

ogue, basing the first part of his ad-Testament on the spirit of neighbo iness, quoting from the Psalmis and others, texts illustrative of the detestation in which lying and slander were nationally held. The early Christian writers were also loud in their denunciation against the illuse of the tongue. Continuing, the preacher declared that the ninth commandment could be looked at from three standpoints; false witness (1) for your neighbor; (2) to your neighbor: (3) against your neighbor; even as there are three kinds of lying: instinctive lying, cold blooded lying, and imitated lying. Not only among the Christians but also among the Egyptians, Greeks, Brahmins of India was lying condemned, and an early Scandinavian writer in one of the Sagas declared "he would not lie to gain the joys of Valhalla much less earth's delights." Taking the first subdivision of the commandment, the Rector stated that many people believed that there was justification in lying for a person, especially in instances where life or honor was concerned, believing not that as St. Augustine said. "lying is unallowable to save another from injury." In modern times lying for another is the most common of sins, for servants are bidden by their mistresses to lie to visitors: clerks to lie for their employers, when selling goods to customers, etc. Sentiment overrules morality, although truth in all cases is best. The second division or lying to our neighbor, is more generally condemned, but even this is practised by doctors lawyers and others, out of a mistaken sense of the fitness of things or out of mistaken kindness to patients clients, etc. Worst of all is the lying of parents to children, the after effects of which are so deteriorating in the moral character of the growing generation. The third division. universally condemned yet practised wholesale, embraces the slander with all its many sub-divisions which is so prevalent and so malignant today, destroying more by its flery and deadly poisons than even the sword. Slander is the modern weapon of offense and defense; a weapon used hourly and indiscriminately by thousands, the world over,-including those in our midst,-for venting personal spite and downing someone who does not please our particular fancy. In these modern days even as of old. every man who works for the betterment of the world, lays himself open to ridicule and slander, the slanderer therby dwarfing his own soul and mitigating the work of the slandered. The Rector finished by exhorting the congregation to watch the unruly member, and cultivate truth and charity in all things .- S.J.H.

The Coastal Trade.

(Trade Review.)

Now that a new contract is to nade for the Coastal Service, and four steamers to take freight and assengers around the coast are being requisitioned instead of two. it is incumbent on the Government to provide that whoever gets the contract should have a foreshore premses sufficiently spacious and convenient to accommodate the public. The practice of truckmen being lined up all day with their loaded carts on Water Street, extending in a queue for a quarter of a mile, as was to be seen on Tuesday, is intolerable to the men engaged as well as to the business people who have to pay a dollar per hour.

The coastal trade has increased wonderfully the past five years, and no doubt will go on increasing. The originating of a new coastal contract is an opportune time to bring about a reform. It will be too late when the contract is made and signed. A large premises with an entrance at one side and an exit at the other is what is required. We have heard several sites suggested, but in all the proposals a large amount of money would be required to secure the deal conditions. Messrs. Shea & Co.'s premises with Messrs. Rendell's adjacent to it would make the best coastal wharf, but the question is so important to the trade of the country in the coming years that the Government would be amply justified in

curing the site if possible to do so. They should look ahead to the ossibilities of future trade and deelopment, and have in mind the fact velopment, and have in mind the fact that St. John's is fast losing the West Coast trade, and that this is partly due to the inefficient coastal service. The business men west of Placentia have to wait too long for their goods ordered in St. John's and get much more satisfaction in dealing with Halifax. With regular weeky boats it would be different.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.) Codfish-The price per quintal in Spain is now 81 shillings, two-thirds of cargo large and one-third medium and small. It is reported that most of the sales are being made outright under the terms of the "Regulations." There is no change in Italy and Greece where all sales are being made under the Hawes Contract. Brazil market is strong and improving every week. Four or five cargoes are now being loaded here for this market, viz., the "John W. Miller," "Miriam H.," "Evelyn" and "Dundo ald Duff." The stocks in St. John's are getting low, but there is a large quantity to come from Northern Outports, which will not arrive here be fore May. The normal prices are \$10.50 to \$11.00 for shore Talqual, and \$8.50 to \$9.00 for Labrador.

Codoff-There is no change in the codoil market and nothing special to "Common" is selling in the local market at \$300 to \$305, according to quantity in lots offered, but there are very few transactions and the total quantity held here is limited. The demand in the United States is quiet, but more activity is expected in the course of the spring. Codliver oil is also quiet, and local sales, which are few, are being made at \$2.25 per gallon. The West Coast Refined Oil is now ready, but only a few small lots have so far reached the St. John's market. Rose Blanche sales are going direct to Patter where the saving of the extra treignt consuces the price.

