"MAY DAY" IN CANADA GOOD TIMES FROM COAST TO COAST 'S GENERALLY PEACEFUL

Coal Strike in West the Only Serious Feature of Labor's Day For Sec. Taking - Skilled Workmen Are in Demand. Sudden Influx of Chinese Noted on Pacific Coast

From coast to coast, with the exception of the coal fields in Alberta and British Columbia, there are no labor difficulties of a serious nature to record to-day.

In Nova Scotia, however, the miners are dissatisfied with the operations of the Lennox labor bill, and Mackenzie King is expected to hold meetings to clear matters up.

Scarcity of skilled labor is noted in Ontario. In Toronto, the dispute between the milk producers and the dealers may result in inconvenience to citizens of all classes.

At present, laboring men are being given something to think about by arrival from China of 23 Chinamen during the month of April.

The question of Asiatic labor has been a serious one on the Pacific coast during the past few months. In this connection The World's Victoria correspondent writes:

"At present, laboring men are being given something to think about by arrival from China of 23 Chinamen during the month of April. This is a decided increase over the record of any previous month since the head tax was raised from \$50 to \$500."

"No explanation is offered as to why so many should have come in so many rows, except that there is a growing demand for them."

PRINCE TAKES CASH MONTENEGRO REBELS

VIENNA, April 30.—The revolutionary movement in Montenegro, where a military government has been proclaimed and armed bands are reported to be marching on Cetinje, the capital, assuming a serious character.

The disorders are said to be rapidly spreading throughout the country. The centre of the discontent is at Andrievica, the headquarters of Vasojevich, the headquarter of the revolution.

SHOW OF ARMS AID TO PEACE

Germany Won't Discuss Disarmament at The Hague.

BERLIN, April 30.—In the Reichstag to-day, several speakers suggested to Chancellor Von Buelow that Germany should take no part in the discussion of the limitation of armaments at the Hague peace conference.

Chancellor Von Buelow, in reply, said that Germany did not object to letting other powers discuss the matter, but Germany would hold aloof. He referred to the recommendation of the first peace conference, that the powers study the question of the limitation of armaments.

"Germany," he added, "has complied with this recommendation, but has not found a formula which takes into account the great diversity in the geographical, economic and military positions of the various states, or one which would be calculated to remove those diversities and serve as a basis for a treaty."

"We never once misused our military strength, and never will. Many persons have advised us to make part in the discussion of the limitation of armaments in order to show Germany's goodwill, since nothing is so common as to be eschewed by such a discussion. Germany will conscientiously examine whether it harmonizes with the production of her peace and with her special situation."

### LONDON HAD TO SETTLE.

Sheriff Sat in Cockpit of "Snark" Till Fine Was Paid.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—Jack London's 40-foot ketch the Snark, in which he plans a cruise of the world, was released from the custody of the United States marshal after London has settled the bill of \$247.75 which he owed the shiphanding firm of Sellers Brothers for outfitting the vessel for his long cruise. His sister, Mrs. Shepherd, appeared in the district court this morning and paid the bill, paying also the charges for having a deputy marshal sit in the cockpit of the vessel two days watching that the order of the court, was not violated.

Mrs. Shepherd said that the reason for London's desire to hasten the day of sailing was due to the fact that he had discovered the engines which he planned to use to make the voyage to Honolulu would not work, and it was necessary to sail that distance, and unless he left very soon he would encounter calms that would make the voyage impossible. The Snark will probably not leave until Wednesday.

### NEW BURIAL REGULATIONS.

New provincial regulations regarding the removal of bodies from the city went into effect yesterday.

Under the new regulation a burial certificate from the city clerk will carry a body to any destination without the authority of Dr. Sheard and without the signing of numerous papers by railroad officials.

# COMMISSION FOR HARBOR BUSINESS MEN SUGGEST

Needs of Waterfront and Bay Discussed by Deputation and Board of Control.

The creation of a commission of three members, one appointed by the Dominion government, another by the Ontario government, and a third by the city council, to report on Toronto harbor problem, was the proposition laid before the board of control by a deputation of prominent business men yesterday.

The visitors included R. C. Steele, president of the board of trade, and J. T. Matthews, vice-president, Dominion Merchants Association; M. J. Haney, president of the Toronto Improvement Society; W. C. Phillips, of the C.M.A., and E. M. Trowen, secretary of the Retail Merchants Association.

It was recommended that the proposed commission should be empowered to engage competent engineers, and to be generally placed in a position to prepare an exhaustive report on the requirements of the harbor and prepare a comprehensive plan for solving the city's entire waterfront problem, including Ashbridge's Bay improvement; the city to bear all the expense involved. Endorsement of the project by all the most interested organizations of the city was obtained.

### Plan Approved.

A letter approving of the plan was shown. It bore the signature, among others, of the local members of parliament, H. M. Edgar, Guild of Civic Art; F. S. McMurray, Riverdale Business Men's Association; Ald. Church, of the harbor board; Thomas Roden, Employers' Association, and Mr. Meyer, Retail Merchants Association.

The deepening of the harbor to admit vessels of a draught of 20 feet, the straightening of the Don, and the conversion of Ashbridge's Marsh into an industrial area, were undertakings that should be begun at once, was declared.

### Railways on Waterfront.

M. J. Haney drew attention to the lack of proper railway facilities along the waterfront, and Mr. Steele asserted that, unless Toronto proceeded at once to deepen the harbor, much of the city's rightful share of water traffic would be lost. Mr. Osborne's plan for the reclamation of the marsh had some desirable features, he admitted.

