CANADA MUST BUY IN CONTROL OF THE G. T. P. TO AVOID GREAT RISK

Country Has Become Responsible Already for Nine-Tenths the Cost of the Enterprise.
HOW YANKEE INTERESTS COULD WORK BIG CUP

The Grand Trunk Practically Owns Transcontinental, but is Not in Position to Finance It.

OTTAWA, March 30.—(Special.)—Hon. Mr. Fielding's resolution to lend the Grand Trunk Pacific ten million dollars for the completion of the prairie section was before the house to-day and Mr. Borden submitted a statement showing of the total cost of the road, only one-tenth was provided by the Grand Trunk, and that in the shape of a guarantee of bonds. The statement is:—
People's Contribution—
Government's total guarantee \$66,638,000.
Government loan, \$10,000,000.
Interest for seven years on mountain section \$13,418,750.
Cost of eastern section, \$190,000,000.
Total (approximately), \$270,000,000.
Grand Trunk Contribution—
Guarantee, \$28,750,000.
Mr. Borden criticized at length the position of the government with regard to the construction of the railway, and said: "What is it proposed to secure for the people of Canada?" The Grand Trunk, which is to provide a guarantee of \$28,750,000 out of a total of \$300,000,000, is to receive for the assistance so given \$25,000,000 of common stock, and the people of this country, who are providing nine-tenths of the whole expenditure and guarantee, are to receive absolutely nothing in respect of any share whatever in the future profits of the enterprise, which shall result from this enterprise when the great western country shall have made this \$25,000,000 of stock worth at least \$100,000,000. Having regard to the money the people of this country have put into this great enterprise, is it not pertinent to ask: What is the purpose to do for the people of Canada?"

Time For Public Ownership.
W. F. Maclean (South York) submitted the proposition that the country should purchase the controlling shares of the Grand Trunk Company's common stock. The proposal was vigorously applauded by many of the opposition members.
Mr. Maclean moved, seconded by Joseph Russell (West Toronto), that resolutions be amended by the addition of:—
"And be it further resolved: That in order to have still more effective security for its commitments and to absolutely control and own a national transcontinental railway system, parliament is hereby authorized to purchase the controlling shares of the Grand Trunk Company's common stock."
Mr. Maclean said that after listening to Mr. Borden's able statement he was forced to the conclusion that the speech led to a declaration in favor of public ownership, for he showed that the country is committed to nine-tenths of the cost of the G. T. P., the other tenth being supplied by the parent company, the Grand Trunk. It was the case of the world to go further and say that the people would support a movement that Canada should take over the whole proposition. Otherwise, according to the confession of Mr. Hays, disaster awaits this great proposition.
"The day has come for a great national policy for this country from the outlook of the great Canadian prairie, and from the outlook of that greater Canada on the Pacific Coast, known as British Columbia," said Mr. Maclean. "I wish to see not only the prairie section finished and put to bed, but the railway pushed on to the Pacific. The outcome of all this is that the only way to attain that and to secure Canada in her investment is to take over the proposition."
The Great Danger.
"If we do not do this now I WISH TO TELL THE PEOPLE OF CANADA WHAT THEIR GREAT DANGER IS IN REGARD TO THIS GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC. The Grand Trunk Company, the parent company, to-day controls absolutely the Grand Trunk Pacific. That is a great fact which I wish this house and the people of this country to be seized of, that by the document laid on the table of this house to-day, and contrary to what we were told a few sessions ago, the control of the GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY COMPANY CONTROLS WITHIN A FEW SHARES OF THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC RAILWAY."
"And who controls the G. T. P. Company? The capitalization of the Grand Trunk Pacific Company is \$100,000,000, as the common stock is concerned, and perhaps all the control is in that common stock. Is it not \$100,000,000, and this common stock is to-day being kicked about by brokers and others, and is only held by a certain clique of men for purposes of manipulation and for the purpose of controlling the old Grand Trunk."
"I venture again to indulge in prophecy; and I am not a false prophet on the floor of this house, the only way to say it myself, EITHER THE CANADIAN PACIFIC OR THE CANADIAN NORTHERN, WHEN IT BECOMES STRONG ENOUGH, WILL TRY TO ABSORB THE COMMON STOCK OF THE GRAND TRUNK IN THE LONDON MARKET, and if it does this, it will control this great

THE OBJECT OF THE CONGRESS

GIVES \$5000 FOR MISSIONS

But His Name is a Secret—Preparations For To-Day's Opening of Congress.

