# Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

## ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twenty-Fourth Annual Meeting of the Society convened in Knox Church, Ottawa, on the afternoon of Tuesday, May 1st, and held sessions for three days, about 225 delegates were in attendance, the majority being from the Eastern branches of the Society, though there were some from as far west as the Huron Presbyterial. The church had been made beautiful with flowers, and nothing was left undone for the comfort of those present.

Too much cannot be said in praise of the ladies in Ottawa, who were most kind and thoughtful hostesses, not withstanding the great demands that there were upon their time, strength and liberality in helping those who had been rendered homeless by the recent great fire.

The President, Mrs. Shortreed, presided at the Sessions. The opening afternoon meeting was of a devotional nature, the President being assisted by Mrs. MacLaren, Toronto, Mrs. Gardener, Ottawa, Mrs. Needham, Orillia, Mrs. Cooke, Smith's Falls, and Mrs. Fraser, Lancaster, who gave a most helpful Bible reading on "Abiding in Christ," based on the 15th chapter of St. John.

The President on Wednesday morning delivered an inspiring address on different aspects of the work, one must make its needs our own and so our prayers will be availing before our Heavenly Father. The Secretaries' reports were then read, and the Treasurer's statement showing the givings of the year to be \$46,331.47, being an advance on the previous year of \$818.19. In addition to this \$5,406.03 had been contributed to the famine fund.

Two addresses were given by missionaries on Wednesday afternoon. Miss Blackadder, after nearly twenty-four years service in Trinidad, gave "home touches" from her life there, and delighted everyone present by her graphic powers of description and wholesouled consecration in the Master's service.

Miss R. W. Chase, B.A., also spoke describing her work in



the college, and gave a masterly explanation of the need of education amongst the high-caste natives, that they are an intellectual people and their souls are reached through their reasoning powers, instances were given of several who had attended the College having given themselves to Christ and exerting a Christian influence in the important positions which they now fill in the community.

A most interesting part of the proceedings was the report of the Ecumenical Conference, New York, given by Mrs. McQuesten, Hamilton. She in few well chosen words gave a very inspiring account of the gathering. Mrs. Thorburn, Ottawa, also gave a short report of the International Conference held last year at Washington.

Frequent mention was made in a sympathetic manner of the disastrous fire which had visited Ottawa and Hull, and the delegates present showed their practical sympathy by contributing over \$100 towards the relief of those who had suffered in Presbyterian congregations, a graceful acknowledgment of this assistance was made by Mrs. Hay, Ottawa. Mrs. Alexander, Ottawa, gave the closing words, dwelling on the theme of personal responsibility, and lifting all hearts to solemnizing thoughts of duty.

The Question Drawer, ably conducted by Mrs. Fletcher, Thames Road, was the medium of numerous questions, many of which were answered, so as to give valuable hints on methods of conducting meetings.

### Conference.

The usual Conference of the Board, comprising the thirty-six Managers with Presidents or their substitutes and Presbyterial Secretaries and Treasurers took place on Tuesday evening. The subjects discussed were, increasing the membership of the Society; the purchasing of small packages of literature for annual Presbyterial meetings; the expenses of Auxiliaries how incurred and how met; the necessity of keeping up the Mission Bands, and Auxiliaries having an oversight of them, for the purpose of training the younger ones in the work of the Society. Those present expressed themselves freely on these subjects, and some good suggestions were made for remedying the difficulties spoken of.

On Wednesday afternoon a Conference of Mission Band workers was held under the guidance of Mrs. Grant, Home Secretary. Mrs. Gardener, Ottawa, gave a missionary tree exercise with a class of girls and, Miss Beatty, Pembroke also took part.

### Greetings.

Greetings were received from seven sister societies. Mrs. Kines, representing the Methodist, Mrs. Halkett, the Baptist, Mrs. Lambe, the Congregational, Mrs. Shortreed, the Jewish Mission, Mrs. McMurrich, the McAll Mission, and Miss McMaster, Montreal, the Woman's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church, Province of Quebec.

Letters of greeting were received from the following Societies: Woman's Missionary Union, Queensland; Woman's Missionary Union, Otago, New Zealand; W.F.M.S., Philadelphia; W.P.F.M., Northern, New York; W.P.B.M., Chicago; W.P.B.M., Portland, Ore.; W.B.F.M., St. Louis; W.O.B.F.M., San Francisco; Leper Mission Association, Guelph.

### Public Meeting.

On Wednesday evening a public meeting was held in Knox Church, presided over by the Rev. Dr. Moore, Convener of the General Assembly F.M.C. After devotional exercises, the Rev. W. D. Armstrong extended a cordial welcome to the delegates present. Mr. Geo. Hay, Ottawa, presented the reports of the Society. Miss Blackadder, Trinidad, Miss. M. W. Chase, B.A., Indore, and the Rev. A. B. Winchester, Vancouver, B.C., all gave addresses on these different fields of labor.

### Resolutions.

The following resolutions were presented to the Society and carried by a standing vote.

On the resignation of Mrs. Campbell from the office of Corresponding Secretary:—

The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society learns with deep regret that Mrs. Campbell has been compelled to withdraw from the active service of Corresponding Secretary of the Society, and in consideration of her long and efficient services, the Society desires to place on record its due appreciation of her untiring self-denying and loving service so cheerfully rendered on every occasion and trust that we may long have the benefit of her wise counsel and experience.

On the division of Mrs Telfer's work:—

The Society is also sorry to learn that Mrs. Telfer finds it necessary to give up a part of her work in connection with her department of literature, which has grown to such magnitude under her careful and judicious management. We are glad, however, that she will still continue the supervision of "Missionary Tidings," which to all our Auxiliaries is such a welcome visitor from month to month, and are only sorry she is not here to introduce our little magazine in its new and attractive form. We miss



very much the bright, inspiring faces of these faithful officers and sincerely hope that they may soon again be seen in their accustomed places on the platform.

Mrs. Jeffrey's trip to the North-West :—

The Society desires to express its deep sympathy with Mrs. Jeffrey in her enforced absence through weakness from our Annual Meeting, and especially realizing that this has been caused by her indefatigable efforts to further the interests of our missions in the North-West and British Columbia. We earnestly pray that she may soon be restored to her wonted health and vigor, to continue the work she has so materially advanced and which is so dear to her heart.

#### Allocation of the Money.

Moved by Mrs. Armstrong, Ottawa, seconded by Miss Gibson, Ottawa, and carried :—That the Treasurer of the W.F.M.S. pay to the Foreign Mission Committee the sum of \$1,400, towards the expenses of the W.F.M.S. for the current year ; and also that the Treasurer be empowered to pay to the Foreign Mission Committee such sums as the Board may direct during the year.

Moved by Mrs. Alexander, Ottawa, seconded by Mrs. Vincent, Hamilton :—That the Treasurer of the W.F.M.S. pay to the Treasurer of the Ewart Missionary Training Home, during the current year, such sums as may be required for the maintenance of the Home.

#### Time and Place of Next Annual Meeting.

Mrs. Grant, extended a hearty invitation to hold the next Annual Meeting in Toronto, which was gratefully accepted by the Society.

#### Votes of Thanks.

It was moved by Mrs. Horne, Elora, seconded by Mrs. Hamilton, Goderich, and carried by standing vote—That the sincere and cordial thanks of the visiting delegates be tendered to the ladies of Ottawa, and to those of Knox Church, who have so kindly entertained us, especially when there were so many extra calls upon them in assisting those who were rendered homeless by the fire.

Hearty votes of thanks were also passed to the Trustees and Managers of Knox Church for the use of the church for the Annual Meeting ; to the organist and choir for their services ; and to those who added so much to the pleasure of the meeting by their solos.

To Dr. Warden, who so kindly audited the Treasurer's books ; to the Press for the reports of the meeting ; to the Railways for reduced fares.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

DEAR DELEGATES AND FRIENDS :—A great poet has said, "Time travels in divers paces with divers people." With the members of our Society he travels at an ever-increasing pace. We scarcely realize that one anniversary is past before another is at hand, and as the work enlarges and presses for attention, so much more swiftly do we find the days glide by. Six years ago we met in this city to report the work of our eighteenth year. To some of us it seems little more than as many months since we enjoyed the kind hospitality of our Ottawa friends, and held conference here concerning the great work entrusted to us. Pleasant memories of the many kindnesses then received still hold a large place in our hearts. We were, therefore, looking forward with brightest anticipation to our meeting in Ottawa, until the sad news reached us that a great fire was raging in this beautiful city. As soon as we had definite information regarding the extent of the disaster, your Executive was called and immediate steps taken to arrange to hold our annual meeting in Toronto, and relieve Ottawa of all responsibility. Our action was then communicated to the committee here, but they urged so strongly that no change be made lest the meeting suffer, that we felt constrained to yield to their wishes. We deeply sympathize with all who have suffered through this calamitous fire, and while appreciating the loyalty of the Ottawa friends to the work of our Society, and their readiness to sacrifice themselves to its interests, we were very reluctant to add in the least to their burden of anxiety and care. All concerned will understand that had it been possible to do otherwise our annual meeting would not have been held here at such an inopportune time, we believe, however, that He who over-ruleth all things will grant the greater blessing to those who have so kindly welcomed our delegates under such trying circumstances.

Though the years have passed swiftly they have marked many changes in the personnel of our membership. Many of our workers have passed through seasons of trial and loss, and not a few of them have thus been compelled to withdraw from the work which for years had been to them a privilege and a delight. Other esteemed friends with whom we loved to meet and take sweet counsel have been called to higher service, and to-day we "long for the touch of a vanished hand, and the sound of a voice that is still." To them the change has "merged hope into fruition," and they now serve in the presence of their King; and while we mourn our loss we cannot but rejoice that with them "all is well." The thought of time's onward march, and the changes which follow urge us to earnest endeavor to do with our



might all that opportunity makes possible in the advancement of our Lord's kingdom.

We are living in one of the most eventful periods of the world's history. The century now closing has been one of marvelous development along many lines, but that which especially marks it from a Christian standpoint, is the rapid growth of missionary sentiment and effort. One hundred years ago there was little that to the human eye gave token of the approach of a great missionary era. To only a few chosen ones of that time was faith given to behold the "little cloud" which indicated the showers of blessing that were to enrich and fructify all future missionary effort. Those faithful missionary pioneers laid hold of Omnipotent power in prayer and consecration and won for Christendom a quickening and enlightenment regarding the true purpose in life of God's redeemed children. Christians everywhere are now called to worthily occupy this inheritance of privilege and responsibility which has been so increased and enriched during the past century. To-day with scarcely an exception the countries of the world are open to missionary effort. It is, true that in the case of some the entrance is still hedged about with difficulties, but these are being gradually removed and the almost universal cry from heathendom is, "Come over and help us."

We rejoice that God has laid the evangelization of the world upon our hearts and consciences and has in any measure enabled us to respond to His call to service. Yet we cannot but feel that there are heights to which we have not attained. Must we not all confess that we have failed to reach the limit of our possibilities in Christ? Have thought more of our own inability than of His strength made perfect in our weakness, have been more exercised about our own helplessness, than with the thought that we can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth us, and thus we have limited the blessing that should have flowed through us to the world. Has there not been failure too, in our conception of the magnitude and urgency of the world's need and in sympathy for the multitudes who know not of the world's need and in sympathy for the multitudes who know not of Christ. If we had the love for souls born of close abiding in Him, would we not be more anxious that He should teach us how to pray the effectual fervent prayer that availeth much, and be more instant and devoted in His service? We grieve that there are not more souls born into the Kingdom through the ministry of our missionaries; that there are not more of our Presbyterian women interested in missions; that there are difficulties and hindrances in our work; but, how many of us have wrestled in prayer for souls; for the removal of hindrances; for unity and good-will among our workers and for the quickening of missionary interest in the hearts of all Christian women? We have made these our burden of earnest prayer, but have they been so laid upon our hearts, that we, like Jacob of old, would not let go without the desired blessing. It is borne in upon me more and more that if we would prevail in prayer, we must feel the burden of those for whom we pray, we must enter into their need so

fully that our cry for them will be one of intense desire, accompanied with the faith that will not waver or grow discouraged. God has signally blessed our efforts in the past, even though much that was unworthy mingled with our service. The work has grown by His blessing to fair dimensions and our hearts have been gladdened as we have heard of souls being born into the kingdom, through the ministry of our missionaries. For all the blessings our God has vouchsafed us, we are deeply thankful and ascribe to Him the glory and the praise.

From the reports in your hands you will gather much of cheer and encouragement. It is not in my province to enlarge upon questions that properly come to you through our secretaries. There are a few points, however, to which I may be permitted to refer. Those who were present at the conference last night know that a strong desire has been expressed, that this closing year of the century should be marked in our society by a large increase in the membership. The thought was first presented to your board by one of its members, and so eloquently and earnestly did she plead that action should be taken that we were moved to earnest desire that all the women of our church should be enlisted in this effort to win the world for Christ. We therefore pass it on to you in the hope that some wise, concerted action may be taken to bring about so desirable an issue. We well know that there are women who could not possibly attend our meetings, but are they not the exception? And even so they need not be debarred from a living interest in missions. They should be reached and made acquainted with the nature of the work and brought into sympathy with it. Individual influence and effort must be brought to bear, and that after patient waiting for Divine guidance and help. No part of our work requires more delicate management than that of seeking to arouse the uninterested, but is it not worth while to make an honest attempt to win at least one such convert to the service of the Master? What an impetus the work would receive if even half our present membership were doubled in the coming year! All our women are needed—the home-makers and mothers, the women of culture and leisure, each has a niche to fill and all are called to use their influence and power in the Master's cause. Let us make this a matter of earnest prayer while gathered here, that we may go back to our Auxiliaries on fire with desire to win new workers for Christ.

Another and most important question is: "What shall be done to win and keep our young people?" We learn from the Home Secretary's report that Mission Bands are constantly falling out of line, and the reason usually given is, "Lack of a leader." If the organizations of young people in our congregations could only be interested in the systematic study of missions, led by the pastor or any one fitted to guide intelligently in such a course, there might then be a source of supply from which to draw leaders for our Mission Bands. The young people would, in this way, acquire such a knowledge of missions and missionaries as would kindle in them a



living interest in all the great work entrusted to the church. Where it is possible for a young woman to take advantage of the facilities for study open to her in connection with the Ewart Missionary Training Home, no better preparation need be desired for the office of a Mission Band Leader, or for any other department of the Church's work open to women. It is desirable in this connection to turn our attention to the training of the children in the Sabbath schools and Junior Christian Endeavor Societies. Many of the women in our Auxiliaries and Young Women's Bands, are teachers and leaders in these, and have weight in their councils. Could they not use their influence in having the subject of missions more constantly before the minds of the children. In an article in the "Sunday School Times," of April 14th, entitled "What is the Sunday School doing for Missions?"—a statement, giving the contributions of the Sunday schools connected with a number of the Missionary Boards of the United States, shows "that the Sunday school is a veritable gold-mine capable of yielding large returns for missionary purposes." The whole article is interesting and suggestive, and worthy of careful perusal. We urge the women of our Auxiliaries to interest themselves in the education of the children of our Sunday schools along missionary lines, not that their givings may flow into our treasury, but that they may be trained to an intelligent interest in foreign missions. The Junior Christian Endeavor Societies might, we think, be organized in connection with our Auxiliaries, as is done in sister societies of the United States, and their missionary contributions go to increase the funds of our Society.

