





Rev. J. L. Gordon's Discourse Interrupted by Visitor From

"That's a lie!" shouted a young manduring Rev. J. L. Gordon's sermon on the Pope, at the Bond-street Congregational Church, yesterday morning. This was when Mr. Gordon gave the Roman Catholic version of the following text: "Thou art Peter, and upon this rock will I build My Church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail

Mr. Gordon proceeded with his sermon. Afterwards the interrupter apologized to Mr. Gordon. He was a visitor from New York City . Good and Bad Popes.

During the course of his sermon, he said that in the past 2000 years, since Peter, who is supposed to have been the first occupant of the papal chair, there had been 260 Popes—some good, some bad. Some of the finest saints the world has known sat in the papal chair, and some of the worst specimens of humanity had occupied the

Pope Leo XIII. was one of the finest characters which the Roman Ca-tholic Church had ever promoted to the position. He stated that during the last century the world had been favorlast century the world had been favored with three grand old men—Prince Bismarck, W. E. Gladstone and Pope Leo III. There had been a popular superstition among Roman Catholic friends that no Pope would 'reign longer than St. Peter, who reigned 25 years; but Pius IX. reigned 32 years, and Leo XIII. had passed the 25-year limit. He was ordained priest in his and Leo XIII. had passed the 25-year limit. He was ordained priest in his 27th year, had been bishop for 60 years, cardinal for 50 years and Pope for 25 years. The Pope was head over a church which had a constituency numbering 200 million—a church whose history covers nearly 2000 years. There were 12,000 bishops in the Roman Catholic Church and 60 cardinals.

Great Religious Organization. Mr. Gordon spoke of the Roman Ca-holic Church as being the greatest religious organization on the face of the earth, and that even her enemies acknowledged that fact. What-ever he might think of the Roman Catholics of to-day, any candid student of history would acknowledge that, when the civilization of Rome was threatened by the hordes of barbarians who swept down upon her from the North, the Roman Catholic Church was instrumental in saving all that was instrumental in saving all tha was best in that civilization, and preserving for future generations the fun-damental principles of Christianity. He said that it was hard for a Pro-

He said that it was hard for a Protestant to lay aside his prejudice when considering the merits of the Roman Catholic Church. That the men in whose veins flowed the blood of the marytrs of England and Scotland could hardly close their eyes to the fact that the history of the last 800 years was decidedly against the Roman Catholic Church as a political organization.