To-day Toronto will witness an event without a parallel in the history of the world, the opening of the first national missionary congress.
Last night the registration of commissioners had closely approached four thousand, and the limit of 1500 seats for ministers had been passed by 200, who will be admitted, but no satisfactory explanation of his action was forthcoming.

Spain, Fraser, Gregory Among the Batch Who Are Dismissed From the Service—Others Pensioned.

OTTAWA, March 30.—(Special.)—The decision of the minister of marine and fisheries upon the recent Cassels enquiry, which has been confirmed by order-in-council, was laid upon the table of the house to-day. The minister deals with the officials named by J. G. Cassels as follows:

Commander Spain, dismissed.
J. F. Fraser, commissioner of lights, dismissed.

"For Cause."
In regard to Lieut.-Col. Gourdeau the order sets forth that "Col. Colonel Gourdeau has shown a lack of discretion, but nothing has been adduced to show that he has acted either directly or indirectly by any action he may have taken."

BOOKKEEPER SAYS M. L. A. HAS CHEATED PROVINCE

W. A. Preston Concerned in Charge Made Against Lumber Co. of Making False Returns.

PORT FRANCES, March 30.—(Special.)—The government has appointed Samuel Price, mining commissioner of Temiskaming District, as a royal commissioner to enquire into the alleged fraudulent action of the Fort Frances Lumber Company of this place, its president, W. A. Preston, M.L.A., and late manager, Wm. Cassidy, in sending false returns to the crown lands department during the years 1907 and 1908, thereby defrauding the government out of some \$300 in timber dues.
The charge is preferred by J. M. Johnston, late bookkeeper for the company, and owing to the prominence of the parties said to be implicated, the case is attracting considerable attention. The court to enquire into the charges will sit in the town hall here April 1.

ONTARIO AND MANITOBA TO GIVE DREADNOUGHT

That's What Ottawa Hears and Other Provinces Want to Get In on It—Commons May Reopen Naval Question.

OTTAWA, March 30.—(Special.)—Information was received here to-night that Manitoba and Ontario are in communication and have practically agreed to offer to contribute a Dreadnought to the imperial navy.
Premier McPhillips of British Columbia has telegraphed that if anything of this nature is contemplated, his province desires to participate. The Premier of New Brunswick has intimated that it is prepared to follow suit.
The question is the sole topic of gossip in the corridors to-night and the Premier's feeling that the question should be reopened.
Hon. W. S. Fielding of the cabinet is said to be very anxious that a more tangible expression of Canada's feeling should be shown than the passing of a resolution.
The Conservative caucus to-morrow night will discuss the question.

LONDON COMMENT

Canada's New Naval Policy is Favorably Viewed.

LONDON, March 30.—(C.A.F.)—The Canadian naval policy meets with unanimous support of the press. The Morning Post thinks it a great opportunity for imperial statesmanship and the Standard says Laurier is not addressing his words to Ottawa nor even to London, but to other capitals where, perhaps, they are more novel and less welcome. The Mail says "Laurier's words will not be forgotten. The graphic simile of imperial statesmanship and the viewpoint the line adopted by Mr. Fisher added: "When I was asked in Zealand is doubtless most desirable, but political considerations have heavily on the side where Canada is now definitely committed. The debate is a splendid sign of Canada's awakening to her responsibilities."

PROHIBITION FOR NOVA SCOTIA

Resolution to That Effect Introduced in the Legislature.

HALIFAX, N.S., March 30.—(Special.)—A resolution was introduced in Nova Scotia Legislature this afternoon for provincial prohibition.
It was moved by Mr. Campbell, Union Reform member for King's County, and seconded by R. H. McKay, Liberal for Pictou, who recently defeated C. E. Tanner in the by-election.
Rev. Mr. Cooper, Liberal for Queen's County, moved adjournment. It is understood he will oppose prohibition, claiming that the present laws give better results.

AMBASSADOR TO BRITAIN

WASHINGTON, March 30.—Senator Root of New York, speaking at a dinner to President Charles Eliot of Harvard University to-night, at which President Taft was also a guest, indicated the choice of Dr. Eliot as the new United States ambassador to Great Britain.

DOWNNEY'S BILL IS KILLED BY PREMIER

Sir James Objects to Compulsory Notification of Tuberculosis as Unnecessary and Unfair to Poorer Classes.

