A Missionary Marriage.—The latest news from India announces the marriage of Rev. James Fraser Campbell, formerly of this city, to Miss Forrester, daughter of the late Dr. Forrester, founder of the Normal School. They are both missionaries from the Presbyterian church in Canada.—H. Paper.

Within this year Nova Scotia will be called on to furnish for the economic wants of Canada 150,000 tons of pig iron alone, for this is at the base of all iron manufacture. The labor, and minimum coal for coke, in mining ore, in quarrying limestone for flux, and in turning out the metal product, in this, the first condition of all manufacturing iron, will involve an expenditure for wages of close on \$2,000,000.—Ez.

Manitoba got an accession of eleven thousand emigrants last year, from Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, Britain, the United States, Germany, Scandinavia and Russia. A pretty well mixed population. They were mostly men to take up free farms and then send for their families. There will be a much greater rush for free farms this year, and the new province may in a few years be one of the most populous of the Dominion. The land is said to be inexhaustible fertility and to produce the best of wheat. A projected railroad from Lake Winnipeg to the Hudson Bay would open the shortest and cheapest road to Europe.

Mr. Alexander Aird, a Scotchman, began seven years ago to utilize the sewage of the city of Danzig, by irrigating with it certain barrens in the neighborhood of the city. The crops he has raised on this land have been unusually large; for instance, he has raised six tons and one-half tons of potatoes to the acre, and he considers the undertaking such a success that he has lately contracted with the municipal authorities of Breslau, a city of about 250,000 inhabitants, to remove its sewage during twelve years, and with it he intends to irrigate and enrich for his own profit about three thousand acres of land.

PESTIL, March 14.—A large portion of the suburb of Szegedin, are below the ordinary level of the river Theiss. Instead of five or six hours, it was calculated that the water would take to spread through the town, scarcely an hour and a half passed. Some hope is entertained that on account of timely alarm, the loss of life will not be very great, but the victims must be numbered by hundreds, if not thousands, nor is the havoc yet complete. HOW MANY STATES HANG MURDERERS.

Four States of the Union have unconditionally abolished capital punishment, viz., Michigan, in 1846; Rhode Island, in 1851; Wisconsin, in 1853; and Maine, in 1857. The following States have the 'option' jury law: Indiana, 1852; New York, 1862; Illinois, 1867; Minnesota, 1868; Iowa, 1878, and Louisiana many years ago. In these States there is no capital punishment unless the jury unanimously recommend that penalty; hence there are but few executions in these States. Of the above States Iowa totally abolished that penalty in 1872, but modified that law in 1878 as mentioned. The following States have the 'governor's option' law: New Hampshire, Vermont and Kansas. In these States the criminal is sent to the State prison for one year, Vermont two years prior to execution, when he may be executed on the warrant of the governor, being optional with the governor, whether he shall, or shall not, issue the warrant.

A BLACK SHEEP.

We take the following from the London, Oct., Daily Free Press: "Last year it will be remembered this city was visited by a female lecturer, Mrs. Kent Mason, so called, who was sent on all the virtues, and especially temperance. Her mission was to regenerate the world, and help the fallen, those who heard her declamations are perhaps not aware that while contending others she was herself some sort of a castaway. It seems her name was not Mason at all, but Clayton. Her wife, who has written a letter to the editor, telling of his domestic troubles, arising from the capricious conduct of a wife. In speaking of their estrangement, he says the primary cause of it was Clayton, but who is not even by blood, kinship or legal adoption. I had reason, which I need not mention, making a firm stand against the aspersions of this man more than two years ago. I forbade his corresponding with my wife, which has been regular at this time, and I also desired her to visit his home at all. My wish was to be disregarded by both of them. I have borne my troubles in comparative silence, hoping for the best. Now I am prepared to lift the curtain. I would you hold yourself responsible for the character of the man who took your name, and refuse to be known by her where abouts for many months, as my wife does now."

Telegraphic News.

AFRICA.

Cape Town, March 4.—Basuto, Chief of Kros, is in open rebellion. Colonel Southey commanding the British forces in this quarter, will command operations against them as soon as reinforcements arrive.

EUROPE.

LONDON, March 22.—Advices from Cape Town state that Zulius have destroyed the road from Tugela to Ekowe, and seem determined to do their utmost to prevent relief reaching him. (7) Relief being the arrival of further reinforcements seems abandoned. Seven thousand pounds have been subscribed in London for the Basuto sufferers.

The London Observer publishes the text of a joint note of the English and French Governments, which was telegraphed to Egypt March 8th, recapitulating the terms which had already been agreed upon for the settlement of the crisis. These include the right of Ministers Deliberants and Wilson conjointly to veto all measures which may disapprove.

UNITED STATES.

New York, March 22.—The Graphic says: "General Sheridan has information through military sources on the frontier, that Sitting Bull has a large force of men on both sides of the line, and proposes to make simultaneous attacks, with three columns, upon Forts Totten, Sully, and Fort Totten, upon the grass as the grass is high enough for his animals to subsist upon. He has already sent emissaries to Fort Totten to ascertain the strength of its force and position."

