They are dumped into large vats of boiling water, and left for opened, the contents removed and removed from the body, which is thrown out for the farmers' use. The who very deftly extracts the meat, cracked and passed on. The meat 1s removed and sent to the packers. The cans are filled, weighed and turned over to the sealer, who, seated by his fiery furnace, solders on the cover. The filled cans are then subjected to the boiling process in a retort under a high pressure of steam, taken out, tapped and quickly sealed. Then they are ready for packing and the market after being duly labelled.

The annual catch is about twenty million pounds, valued at \$3,700,000. This being confined to the Atlantic shores of the Dominion, the benefit to the people engaged is seen. "Have you felt any of the Christmas rush vet?" an official was asked

this morning. "Not yet," he replied. "People on this side like to wait so that their mail will reach the othet side just before Christmas Day, and the people on the other side do the same with regard to Canada. We shall begin to feel the pressure in about twelve or thirteen days' time, and it will continue right up to about January 6. We have not yet made our arrangements for taking on the extra men for Christmas, but that will be done this week. The figures for November have not wet been released, but it is said that they show no indication of pressure.