Pork-There is no change in the situation this week. Stocks of pork are accumulating in the United States since New Year, and export trade has fallen off remarkably, which it is thought will lead to a substantial decline within a few months. St. John's imports of pork are well abreast of last year so far, but the uncertainty of the future in the foreign market will no doubt direct importers to buy only what is absolutely necessary to carry Newfoundland over the spring trade, and to outfit for the fishery. We quote this week again, Mes and Fat Back, \$51.00, Short Mess, \$60.00, M. Family, \$57.50, and s.c., Clark, \$51.00, Hant Butt is very

scarce, and is not quoted at present. Beel—The influences working for a decline in Beef are generally the same that apply to Pork. The great European demand has been cut in two and supplies are bulking up at the points of production. Exchange rates too are helping out this tendency. We should have cheaper beef in Newfoundland in the course of the coming summer. Imports to St. John's are over 500 barrels short of last year to date, which we take as an indication that dealers are expecting more favorable prices later on. Present prices are same as last week, viz., \$40.00 for leading brands, \$38.00 for packet. \$35.00 for boneless, and regular plate \$30.00.

Flour-The winter wheat crop re ported from the United States indicates a shortage of two hundred million bushels. Last year the total crop was over seven hundred million bushels, while this year, so far it is estimated at about five hundred million. The weather has been too cold and dry for favorable results. This is helping to keep flour prices up, and confirms the opinion that there will this spring or the coming summer.

Local prices are \$16.50 to \$17.00 for leading brands, and \$15.50 to \$16.00 for second grades. St. John's is short about 20,000 barrels on flour imports as compared with same date last year. High grades to come in will be \$17.00

Sugar-White American granulated is quoted here to-day at \$19.50 to \$20.00 per hundred pounds. A fair sized shipment arrived by the S. S. Rosalind this week and was quickly bought up. Shipments ordered for February were delayed and will not arrive here till the latter part of March. 

MEDALS.

The following announcement has been made for public information:

His Majesty the King has been grac-ciously pleased to signify his pleasure that the British War Medal which has peen granted to His Majesty's Forces, be granted also to the British Domin-ons, Colonial and Indian Mercantile Marine. This Medal in silver will be given to those who can supply such evidence as may be approved of hav-ing served at sea for not less than six months, between the 4th day of Au-gust, 1914, and the 11th day of Noember, 1918, inclusive.

His Majesty the King has also been raciously pleased to signify his leasure that a Mercantile Marine War Medal be granted to the persons speci-fied in the previous paragraph, who are qualified for the British War Medal and who can also supply such evidence as may be approved of having served at sea on at least one voyage through the danger zone.

The result of the foregoing may be

1. The British War Medal will be granted to applicants who have served at sea for six months between the 4th of August, 1914, and the 11th of November, 1918, in-

The Mercantile Marine War Med al will also be granted to applicants who during the period of six months referred to above have served at sea on a voyage through the danger zone.

Definition of the Danger Zone for ne above is as follows:—

(a) Voyage including clearance or entry from or into Port in the United Kingdom, or French Port or Mediterranean Port, between the 4th of August, 1914, and the 11th November, 1918, inclusive.

(b) Voyages in the North Atlantic and Arctic Oceans between Meridians 10 degrees West and 44 degrees East from August 4th, 1914, to November 11th, 1918. (c) All seas in the fololwing peri-

4th August, -1914, to 11th April, 1915. 1st January, 1916, to 4th March, 1916. November, 1916, to 28th Feb-

ruary, 1918. (d) The Atlantic Ocean North of the Equator. Mediteranean ,White Sea and

United Kingdom waters, from February, 1917, to the Armis-tice (11 November, 1918). (e) Voyage in ships held up in the Baltic and Black Sea at the out-break of war which were after-

wards used in these areas by the Government of Russia. (f) Voyage in ice-breakers based on Murmansk and Archangel.

NOTE.—It will be observed that everyone who is duly qualified for the Mercantile Marine Medal is entitled to the British War Medal.

Method of Application:-Applications may be made on the forms which are provided for all Custom House Shipping Officers outside St. John's, and must be filled in in the presence of the Custom House Officer, who will examine the applicant's papers and certify same.

Applications for St. John's will be made to Captain Alan Goodridge, Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, at his office, Custom House Building. Those who were captured by the enemy or precluded by disablement or death through enemy action before here. tion before being able to qualify for one or both medals would be deemed to have qualified, and where a man has lost his life the next of kin would be entitled to