Compulsory notification of tuberculosis disease was the subject of the debate yesterday in the legislature which at least exhibited a considerable amount of independence of opinion on the part of members of the cabinet and the government party generally.
Notification is not for the purpose of placarding residences or removing patients to hospitals, but merely to ensure that proper information as to the treatment and cure of the disease should be imparted.
Premier Whitney would have none of it and declared the idea of it or 40 years ago were good enough for him. Three thousand people die every year of consumption, but if they die of it, die of that argus, Sir James, they would die of something else.
Joseph Downey, sponsor of the bill which was prepared by the provincial board of health, Hon. W. J. Hanna, Hon. Adam Beck and others made a good fight for the bill, but Sir James was obdurate and killed it.
Dr. R. P. Preston renewed the debate adjourned on the second reading of Mr. Downey's bill. There were four proposals to support the bill, but they were unworkable. He agreed with Dr. Godfrey that a commission should be appointed and a report from that body might be acted upon with advantage.
A. C. Pratt considered time would be wasted by a commission. The time was wasted for nothing as the facts were sufficiently known.
A. MacKay (North Oxford) was followed by Hon. A. G. MacKay. He proposed to support the bill, but less important than whether the house was prepared to do something to stop the disease.
Premier Killis H.
Premier Whitney had no doubt that when Mr. Mackay heard from the provincial secretary, Hon. W. J. Hanna, that the government had been doing its full duty. The conclusion to which he and his colleagues had arrived was that the bill could not be accepted. He did not need to go outside the house for reasons. Not one physician had supported the bill. He had read in The London Times that there was no such thing as notification in England except in cases in charge of parish officers. Notwithstanding that, the government obtained the death rate remained about the same. Nature was supreme and went on just the same. Men lived harder and submitted to a greater strain than formerly.
He had been brought up in the country among hard headed people and from what he had heard and seen in a long succession of years, he thought people were being frightened into their graves by the talk about tuberculosis. People would not walk on the same side of the street with those who had a cough. If a physician was in charge of a family what was the government's object in notifying him what to do, unless it was assumed he knew nothing of his profession?
They would be guilty of cruelty thru the system of notification, and the bill did not provide for the most lamentable cases of all where there was no physician. The people too poor to employ physicians had the penalty imposed on them. He appealed to both sides of the house not to impose this burden on the people, but rather to ameliorate and soften the excited public mind. If a man had a tendency to cough, he would not walk on the same side of the street with those who had a cough. If a physician was in charge of a family what was the government's object in notifying him what to do, unless it was assumed he knew nothing of his profession?

PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD WANTS REFORMS

Prohibition of Race Track Betting is One of Them—Italian Accused of Black Hand Methods.

HAMILTON, March 30.—(Special.)—The Presbyterian Synod of Hamilton and London this afternoon passed resolutions calling upon the Dominion Government to amend the Criminal Code so that it would prohibit race track gambling and bring about other social and moral reforms. Rev. Dr. Edgson, moderator, complained of the moving picture show business on account of its pernicious influence and advocated the placing of such shows under censor. The synod also by resolution wants the Ontario Legislature to place the Bible as a text book on the curriculum of the public schools. In presenting the report of the committee on church life and work, Rev. A. L. Budge said that the attention of the general assembly should be called to the calling system, which was affecting the life of the church. Other ministers objected that it was the pride of Presbyterian ministers that they were called to their churches, and Mr. Budge's suggestion was dropped. Rev. D. R. Drummond, in his report on systematic beneficence, said that the congregations were more prompt and systematic in their givings, contribution to some missions had fallen off \$200,000. Fraser Smith reported on foreign missions, stating that there had been an increase of \$5000 in the contributions of the churches, but the contributions per capita per annum to only 44 cents.

Threatened Arson

Smit Daphan, an Italian, was arrested to-night, charged with threatening to burn down the house of Martin Tuoman, 192 Princess street, unless paid \$150. The threat, so it is alleged, was made to-day. At their meeting this afternoon, the city hospital board said that they were perfectly willing to leave themselves in the hands of the city council. The receipts of the hospital for the month of February amounted to \$2774. The annexation committee of the city and Barton Township Councils this evening practically agreed on terms of annexation. One dispute is with reference to the district immediately east of Sherman-avenue and south of Main-street. The hospital board, however, district want to pay only the township rate of taxation for five years and the city will not agree to that. The matter is to be referred to the city council.