We have had before us for months the terrible story of famine and distress in India. In Great Britain and America sympathetic hearts have been deeply touched, and helping hands extended, but there still comes the cry of pressing need from millions of human beings, suffering and dying for want of the bare necessities of life. Our missionaries are giving themselves and their substance unsparingly, to relieve and rescue widows and orphans. We must uphold them by our gifts and prayers, that they may have it in their power to gather in large numbers of these destitute ones to teach and train. The opportunity is great, may we wisely use it to advance the cause of Christ in India. We greatly rejoice that the response from our Society has been generous and that the gifts continue to flow in. May we have generosity of heart to devise liberal things, not only for the present need, but for the enlargement of the work that must naturally follow. The children rescued during the famine, become the wards of the Mission and must be trained, not only in spiritual things, but also to use their physical and mental powers, that they be able later on to provide for themselves. This calls for the establishment of Industrial schools, in which they may be taught such industries as will fit them for after usefulness. To what these institutions may develop, we cannot at the present determine, or what their probable cost will be, compared with the day schools, but

of one thing we may be assured, the results will be infinitely greater and more satisfactory, as the children will be under the constant supervision of those in charge, and opportunities for character-building will be greatly increased. Our missionaries are most anxious to gather in as many as possible, and pleading requests have come from them that they may be allowed increased accommodation and means for carrying on this work. Another outcome of the famine is an Industrial school for blind children established on a limited scale at Ujjain. This appeals strongly to our sympathy, and will, I am sure, have the generous support of our society. We have been called upon to consider the question of necessary accommodation for the rescued ones, this will involve expenditure for property on which to build at Neemuch, and possibly additional expense for buildings at other stations, but we are confident that our members will be of one mind in their desire to meet the present needs. The call for more missionary workers in India is urgent, the staff being so reduced through the ill-health of several of its members. The demand for suitable missionary workers is greater than the supply, and the perplexing question is "How shall the difficulty be met?" Our Missionary Training Home is now an established fact and good results from it are already apparent, though as yet its possibilities are limited. Many of the young women applying for foreign service, find it impossible, or express unwillingness, to bear the additional expense of a year or two in the Home after taking their University or Medical course. Many of them, too, are impatient to begin their life's work, and fail to see the importance of the preparation thus provided for them. We are convinced that this is a mistake. Again and again have we heard experienced missionaries state that it was a great regret to them that they had not received such training before appointment to the mission field. We appreciate the difficulty in the case of those who find it impossible to meet the necessary expense of this additional course and would be rejoiced if some of our large-hearted, wealthy Presbyterians would take in hand to establish this institution on a basis that would permit of bursaries or scholarships to encourage worthy applicants for mission service. We commend this part of the work to you, in the hope that you will give it earnest and prayerful thought and I trust that in the near future it may be placed on such a substantial footing as will make it not the least important of the educational institutions of our Church.

It is with deepest regret that we announce the retirement of Mrs. Hugh Campbell, from the position of corresponding secretary of the Board. Mrs. Campbell, as you know, has been for many years a most faithful officer. During the past year an unusually heavy burden of correspondence fell to her lot, a part of that which had formerly been the work of the foreign secretary was transferred to her. The missionary conference already mentioned, also greatly increased her duties, but all was done with a zeal and interest that told of real love for the work. While regretting her retirement from office, we are



glad that we may still have the benefit of her experience on our board.

We have also to announce that Mrs. Telfer, Secretary of Publications, has been obliged, on account of failing health, to ask that she be relieved of part of the heavy burden she has carried so willingly and successfully for many years. This department has grown to such dimensions under her careful and wise management, that it is now altogether too great a task for one secretary to overtake. The Board has therefore decided, that the management of our *Foreign Missionary Tidings* shall be separated from the general literature, and the latter placed in charge of another secretary. We are pleased that Mrs. Telfer has signified her willingness to continue as secretary-treasurer of the former, as her experience and service will still be retained to your Board. The work done in the past by Mrs. Telfer has been of inestimable value. To her untiring and judicious efforts is largely due the present sound basis on which our publication and literature department stands. It is a great disappointment to us all that she is unable to be with us to-day to present *The Tidings* in its new and improved form, and to report to you her work for the past year. This will be done by her daughter, Mrs. MacGillivray, who edits our publication with such marked ability.

The visit of our secretary of Indian Missions to the North-West and British Columbia last summer, was most opportune and of great benefit to her department, but we deeply regret that it was at such a cost to herself. The trip necessitated most arduous journeying and exposure to all kinds of weather, and the result has been that Mrs. Jeffrey has suffered from continued ill-health ever since her return. It is a real regret to us all that she could not come to Ottawa at this time to give a report of her visit. No part of our work shows more marked progress than that among the Indians, and our society is deeply indebted to Mrs. Jeffrey's untiring efforts on their behalf, and her wise management of the work.

Another year of service is completed, a year fruitful to your Board in experience and blessing. Burdens and anxieties pressed upon us again and again until we were ready to exclaim, "Who is sufficient for these things?" But our testimony to-day is, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." In the world around there has been commotion and sore distress—war, famine and pestilence have carried havoc, devastation and death to multitudes, and the need of the peoples of the earth for the loving Gospel of our Lord and His Christ has become more and more apparent. Looking forward to the future, may we with increased zeal and deeper devotion aim to extend the knowledge of the love of Jesus to the sin-burdened and hopeless in our own and other lands, and may we too, be more faithful in prayer for the coming of the Kingdom of our Lord, that glorious time when strife and sorrow shall cease, "and He shall speak peace unto the heathen, and His dominion shall be from sea to sea, and from the river, even unto the ends of the earth."

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

---

As each year passes an ever increasing amount of business comes before the Board for consideration, and the closing year has been no exception to the rule.

In the reports of the different Secretaries will be found the details of the year's work, and there has also been at the weekly meetings the usual necessary routine business. . Forty-three meetings of the Board have been held and thirty-seven meetings of the Executive, besides frequent meetings of the Finance Committee and conferences between Special Committees and the Executive of the F. M. Committee, the hearty co-operation and kindly aid of these gentlemen have been of special service when questions had to be considered requiring a wider knowledge of the Church's work.

The attendance of the members has been good, though some have been prevented from being present by illness and bereavement in their families. To all such is extended the affectionate sympathy of their fellow members.

An unusually large number of Missionaries have been in the home land this year, and in order to give the thought and care required in answering the many requests that come—"for a missionary to speak at our meeting," a small committee was appointed to arrange a series of meetings for the different Missionaries so that they might not be overtaxed, and that health and strength might be carefully guarded, at the same time endeavoring to minister to the best interests of our branches in their work. Special consideration has also been given to increasing the membership of the Society, and the subject has been placed before you in the *Tidings*.

The Corresponding Secretary has very successfully carried out the arrangements necessary for our delegates' attendance and work in connection with the Ecumenical Conference of 1900 to be held in New York, and those able to attend the meetings are eagerly anticipating the privilege of being present at such a notable gathering of the Master's workers from distant lands, as well as of those from nearer home.

The Secretary for the North-West and British Columbia has



given from time to time at the Board an account of her trip amongst the Mission Stations of the West, and has been able to give much valuable information which has guided the Board in its consideration of plans for the welfare of our Indian brethren. The Society is under a debt of gratitude to Mrs. Jeffrey for her self-denying labors undertaken at much personal hardship and fatigue owing to the immense distances of the western land and the inconvenience and discomfort of travelling arrangements.

The cry of famine stricken India has come close to every heart, and a special grant was made to help the sufferers there, which has been largely supplemented by liberal donations from our branches sent through the Treasurer to Dr. Warden.

The Management of the Training Home has necessarily increased the responsibilities of the Board. Early in the year the Training Home Committee was merged into the Executive Committee. You have before you the report of the Home, and can judge for yourselves what an important factor it will become in the work of the Society. We specially commend it to your prayers and to your practical support, that from the congregations of the Church there may come to the Home consecrated women who shall receive special training to fit them for work not only in the Foreign field but in the North-West and British Columbia.

It has been a great pleasure to welcome the workers from the field at our meetings. Mrs. Wilkie, the Misses Duncan, Ptolemy Chase, Dougan and Dr. Turnbull were all present and gave graphic details of their life and work in India. The Misses Laidlaw, McLaren, Currie and Mr. Skene, from the West, were also with us, and their earnest words reported to you in the *Tidings* should prove an incentive to us all to more faithful service in our work for the Master.

We commend the work of the Society to the women of the Church, feeling sure that they will put forth still greater efforts for the furtherance of the cause of Missions—there is much yet to be done, and the time is passing swiftly. May Christ go before each one of us in the way, and trusting in Him, glorious things will yet be accomplished.

### MISSIONS IN INDIA.

It is sometimes said that missionary reports are all alike, the work goes on from year to year without much change and there is little variety to report, but we must remember that the facts we hear of from time to time and that seem so much the same, the "few women interested" or the "few converts gained," are souls most precious in God's sight; and the report that may be read over in a few minutes means a long year of effort and self-denying labor on the part of the missionary.

In October, Miss Goodfellow, the first graduate of the Ewart Training Home to be sent out, was appointed to our Indian Mission, but even with this addition the staff is quite too small for the amount of work already opened up and expansion is impossible—indeed much anxiety has been felt lest the burden should be too great for those left to toil on in the field. Word has just reached us that Miss Leyden is ordered by the doctors to return to Canada and she is now on the voyage home. Miss Leyden has been an enthusiastic worker and can ill be spared. Miss Dougan's health will not permit her to return to India, though her heart is in the work there. Of those who returned home last year, Miss Ptolemy is better though not yet as strong as we would like to see her, she has been able to address some meetings and hopes to return to India this fall.

Miss Chase has regained her health, but the way does not yet seem open for her return to India, her name is left on the roll in the hope that in the future she may find it possible to return once more to the work she loves. Miss Duncan has been doing work in addressing meetings, but regains health slowly, and is still far from strong.

Dr. Turnbull has since her return been seriously ill—for some time before she left India she was quite unfit for all she was doing, but she worked on beyond her strength and we fear it may be some time before she is fully restored and able to return. With so many in the home land there is urgent need for more workers to take their place.

The long and serious illness of the Rev. N. H. Russell caused much anxiety. Our sympathy has been with Mrs. Russell at this trying time and we rejoice with her that in God's mercy he has been spared to her and to the work.

No report of the Indian Mission this year would be complete without reference to the famine. In the early autumn letters from India had a tone of anxiety, famine was "feared," later the

"hoped for rains had not fallen," the dreaded "famine was coming," then as the days lengthened into weeks *fears* became a terrible *reality* and India was face to face with a famine both of food and water; a famine more wide-spread than any of former years and therefore entailing a far greater amount of distress and suffering, indeed it seemed as if a report of the *work* could only be a report of *suffering*. What this has meant to our missionaries we can scarcely realize, but with true courage they have met the situation and have tried by every means in their power to help, to feed, to rescue the suffering, and so prove to the people of India that the "Gospel of love they have been preaching for twenty years" is a real thing and teaches men to think of and care for others. In our hospitals and dispensaries are many sick, not from any disease, but for want of nourishing food, and the question of increased accommodation for orphans and widows is a pressing one. To save and train these children is surely the Church's opportunity, for in a few years they will form a self-supporting Christian community. May our missionaries have the needed wisdom and strength to carry on this work, and may we in the home hand be faithful in bearing our share of the burden.

To add to the suffering and horrors of the famine, there has been an epidemic of smallpox. As you will learn some of the schools have had for a time to be closed. Many of the children in the Homes have suffered from it, and some have died. There has been constant risk in caring for them, all helping to make this a year of peculiar trials and yet through all the anxieties there have been abundant blessings. God has to His weary overburdened workers vouchsafed His keeping power. One and another acknowledge "uncounted mercies and blessings" the good hand of our God upon them, leading, guiding, supporting, giving "fulness of sunshine" as well as "sorrowful night."

### Indore.

**MEDICAL WORK.** — Miss Marion Oliver, M.D., and Miss Thomson. One of the great drawbacks in carrying on efficient hospital work has been the difficulty in securing suitable young Christians to train as nurses. This year a regular training class has been begun, the course to extend over a term of three years. So many widows and girls were taken in during the famine three years ago that there will soon be a number of women available for training. For various reasons Miss Oliver was short-handed during most of the year and the Hospital has frequently been overcrowded, sometimes with cases requiring a great deal of care and attention. The



nurses on day duty have given from one hour to an hour and a half every afternoon to reading, singing and teaching texts of Scripture to their patients. There has been an increase in the number of surgical and obstetrical cases, showing that the Hospital is steadily more and more meeting the needs of suffering womanhood.

*Statistical Summary.*—Number of in-patients 215, out-patients 4,973, treatments 15,362.

*Girls' Boarding School.*—Miss Sinclair. The school began with fourteen pupils eight years ago. This year it has been recognized as a High School by the Senate of Calcutta University. There are at present ninety-two boarders, rather more than half of whom are famine children taken in three years ago. With only three or four exceptions they have proved bright and eager pupils, giving every reason to hope that from among them not a few shall be raised up to serve Him whom they have come to know as the True Bread of Life. Four of the older girls have given up their studies in the vernacular, and while continuing their English studies, are doing good work as teachers in the lower vernacular classes. The daily Bible lesson and Scripture study classes have been continued throughout the year, with an ever-deepening love of the Word on the part of most of the pupils. The older girls, with the help of the matron, conduct Sunday School, one of them presides at the organ and teaches the highest class.

*Y. W. C. A.*—Meetings have been regularly held at midday on Sabbath. For the most part the girls manage the meetings themselves, Miss Oliver having a Bible reading with them occasionally. Considering the small amount of money at their disposal their faithfulness in giving is most commendable. An annual subscription is sent to the Leper Asylum at Sabathu. Miss Sinclair writes that "while religious training is regarded as of infinitely greater importance than any other, and the intellectual development as necessary to a strong, healthy Christian womanhood, yet their domestic training is not neglected. The girls do all their own grinding, sweeping, sewing, cooking, etc.; the bigger girls look after the clothing of the little ones and "mother" them generally—and all are, it is hoped, being fitted by their training to live useful, helpful lives when they go out from the school.

*Evangelistic.*—Miss White. Miss White has continued her work among the Mang women. The Mangs are a very poor and low caste, and the work this year as heretofore has had its lights and shadows. Meetings have been held three times a week, including the Sabbath School meeting. Bible lessons are given,

followed by instruction in reading and writing to any who wish, also sewing and knitting. The attendance has been irregular, as many have left in search of work elsewhere. Others have grown careless, and occasionally it has seemed expedient to withdraw for a time till invited to return. Work has been carried on as well in another mohallah in a distant part of the city, peopled by Mahomedans and Hindoos, this has been stopped lately for want of a capable Bible woman.

*Zenana Work.*—Access has been had to over thirty houses. Visits are received willingly, especially among the Mahomedans for they are the most strictly purdah (veiled) women. They listen to the Bible lessons, ask questions and often tell stories about the lesson in their own quaint way. Many are able and glad to read the Bible for themselves. One woman named Janki reads the Bible to some of her neighbors, and also helps a less bright pupil with her lessons. There is much to encourage the hope that God is abundantly blessing this effort to advance His cause.

*CAMP SCHOOL.*—This school has grown out of the Zenana work. The attendance has steadily increased, now there are fifty-seven in regular attendance. Much interest is shown in the daily Bible lessons. At Christmas six prizes were awarded this school by the Sabbath School Examining Committee. The assistant teacher Sulsiehati is one of the first and most advanced girls in the Industrial Home. She is a nice, unassuming Christian girl, and is much loved by the children.

*Sabbath School.*—The attendance is much the same as on week days. Complaints are often made that too much Christian religion is taught, proving that the children tell about the lessons in their homes.

