A SHOOTING AFFAIR

George Beatty of East Toronto Arrested, Charged with Shooting and Killing

At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon Constable T. Dabery of East Toronto arrested George Beatty on the charge of shooting and maliciously wounding Miss McLaughlin of the Esby Hotel, at the Newmarket track. As far as can be learned the facts concerning the case are as follows: On Saturday evening, Oct. 30, a party was held in the hotel, and about fifteen persons were present. The most enjoyable time was spent until about midnight, when the shooting took place. The accused, it is said, had a revolver in his hand and it was discharged and the bullet entered Miss McLaughlin's thigh. It penetrated the flesh about three inches. Dr. Britton, whose office is near the hotel, was immediately summoned. The doctor extracted the bullet and dressed the wound. Owing to the fact that the whole affair was alleged to have been accidental, and that all witnesses refused to give any facts upon which information could be laid, the constables were able to do but little in the way of investigation.

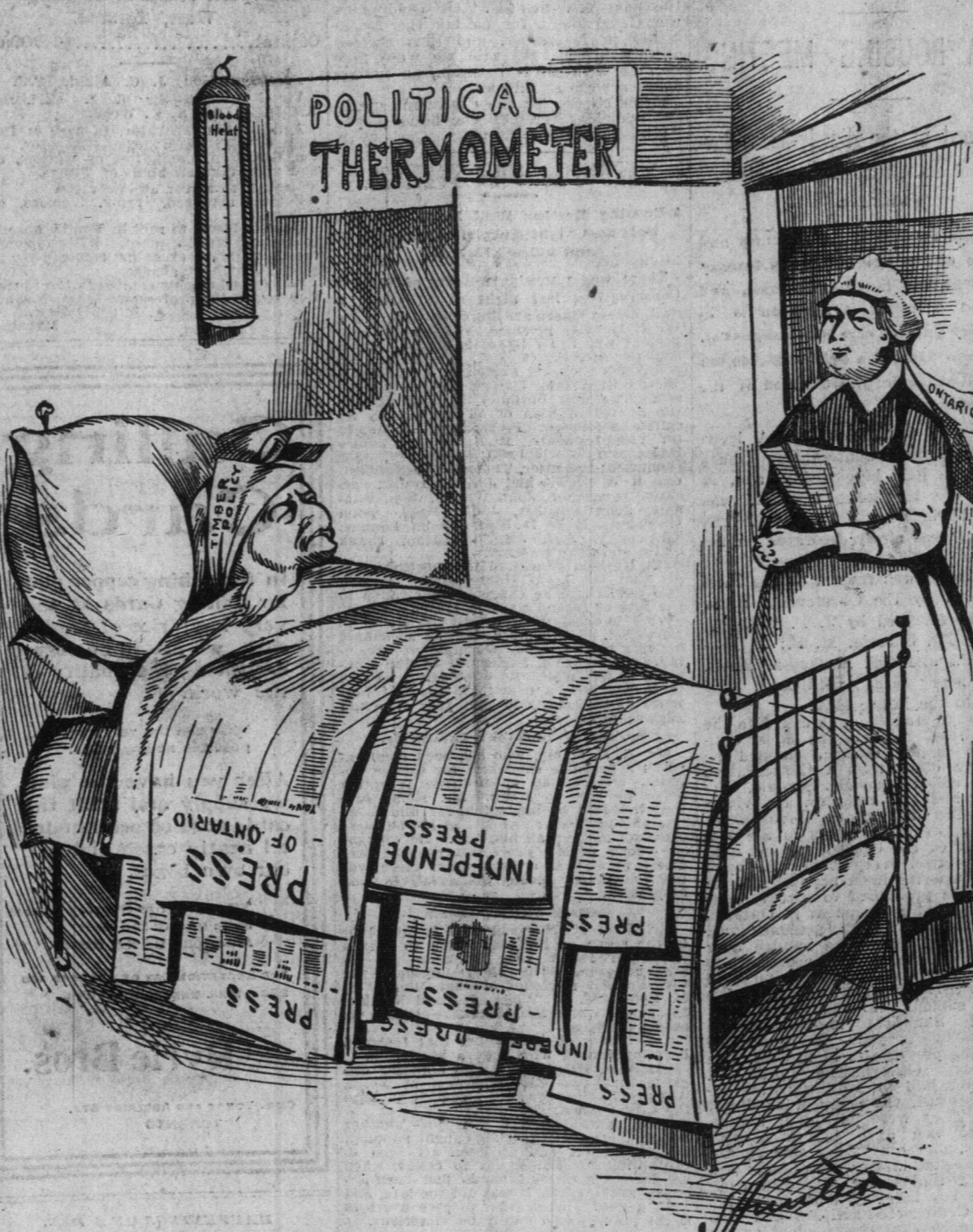

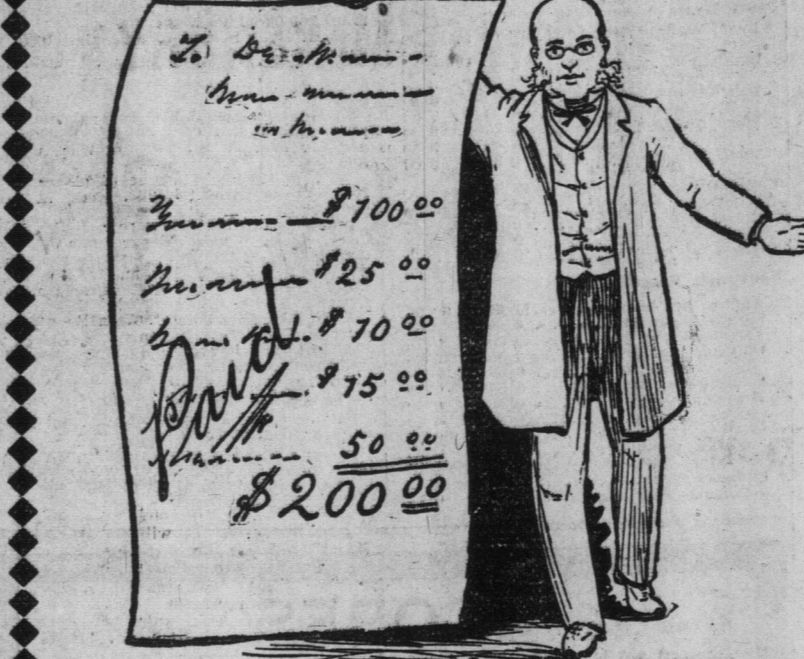

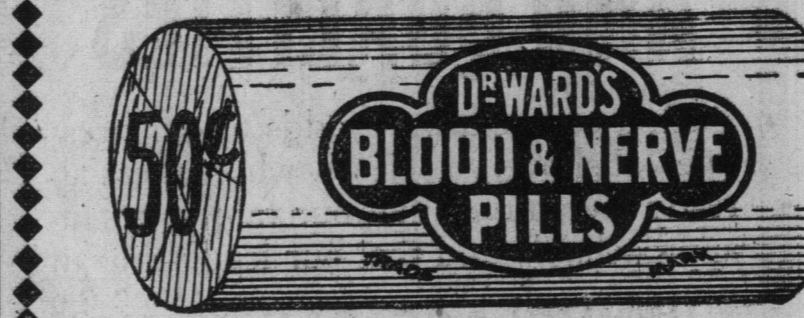