Controlled Hubbarth pointed out that the city had spent \$250,000 in the last five years in improving the docks, and that the government engineer had admitted that the straightening of the Don should be undertaken by the Dominion authorities. The government had spent millions on improvements to Montreal harbor. He was totally opposed to the scheme being taken up as a civic one.

Mr. Trowen spoke rather heatedly, asserting that if the civic authorities would move in the matter the city should elect representatives that would.

The mayor suggested that a conference of the local members of parliament of the Dominion and Ontario governments and the interested bodies should take place, and promised early consideration of the scheme by the board.

### Building Permits in April.

The total of \$2,044,870 in value of building permits issued in April, 1907, surpassed the showing for April of a year ago, the margin being over \$80,000. Never before in the city's history has the two million mark been passed in a single month, or even been approached. Following is the comparative statement:

John H. Mitchell, the alleged partner of Dr. George H. Foster, was sentenced to the penitentiary for four years yesterday by Magistrate Denison on two charges of theft and two charges of forgery.

Mitchell forged the name of a Miss Caldwell to a note which he gave Dr. Foster as part of the proceeds of the sale of a safe. He also acknowledged forging the name of N. MacKay to a note for \$40, and two straight thefts of money from Foster.

Mitchell's wife and sister were present when he was led away. He had been in trouble before, but got off by making restitution.

### 16 HOURS ENOUGH.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 30.—A bill which would make it punishable for a railroad corporation to employ more than 16 hours in any 24 an employee whose duties have to do with the movement of trains was passed unanimously today in the assembly.

### Traffic Killed Three.

ROCHESTER, April 30.—An east-bound accommodation train on the New York Central was struck by a military band two miles east of Batavia today, killing three of them outright and fatally injuring a fourth.

### Hart Honorably Acquired.

Alan Hart, cashier of the J. D. King Company, charged with the embezzlement of \$108, was honorably acquitted by Magistrate Denison yesterday.

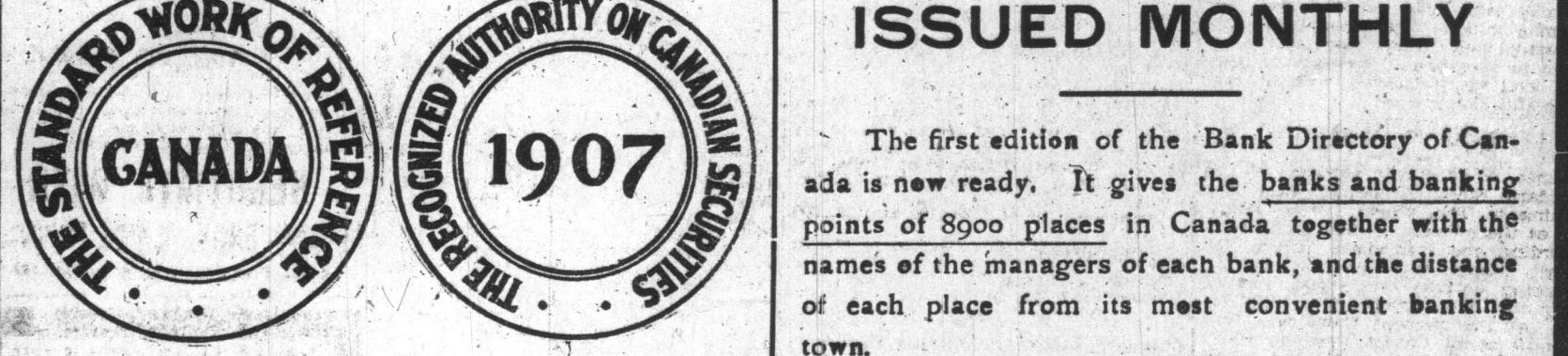

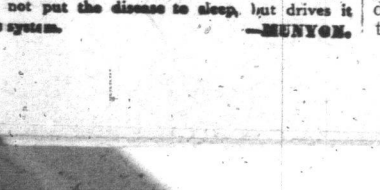
Negotiations had been going on for some time, the manager said, and while he would not say definitely that the deal had been closed, he intimated that the report regarding the option was true.

Dr. Andrew Edie, who was assaulted by Nicholas Noble on Tuesday, April 9, and who has been lying at his home, West Queen-street, in a critical condition since then, was reported yesterday to be practically out of danger.

His condition is much brighter and little by little his memory is returning. Noble is still in jail, but his counsel, T. C. Robinette, will move for bail as soon as the physicians in charge announce that the patient is completely out of danger.

### Forgery in Third Degree.

NEW YORK, April 30.—Jacob Frank, an agent for the New York Life Insurance Co. in this city, was arrested today, charged with forgery in the third degree, in connection with the recent election of directors of the company. The specific case upon which Frank was arrested was the alleged forgery of the name of Erhard Gerhardt, a policyholder, insured by Frank's agency.

FOSTER LIQUIDATION DEADENS THE MARKETS

Heavy Selling of Foster Depresses Market for Mining Shares, But Prices Are Steady.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, April 30. Renewed heavy liquidation in Foster stock was the one and only influence in the mining market to-day. Thousands of shares of this issue came out during to-day's trading, and it was considered a tragedy to the good undertone of the market that the price did not break considerably more than it did.
