice.
I cast my vote unhesitatingly in
favor of Sir R. Bond, and I believe
that if public meetings were called
throughout the island, a vast majority
would pronounce in his favor.

Prohibition.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir:—Now that the menacing
war-cloud has lifted, we are free once
more to devote our attention to the
troubles nearer home that await solu-
tion. I take this opportunity, there-
fore, of calling before the considera-
tion of the community a condition of
things that cries for amelioration. I
allude to the present intolerable situa-
tion with regard to Prohibition.

Under the existing law a very large
number of the free citizens of this Do-
minion are placed under a grave, un-
deserved and perfectly avoidable
hardship. By this law they are, in ef-
fect, forbidden, on pain of heavy pen-
alties, to drink certain things to
which they have been accustomed all
their lives, which afford them harm-
less pleasure, and which have been
generally used by the human race as
far back as history runs. Their homes
—the sacred citadels of citizenship—
are invaded and searched upon the
slightest suspicion of their harbouring
any of these forbidden liquors. They
are liable to be called to account for
the contents of their cellars, even
though there be no suggestion that
the liquors are intended for any but
their own personal use. If any one
falls ill and need a stimulant, an elab-
orate and lengthy form (which adds
greatly to the expense) must be gone
through to obtain it. It is on record
that in the interval patients have died.
A condition of things which reminds
one forcibly of the Blue Laws of Con-
necticut, which penalized the offender
who kissed his wife on Sunday, or of
the Cromwellian edict forbidding
mince pies and Christmas puddings!
These instances are comic, and, for
the matter of that, there is no lack of
comedy in the workings of the Pro-
hibition law here, but the interfering
and tyrannical spirit in which they
were conceived, was a serious matter
enough, and I fear it is the same
spirit which shows itself in our local
Blue Law.

And what benefits has the law to
show in return for all these hard-
ships? Are the habitual drunkards, at
whom it was aimed, reformed? I do
not need to tell anyone conversant
with present-day conditions that their
last state is worse than the first. Is
the community healthier? Not if one
may judge by the ravages of the last
epidemic—which, by the way, would
have been far more deadly if the pro-
hibitory law had been more effective.

HOW LONDON WAKES TO WAR

By R. Sims, in British War Pictorial

At six o'clock in the morning by the time I have left the door of my flat, the streets are already filled with the hurrying throng of Londoners. As I step out into the street, I see a little group of men in the distance, some of whom are already at work. The streets are deserted except for a few labourers sauntering towards their mid-day meal wrapped in the conventional red handkerchief, and little groups of charwomen bound for the buildings and houses in the neighbourhood and gossiping as they go, but with the languor of early morn.

Towards six o'clock a rivulet of humanity begins to trickle into the City. It is made up mainly of elderly and middle-aged men of the labouring and artisan class.

At 6.30 I am in the spacious coffee-room of a big railway hotel. At over a dozen tables groups of officers are already breakfasting.

At seven o'clock the great terminus is a scene of intense animation. The departure platforms are crowded with khaki. The arrival platforms are filled again and again by the incoming tide of humanity. Train after train arrives from the suburbs and environs of London and discharges its freight, and from a dozen platforms a broad stream flows out into the world of work. The war has made a marked difference in the character of these mighty streams of humanity, that converge upon London in the early hours of the morning. The few young men in them seem to be tossed to and fro like derelict spars by the surging seas of femininity.

Soon after seven there are hundreds

of young girls in the incoming crowds. Some of them are not going direct to their work. Their offices and places of business will not be open yet, and so the station waiting-rooms are packed with them and many of them find resting-places in such of the City churches as open early for their accommodation.

These girls are compelled to come to their work with time to spare. If they left it till the last train they might fail to find room in it; then they would be late at business. This fear of being late has a marked effect on the attitude of the crowds that are now beginning to wait for trams and motor-buses. Everywhere you see anxious faces and eyes peering sagaciously into the distance.

There is a notable change in the character of the morning invasion as the hours advance. The majority of the girls in the seven o'clock crowd are young and pale and poorly dressed. Their skirts are skimpy, and there is little attempt at finery. They carry their mid-day meal in a brown-paper parcel, and many of them have a well-worn paper-covered six-penny novel under their arm.

At eight o'clock there is an appreciable difference in the type of inflowing femininity. The girls are older. Many of them are young women and women who are not so young. They are fairly well dressed, and they carry their provisions for the day in an attache-case. Many of them have a novel in volume form under their arm, and some have brought flowers from the garden. It may be to adorn their office desk, or it may be a friendship's offering to a fellow employee of the other sex.

At nine o'clock the young women who flow in graceful streams along the City ways are quite daintily and fashionably dressed. They wear silk blouses and carry vanity bags. They do not carry brown-paper parcels or camouflage their food in attache-cases.

Their salaries permit them to lunch at a restaurant.

In the nine o'clock crowd there are many more men than there were at the earlier hours of the morning.

By ten o'clock the City and the West End are wide-awake. Londoners are up and out, and the great world of London is at work to win the war.

You have only to watch the awakening of London to understand how great and glorious a part women are playing in the world's fight for Freedom.

From East and West and North and South since the earliest hours of the new-born day a noble army of women has been spreading itself over the capital to be the working bees in the great hives of industry connected with the war and the munitions of war, to take the place of men in all the industrial and commercial and clerical occupations.

It is small wonder that our hearts are filled with pride when we realise how great an imperial asset woman-power has proved itself to be in the Empire's hour of need.

Naval Secrets.

There are some things that money cannot buy, among them the secrets of our silent Navy. There exist confidential volumes on wireless signals, codes, books on gunnery and torpedo matters, all of which are kept as securely under lock and key on board ships as are treasures in the Bank of England.

The safeguarding of the Navy's secret library on a battleship is a special little ceremony in itself. Every officer who keeps watch has to satisfy himself when going on duty and when being relieved that the books are in their respective chests.

Special keys relating to these chests are retained by the commanding officer and his second-in-command. The keys are tested frequently by the naval stores officer in dockyard to see that they are correct, and have not been tampered with.

Sometimes it is necessary to destroy a reference book. Two officers then burn the book until it is reduced to ashes. Before destroying it, the number and title must be accurately recorded and its fate entered in the ship's register.

Super War Bread

It is an Englishman's prerogative to grumble, and perhaps his pet theme to-day is war-bread. "How can we be expected to eat this stuff?" he asks, but he goes on eating it, just the same, and thrives on it.

The next time you are inclined to grumble at your loaf or to quarrel with your roll, thank your stars instead that you are not eating German war-bread. Then, indeed, your sighs might be justified. According to the "Deutsche Tageszeitung," the authorities of Leipzig recently made an examination of the bread Fritz was baking. And the authorities held up their hands in horror! They found feathers and thread and wadding and wood. They found paper and straw and splinters and sand. They also found lysol, gypsum, and chalk!


