



Moliere Mystery Still Unsolved.

The tricentenary of Moliere's birth, which has just been celebrated throughout Europe, has revived the umors in Paris that perhaps an inrestigation of the Moliere case by a learned commission might provoke a literary riddle as great as that sur-

rounding Shakespeare and Bacon. As a matter of fact only three signatures of Moliere are known to exist and while the author was prolific in and while the author was prolific in his early career, not a single manuscript of any of his plays can be found. Does this signify that Moliere merely bought plays from writers poorer than himself in order to climb to fame under the king's patronage. To suggest this to the average Frenchman is to invite a roar of protest, for if there is one tradition to which the French cling it is adoration for the risque lines which the fol-lowers of Moliere have adopted as the highest standard of France's stage