*NORMAL CLASSES.*—These classes are conducted in the College, and as required by the Education Department are carried on in two main divisions—methods of teaching and school management. The practical work of the students was favorably reported on by the inspector in August. The students have been attentive, willing and apt; two tried the written examinations on the 1st December for candidates of the secondary grade, including history of education, etc., and a more advanced and thorough study of the subjects required for the primary grade.

So many of the staff were home on sick leave Miss White offered to delay her furlough for a year, and took a holiday of five weeks at the Hills.

*EDUCATIONAL.*—Miss Grier. This work has been carried on in three vernacular schools under Miss Grier's care.



No. I (Marathi).—This school was formerly under Miss Ptolemy's charge. It is for Marathi Brahmin girls, and is the largest of the schools, the number on the roll being 120, and the girls in the higher classes attend very regularly, though one of the drawbacks to girl schools in India is felt here as elsewhere—viz., the numerous Hindii festivals which must be attended by women and girls, these festivals sometimes lasting a whole week. Reading, writing, arithmetic, a little geography and grammar are taught, also sewing, knitting and crochet work. The staff consists of three Christians and three non-Christians, also three calling women. The annual prize-giving was held as usual, when many were made happy by the gifts from Canada. There has been much sickness, and many children were kept at home by smallpox. Some girls were removed lately because they were given too much Bible instruction, again showing that they tell in their homes the truths they are taught. The great desire in teaching them is that they may not only *hear* but *understand* and take hold of that which is for their eternal salvation.

No. II (Pinjari Bakal)—This school is for Hindi girls, and is chiefly attended by those of the laboring class. Though in the centre of a Mahommedan district only four Mahommedan girls attend in the three schools, two of whom are very small. Two have attended long enough to read through the first Hindi book. "The parents don't like the children taught about Jesus Christ," is the reason given for the non-attendance of Mahommedan girls. The average attendance is fifty-eight, and there are two Christian teachers and one non-Christian pupil teacher.

No. III (Mullar Gang.)—This school was started three-and-a-half years ago at the request of many Bunias (merchants), but on finding the principles of Christianity were daily taught, with the exception of two girls, all were removed. The children who now attend are chiefly those of brass makers who live around the school. For two months the school was closed, because in every home without exception one or more members of the family had smallpox. The children are not as far advanced as in the other schools, but some of the larger girls are industrious and anxious to improve. Many of them are very poor and come with clothing that is barely decent.

*Sunday Schools.*—Every Sunday morning Sunday School is held in each of the schools. Miss Sinclair has charge of the Marathi Sunday School, and also the daily Bible lesson.

*Zenana Work.*—This work has been hindered for want of a Bible woman, but till within the last three months Miss Grier

visited seven houses regularly, and has paid one hundred visits during the year.

### Neemuch

**MEDICAL WORK.**—Miss Margaret MacKellar, M. D. The year opened with the usual work going on in the three dispensaries. In May the Jawad dispensary had to be closed owing to Miss Bayley being compelled to return to England on account of ill health. Mrs. James, the trusted helper, has not been able to undertake any work owing to illness, and her niece Mary, who was learning compounding, had to leave. The other Christian girl who began with the year to learn, is the only one who has been at her post all the time.

**Evangelistic Work.**—Only for one month was there a regular Bible woman, but Mrs. James has been faithful in proclaiming the Gospel Message. For a time some of the older famine children of '97 helped with the singing in the Camp dispensary. During half the year at least, some one, or all three of the Parsee women of whom we have before heard, have been present at the Gospel Services. They join in the singing of the hymns, and at times repeat the Lord's Prayer. The youngest has had copies of the Gospel and Bible characters home with her to read in secret, as her father will not allow her to read such books.

**Sunday School Work.**—Every Sunday morning Miss MacKellar reads with a bright intelligent Mahomedan servant, whom they have had all the year. Also all the women in the compound go to the bungalow for an hour's lesson, thirteen names are on the register. It is encouraging to know that they retain the principal points of what they have been taught. They dearly love to sing hymns. What is lacking in the music is made up in heartiness.

**Famine Work.**—Miss MacKellar says: "Any reference to the work would be incomplete without mention of the sore famine which prevails and which blackens every prospect for many months to come." From September to December food was distributed to 55,912 persons gathered in the compound, or later in an open field. During January Miss MacKellar fed about 8,000 from her cart going between the dispensaries, and in February an average of about 200 a day. During this trying time it has been a great disadvantage having no hospital, one drawback being the necessity of paying many more visits at different and far distant centres, involving an outlay of time and strength. Small-pox has been very prevalent, vying with the plague in Bombay in

carrying off 100 and 150 a day. The mortality among little children has been very great—out of twelve of the famine children who took it eight died—all these cases are isolated in a house about a mile beyond cantonment limits—a necessary distance, but adding much to the labor of attending them.

*Statistical Summary.*—Gospel Services, 428 ; new patients, 3,706 ; treatments, 13,512 ; houses visited, 127 ; visits paid to houses, 904 ; operations, about 60 ; receipts from fees and sales, Rs 196-15-3. 1,688 of the treatments have been to famine sufferers.

*Educational.*—Miss Campbell. In addition to the orphanage, Miss Campbell has had under her care the CITY CHAMAR and JAWAD schools. In all of these schools, besides the regular course of Bible lessons, the Bible has been used as a text book. At the Jawad school the attendance had decreased for some time, and Miss Campbell threatened to close, whereupon there was a marked change and there are now fifty-five names on the register. The work in this school is always thoroughly done, and it is a pleasure to hear the children recite. At the Chamar school the calling system has been done away with good results.

*Sunday Schools* are held in each school every Sunday, and the attendance is about the same as other days.

*Workers' Monthly Meeting.*—This meeting is held to report the work of the past month, to pray for a blessing on the teaching of the Word and to afford mutual encouragement by mutual interest.

*Orphanage.*—There are now sixty-one in the Home and with the rapid increase in numbers better accommodation is sorely needed. An epidemic of measles, and more recently smallpox, visited the Home, but in spite of hindrances the children have made fair progress in their studies ; but above all they have “grown in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.” They begin the day with prayer and have a daily Bible Lesson with prayer for special objects, and they are very intent on watching for answers. Over and over again God has honored their simple faith in providing money for food for the starving, and in sparing the lives of those who were ill. Miss Campbell writes that all are being trained to be useful—they do their own grinding and cooking, they care for the babies and younger children, make and mend all the clothes of the establishment. When the feeding of the famine stricken began in September they were intensely interested—they have done nearly all the grinding and all the cooking of the food for distribution. In order to do this and manage their own work they have had to rise at four o'clock, which is done without a murmur, “For” say they, “we too were just like that, dirty and

ragged and hungry, and God cared for us, so we wish to help." A call for food from them, if the supply for the hungry runs short, brings shouts of "Take mine," "and mine."

*Evangelistic.*—While the crowds of famine stricken were being fed on the compound, and later in the open field, a service was held with them, the older girls from the orphanage helped with the singing—the Christian cook and a catechist lent by Mr. Wilson pointed the motley crowds to the "meat that endureth unto everlasting life."

MISS LONDON.—When Miss Duncan left on furlough Miss Landon took charge of the three outside schools for girls in Neemuch Camp, also the superintendence of the two camp Bible women.

I. *Moolchands Compound.*—This School has moved into another house in the Compound to suit the convenience of the landlord. Rajibai has continued steadily as teacher in this school. Her discipline is good, the children are fond of her and she has great influence over them. She is helped by one of the older girls who teaches the little ones.

II. *Kalal Mohullah.*—In July there was an influx of Goldsmiths who have continued to come steadily and are bright willing pupils, coming mostly unknown to their fathers who are afraid of their becoming Christians; their mothers, however, approve of their coming.

III. *Weavers Mohullah.*—The teacher of this school, Rebecca-bai, was made matron of the Orphanage at the end of December and was replaced by Marthabai who formerly had charge of Miss Campbell's School in Neemuch, but she has been in poor health for some time and was away for a month early in the year. The teaching in these schools has gone on as steadily as the irregular attendance of the pupils will permit. Smallpox caused the absence of many during the winter months and three scholars died from it—the schools were closed for a fortnight in February as it was feared the children were spreading infection among themselves. The famine is engrossing much of the time and attention even of those engaged in regular work—all day at the school doors is a stream of destitute beggars who often need to be helped. Miss Weir has taught the Bible lesson to the older girls. One class has just finished the life of Christ. One girl has read Acts, two other classes are reading Matthew and Luke respectively. The children come with open receptive minds and readily receive the truth.

*Zenana Work.*—One Bible woman has given up work, and the one who was moved from Neemuch to take her place has been ill for some time and has not yet begun to visit many houses. Rajibai



has continued visiting very faithfully. A Brahman who in past days was much opposed to Christianity and had nothing but abuse for her and her husband, but who within the last two months has completely changed, has invited her to his house, where she now goes regularly to teach his wife. The chief calls to visit in houses is from parents and friends of the school children, and in this way the school and zenana work help one the other.

*Bible Classes, etc.*—After the last hot weather holidays a weekly prayer-meeting was begun for the workers. They gather for half an hour before school opens on Mondays, and all have felt the benefit of thus beginning the week. Since October a Sunday School Lesson Preparation Class has been held on Saturday mornings, which also has been found a blessing.

The evangelistic meeting for old women has been held weekly without fail. Though the primary motive for attendance is the distribution of money after the meeting, yet the good seed sown may not be altogether fruitless.

#### Dhar.

*Medical Work.*—Miss Margaret O'Hara, M.D. Medical work has been carried on as last year in two dispensaries and in the hospital. The attendance both of out and indoor patients has been larger. Their interest in the story of the Cross has been deep at times and again indifferent. The in-patient, of whom we heard last year, was baptized in April and married to a Christian man in December. The matron left in February. The nurse Marthabai has contracted tuberculosis and is fast leaving us, and one of the Christian girls who has been helping with the famine people has become completely paralyzed. The oldest Bible woman has been ill, but the other workers are all striving their utmost to meet the needs of the day. Three of the women passed the lower grade teachers examinations and one the higher grade. The distress and disease among the people are so universal, mortality so great, the scarcity of water and food so overwhelming, Miss O'Hara writes that she has no heart to report.

*School Work.*—One primary school has been carried on without intermission. The attendance has not been large but has been fairly regular. Some of the girls are now reading in the second book; sing nicely, and sew much better than they did. There is a *Sabbath school* in connection with the day school with an equal attendance. There are also Sabbath schools in connection with the medical work.

*Zenana Work* was carried on by the Bible women during

the early part of the year but latterly it has been closed because the women have been forced to go on relief work and the Bible women have been engaged in doing what they can to relieve the dying people.

Indoor patients, 274 ; outdoor patients, 7,442 ; treatments, 20,320 ; treatments at out stations or homes, 187.

### Ujjain.

Miss Jamieson. Three schools in as many mohullahs were kept open a part of the year, when the removal of Miss Weir to Mhow involved the closing of one of them, several children have been taught to read, and much attention has been paid to religious instruction. Owing to the famine it has been most difficult to keep up the attendance, as the parents cannot afford to lose the help of their children in their struggle for bread. In the *Mang* school it has been found necessary to allow the children to come for a short time, if only for an hour daily, and then return to their work.

*Mohullah Work.*—Fifteen different mohullahs have been visited, some of them regularly during the year. This work has chiefly been done by the old man who with his wife has been living in the School for the Blind, the missionary making occasional visits as time permitted. Latterly this worker's time has been spent among the starving people in the city, from among whom several widows and orphans have already been rescued.

*Sabbath Schools.*—These have been conducted as in former years. The day schools are taught on Sabbath as Sunday Schools, and others are held in mohullahs as opportunity offers. By this means much Christian literature has been distributed.

*School for the Blind.*—This work of pathetic interest has been carried on for more than three years. When orphanages were opened for famine children several blind were found among them, and were sent to be taught with the others. There are now thirty-one pupils. The aim of the school is first of all to bring each one to Christ, and to give as thorough a knowledge of the Word as possible, and further, to teach all the work of simple housekeeping that they may not be dependent upon others ; also, if possible, to teach a trade by which they may be able to earn their own livelihood. Those who show special aptitude for active Christian work will be trained as Catechists or Bible women. This work is one calling for much patient perseverance, but Miss Jamieson is able to report that nearly all the children have made marked progress. When first they enter the school they are, for the most part, dull and almost hopeless. Now they are bright, active, happy and



helpful to one another. They do their own grinding, cooking and other work, while all are learning to spin and the boys to weave blankets, for which there is sale. The learning of a trade is slow, but the results so far have been satisfactory. In their studies they have made even more marked progress. Fourteen read fluently the type for the blind, while twelve read fairly well. The older pupils have read many times the Gospels of Matthew and John, Acts, Romans, and I. and II. Corinthians, and the Pilgrim's Progress, which are almost all the books procurable in Moon's system. For the most part the blind children take the greatest interest in their studies, and often ask when tasks are assigned, "May I not take more than that?" Seven of the older ones have professed faith in Christ, and by their consistent Christian character have a very helpful influence in the school; teach and read to the younger ones and frequently conduct morning and evening prayers. When there is any misconduct on the part of the others, these Christians reason with and report them in such a fine spirit it is seldom resented, and by their lofty principles shown in the little things of every day life they help to create a healthy atmosphere in the school.

### Mhow.

The report from Mhow covers only the last seven months. Miss Leyden, who took up Miss Calder's work, having had to leave on account of illness, no report of her work has reached us.

*Evangelistic.*—Miss Weir. During these seven months ten villages have been regularly visited, while occasional visits have been made to other villages. They all lie within a distance of five miles from Mhow. In many of these villages visits are well received, and a few of the women seem truly interested in the message of salvation. Two Bible women are devoting their entire time to this branch of the work.

*Zenana Work.*—This work has been much hindered partly through the harmful influence of a Bible woman formerly employed and found to be unworthy, and latterly it has been impossible to secure an efficient reliable woman who could devote her whole time to the work. The number of houses visited is consequently smaller than usual, yet some of the women show an encouraging interest in Bible truths and some of them read the Word for themselves.

*Meetings for Women.*—Since the New Year weekly meetings for women have been held in two mohullas. Picture rolls and a baby organ help to make these meetings attractive. For the

workers a Bible class was started at the beginning of the year, the study of the Acts of the Apostles was taken up, the hour spent in this class has been found one of the most interesting and helpful of the week.

*Educational.*—The attendance at the two village schools was very small, and owing to a number of causes did not improve, so last October it was decided to discontinue them for the present.

## MISSIONS IN JAPAN.

### Formosa.

The return on furlough of Mr. and Mrs. Gauld has revived interest in this field. Many throughout our Societies have had an opportunity of hearing Mr. Gauld's account of the work being overtaken there. Our Society has again provided towards the support of the girls' school and also paid the salaries of Bible women employed at the different stations.

## MISSIONS IN CHINA.

### Honan.

CH'U-WANG.—Miss McIntosh reports that work among the women has been steadily carried on throughout the year. During the summer months Mrs. McClure kindly took charge of the Sabbath and week day classes, so that in no branch has the work fallen behind. Some eight or nine women have regularly attended public worship on Sabbath mornings, and the usual Bible Class met in the afternoon in the women's chapel. Forty-eight meetings have been held, with an average attendance of twelve, an increase of three over last year. Sixty-three week-day meetings have been held, with an attendance averaging ten. At one of these meetings Dr. McClure's second assistant gave an address on the evil of foot-binding, which was much appreciated by the women, but none have as yet had the courage to unbind.

