The idea that the pupils should first AILOR WANTED. of all have a good English education to be followed by classical instruction, to be followed by classical instruction, if they demand it, is certainly a very rational and proper one; and the distribution of the fund on the basis of the average attendance of all the pupils would prevent the hot-house forcing of boys, who know very little about the English language, to the acquirement of a very inconsiderable smattering of Latin. These and other notable errors in the Act require to be retrieved, and the more quickly the work is performed the better it will be for education.