MEXICO, March 22.—A storm of the severest nature swept over Memphis just after midnight. It came from south and west, and continued three hours. The lightning struck the Memphis cotton and woolen mills in the southern portion of the city, which entirely consumed the mills, valued at \$30,000. Employed 125 hands who are thrown out of employment. Loss \$29,000.

JESSIE EDWIN WHELOCK.

The St. Paul's "Pioneer Press" of the 14th inst., contains an obituary notice of Jessie Edwin Whelock, whose death occurred on the 12th inst., from consumption. The deceased was the fourth son of Jos. Whelock, Esq., of this town, and was born on the 15th of July, 1818, in Minnesota to whom he inherited a large tract of land. He was a student at the University of St. Paul, and was a member of the "Pioneer Press" will show with what esteem and confidence he was held by the land of his adoption.

Jessie Edwin Whelock, whose death on Wednesday night was briefly chronicled yesterday morning, would have wished no other tribute to his memory than the silent and unobtrusive sorrow of his friends. But there are hundreds among those who knew him in the early days of Minnesota to whom the brief announcement of his death will have been unalloyed by any intimation of his illness. For about two years he has been battling bravely with consumption, whose seeds were contracted in the trying climate of Washington, of which he had been a resident for ten years. Last summer he was appointed register of the United States land office at Fargo, and his friends hoped that the change of climate might restore his health. The event sadly disappointed these hopes. Having been one of the early settlers and for years a resident of St. Paul, he was regarded in his home, and he came home to die, surrounded by his old friends, who soothed his last days with every possible testimony of kindness and affection. He met death with manly courage and calmness, accepting trustfully the consolations of religion, and scoring all his terrestrial claims. To those who knew him it need not be said that he was a young man of great promise. His letters to the "Pioneer Press" as his Washington correspondent, over the sea & through Pausanias, gave evidence of a marked talent for journalism, which circumstances had favored its development, would have given him a high rank in the profession. His generous and noble qualities, which took a special grace and emphasis from the sharp and powerful earnestness of his character, will long be cherished in the memory of his friends—and they need no other eulogy."

THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

CLOSURE OF THE DEBATE ON ABOLITION.

The debate in the Legislative Council on the proposed abolition of the body of the dead yesterday. The debate throughout was regarded with much interest, and the Council Chamber, which seldom has many visitors, was well filled. Indeed the usual quietness of the Chamber was disturbed by occasional slight manifestations of approval as a speaker on one side or the other made what his sympathizers thought a good point. Mr. Morrison closed the debate in support of the amendment and Mr. Creelman in support of the original resolution. The question was taken on the main resolution first, that being the practice of the Council. Mr. Creelman's resolution in favor of the abolition of the Council was defeated by the following vote:—

THE GLOUCESTER FLEET STRUCK BY A TERRIFIC STORM ON THE BANKS—FEARFUL LOSS OF LIFE AND PROPERTY.

A terrible north-east storm came upon the Gloucester fishing fleet of fifty vessels on February 20th when it was in a dangerous position on George's Banks, and it is beyond doubt that there has been great loss of life and property. Fourteen vessels, valued at \$75,000, are missing without all their crews, numbering 145 men, forty-one of whom were married, and had nearly one hundred children. For the last ten days the excitement in Gloucester has been intense, and the most gloomy fears have followed every arrival with no news of the missing fourteen. It is certain that many are lost. The owners have given up all hope. No great financial disturbance is expected, but a general depression. The insurance on the missing craft is all placed in the Gloucester Mutual Fishery Insurance Company, and assessments will be made on all the fishing firms doing business. The insurance is \$36,286, but the financial loss is overshadowed by the terrible effect on the fishing fleet and the loss of women and children.—Ez.

TEMPERANCE ACT.

Pursuant to an invitation issued by the Dutchet in term of a meeting, a good representation of Temperance workers from different parts of the County assembled at Whitehall on the 18th inst. At three o'clock, P. M., the chair was taken by Oldham M. Taylor, Esq., of Middleton; E. Barton, Jr., was appointed secretary and the following was read:— The Convention was called to consider the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, and to decide as to whether or not to advise the Executive to recommend the Act put in force in this County.

After a few preliminary remarks by the chairman, the discussion became general, the merits and demerits of the new Act, and our local license law, were fully discussed, some advocating the superiority of the Permissive Bill over the License Law, and others vice versa.

After a lengthy debate it was decided to take steps to submit the Act to the County. Committees to circulate petitions were appointed for the Western part of the County, and for the Eastern part of the County not being so large as desired, the meeting was adjourned to meet at Middleton on Saturday, the 20th inst. at 9 o'clock, A. M., when as many temperance workers in the county as can make it convenient to attend are invited to be present.—Journal, 18th inst.

Government Commissioner at Szegeidin found three quarters of the town in ruins. He thinks scarcely 200 houses will be left standing. The statistics state that several thousand persons have been drowned. Two thousand farm houses in the surrounding country have been destroyed by fire. It is believed the water will not entirely subside before July.

There are 24 vessels fitting out at Lunenburg for the Grand Western Bank and Labrador fisheries, employing 350 men, an capital on fitting out of \$60,000. They brought in last year 90,440 quintals fish.