*Station Classes.*—A small class was held in March with four women in attendance, all from Hai-lung, a market town about ten miles distant. One of their number, Mrs. Chao, a particularly bright and interesting woman, was examined by two of the gentlemen and found to possess more than ordinary intelligence. Her name was added to the list of catechumens. In October a trip to Hui-lung was planned, but as wild rumors occasioned by the long-continued drouth and consequent failure of crops were

everywhere rife, at the request of the Christians the project was abandoned, and instead a circular letter was issued inviting the women to come to Ch'u-Wang to study. In response to this four only could make it convenient to come, and remained but a short time. Later one Sabbath morning four other women from the same place arrived in time for morning service, having risen with the dawn and walked in, but they could only remain three and a half days, as they had little money and could not afford to buy food. This year the Mission supplies fuel, light and bedding only, the members attending the class being responsible for their own food. In April Miss McIntosh assisted Miss Pyke with a six days class at Ta-Kuan-Chang. From nine to thirteen women attended. As this was the first class attempted away from the Mission Compound, a little anxiety was felt as to results, but they were met with only warmth and cordiality, and it was felt that this was one of the best methods for reaching and influencing a larger number of women. Three women were received as catechumens and two were baptized during the year. Again an increase in the sale of literature is reported. During the annual tenth month fair hundreds of women were received, among them not a few interested listeners.

*Visits paid in town.*—Through the tireless energy of Mrs. Chang, many doors have been opened; in Chu' Wang forty-four visits have been made during eleven months.

*Village Work.*—Some eighteen visits have been made in the neighboring villages and interest has been maintained, though Miss McIntosh says this has been and is a very trying year for the Chinese; they simply have nothing to look forward to owing to the lack of grain. No crops have been sown in that locality, and it is much harder to work among those whom you know are cold and hungry.

*Medical work.*—Miss Jeanie Dow. M.B.

*Statistical Summary.*—Patients treated, 568; total number of treatments, 2,106; inpatients, 42; average stay in hospital, 17 days; Gospel talks to outpatients, 151. As Miss Dow spent some months at the coast during the summer, this represents seven and a half months of work. In April the married daughter of one of the Christians obtained tardy leave from her husband to enter the hospital for treatment. Her disease was past help, but she said she had committed her soul to the keeping of God, and when her death came two or three months later her trust was fulfilled. In May two women came from south of the Yellow River for "instruction and treatment." In September they returned again and remained eleven weeks, though not requiring much in the way of treatment.

Mrs. McClure gave them two or three hours instruction every day, so they returned home richer than when they came. During Dr. Dow's absence in the summer the women were treated by Dr. McClure, and in November when Miss Dow was at Chang-ti-fu Miss McIntosh directed the assistant, and thus kept the work running.

The little Sabbath afternoon class has held its own. Average attendance for forty-nine Sabbaths, eight. From June to September Mrs. McClure kindly allowed the girls to join her Women's Bible Class and thus held them together. Whatever the outcome of the class may be the little ones are quite enthusiastic about coming.

*Chang-te.*—Miss Pyke. A portion of the summer was spent by Miss Pyke in taking a needed holiday at Bockey Point. Since her return the work has been continued much along the usual lines. A *Girls' Class* is held weekly, and a *Station Class* was held on the Compound for ten days in October.

*Outside Visitation.*—In company with a native Christian woman visits were made and the patients in the Hospital visited as long as they continued to come. In the fall, six days were spent at one of the out stations nine miles distant. Two of the native Christian women assisted in teaching a large class of earnest women who were joined by a few from the neighboring villages. This report covers six months. The full report of the year was sent first to the Honan Presbytery and has not yet come to hand.

*Miss Wallace, M.B.*, is still engaged with the study of the language, but has been able to assist Mrs. Menzies in her meetings with the women and during a stay of some months in Hsin Cheu, started a daily class for girls.

Mrs. MacKenzie, we are thankful to learn, is restored to health and able once more to enter heartily into the work. Mrs. Goforth, in spite of many home claims, has visited in the city and villages and meets with many manifestations of interest. On the closing day of the great national New Year's holiday, hundreds of women were received and heard the Gospel message. It is impossible in this short report to give any details or more than touch on what has been done. May the earnest concerted effort on the part of each worker in this far distant field to extend the Master's Kingdom, soon yield a rich reward and this people who are filled with a deep unrest turn in simple faith to the true God.

Sorrow has again entered the home of Mr. and Mrs. Goforth, their little daughter Gracie, after a lingering illness, was called home. We offer them our warmest sympathy in this sore trial.



May they realize abundantly the blessedness of divine support and comfort.

To Miss Pyke also our sympathies are extended. She has suffered the loss of both father and mother while far removed from them.

*School and Hospital Supplies.*—Guelph Presbyterial Society provided very liberally for this department of the work, eight cases of goods weighing 800 pounds were shipped early in September. Generous donations were also received from several Auxiliaries and Mission Bands. Expressions of gratitude from our missionaries to these kind friends in Canada have from time to time been published in *Tidings*. The boxes did not reach in time for Christmas owing to some unexplained delay—they were, however, in time for the day school distribution of prizes. To all those who so cheerfully and generously contributed towards this object our hearty thanks are extended.

The reports that have come from our missionaries in the North-West and British Columbia are nearly all very encouraging, and we regret that want of time and space prevents our giving them in full; many interesting items must be omitted.

The past year, on the whole, has been one of progress both in spiritual and in temporal matters.

There have been many conversions, and evidences of spiritual growth have not been lacking.

It is very satisfactory to note increasing liberality as shown by their contributions for mission and benevolent purposes, and in furnishing material and labor for the erection of houses of worship.

In nearly every report reference is made to the improved health of the Indians, showing that better ways of living now prevail. The Indians continue to prosper in material things, and the earnings of the past year exceed those of the previous one by \$280,000.

At Crowstand a new building has been erected, and at Birtle a large addition made to the school, giving in both cases more comfort and increased facilities for work.

In British Columbia two small school buildings have been put up, one at Dodger's Cove and the other at the Uchuckleshaht village.

The Rev. A. D. McKetrick, until recently in charge of the Methodist Indian Mission at White Whale Lake, is now at Keewatin, and is opening a Presbyterian Mission among the Indians on the west side of the Lake of the Woods. He will have some 500 Indians in small and scattered bands under his care.

*Mistawasis Reserve.*—Rev. W. S. Moore and Mrs. Moore. Mr. Moore writes: "In regard to our mission work during the year I may report that, as a whole, it has been satisfactory, progress has been made more in the building up and strengthening the faith of those already converted, rather than in the number of those entering the kingdom. The number of families in the mission is forty-eight, communicants fifty-five, six being added during the year, and four removed from the roll. Baptisms ten, number in Sabbath school forty-seven, congregational collections \$58.00, Sabbath school \$6.45, W.F.M.S. \$23.00, total \$88.00. In addition to these sums quite a large collection has been made for a new bell. The number of deaths is smaller than for many years being only five. The Sabbath school is a very successful one, the children being well taught in the Bible and catechism. Mrs. Moore has quite a large class of young boys and no doubt the seed thus prayerfully sown will bring forth much fruit."

*School.*—Miss Gillespie still carries on her work of faith and

labor of love for these Indian children. There has been a new departure during the past year and we now have a boarding school on Mistawasis Reserve. Last fall the Indians proposed to Miss Gillespie to keep some of the smaller children in her house from Monday morning until Friday night as the distance from the school was too great for them in winter. They offered to raise the roof of the kitchen, thus giving two rooms for their accommodation, this was done with the aid of a grant of \$40.00 from our board. Mr. Goodfellow, the Indian Agent, and his wife, have rendered valuable assistance in supplying food for the children. In addition to the children from the Reserve, Miss Gillespie has with her four children from the Nebo Settlement twelve miles away.

*Mahoce Wasta Reserve.*—Miss Baker and Miss Lyttle. *School.*—There are seventeen children on the roll. The number was diminished during the year by sickness and death. Conduct and progress are satisfactory, attendance of the younger ones very regular, two little boys and two girls have not missed a day all winter. In the Industrial Department we have not done as much as usual. The larger ones are able to do more at their lessons and we were most anxious to have them get on as quickly as possible. Last summer the children had a good garden at the Mission. They also had gardens at home where they put into practice what they learned at the Mission. The religious instruction in the school and on the Reserve has been carried on as usual, regular services every Sabbath morning and evening. As the old people cannot read, a part of the time is taken up committing to memory texts and hymns. With a people steeped in ignorance and superstition the work is necessarily slow, and it is only by contrasting their former with their present condition that we note progress. When we came here there was no Sabbath, now it is fairly respected. With the greatest difficulty we gathered in the smallest children to the Sabbath school, now they all attend and listen attentively. As we go over to visit Little Chief and his wife we remember the heathenish practices we witnessed at the time of the death of their children, now they are pleased to join in prayer and praise. We can see evidences that the Gospel is having a transforming influence on the lives of this people. As yet it is only sowing time, but we know that in Gods good time there will be an abundant harvest.

*Round and Crooked Lakes Reserves.*—Rev. Hugh McKay writes: "The work of another year has come to a close and we express our thanks to God for His continued goodness. We have been blessed with health, a beautiful mild winter, the opportunity of being for one year more laborers in the vineyard of our Divine Master, and

tokens for good in our work. Appointments have been kept during the year. The Indians of the She-Sheeps band who were so hostile are becoming more friendly, here and there we find an open door. They are still opposed to sending their children away to school but would send them to a day school if there was one on the reserve. On Kewistahaws Reserve a church building is being erected which we hope to have ready the 1st of July. The Indians are contributing both money and labor and are taking much interest in the new building." Mr. McKay hopes that the Indians on Kennies Reserve will soon be anxious for a church also.

*School.*—There are thirty children enrolled. The average attendance has not been so large as last year. Some improvements have been made in the buildings—new floors laid and all the building has been painted and kalsomined. Mr. McKay is anxious to have two small day schools established at She-Sheeps and Goose Lake. The hospital has been kept open all winter, and many poor sick ones sheltered and cared for by the missionary at his own expense. The clothing sent by the W.F.M.S. has helped him very much in this work. The number of Indian communicants is twenty-five; added during the year, six; removed by death, one; other causes, four; adult baptisms, four; infant, three. Contributions for Schemes of the Church, \$23.00; for benevolent purposes, \$20.00.

*Bird Tail Reserve.*—Mr. McArthur writes: "The work on the Reserve has gone on quietly during the year. There have been no additions to the communion roll, but we believe the spiritual life has been deepened. One member has been removed by death and two by certificate. The number now on the roll is twenty-five. The attendance at Sabbath services average thirty; weekly prayer meeting nine. Both missionary and people appreciate the comfort afforded by their new church building. There has been less sickness than usual during the past year, and although the crops have been light there has been no suffering on the Reserve." The W.F.M.S. Auxiliary have done better than ever during the past year, and have contributed \$35.00. The President, Mrs. Jason Ben, in sending their report, says: "We are but a poor society among the Indians, but God has enabled us to do better last year, and we ask our white sisters to pray for us that we may be kept faithful in the work. The contributions to the Schemes of the Church were \$47.00, making in all \$82.00 contributed by this band for mission purposes."

*Crowstand Reserve.*—*School.*—The erection of the new building interfered to some extent with the regular school work, but on

the completion of the building work was resumed under so much more favorable circumstances that both teacher and scholars were much encouraged, and excellent work has been done this winter. There are at present thirty-nine children enrolled, thirty-three treaty and six non-treaty children. The attendance has been regular and the health of the children good, especially since the completion of the new building. The most of the girls are young and not able to render much assistance in the housework. Farming and stock-raising are carried on on a small scale, but sufficient to give the boys a training in these important industries. The conduct of the children has been satisfactory, and altogether the school year just closed has been such as to give cause for thankfulness and encouragement.

*Reserve.*—During the winter the Sabbath morning service has been held in the school-room instead of the church six miles away. The attendance has been better than formerly and the interest quite encouraging. The afternoon service has been held at Two Creeks in the different houses, and has been well attended. The additions to the membership are fewer than could be desired, there being only two on profession of faith. The health on the Reserve has on the whole been good. It is with feelings of gratitude to God for all He has been to us and done for us during the past year that we present this report."

*Birtle School.*—There are now forty-two names enrolled, and the average attendance for the year forty-one. During the summer three girls and four boys were out at work, the girls earning \$5.00 and the boys \$9.00 per month. Seven pupils were received during the year, and six discharged. Two girls were received into the membership of the church on profession of their faith, and have in their conduct shown the power of the Gospel in regenerating the heart. The health of the children has been good, and their conduct generally speaking satisfactory; we have not had a single runaway this spring. The attitude of the Indians towards the school has completely changed during the past few years. They look upon the school now as established for the good of their children. Hugh McKay, who has acted as out-door assistant for the past two years, has resigned his position, and gone to live on the Reserve to make a home for his widowed mother. We trust that his influence and example may be very helpful, and that he may be the means of much good to his people. The addition to the school building has given increased facilities for work, and all the members of the staff speak of the comfort and convenience from the new kitchen and pantries, laundry, sewing-room and school-room.



*File Hills School.*—Mr. Skene, who has so successfully carried on the work of this school for eleven years, retired last October to take up work in the Regina school. He will be much missed, as whatever success has attended this school was entirely owing to his devotion and ability. Mr. Stewart, formerly of the Brandon school (Methodist), was appointed principal, but has since resigned. There are twenty-one children in the school, thirteen treaty and seven non-treaty, and thirteen in the Home.

*Portage La Prairie School.*—Miss Fraser writes: "Our work has moved on quietly and successfully during the past year; we have had hindrances, but also many encouragements. Our school has been somewhat smaller owing to the removal of five girls and one boy. There are at present twenty-three names on the roll, all of these being in attendance. The progress of the children in their studies has been good. Morning and evening worship is conducted, and all who can read take part. It is very delightful to see the interest shown by the children in their Bibles; the smallest one is ready with a Scripture text every day. The progress made by them in housework is very marked, and the girls who are out at service continue to do well."

*Indian Village.*—"The work among the adults is also encouraging, although somewhat retarded by the moving about of the Indians. It seems necessary for them to do this in order to secure work. We have had good meetings, and on the whole the attitude of the Indians towards Christianity and civilization has become more friendly. As evidence of this, an appeal was made by Mr. Brown, a few Sabbaths ago, for the Famine Fund for women and children. They responded by a collection of \$8.00. This was indeed a sacrifice on their part. Some of the women came and asked for work in order that they might have something to contribute. It is with deep regret that we report the resignation of Miss Laidlaw, who has for so many years held the position of teacher, and who has been a most devoted and successful missionary. We hope and pray that in her new home she may be abundantly blessed."

*Rolling River Reserve.*—Mr. and Mrs. Wright. The attendance at morning and afternoon service has increased, and seven of the Indians have professed faith in Christ. Our Indians are improving very fast, and are providing homes and supporting their families. The habit of begging is almost forgotten. They have logs out for nine new houses and a new hall, and five of them have their shingles and lumber bought. It is entirely a new thing to see an Indian buy lumber and shingles so far ahead. The exhibition which was held last summer has done much good in

stimulating industry. A number of the women knitted socks and mitts for their families during the past winter, also a number of quilts have been made. The agent reported all houses clean during his last visit.

*Hurricane Hills Reserve.*—Mr. and Mrs. McKenzie. Two services were held every Sabbath during the year except one; attendance fair, but not so large as last year owing to the influence of the medicine men. The houses and tents were regularly visited and short Gospel addresses given. A little boy three years old brings his parents to church every Sabbath. The father used to come once or twice a year, but his little boy must have him come with him every Sabbath. The little fellow sings Indian hymns he has learned in our meetings to the delight of his parents and the wonder of the Indians,—“A little child shall lead them.” The sick are regularly visited, where our presence is specially welcome. There are two parties on the Reserve, the progressive and the old pagans who cling to old customs. The former men, women and children show marked improvement in dress, cleanliness and housekeeping. Mrs. McKenzie still carries on her Bible Class for young men. The number on the roll is thirty-eight, and average attendance ten. There are always a few who attend with great interest and regularity. Mrs. McKenzie also gives instruction in sewing and cooking, and two or three of the women can make good bread. The sewing class turned out ten men's shirts, five quilts, two pair of socks, and some children's underclothing. These articles are for sale. The Sabbath School Mission Box contained \$8.30 which was given to the Indian Famine Fund, also a collection was taken for the Century Fund amounting to \$5.00.