EXTENSION FOR LOOPS RAILWAY'S NEW OFFER

Manager Fleming's Proposition Looks Reasonable, Says Mayor.

Street railway wants lines on: Bay-street from Front-street to Queen-street; Victoria-street from Wilton-avenue to Adelaide-street; Adelaide-street from Church-street to Wellington-street from Church-street to York-street; Teraraulay-street to Agnes-street; thence along Agnes-street and St. Patrick-street to Bay-street; Line on Harbour-street. Line on Harbour-street. From Victoria-street to the Don, across bridge to Elliott-street, up Broadview-avenue to cross street between Gerrard-street and Danforth-avenue. If an agreement is reached on this basis about 15 miles of new street railway track will be constructed this year, making 115 miles trackage.

At a conference between Mayor Oliver and Manager Fleming in the city hall yesterday afternoon the company submitted terms as above. While the mayor did not definitely commit himself to acceptance, he stated afterwards that he considered the proposition reasonable. Mr. Fleming will make a written offer within a few days, after which it will be up to the council of the city, which will have to make one of the most important decisions in years on matters of street railway policy. It is admitted that the growth of the city makes certain extensions highly desirable. It is not necessary but there is strong opposition to car tracks on Bay-street which is the only down town thoroughfare paralleling York-street, given over entirely to vehicular traffic. Mayor Oliver said after the conference that Manager Fleming had made a very fair proposition, and that the company would send him a letter in a day or two setting forth the details. "It will be a matter of new lines east, west and north," said his worship, who was evidently very well satisfied with the results of the conference. "The only thing I will have to swallow would be the Bay-street line, I haven't just made up my mind about that yet."

he explained and announced that it would give the company pleasure to offer in return the Teraraulay-Agnes-St. Patrick line and also the Wilton-avenue line. He explained that the cross street line from Broadview-avenue to Carlaw-avenue was preferable to the line up Carlaw-avenue, as such a line would simply parallel the Broadview-avenue line and wouldn't be of advantage to the people of upper Riverdale. Receipts Piling Up. If receipts continue to increase as they are doing the railway would be able very comfortably to afford to build the new lines. So far this month receipts are over \$23,000 ahead of those for the same period of March, 1908, and since Jan. 1 the increase is \$58,924, while operating expenses are \$600,000 less. It is, of course, the prospect of motor bus competition, since 60 buses are expected to be in operation in a month. Manager Fleming says he isn't worrying over the outlook, however.



Profit Taking Movement A Pressure On New York Stocks

Good Supply of Securities Forces a Backdown on Wall Street—Local Traders Await Public Buying.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, March 30. The two factors which mainly entered into the dealings at the Toronto Stock Exchange to-day were the annual financial statement of the Canadian General Electric Company and the announcement of the increase in the Rio Tramway capital.

Generally speaking the market was somewhat inactive above the level of the previous day and there was less speculation in the Coal and Steel stocks than has recently been the case. Speculative sentiment in the market continues conservatively bullish, but outside interest is not broadening to any great extent, and traders close to the market do not feel disposed to take on much stock until more favorable signs of an increased public interest are manifested.

Investment buying continues to be a very light order, but prices in all issues which are being dealt in by those who buy shares outright have a firm undertone.

Since Friday the New York banks have lost \$1,300,000 to the sub-treasury. Monday's advance carried the average price of 20 active railroad stocks to within 1-4 of 10 per cent of high prices since the panic.

Prices earnings of 37 American roads for the third week of March increased 7.82 per cent. Rumor forecasts a 7 per cent rate for Southern Pacific common and retirement of the preferred coincident with consummation of bond arrangements.

Anaconda Copper Company declared regular quarterly dividend of 50 cents share.

Joseph says: Atchison, Baltimore & Ohio and the Pacific continue strong abroad and the buying of these is as confident as at any time since the turn of the market came. The Erie commission for February is certainly an eye opener. The company gained thru an increase of \$2,000,000 in gross and not less than \$780,000 in the 28 days, and March will be even better. This disposal, of course, of any receivership story, would be a relief to the market above 100. There is another Harriman stock that is likely to do some stunts at any moment, Illinois Central. It will bear close watching.

The trend of opinion seems to be strongly upward now. We firmly believe Southern Pacific will work up to 150. Union Pacific will meet offerings of any kind that would seem to have been dormant we think bull turns may be made by quick traders.—Financial Bulletin.

