



The monthly meeting of the board of the House of Industry was held at the House yesterday. President S. Alcorn was in the hair and those in attendance were: Rev. Messrs. A. J. Broughall and A. H. Baldwin, Messrs, A. J. Broughall and A. H. Daldwin,

monthly reports were first proceeded with,
and the superintendent's report showed
that 28 families were relieved during the

month of March.

The secretary's annual report was read and passed preparatory to the annual meeting on Tuesday. It showed that 1900 families had been assisted during the past year, comprising 7383 persons, while 1074 casuals were also relieved, making a total of 8457. This is a reduction of 219 persons as compared with the previous year's records. Seven hundred and seventy-one tons of coal, 267 cords of wood and 1000 bushels of coke were distributed among the city poor, and 43,533 loaves of bread were also given away, in addition to 7266 lbs. of groderies. The secretary shows a reduction of 10c. per capita on those relieved, or \$1.21, as compared with \$1.31 during the previous year. The average number of persons-nightly sheltered during the past year was 65, a slight reduction on forwar years.

The physician's report shows the mortality in the House for the past 12 months has been less than in any year since 1856, five deaths only having occurred.

Ladies of all denominations and connected with all classes of charitable institutions seem to expect that they should be enrolled as duly authorized agents of the board, to administer relief wherever they pleased, and the directors say they are being pressed on all sides to hand over staples of food and fuel on the mere request of these ladies, without taking the trouble of having the house's officers ascertain if the facts of the case warrant assistance being given. In Mr. Baldwin's opinion it was usually an attempt to force into the service of some particular church an institution which particular church an institution which should be entirely non-sectarian. The board unanimously expressed its disapproval of an agent or officer who was the active agent of any sect or other charitable institution. tution. The board adjourned after two hours' deliberation.