*Pipestone Reserve.*—Mr. and Mrs. John Thunder. Mr. Thunder writes:—“I was greatly rejoiced over the conversion of the Iyagayan or old Moses, a great idol worshipper living in darkness until last summer when Jesus found him and took him into His Kingdom. It was a great pleasure to hear him pray for his children, those in the school and those at home, the people on the Reserve, and the Missionary and his wife.” The Lord's Supper was administered last July by the Rev. Mr. Speer, of Pipestone, when nine Indian communicants sat down to the Lord's Table. During the year there were four adult baptisms, three additions to the communion roll, and one Christian marriage. Sabbath services morning and evening, prayer-meeting Wednesday evening. Mrs. Thunder's sewing class has done good work, sending, as a result of their labors \$30 for missionary purposes. A collection for the Indian Famine Fund amounted to \$6.

*Lizard Print Reserve.*—The Rev. David Cattenach was



appointed Missionary last fall. Mr. John Black resigned at the end of the year, but acts gratuitously as Interpreter. The Indians on this Reserve has made considerable progress during the year, there were several conversions, and the Indians are preparing material for a new church and will meet nearly the whole expense of the building.

*Okanase Reserve.*—Mr. and Mrs. McPherson. Mr. McPherson writes :—“ It gives me great pleasure to report the past year as one of the most successful we have experienced in our work. The faithfulness of our people in attending Divine Service has been a great encouragement to us. At our last communion service we had the joy of receiving four young members on the profession of faith. The number of communicants now on the roll is forty-four ; average attendance at morning service, sixty ; afternoon, thirty-five ; number of baptisms, one adult, five infants ; number of marriages, four. There have been no deaths among our own Indians during the past year. These returns show how good God has been to us as a people. The Indians on this Reserve have for the first time contributed to the Schemes of the Church, \$21.25 for Foreign Missions, and \$12.15 for the Famine Fund. They have also undertaken to build a church at their own expense. Another step in advance is that they have asked the W.F.M.S. not to send any more clothing for adults, as they feel that they are now able to provide for themselves, but would like the clothing for the school children continued a little longer.

*School.*—The number on the roll is twelve ; the average attendance good, except in winter when the distance prevents the younger children attending in stormy weather. The majority of the children come clean and neat. The girls make more rapid progress than the boys owing to the industrial work. Mr. McPherson hopes to have a garden at the school for training the boys.

*Regina Industrial School.*—There are 115 pupils enrolled, and eight or ten of these will receive their discharge at the graduating exercises on April 25th. An interesting ceremony on that day will be the marriage of two of our graduates, Herman Wonkswape and Sawin Snow. Herman has been an efficient carpenter instructor for about a year ; they are to occupy the Carpenter Instructor's cottage. Good work has been done in the schoolrooms during the past year, Mr. Skene, formerly of File Hills, in the senior department, and Miss Nicoll who returned to her work at the beginning of the year in the junior, both of these are competent and conscientious teachers. Mrs. McLeod has been matron for the past six months, during which time we have resided in the school, she has taken great delight in the work ; however, she is

not strong enough to take the duties permanently, and Mrs. Stewart, formerly of the Elkhorn School, will take her place. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be dispensed during April, when a number will unite with the church. One of our graduates has written to ask if he can come forward when the Supper is observed. Progress seems to be highly appreciated by all ex-pupils; it keeps them in touch with the school. Never since we began the work have we so highly prized the splendid clothing sent us from year to year. We are exceedingly grateful for it.

*Moose Mountain Reserve.*—Mr. and Mrs. Dodds. Mr. Dodds writes: "During the past year we have had reason to thank God for many tokens of His love for blessings bestowed upon us, for a better understanding, a clearer view of the work He has given us to do, the means by which it is to be accomplished, and for the encouragement He has given us in it. The religion of these Indians is founded on polytheism and composed largely of superstitious fear which induces them to make numerous offerings in order to propitiate the several deities. It has been our endeavor to undermine and destroy this belief, and to substitute the belief in the One True Living God. The majority of the Indians here are now willing to acknowledge their belief in one God who has created and guides all things, and we feel assured that the belief in the love of God as manifested in Jesus Christ will come and take the place of superstitious dread that has haunted them in the past. The majority of the Indians observe the Sabbath, but I have not succeeded in getting them out to the Sunday morning service regularly, but we visit their camps every Sabbath afternoon when they will follow us from house to house to hear more. Our Indians are making satisfactory progress towards self-support and independence; many of them raise enough grain and cattle to keep themselves comfortably."

*Muscowpetung's, Pasquah's and Piapot's Reserves.*—Mr. Monro writes: "The work has been moving on quietly and steadily; services in Piapot's and Muscowpetung's Reserves have not been well attended during the winter, but for the last few Sabbaths have greatly improved. House to house visitation is the most important work, and the most effectual. I cannot speak of any actual conversions; it seems so hard for them to grasp the elements of the plan of salvation, but I live in the faith that the good seed constantly and prayerfully scattered must eventually prevail."

*Swan Lake, Indianford and Long Plain.*—Mr. Robert McKay, missionary. No report has come from Mr. McKay, but we know

he has been carrying on the work during the year with the usual difficulties inseperable to initial work among the Indians. It takes time and patience to convince them that it is only their good that is sought. Mr. McKay has long distances to travel in covering his large field.

*Alberni Industrial Home.*—Miss Johnston retired from the work the end of June, and Mr. and Mrs. Motion, formerly of the Regina Industrial School, were appointed principal and matron. Mr. Motion writes: "There are now twenty-nine children in the home. Some of these come from Dodgers Cove and Ucluelet. We have now entered upon our spring work, which puts a stop to inside work at present. We have planted an orchard of about 140 grafted apple, peach and pear trees. It is our intention to give more time to industrial training than heretofore. Our boys show great aptitude in all their work, also the girls in housework. Besides the home there are two bands of Indians who live quite near the school, the Shesahts, who live at our gate, and the Opichesahts, about a mile away. Our order of service is as follows: service every alternate Sabbath in the school house at 11 a.m., Sabbath school at 3 p.m., and evening song service at 7. The second Sabbath we go with the children to the village church in the morning, Sabbath school at 3 p.m., and evening service at 7 p.m. As the men are away about eight months in the year sealing and fishing at the coast it is hard to be with them much. The most encouraging part of our work is with the children, and our hope is that before leaving the school they will be good soldiers of Christ."

*School.*—Mr. Cameron writes: "During the first six months there were sixteen boys and twelve girls in attendance. The standing in class was seven in Fourth Reader, seven in Third, seven in Second, four in part second of First Book and three in Part First. In the summer six of the boys went to Behring Sea sealing, and

eight girls returned to their homes. In addition to the twenty-nine children now in the Home, there are a number of day pupils. The subjects taught are reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, history, Bible study every day and shorter catechism occasionally. The school hours are the same as the public schools in British Columbia, and the school is visited monthly by the Indian Agent. Most of my work is now primary but the children are bright and interesting and are learning quite as rapidly I think as white children would learn another language. Most of them are amiable and very loveable.

*Ahousaht School.*—Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Russell: "Mr. Russell reports the number of children enrolled during last quarter fifty-six. The attendance varied from twenty to thirty-five. The progress of the children has not been satisfactory owing to the frequent removals of the parents to the different fishing stations and to Potlatches held during the fall and winter. Another reason is my inability to give them the time and attention required by the large number of pupils varying in age from six to twenty-three years. I have found it necessary to continue my former practice and have the more advanced pupils in the forenoon and the others in the afternoon. It is therefore with great thankfulness that I have learned that an assistant teacher will probably be appointed this season. The religious services have been conducted as usual, the attendance has not been so large though the attention and interest have been better and there are apparently a large number who are grasping the meaning of Christ's work for them. Two young men were studying much with me during the last winter, these asked for and received Bibles which they took with them when they went sealing. A very great hindrance to evangelistic work is the constant moving of the people. I cannot follow them and be responsible for school work as well. Unless proper attention can be given to the adult population in the matter of evangelistic work no very good results can be hoped for on the part of the children. I am sorry to say that through the influence of the head Chief, cards and liquor were again introduced causing many to fall, being unable to resist these evils when brought into close contact with them, others have stood fast. So while the present time in our history seems quite dark we are not doubtful of the outcome, the battle is the Lords and He will gain the victory.

*Uchuelet.*—Mr. and Mrs. Swartout. Evangelistic work has been carried on during the past winter by Mr. and Mrs. Swartout and Miss Armstrong. In Mr Swartout's absence at Dodger's Cove, Mrs. Swartout and Miss Armstrong have conducted



services among the adults and carried on the Sabbath school. "Mr. Swartout reports I rejoice to say that in both Ucluelet and Dodger's Cove we are more than holding our own. One of the difficulties of the past at Ucluelet has been the long absences caused largely by the uncertainty of travelling, and this winter I have endeavored to give each more attention but it has resulted in my neglecting the Albernis on the islands. I am at present engaged in a contest with the Indian Doctor difficulty and have decided to enforce the law regarding the practice of witchcraft and sorcery. I have been made desperate by the practice of these people who live by fraud and oppose all civilized methods of treating the sick.

*Schools.*—Miss Armstrong. "The year into which we looked hopefully last March has not disappointed us. Though school has been carried on under increasing difficulties, yet very gratifying progress has been made by the pupils. The greatest difficulty to be met with is irregularity of attendance. This is not the result of unwillingness on the part of the children to be in school, nor of the parents to have them there, but of the peculiar circumstances of this tribe. The fishing camps of the Ucluelet are very scattered, and as the parents of almost half of the school children depend almost entirely for a living on fishing, hunting and the manufacture of dog-fish oil, they are obliged to move to their different camps as the fishing season opens there. The quarter ending June 30, 1899, was broken into by a general move out to Long Beach, a camp about nine miles from the school, for the halibut fishing. The quarter ending September 30th was crippled by a move to the dog fish camp up in Barclay Sound, at least fourteen miles in the opposite direction, and to the Fraser River for the canning season. Two months were lost from the next quarter, when Ucluelet was almost entirely deserted while the winter supply of food was being gathered among the islands in the Sound. It is not usual that so many people go at one time as to oblige the closing of school. There are almost always enough left to keep school open, yet the progress is retarded. Under these circumstances it is gratifying to note the interest taken in the school by both parents and children. There are four pupils in the third standard who rank 'very good' in their class. Six in the second standard quite well up in their work, while six more lively little girls, all under eight years, are almost ready for second standard, while ten little 'beginners' make up a school of twenty-six. During the year three of the Ucluelet pupils were admitted to the Home at Alberni and there is a good prospect of more applying for admission very soon. The correspondence now carried on

between the two schools is interesting, amounting almost to a competition in the use of English. The girls have learned to knit stockings in a surprisingly short time. Already one little girl (they are all under ten years) has an order for a pair of socks given her, and I expect other orders to come in soon. The sewing too is very neatly done. They have greatly improved in personal cleanliness. It is the rule to see clean, tidy little girls come to school. Sabbath school is very well attended and a good deal of interest taken in the lessons. During the week answers to questions on the lesson are prepared, and texts of Scripture memorized. Several of the little girls can repeat the twenty-third Psalm without missing a word. Many of the parents come to the Sabbath school and seem very interested in what the children are learning. We like to have them come and we often pray that the Lord may use the little children to lead them."

*Dodgers Cove.*—Mr. McKee was appointed teacher last spring, and along with Mr. Swartout has carried on evangelistic work. Owing to the Indians spending their time at two different fishing stations on adjoining islands it was thought better to erect two small school buildings, one at each station, and as the Indians move from the one to the other the teacher goes with them and in this way the children are not interrupted in their studies.

### Supplies sent to the North-West and British Columbia.

The clothing sent during the past year was quite equal in quantity and quality to previous years. We would again remind our friends not to send tight fitting waists and jackets as an unusually large number were sent last year. We would also request our Societies to provide only sufficient clothing for the number of adults asked for. Salt Springs, Covey Hill, etc., have again contributed to this department of our work, for which we thank them.

The Indian Department has again refunded the money paid for freight amounting to \$794.77.

## HOME SECRETARY'S REPORT.

ANOTHER twelve months of our history as a Woman's Foreign Missionary Society has passed, and its results, great or small, are recorded both on earth and in heaven; our faithfulness or unfaithfulness, our earnestness or indifference, our realization and improvement of the opportunities presented or the contrary. Whether these months stand for individual growth in grace, deeper consecration and truer loyalty, or whether they stand for broken resolutions, unfulfilled aspirations and wasted impulses, is only known above; but that we may have some idea of our standing as missionary workers, we present to you to-day, in facts and figures what human eyes and intellects may discern and compute. The year has been one of quiet steady progress, especially in contributions, which show a decided increase; not much advance in some directions, but still advance in every department except that of membership. This latter fact is saddening, that we have to-day fewer members than we had a year ago. Earnest appeals have been made in every annual report; and many of the auxiliary reports tell of varied and systematic efforts to interest and enlist the sympathy of others, but the results are not what they should have been. Why will not each woman in our Church take the privilege of becoming a co-worker with the Saviour, and taste the joy of being permitted to help in leading others out of darkness into light, and thus gladden the Master's heart? We shall have entered upon a new century before we again meet as a Society; and our next annual meeting will be the twenty-fifth anniversary of our organization. Shall we not then during the coming year have a century rally, and endeavor at least to double our numbers before another year begins?

### Presbyterial Societies

Our Presbyterial Societies have not increased, and still number twenty-seven. Sarnia heads the list this year in regard to increase in the number of its branches, having added six Auxiliaries and one Mission Band; but Barrie follows closely with four Auxiliaries and two Mission Bands, and neither of these have lost any Societies. Eight other Presbyterials have retained all the Societies they had at the beginning of the year and five of these have added branches.

In sixteen Presbyterian Societies the membership has decreased by numbers varying from one hundred and fifteen to one.

The Presbyterian presidents seem to realize more fully each year the necessity of keeping in touch with all the branches under their care ; and nearly every Presbyterian report speaks of the visits of the president and the good that has resulted. These visits are a bond of union, making the weak societies feel that they are not isolated, but part of an organization, and giving them cheer and courage for another year's work.

So many of our missionaries at present on furlough returned home in impaired health that the Board felt it wise to insist that the greater portion of their time should be spent in resting. Not so many visits have therefore been made by them to Auxiliaries as in some former years ; but a number of Presbyterian Societies have, at their annual meetings, received and enjoyed the inspiration of the presence and words of one who could speak of that which she had seen and heard. Miss Duncan, Miss Chase, Miss Dougan and Miss Plotemy have all given valuable aid in this direction, and we are sure that their words will be the means of stirring up many to greater zeal and earnestness, and that the results will be felt in after years.

Our

### Auxiliaries

are the real force and power of our work ; here our real progress must be made ; here our strength and influence manifested. It is, therefore, with the greater regret that we have to record a decrease in the number of Auxiliary members of over five hundred even when allowance is made for the increase in the number of General Society members. It may be, as one secretary has suggested, that part of this decrease may be accounted for by the more accurate returns that have been made, but we must still find here cause for serious reflection.

It is on the members of our Auxiliaries that we must depend largely for our numerical growth. We need to reach out after the uninterested in our own congregations, and with cords of love and prayer draw them into the inner circle of our Missionary Societies.