While speculative sentiment is overwhelmingly bullish, the retirement of the shorts and in many cases the doubling up on the long side, are calculated to weaken the general situation more than would seem from the apparent strength. Consequently it would be wise to abstain generally from buying stocks on bulges. There are some issues that in view of the present manipulation, we think ought to sell two to five points higher. Among them are Baltimore & Ohio, Great Northern, Illinois Central, Atchison, Northwestern Atlantic Coast, Canadian Pacific, Kansas City Southern, Consolidated Gas, People's Gas, North American and Western Union. On the other hand, we would take the selling side of Union Pacific, Southern Pacific, Reading, Smelting, Copper and Colorado Fuel, on the bulges for turns. These stocks will be subject of heavy liquidation on any further rise. St. Paul, New York Central and Erie may be forced several points higher, but on any marked bulge we would go short of them, as later on we think they will sell well under present figures. Foreigners will not buy very heavily until our own public purchases with greater liberality.—Town Topics.

On Wall Street. C. I. Hudson wired Beatty & Glasco, 14 King-street west, the following: While the general stock market eased off somewhat under heavy profit taking, a few issues, including U. S. Steel,

continued firm and closed with good increase in price, and was a point up after a rise of 1-1/2 points, and was the feature of the day. Many were mystified because of its great strength, but we are not surprised. People with long foresight are buying it because of future possibilities. The tariff issue will be settled within two months. Then the steel trade ought to boom. It may react somewhat in the meantime. We must be prepared for setbacks. But we believe that anybody who will buy Steel and say it away will not regret it. It is altogether likely that there is a large short interest still outstanding in Steel stocks. There was a material increase in public buying of stocks to-day. A few more days like this and the general public may run away with the market. While we were a material buyer of stocks, they will not be able to buy at moderate setbacks. Some of the lower priced ones will probably give best results.

Enn & Stoppard wired to D. Urquhart: The volume of business both in stocks and bonds decreased somewhat to-day after the unusual activity on Monday. In fact, the volume of stocks on balance and general interest in the trading showed considerable expansion, with various upward movements in individual issues. Although the extent of recent advances in prominent stocks seems sufficient to account for such reactionary tendencies or hesitancy as appeared during the session, the trend of events is constructive and encouraging, and we feel very sanguine regarding outcome of fluctuations during the year.

Miller & Co. wired Wallace & Eastwood after the close, as follows: For the first hour the trading element on the floor spent most of the day working for a reaction, and it seemed to be particularly anxious to offer Union Pacific at moderate concessions of price. The stocks of the week, being carried by weakly margined holders, the Steels and the metal situation bids fair to will discount. We remain entirely friendly to the positive view.

LEGISLATURE COMMITTEES

Toronto to Vote on Ward System in School Board Elections. The Sunday car question was finally disposed of yesterday by the private bills committee as far as Fort Arthur and Fort William are concerned.

Automobile regulation will be considered by a sub-committee composed of Geo. Pattinson, Waterloo; D. C. Ross, Middlesex; Dr. Godfrey, West York; J. J. Craig, East Wellington; J. J. Carrick, Fort Arthur; George H. Gooderham and W. K. McNaught, Toronto, and Geo. W. Sulman, Kent.

The North York member is also moving to amend the insurance act in respect to cash payments. He would provide that directors may also be agents if they want to. He would further remove the one-third limitation now existing, and permit them to carry as much insurance as they like, provided they deposit with the government money equal to the amount deposited by other companies.

An amendment to the university act introduced by Hon. Dr. Pyne will give Dr. John Seath, superintendent of education for the province, a seat on the university board.

By the provisions of an act respecting lunatics to be introduced into the legislature by the attorney-general, the present Ontario Statute is repealed and the English act is substituted. Hon. Col. Matheson's bill to amend the succession duties act aims to remove some of the objections to the present act. The surtax on lineals, which stopped at three per cent, they would otherwise pay, making the total payment where lineals, i.e., children, are concerned, equal to ten per cent.

In the public accounts committee, D. C. Ross of North Middlesex, took exception to the manner in which expenditures on bridges were made, but an examination of A. W. Campbell, deputy minister of public works, satisfied Mr. Ross. At the next meeting, Audrey White, deputy minister of lands and forests, will be examined to the system of payment in connection with colonization roads.
