

#### Figures That Lie.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—The census returns for 1921 present certain figures which pretend to show the value of the agricultural products of the country, but which grossly over-estimate the importance of the industry, for the eave out of consideration the weight fact that we are paying a very heavy import duty on agricultural produce, and this duty, as it enhances the cost of the imported article also raise he price of the locally produced goods, for it gives the farmer a pre text for exacting a price equal to that which the importer demands for the

The prices thus quoted in the cen sus returns and reproduced in the report of the Minister of Agriculture are unnatural prices and represent to a very large degree the sway of the highwayman who in this case is the stupid government that considers it conomy to tax its own people to the

verge of death. It is time we began to take a sane view of agriculture as it applies to this country. We must either cut out that expensive department entirely or cut out the duty on imported farm products. We should not be saddled with the burden of both. After all those years of extravagant effort we find ourselves to-day more heavily taxed for agricultural products than ever before, and this is the sum total of all that has been achieved. According to the official agricultural reort we are not as far advanced as we were twenty years ago. That we are paying dearly for our agricultural development (?) a thought will show. We pay here for farm products, the Canadian dealers' price, plus freight, plus duties, plus extra handling, plus commission merchants' profits. The ocal farmer has all the advantages of being able to sell directly to the onsumer, yet he is not able to sell pelow the inflated price of the imported article which has to bear all those extra charges spoken of. It is manifestly unfair to quote figures so outrageously padded when the idea is to show the value to us of our farm products. Apart from the fictitious value which an unjust import tax gives to the local article, the figures in the table furnished by the census returns are very misleading because raggerated, I will not say wilfully isleading, because they have, no doubt, been furnished in good faith, by men who were quite unfit to ap-

praise the articles listed. The table sets cows at eighty dollars which is fifty per cent. too much. The next item "other horned cattle" is even more deceptive. These animals are also valued at eighty dollars. The "other horned cattle" must mean of ourse, all calves, yearlings, males, etc. The exaggeration here is too palpable to need comment. Sheep are put down in the table at fifteen dollars, which is also a gross exaggeraing this is very nearly double the value of such sheep as we have. Taking all the items listed the rule of inflation is found to maintain itself pretty well throughout, as I have particularized in cattle, sheep, etc. The agricultural products of this country are worth about four millions. They are given in the table at \$14,367,876.70. Those who take the trouble to look over returns such as this quoted from must be convinced, if they reason at all of how utterly valueless they are. If agriculture is to flourish in this country and be a distinct benefit to it, it must be put on another basis entirely. No real, intelligent or honest effort to achieve this end has been made in many years, and it is time now that the people wake up to a realization of how they are being fooled.

So epoch-making appeared the scovery of the Black Sea that in one intrepid seaman "who came back with the Argonauts," much to-day as a nan might claim with pride that "my family came over with the Conqueror," and Pindar, in 466 B.C., celebrated the chariot victory of the King of Cyene at the Pythian games by composing magnificent ode upon the subject of he royal descent from a mythical Ar-

But ancient mariners are not all ythical or legendary. The story of Noah's Ark is evidence of considerable naritime skill; the Ark was of the collowing dimensions: Length. 450 feet; breadth, 75 feet; depth, 45 feet. its "registered tonnage" would be approximately 15,000 tons, and in the opinion of so sober a scientist as the Secretary of the Institute of Naval Architects, she was a "ship-shaped structure." The truth in the legend is confirmed by the fact that there are in Egypt existing to-day boats built in Noah's traditional era (2800 B.C.), while an inscription of this date records the first maritime expedition in history. This expedition was undertaken by an Egyptian named Hannu, who made his way down the Red Sea, and Indian Ocean to Somaliland and Zanzibar, eighteen hundred years before Hiram's Phoenicians fleet, following the same route, brought back the gold and precious stones from King Solomon's Mines to adorn the Temple in the Holy City.

The Phœnicians were the great navigators of antiquity, and long before Homer wrote the Iliad the grave Tyrian trader undid his corded bales at Marseilles and Cadiz. and brought ack from the islands of the English Channel the tin that helped to turn the Stone Age of Asia Minor into the

Bronze Age of Troy. For in Troy the roy was unearthed an axehead of white jade.