No new methods of work are noted, but the educative process is going on, and in increasing numbers the members are showing themselves capable of writing original papers on Missionary topics, and in other ways contributing to the success of the monthly meetings. Latent talents are being developed, and it no longer appears to be difficult to obtain those who will take charge of one meeting. This should in time prepare many to become presidents,

and thus lessen the probability of a Society becoming scattered by the removal of their leader.

“Programme committees,” “open meetings,” “interchange of visits between auxiliaries,” (especially in the country), “a special meeting in the country every three months, in addition to the regular meetings, with a voluntary offering which added to our funds,” “maps of the countries drawn on the blackboard, mission stations marked and names of missionaries learned.” These are mentioned as methods of increasing interest and are found helpful, but let us not forget that while methods are valuable, the true secret of success in our meetings is prayerful preparation and an earnest desire for the extension of Christ’s kingdom.

### Mission Bands

Although twenty-three Mission Bands were organized during the year, the number of Bands now in working order is only four more than last year, and of the nineteen that have dropped out, eight have been organized less than three years. These facts speak for themselves and surely show a lack somewhere.

Mission Band conferences have been held each year for a number of years, at which helpful and inspiring addresses have been given, and methods of working in successful Bands have been explained and yet year after year a number of Bands cease working. Is this unavoidable? If not let us try to find the remedy.

Still there is much to encourage in the Mission Bands’ reports. Although the number of Bands has increased so little, there has been a decided increase in the numbers attending, and there were over four hundred more receiving instruction in these training classes during the year.

One Presbyterian president showed her real interest in the Bands by visiting each one under her care, and we are confident that we shall see results from this next year. In another Presbyterian Society the contribution of each Mission Band was greater than that of the preceding year.

Of one Band it is said that “each member is an active worker, and all the exercises are strictly missionary.” In another “each member is given the name of a missionary, these names given as the roll call, and any facts learned of their own missionary are reported.” Maps have been drawn, mission fields and lives of missionaries studied, and the statements from nearly all of the Bands that have reported are so cheering and earnest that we cannot help being hopeful for the future.

One word about Young Women’s Bands. Are we making all the effort that we might to secure the co-operation of the young

women of our Church, either as members of the Auxiliaries, or of organizations of their own? We need their help. How indifferent we are to the future of our missionary interests, when we neglect to lay our hands on these fresh, enthusiastic young lives and train them for a special work. A missionary wrote: "As I think of Christian young women in our land, thought fails me in trying to grasp the possibilities, the changes that would come, if *Jesus* so controlled that they put *first things first*."

Shall we not endeavor to make them see these things in their true light.

Each year brings a repetition of the statement that the thank-offering meeting is one of the chief features of the year. Special effort being put forth to make it interesting and attractive, many are induced to attend who never do so at any other time, and some are so interested by what they then hear that they become members of the Society.

The day of prayer is also becoming more generally observed, and many speak of the ennobling effect of thus beginning the year with prayer.

So we go forward to another year conscious of all the failures and imperfections that have marred our work in the past; but relying upon that grace which has helped us hitherto, and asking for that wisdom which is promised to all who truly seek for it, to guide and direct us and keep us from making mistakes in the work which has been entrusted to us.

## INTERNATIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT.

---

THE number of Societies embraced in the International Union stands the same as last year, namely, twenty-eight.

As formerly, reports have been exchanged with most of these, and from three of them we have received, during the year, their monthly publications. From time to time extracts have been taken from these for the *Tidings*.

The third Conference of the Union was held in Washington, D.C., on the 3rd and 4th of October, last year.

Sixteen of the Societies belonging to the Union were represented at this meeting, and amongst the number of delegates it is interesting to note twenty-two missionaries present from Persia, China, Japan, India, Siam, Turkey, Laos and South America.

Miss Mathews, Secretary-Treasurer, reported a considerable balance on hand, and in consequence Societies would not need again to contribute until the next Conference.

Mrs. Bell, of London, England, was elected to the Presidency, and Liverpool was fixed on as the next meeting place for the Conference, in 1904.

A full report of these meetings is being prepared and proportional grants sent to each Society.

Our Society is under obligation to Mrs. Hay, of Ottawa, for bringing a report of this Conference for the *Tidings*. Mrs. Shortreed was the special representative of our Society, and to Mrs. McCrae, of Guelph, we are indebted for preparing a paper asked for on "The Outlook, Opportunity and Obligation," which is spoken of in reports as thoughtful and practical.

Those of our delegates who were privileged to attend the Conference speak of interest deepened and enthusiasm aroused in the work of spreading abroad the Gospel.

The aim of the International Union will in some degree have been accomplished if the different Societies comprising it are made to feel that in the work of evangelizing the world they are "laborers together."

Let me quote from an address given at a Conference of the Zenana Mission—"Herein we have united service. Thanks be to God. We do not stand isolated the one from the other. We are linked the one to the other, members of that one body of which

## PUBLICATION REPORT, 1899-1900.

F. M. TIDINGS.

In looking back over the work of another year, we would record with grateful feelings the loving guidance of our Heavenly Father. His wisdom has counselled us, and the direction so much needed He has in love supplied. It is only when we look for the help promised that we receive the courage to go forward, knowing that He will supply what is lacking on our part, and will not suffer the work to be retarded through the weakness of the instrument.

The work of the past year has been one of progress. The *F. M. Tidings* has advanced considerably, both in the number of subscribers and in the appreciation it has gained among our members. The circulation for some time has been over 16,600.

Of late years the thought has come to many of our members, "Is the organ of the W.F.M.S. in appearance a worthy representative of such a progressive body?" It was felt by the delegates who attended the Washington Conference, that when compared with the magazines that emanated from Sister Societies in the States, our publication looked insignificant in dress and form, though not in matter. As the contract for printing had to be renewed, it was considered by the Board a suitable time for enlargement. This has given the Committee on Publications a good deal of thought and anxiety, and they now present you with what they trust will meet with your approval. The printing estimate demanded a slight increase in the subscription; but we feel confident our subscribers will uphold us in what has been done. What magazine comes into your home at the small cost of fifteen cents per year that gives the information and stimulus this Leaflet has given you for the last seventeen years.

Among the improvements to be made will be the frequent use of illustration, that our readers may see from time to time the work of our missionaries in their various fields.

To enable these improvements to be carried out, four pages have been added for advertising matter. The Committee felt that the future of the *Tidings* must be looked to, and that, as hitherto, it must be kept on a paying basis. This we hope to do by the help of the advertising pages.

This year there have been sent out 10,936 more copies of the *Tidings* than last year. It is hoped this new departure will not lessen the circulation; for we can assure the Society it is in their interest alone that this aggressive step has been taken.

From the Report it will be seen that we have met the expenses of our delegate to the North-West. This visit of Mrs. Jeffrey has been a source of great pleasure to our workers in that lone land, and will be of infinite value to the Board in dealing with matters connected with the Mission. Miss Duncan, now on furlough, has been appointed to represent the Board at the Ecumenical Conference in New York the end of April, and will read a paper on her work among women and children in India. Her expenses have also been met by the Publication Department.

To all who helped in any way by papers or letters to make the *Tidings* interesting, and especially to the ladies who so willingly give their services each month in the task of mailing, we would record our appreciation of their helpful services.

### Literature.

Our work, though not showing an increase in funds, has been a success in point of interest. We feel assured that our members are growing in missionary zeal and intelligence. It cannot be otherwise when we consider the course of study so many of them are pursuing, as indicated by the valuable papers that are written on the different mission fields, not alone on our own work, but on the mission work of Sister Societies. This shows research such as will greatly strengthen the W.F.M.S. in the years to come.

There have been sent to both the Conferences in Washington and New York, samples of all our literature, and in return, many valuable pamphlets have been received on the work carried on by other Societies in fields not overlooked by us, for does not our Prayer Card ask you to remember them at your Sabbath evening hour of prayer. It has been thought advisable to have a supply of these on the table at the Annual Meeting instead of printing new leaflets. The Thank-offering Envelopes and Leaflets have again

advanced ; 33,871 envelopes and 17,500 leaflets having been sent out. The contribution envelopes and mite-boxes are also in excess of last year. The Club for the Missionary Review has increased by twenty-one ; in all, there is a list of sixty-four subscribers, most of whom are W.F.M.S. members.

**EWART MISSIONARY TRAINING HOME.  
REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE  
OF MANAGEMENT.**

---

IMMEDIATELY after the Annual Meeting of the W.F.M.S. in May last, Mrs. Ross, the Superintendent of the Training Home, having decided to accept a position in the Ladies College, Ottawa, handed in her resignation to the Joint Committee. It was with sincere regret that we parted with Mrs. Ross, whose work in the Home had been highly valued, and whose courage and patience, qualities so necessary at the inception of a new enterprise, had been an inspiration both to the students and to all associated with her. Mrs. Ross was followed to her new field of labor with many good wishes from her friends in Toronto.

In July, Mrs. E. Livingston, of Winnipeg, a lady well-known as an active Christian worker in that city, was appointed to succeed Mrs. Ross. Mrs. Livingston entered upon her duties early in September, 1899, and the Committee have pleasure in stating that she has filled the position of Superintendent since that date, with ability and faithfulness, and that she has enjoyed the confidence and affection of those under her charge.

At the beginning of the year it was agreed by the Board that the Committee of twelve which had hitherto supervised the internal management of the Home, should be discontinued, and its duties handed over to the Executive. The chief object in making this change was economy of time by reducing the number of meetings, the former Training Home Committee and the Executive being composed for the most part of the same persons. The Executive has therefore taken charge of all the financial and domestic affairs of the Home during the year.

When Mrs. Ross took up her residence in the Home she brought with her a number of articles of household furniture, etc., the use of which she kindly placed at the disposal of the Home during her term of office. Consequently it was found necessary on re-opening the house, to make several additions to the furnishing, and also to replace worn-out articles. Every item was carefully considered, but these purchases, in addition to salary and current expenses involved a considerable outlay. Had the number of students throughout the term been as large as at the beginning

of the year, we had reason to expect the expense of maintenance would of course have been proportionately less, but in the case of some who had made application for entrance unforeseen circumstances arose to defer and possibly to preclude altogether their attendance at the Home.

But although the number in training during the year just closed has fallen short of our expectation, we recognize that numbers do not represent all for which the Home stands. We know that the importance of the training really consists in the quality of the work done, and we believe that the results from even two or three well-furnished, earnest workers will most surely repay all that has been expended on their education.

We have been greatly encouraged by the zeal and enthusiasm shown by the students in their work, and by the evident enjoyment they have had in it. Their expressions of grateful appreciation in regard to the instruction received have been very marked, and the lecturers on the various subjects have testified to the excellent work done by the young women in their classes.

We would again place on record our deep sense of obligation to the Professors of Knox College, and to the other friends who have so generously given of their time and strength to the work of instruction. We are well aware that it is no light matter for those whose time is so fully occupied with pressing duties, to prepare and deliver special courses of lectures for our students, and we find it difficult to express our thanks as we would wish to do.

Rev. Principal Caven has given throughout the session, weekly lectures on the New Testament; Rev. J. A. Turnbull, M. A., LL. B., on the Old Testament; Rev. Professor MacLaren, on Christian Doctrine; Rev. Professor Ballantyne, on Church History; Rev. W. McWilliam, LL. B., on Evidences of Christianity; Rev. J. W. Rae, a course covering half the term on Sunday School work and methods of teaching; Rev. J. Wilkie, of Indore, five lectures on the People and Religions of India; and Dr. P. H. Bryce, of the Provincial Health Department, a course on Health and Sanitation.

In addition to these lectures which were all given in Knox College, Miss Masson, Principal of the School of Elocution, in connection with the Toronto Conservatory of Music, kindly permitted a class from the Training Home to meet in the Conservatory Hall three Tuesdays in the month where our students have had the benefit of training in Voice Culture and Expression under the tuition of Miss Proudfoot to whom our best thanks are due for a special course of lessons, and for the interest she has taken in the class.

At the examinations for 1899-1900, held at the close of the

term, two students, Miss Leach and Miss Gunn, who have taken the full course, were accorded diplomas of graduation. Miss Ross, who has been a resident student for the full term of two years, received certificates of standing in all the examinations on which she had written. Miss Reid did not reside in the Home, but took the full course of study and passed successfully in all the subjects for the first year; and Miss Barker, who also was an outside student, passed successful examinations in five of the subjects. Miss McMaster, another outside student, received a certificate as having passed in Church History.

We trust that in the coming year a deeper interest will be taken in this branch of the work, and that this interest will take shape in a larger number of applicants for training. It is the earnest wish and prayer of the Joint Committee and of the Board that many of the young women of our Church, even though they may not see their way to give their lives to any special form of public Christian work, may be led to avail themselves of a course of study in the Home. Those who have leisure and means for such a course would never regret the time so spent. While the object for which the Training Home exists is the proper equipment of workers for the Master's great harvest field, the lectures, which are free to all, afford a means of mental culture well worth the ambition of women who desire to improve their minds.

We cannot but express our sorrow that candidates in larger numbers are not forthcoming, in view of the present urgent need for workers in the foreign field. Where is the Church to look, if not to its Training Home, for missionaries to take the place of those who must come home on furlough and of some alas! who return faint and overborne, in broken health, and obliged to give up the work?

Our hearts have been thrilled during the past year as we have seen hundreds of young men offering their lives for Queen and country. When shall we be thrilled by a like outburst of loyalty to the Heavenly King?

In December Miss Cowan was offered and accepted the position of Bible-woman for Cooke's Church, Toronto, and left the Home in order that she might live nearer the centre of her work. Miss McNeil entered the Home, so the session ends as it commenced, with four students.

In addition to the lectures at Knox College and the elocution lessons at the Conservatory of Music, the students have accomplished a large amount of mission work during the winter. A weekly service has been held at the Industrial Refuge on Sunday mornings at 9.30. Wednesday afternoon was also set apart for mission work amongst the poor of the city. At the beginning of the session the service was held in the room on George street, where such valuable work had been done last year by Mrs. Ross and her students. For various reasons, however, it seemed advisable to give up the old room, and as the ladies in charge of the Duchess Street Mission, in connection with Knox Church, were willing to accept the services and assistance of the Ewart Training Home students, the Board consented that a change should be made in view of the fact that the Duchess Street Mission is in the immediate vicinity of the old room on George Street. A Mother's Meeting is held weekly, and a great deal of visiting has been done amongst the poor people in the neighborhood.

Three mornings during the week have been spent with the nurses of the "Nursing At Home" Mission, the students visiting the different cases with the nurses and assisting them in their work.

In addition to the mission work in which all the students have taken part, Miss Leach has conducted a monthly service for girls at the Mercer Institute, and Miss Leach, Miss Ross and Miss McNeil have taught in the Chinese Sunday School at the Y.M.C.A.

A weekly Bible Class has been conducted by the Superintendent in the Home during the winter, which has been well attended by outsiders as well as students.

All this work, added to the necessary hours of study, has made the winter a very busy one for the students, but the work has been well and faithfully performed, each doing her part cheerfully.

The "Home" life has been most pleasant and harmonious. The students, without exception, have been loving and helpful to each other, as well as loving, helpful and obedient to the Superintendent.

Miss Ptolemy, who wished to take advantage of some of the lectures, was an inmate of the Home for a time, and Miss Dougan was also with us for a few weeks. The presence of these two missionaries has been not only a very great pleasure to all in the Home, but also of great benefit to the students, inspiring them with fresh zeal and earnestness, while the practical information

which they have been able to give about India and the work required of the missionaries cannot fail to be of value in the future.

Praying that the Home and the work may be owned and blessed by the great Head of the Church, I beg to submit this report.

## REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIAL SECRETARIES

### BARRIE.

*Mrs. Needham.*

The thirteenth annual report of Barrie Presbyterial Society is a good one. "Thy Word have I hid in my heart, O Lord." This is the secret of any measure of success we have attained. The general tone of the reports indicate that a force is at work; a *heart power* which is productive of an earnestness in the members, and causing this Society to be felt in every congregation where it is established. This has been stimulated, no doubt, by the thorough and systematic visits of our President, Mrs. Cameron, throughout the Presbytery, and her educative and inspiring addresses have borne real and abiding results. One is struck in the reports with the re-occurrence of the words "an open meeting," addressed by Miss Chase, on furlough from India; Miss Goodfellow, graduate of Ewart Training Home; Rev. McGillivray, Rev. R. P. McKay, and many others directly identified with Mission work.

Our Presbyterial Society has been materially strengthened by the addition of two Auxiliaries, Huntsville and Elmvale; four Mission Bands, viz.: "Esson Workers," Oro; "Maple Leaf," Fesserton; "Active Workers," Willis Church, Oro, and "Cameron," Burns Church, First Essa, making a total of fifty-nine branches, thirty-two Auxiliaries and twenty-seven Mission Bands.

During the year Auxiliaries seem to have made a more exacting study of the countries on the Prayer Cards, supplemented by extracts from magazines and other periodicals. Papers on the "Jews," "Prayer," "Thanksgiving," appear in reports at times. The Mission Bands employ a diversity of methods to instruct the members. One Band mentions a "watch tower" as a helpful exercise. Another, papers are prepared, then compared relative to the manners and customs in India, China, etc. The sewing for North-West box provides, as usual, a legitimate means of keeping the little ones busily employed. With an exception of a few, all branches have contributed liberally towards the box. The *Foreign Missionary Tidings* proves to be a welcome visitor, an increased number are subscribed for.

Increased interest, funds, North-West goods, cause this year, to be one of special interest. Would that all serve their Lord and Master as faithfully as our Sovereign's sons on the sands of Africa, so soon would the battle of right against all that is sinful and impure be accomplished, and the reign of peace and righteousness in Christ's Kingdom be established.

## BRANDON AND PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE.

*Mrs. R. H. Robertson.*

Twenty-one Auxiliaries and one Mission Band have reported work done during 1899. One new Auxiliary has been organized during the year, but two have been obliged reluctantly to disband at least for a time, chiefly owing to loss of members by removal. Some of the country Auxiliaries labor under great difficulties, many of the members are a great distance from the place of meeting, many also have young families, and in this country where it is such a hard matter to get help, it is almost impossible to leave home even for an hour meeting, which means a whole afternoon under the circumstances.

The reports that have come in this year are, in most cases, characterized by a determination to go on with the good work begun, and by thankfulness to our Father for the measure of success they have had in the past.

One small Auxiliary in the country, this last year increased its contributions over the previous by forty dollars (\$40). We are very thankful that though some few Auxiliaries fell behind the giving of the year before, on the whole the amount raised is larger this year than it was last.

With one exception, Thank-offering meetings were held in every Auxiliary and many of us had the privilege, at these meetings, of hearing the Rev. Mr. Gauld tell of his work in Formosa. It is not often we have the opportunity of hearing a returned missionary, so we appreciate the privilege fully when it comes our way. All our members, at their meetings, still continue the study of the Bible and missionary subjects.

## BROCKVILLE.

*Mrs. Ross.*

This fifteenth annual report gives us abundant reason to thank God, and take courage.

The reports as a whole are very encouraging, although some have a note of discouragement such as few members, irregular meetings, illness, long distances apart, removals, etc. These disheartened ones have in many instances sent larger offerings than last year, so that on the whole, the year's work of the Society is an advance over former years.

The membership shows a slight falling off owing to removals; but there is a spirit of joy and gladness, which shows the work has been faithfully done.

Our finances are better; the envelope system more general; and meetings are held more regularly. The day of prayer has been observed by many of the Auxiliaries; the programme prepared by the

550 copies of the *Foreign Missionary Tidings* were distributed in as many families, an excess of thirty over last year.

Seven large bales of clothing weighing over one thousand pounds, were sent to the North-west, including a good deal of new material.

Our President, Mrs. Dowsley, organized three new Auxiliaries; Kemptville, in January, a most promising one, and Morton and Lyndhurst, which have since been united and are doing good work under the name of Morton.

We have reports from thirty-one Auxiliaries, and thirteen Mission Bands; two Bands have not been heard from.

Bible study has been prominent in the programmes of meetings; also study of Mission fields; special mention being made of the Klondike and New Hebrides. The reports of the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands tell of deep spiritual life and growth.

Can we estimate what the year's effort of this Presbyterial means?

Can we know the blessings given in answer to the prayers of the women of the church?

We cannot tell but we leave it with Him for whom we have done it all.

---

## BRUCE.

*Mrs. Ferguson.*

In presenting our twelfth annual report, we are glad to note that some progress has been made, though perhaps not what we have desired or expected.

One new Auxiliary has been organized at Glamis, one at Armow has been transferred from Maitland Presbyterial Society to Bruce, and a Mission Band has been organized at Walkerton.

Owing to this our membership has increased, otherwise it remains about the same. Some report decrease in membership, although even these, in some cases, report sustained or increasing interest.

One life member was added during the year, but our Heavenly Father saw fit to take her to Himself. We refer to Miss Mickle, of Chesley, who, ever since the organization of the Auxiliary there, has taken a warm interest in all that pertains to the Society. Three other Auxiliaries have been called upon to mourn the loss of earnest faithful workers. They rest from their labors and their works do follow them.

There is an increase in the number of Scattered Helpers also.

Meetings, are on the whole, held regularly, are well attended and the interest is sustained. In some places, however, through adverse circumstances it is found difficult to hold regular meetings, but nearly all, in some form, give evidence of healthy interest and desire for more usefulness.

In some places where members are scattered, meetings have been held in the home, and in this way the influence has been widened as others have frequently attended.

We all deplore the fact that such a large number of the women of our Church are not members of our Society, who should belong to it.

The Thank-offering meeting still continues to be well attended, proves a source of blessing and is the means of interesting outsiders.

A number of our Auxiliaries have adopted the plan of having the members take charge of the programme for each meeting in turn, thus relieving the President from the whole responsibility, and making the meetings more interesting diversified.

Bible readings have been taken up. Some follow closely the topics of the Prayer Card, interesting and instructive papers have been written and read.

The *Foreign Missionary Tidings* is taken by all the Auxiliaries. Our contributions show a slight increase this year.

Nearly all contributed to the box of clothing for the North-West Indians.

Mrs. Johnston, at her own urgent request, was allowed to retire from the office of Presbyterian President, a position she has held for seven years, during which time she has been indefatigable in her work and labor of love. It was with great reluctance that the Society acceded to her request.

## CHATHAM.

*Mrs. B. R. Peddie.*

Reports have been received from twenty-two Auxiliaries and nine Mission Bands. Four life members have been added this year. The reports are on the whole encouraging. Thamesville was re-organized in September, and sent a liberal contribution for the four months. Turin was also organized in September but no report was sent. Three Mission Bands have dropped out but we hope for good tidings from them at our next annual meeting.

Dresden Auxiliary, last year, were fearful for the life of their Society, but they persevered and look forward to better things. Blytheswood has no Auxiliary yet, but there are some who are faithful and they have sent \$11.25 to help swell our contribution.

The President, Miss Walker, has visited most of the Auxiliaries during the year. She was assisted in some cases by the Visiting Committee.

The Secretary of Supplies reports that the clothing sent for the North-West was, in both quality and quantity, very good.

The *Foreign Missionary Tidings* is much appreciated and over 300 copies are circulated.

---

### GLENBORO.

In this our fourth annual report, we find both encouragements and discouragements in our years work. For all that is encouraging, we give thanks to God, and the discouragements, we hope, will stimulate us to more earnest work in the year we have begun in this large, scattered, and ever changing Presbyterial. It is with great difficulty that your Secretary prepares her annual report, owing to the meagre information sent in by Auxiliary Secretaries.

We regret to have to report one Auxiliary inactive this year owing to the removal of its president, and the great distance between the few remaining members. They hope to resume work this year. One Mission Band has disbanded. We cannot report any additions to our Presbyterial, but all the Secretaries' reports breathe a hopeful tone.

Our contributions are in advance of last year, and that is encouraging.

Our average attendance is largely increased and the interest taken in the work is greatly improved, and most cheering.

Contributions of clothing has been sent to two different places. Ninety copies of the *Tidings* are subscribed for, and are much appreciated. Thank-offering meetings are annual now throughout the Presbyterial.

---

### GLENGARRY.

*Miss A. M. Cline.*

After sixteen years of work as a Presbyterial Society, Glengarry remains firm in its attachment to the cause, and thankfully reports a growing interest in almost every case. Each recurring year, and its necessary review brings with it this solemn lesson to every member—"Each year past is a year less to live and work, a year more for which to give account." We regret the loss of East Lancaster Auxiliary, but have gained a Mission Band in that locality, giving us thirty-one Auxiliaries and twelve Mission Bands, the same number of Societies as last year, viz., forty-three. We find a decrease of forty-two in the total membership column, but our Auxiliaries are responsible for that,



as our Mission Bands have gained thirty-nine members. We also report forty-one less from our Scattered Helpers. Notwithstanding the losses, our average attendance is better, our offerings larger and the Scattered Helpers have contributed more liberally. Our members continue to interest themselves in the Indians of the North-West, for a good supply of clothing was cheerfully given last year.

Three hundred and ninety-nine copies of *Missionary Tidings* were taken, nine more than the preceeding year, but still far short of what it should be, as those who subscribe for it regularly, find it increasing in interest every year.

### GUELPH.

*Miss Kerr.*

I bring our fifteenth report to you with a feeling of deep thankfulness. We have truly had a year of quietness and comfort. Whatever may have been happening elsewhere, neither death nor sickness is reported among our members. In spite of "the small numbers and diminished giving in consequence," mentioned by some Societies, the total contribution is over \$100 in excess of last year.

Difficulties there are, of course; scattered membership, distances, removals, and there have been vacant pastorates, but these have been filled of late, and in consequence, we have to welcome some new fellow-workers. We have added one Auxiliary, Rockwood, and four Mission Bands. One of these replaces another which melted away.

In some reports there is a ring of discouragement, a faithful few keeping together bravely, helping and being helped, grieved because others are careless of the blessing. Nearly every Society has sent gifts to India. What was asked for, though in view of the present dire need, would that it had been ten times more. Many speak of systematic study of Mission fields and maps, reading of Missionary books, letters, papers, and incidents. "More taking part in prayer, or turns in leading" Bible studies and sentence prayers. In the Mission Bands there is the teaching "line upon line," the little ones learning the names of all our Mission Stations and the Missionaries in each, and reciting them at every meeting." Sewing meetings, where one reads aloud while the rest sew, little fingers learning to sew and knit, so as to have something to send.

The Thank-offering meeting has become an accomplished fact, few feeling that they can afford to lose the inspiration of it.

The *Missionary Tidings* must help largely as 1,363 copies are subscribed for, 252 copies more than last year. The new report sheets are a great help, they leave so little room for mistakes. Some Secretaries make very intelligent use of the remarks column. If all did we would be able to have perfect and trustworthy reports.

Mrs. Watt, our President, has visited and addressed almost all our Societies, and many have thus been helped.

## HAMILTON.

*Miss L. MacKenzie.*

Our report for 1899 is, on the whole, a cheering one, though we regret a decrease in membership, principally among the Auxiliaries in the country districts. This is owing for the most part to the distance of members from the church and the bad roads which are a great hindrance to regular attendance for the greater portion of the year. There are no new Auxiliaries or Mission Bands to report. One Mission Band—Simcoe "Wayside Gatherers,"—has been reorganized and is in a flourishing condition. The tenor of most of the reports is very hopeful and we are glad to notice the willingness of members to take part in meetings both in devotional exercises and preparing original papers. In some Auxiliaries leaders are appointed to take entire charge of meetings, a plan which seems to have been very successful.

There is more real study of Mission Fields and the lives of Missionaries than in former years, and this we consider a very hopeful sign as knowledge of these unselfish, consecrated lives, their hardships and difficulties, cannot fail to enlist a deeper sympathy and corresponding liberality in giving among our members. Thank-offering meetings have been almost universally observed by the Auxiliaries and several Mission Bands have held their own Thanksgiving, where large offerings have been made. One noticeable feature of the work is the growing interest in the preparation of supplies for the North-West, seven Mission Bands giving their help to the Auxiliaries, resulting in the sending of ten bales and one case of clothing to the school at Portage La Prairie.

The increase in the number of *Tidings* ordered this year has been very small, only two over 1898. 1,111 circulated. We are glad to report four new life members, all from Hamilton Churches. There is a falling off in the number of Scattered Helpers, but the contributions from that source are a little larger than in 1898.

We are glad to report a large increase in our offerings.

Let this year advance or some will perish without the Gospel, who should have received it at our hands.

---

## HURON.

*Mrs. R. Irwin.*

All memories of the past are not painful but sometimes are very pleasant, and we are pleased to note that the retrospective view of 1899 and its work as a Presbyterian society, though not unmixed with sorrow, has much in it to make us very thankful. In presenting this fifteenth annual report, we have much to praise God for; we are spared to enter not only upon a new year's work, but to see the commencement of a new century. We know not what this year may have



in store for us, but this we do know, Christ commands us to work in His vineyard to-day. Even since 1900 dawned upon us some of our members have been called to higher service; let us work while the day lasts. Our membership is not quite as large as last year, but our average attendance has been better, and the interest is deepening. In most societies the roll call is responded to with appropriate texts of scripture on a given subject; others use the topic card, and excellent and thoughtful papers have been prepared. The study of the different mission fields is interesting and profitable. A few of our churches are without a pastor, and this in country charges makes it very difficult to keep up a Missionary Society. Some few complain of the indifference of the women to missionary work; these are the exceptions. Some, yea most of our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands have done splendid work. Very few have entertainments for raising money, but depend upon fees, collections, mite-boxes and thank-offerings for their funds. All report what a blessing the Thank-offering meeting is to the whole congregation. Many write personal letters to every woman in the congregation inviting her to this meeting, and find the plan successful. Two life members were added in 1899, one in Hensall and one in Exeter. We have sixteen Auxiliaries and ten Mission Bands. More *Missionary Tidings* are taken, and thus members are more interested in the work of our own missionaries. The visits from our President are very helpful and much enjoyed. Scattered Helpers are doing good work.

### KINGSTON.

*Miss Fowler.*

At the close of another year the officers of this Society present their annual report with feelings of thankfulness that the work has been carried on successfully during the year. The reports speak on the whole of increasing interest and a greater willingness on the part of the members to take part and assist in the work. Most of the Societies now study the mission fields, taking up one field and studying it thoroughly before passing on to another. Addresses are given and papers prepared by the members, and so everyone gets some knowledge of the field and its needs. In many places in this Presbytery the members are very scattered and during the winter months it was impossible to have a good attendance at meetings. In one Society this is overcome to some degree by having the meetings in the church in summer, and at the homes of the members in winter. Special meetings are held in connection with all the Auxiliaries. These include Thank-offering services, united prayer meetings, and open meetings where two or more Societies meet together and addresses are given by returned missionaries and others. All these are found helpful in increasing the interest and extending a knowledge of the work.



We regret the removal from our midst of our President, and the loss of many valued members during the year. Every Society must see the necessity of being continually on the watch and of making persistent efforts to secure new members to fill the places of those who have fallen out.

We read in one Society of the members being so discouraged that they thought they would have to disband, but thanks to one or two energetic members they have had a most encouraging year, so we see what may be accomplished by even a few who are interested.

In closing we would again acknowledge with grateful hearts the guiding hand of our Heavenly Father, who has led us safely through another year. We rejoice in what has been done, and pray that we may realize more and more the needs of the work, and may put forth all our energy in the great mission of winning the "World for Christ."

## LANARK AND RENFREW.

In presenting this annual report we have reason to believe that many of the Societies have been faithful, though we have made no progress financially during the year.

Each passing year carries with it a record similar in its general outlines to that of the preceding years. The question, "What is the best way of keeping the interest bright and lively in the work," has evidently been a source of self-examination to some who report nothing. Figures fail to show spiritual results, hence the necessity of written reports.

We would earnestly urge in the coming year that all Auxiliaries and Bands would pray constantly for a clearer appreciation of the privilege and honor of being workers together with our Lord and Saviour in the upbuilding and extension of His kingdom both at home and abroad, for a deepening sense of individual responsibility, and a more self-denying effort for the advancement of it.

We rejoice that the encouragements stand out most prominently, though we hear such statements as the following, "So few in our congregation seem to be really interested," "Only the faithful few attend our meetings." Let the faithful ones this year besiege the Throne of Grace in prayer that the Christian women may be awakened to a deeper sense of not doing what they can, and that those who have assumed the responsibility of doing may be blessed with the grace of continuance and enabled to faithfully perform what they have pledged themselves to.

One serious drawback which we desire specially to note is the number of Mission Bands which fall from the ranks each year, yet it should not be, for no department of this work has more encouragement in it. The young people are so easily led, so eager to help, so

enthusiastic, and their young lives so full of possibilities if only trained.

Many of our Auxiliaries have suffered dire loss during the year through the removal by death of esteemed officers and members.

Franktown Auxiliary still holds up its high standard, both spiritually and financially.

---

### LINDSAY.

*Mrs. Horn.*

Twenty-one Auxiliaries and eight Mission Bands were reported at the end of our year, but within the last month an Auxiliary and Mission Band have been organized in St. Andrew's church, Beaverton, making the totals, Auxiliaries twenty-two, and Mission Bands nine.

The Cresswell workers were obliged to disband during the year, but they have joined the neighboring Auxiliary at Sonya, so are not lost to us. We are glad to welcome the the Bobcaygeon Auxiliary, which until the past year belonged to the Peterboro Presbyterial. Although our totals are smaller we feel that we have no reason to feel discouraged. The decrease in membership is owing in a large measure to removals and deaths.

Our contributions are \$57.92 behind what was contributed last year. We regret this very much, but find that there has been decided increases in most of the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands. The Lindsay workers, who have the largest Auxiliary, have alone fallen short the amount of the decrease. Heavy expenses in the home church have interfered with the regular giving for missions. We trust that this will not occur again.

Four large bales of clothing were shipped to Rolling River Reserve during the year. The Secretary of Supplies reports the clothing "clean, carefully patched, strong and suitable." Among the other things were fifty-two warm woollen quilts.

We have workers at Balsover and Kirkfield who still wish to be considered only Scattered Helpers. Besides these we have to report forty-two Scattered Helpers.

We trust that as the new year opens with increased need for our prayers, our givings and our interest, we may have grace given us to put forth a greater effort to extend the work than ever before.

### LONDON.

In presenting the sixteenth annual report of our Presbyterial we are glad to be able to record the addition of two new Auxiliaries, viz., New Glasgow and Springfield, and one new Mission Band, called the Ross Mission Band, of Glencoe.

Forty Auxiliaries and sixteen Mission Bands have reported this year, making a total of fifty-six Societies, but it is to be regretted that a number of churches are yet without either Auxiliary or Mission Band.

Five new life members have been added this year, three from St. Andrew's, London, one from Glencoe, and one from Alma St. Church, St. Thomas. The membership is considerably in excess of last year, although the average attendance on the whole is not quite as good. The offering for the year is also greater.

During the year the Library was divided and sent to the following Auxiliaries: Glencoe, Cowal, Bryanston, Kintyre, Tait's Corners and Vanneck, the President of the Society being responsible for the books.

The benefit derived from the *Missionary Tidings* cannot be too highly spoken of as a valuable source of information, 920 copies being in circulation, which is greatly in advance of last year.

One noticeable feature of the work is the growing interest in preparing the bale of clothing, 4,270 pounds being shipped from this Presbyterial to the North-West. Very few of the Societies fail to contribute, while the valuable gifts made by the members of the Mission Bands show plainly the pleasure it gives them to fulfil the words of our Master, "I was naked and ye clothed me." May they reap the reward which follows with the "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these My brethren, ye have done it unto Me."

## ORANGEVILLE.

*Mrs. H. D. Fraser.*

The annual reports of our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands show considerable progress in the work.

Although the total membership of our Society is only one more than last year our contributions show an increase of \$63.00.

As a Presbyterial we regret very much the removal from our midst of Mrs. (Rev.) H. Crozier, one of our former Presidents. She has gone to another field of labor, where we know that her faithful work will be manifest.

The Orangeville Auxiliary mourns the loss of one life member by the death, last July, of Mrs. McGillivray.

The Primrose Mission Band has also suffered by the death of their faithful President, Miss A. T. Johnston, and have found that they were unable to keep up the Band, although they have sent a contribution.

We feel that there ought to be an increase in the circulation of the *Foreign Missionary Tidings*; but during the past year the number of subscribers was sixteen less than the previous year.

We held our semi-annual meeting at Shelbourne on the 7th of June, at which very interesting addresses were given by Mrs. Jeffrey,



of Toronto, on Mission Band work, and by Rev. A. McLachlan, returned missionary from Turkey in Asia. We also listened to an excellent paper from Mrs. McKinnon, of Hillsburg, on "How to interest others in Mission Work."

We regret very much that Mrs. Myers, our faithful Secretary for six years, felt obliged to resign her office, but as we know that she will always be interested in the work, and helpful in other ways, we are resigned to her decision.

## OTTAWA.

In submitting the thirteenth annual report of the Ottawa Presbyterian Society, while we have great cause to be thankful for so favorable results—financially and otherwise—it is with much regret that we are called upon to notice a few defections. No reports have been received from our Auxiliaries at Merivale and Manotick. The fact that both these congregations have been without settled pastors during the year just closed no doubt accounts for the falling off in interest in these branches. The Auxiliary at North Gower has also ceased from active participation in the work of our Society, though some of the members have proved their love and interest by contributing \$18.00 to our funds. Campbell's Bay Auxiliary, which was re-organized in 1897, is also unreported. The Mission Bands at Portage du Fort and Vernon have not been heard from. We will look for hearty co-operation in all these branches at an early day. While truly sympathizing with the discouragements which many of our branches have to meet we would urge them not to disband without making a strong effort to overcome difficulties in the way. In any case there is always the possibility of forming a band of Scattered Helpers, and thus keep in touch with the work of our Society. Our first organization in 1900 was formed by Mrs. Hay at Hawkesbury on January 9th.

During the year a Mission Band was organized in connection with New Edinburgh Auxiliary, also a senior branch of "Golden Links" Band in Bank St. Church. The reports from our Mission Bands are bright and full of interest. We have now twenty-seven Auxiliaries and eleven Mission Bands on our list.

The usual clothing was sent this year to Alberni, B.C. All take a hearty interest in this work of helping the needy. *Foreign Missionary Tidings* has a growing circulation. Scattered Helpers are to be found in eleven Auxiliaries. In closing we would express the hope that all our members may enter the new year with fresh zeal and renewed courage in this supreme work of winning the "World for Christ."

## OWEN SOUND.

It is with varied feelings that we present our twelfth annual report, standing, as we do, on the threshold of the twentieth century. Through its open door we look out upon the great fields of labor, and hear the cry of those perishing alike in spiritual and temporal need. With a strong impulse to go forward, we glance back at the strength of our forces and realize, perhaps as never before, how few the laborers. If there is one keynote of discouragement in every report it is the regret that so few of the Christian women in our churches have become members of the Woman's Foreign Mission Society. We might do well to imitate the example of one Society, which enlarged their numbers by appointing committees to visit the ladies with a view of enlisting their sympathy.

We are able to report one new Auxiliary added, an increased membership in the existing societies; also a most encouraging increase in contributions.

Some report decrease in members, coupled with increased offerings; others the reverse of this; again the members may remain the same while the offerings increase. The printed reports will give these varying balances as marks of apparent success or failure, while no mention is made of the firm deep-rooted growth of interest, as shown by the efforts of each Society to utilize every talent of its members in preparing papers, addresses, or otherwise assisting. This quiet undercurrent influence may not reach beyond the one little circle; nevertheless, substantial benefits have been reaped. Thanks to that valuable help, the *Missionary Tidings*, the time is now past when Societies wrestle with the question of how to maintain their interest.

The day of "special prayer" is taking its place side by side with the Thank offering, which is now an established fact. Many profitable interchange of visits are reported, also the benefits derived from having Miss Duncan address four meetings.

A special delivatory service was held for Miss Goodfellow, who went out from Thornbury Auxiliary to her field of labor in India.

The Mission Bands not under the fostering care of the mother Society do not give satisfactory reports. Can we afford to neglect this department wherein lies our future strength? Soon we must leave the work for them to carry on; for each year leaves us one less in which to labor, but one more for which to give account.

## MAITLAND.

In reviewing the work of another year we naturally look back to see with what distinct aims we set out on our year's work, and then

consider how far these aims have been followed, and with what results.

We know that many entered upon the year's work in a spirit of resolute hopefulness, not satisfied with present attainments, and alive to the great need for further efforts, and with a desire to accomplish something better than had been accomplished in the past. With this aim in view the work of the year has been carried on. That this spirit has characterized our work should evoke from our hearts true humility and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father.

Again we may feel encouraged by the reports from the Auxiliaries. Not a few show an increase in membership, as well as in contribution.

Three of our Auxiliaries were interested and helped by addresses from Miss Duncan of India, while others were favored with an address from Mr. Wilkie.

In December an Auxiliary was organized at Riversdale by the members of North Kinloss Auxiliary.

In September a large quantity of good clothing was sent to the North-West. Our Mission Bands aided very materially in this work in preparing many useful articles to be sent with the box.

## PARIS.

Owing to the change in the date of our annual meeting we review only nine months' work of the Paris Presbyterial Society. Some of us had fears that the shorter period of time might affect the tone of the reports sent in; but we have every reason to be thankful for the zeal and faithfulness on the part of our members. Nothing specially new is reported in the method of conducting meetings. One Society held an open meeting every three months, inviting the President and other members to be present and give a report of the work of their Society. Bible readings prepared by different members, and the Thank-offering meeting are spoken of as specially helpful. The President kindly visited and addressed the Mission Bands this year, leaving the Vice-President to visit the Auxiliaries.

We are sorry to report one Auxiliary less this year, St. Andrews', Blenheim; and one Mission Band, the "Anthony Marshall," Ayr, has disbanded. The "Bee-Hive" of Ayr is empty, the Bees having swarmed into the Mission Students' Band; but we welcome the new branch, the Y.W.M. Five hundred and forty-two copies of the *Tidings* were distributed, a slight increase. The number of Scattered Helpers is less than last year.

### PETERBORO.

The work of 1899 has gone on steadily and hopefully, and we are pleased to be able to report an increase in membership and contributions. Our contributions this year are larger than any previous year since our organization. 580 copies of the *Foreign Mission Tidings* are subscribed for by the different branches. While this shows a very fair circulation we cannot help feeling that if this organ of our Society were more generally received and carefully read it could not fail to awaken a deeper interest in the work.

In August 850 pounds of good warm clothing was shipped to Birtle. Many of the Auxiliaries were visited during the year by our President, Miss Forsyth, and all speak of the benefits which their Societies received from her helpful and soul-stirring words. Several Societies have lost by death very faithful and valued members. We regret that we can no longer claim Bobcaygeon as one of our branches, it having been transferred to the Lindsay Presbytery during the year. Although a small Society they were always ready to do what they could to assist in the work. In many of the reports the fact is stated that there is a marked improvement on the part of the members to take part in the monthly meetings, and it is acknowledged that when this is done the members have been spiritually benefitted. Another pleasing feature is the prominence given to prayer and Bible study. This is a step in the right direction and we feel that too much stress cannot be laid on Bible study and prayer. If we could only induce those who are opposed to foreign mission work to study the subject in the light of God's Word with the Holy Spirit as teacher, we feel that they would soon be convinced of the necessity of the work.

### SARNIA.

In presenting our twelfth annual report we have much reason for thankfulness, and ground for encouragement for the coming year.

There have been added to our Society this year six new Auxiliaries and one Mission Band. We note an increase in membership in nearly all Auxiliaries. Meetings have been well attended during the year, and the interest well sustained.

Our contributions are over two hundred dollars in advance of last year.

Our Society sent nineteen hundred pounds of substantial clothing to the North-West, most of which was new, a large number of warm quilts being a part of the bale, to which the children of a number of our Mission Bands contributed by meeting and making quilts, hoods, etc.

The visit to each Auxiliary, of our President (Mrs. Urquhart) was much enjoyed and appreciated by all, as each report spoke of the help and encouragement her presence had been to them.

The number of Scattered Helpers is doubled.

The Thank-offering meetings are looked forward to as the most important meeting of the year, profitable in deepening the spiritual interest of all who meet.

The *Foreign Missionary Tidings* continues to be a great help in our work. There are three hundred and seventy-nine taken throughout the Presbyterial, and we feel encouraged by the success of the past, to look forward hopefully to the work of another year.

the whole the membership is slightly decreased, and the average attendance at the meetings has not been as good; in many cases this is owing to removal of members, where no additions to the Society has been made. The interest in the work keeps up among members of the Auxiliaries, but few new members have been added. Programmes arranged for the year, have been used in some of the Auxiliaries. Subjects on missionary topics are chosen for each month and certain persons assigned to take these in charge; while the rest of the members, having these programmes beside them, can study the subject and discuss it intelligently in the meetings. In this way more of the members take part and manifest a greater interest in the work.

A larger number of copies of *Foreign Missionary Tidings* is taken this year than last. Other missionary literature is circulated as well, making it an easier matter than it was in former years to get information on our mission fields. Visits from missionaries also stimulate and encourage; so that where there is lack of interest in the work it must be because there is not the willing spirit to undertake even the little trouble for the Master's sake.

The contributions are scarcely up to last year's mark. There have been many reasons for this; in one or two cases the usual Thanksgiving offering has been delayed to the end of the year; in others the falling off of members has accounted for it, and in others, especially in the country, the extreme cold of last winter prevented the usual attendance at meetings and the collections were small in consequence.

There are twenty-four Auxiliaries in the Presbytery and fifteen Mission Bands. Three new life members have been added this year.

The interest in the clothing fund for the Indians of the North-West is as keen as ever. The clothing sent to the File Hills School consisted of twelve bales.

As if the depression on the Auxiliaries had had an influence on the Mission Bands, they too are not showing the advance of past years. Still there is good work being done and considerable progress in some of the Bands. Carlingford has not reported this year; their President having removed from the neighborhood, another has not been found willing to undertake the work, so no meetings were held, but they do not wish to disband as they hope that next year they may commence work again.

Three new Bands have been organized this year.

I would ask the members of our Auxiliaries to try and give more encouragement to our Bands; they are under our care and we ought to try and assist them in every possible way. Our Juvenile Bands need a good deal of help and advice or the interest must wane. Where their work is encouraged they will succeed. The work is a great one and needs all the zeal and energy we can put into it.

Let us resolve that at the next annual meeting of our Presbyterial, we will be able to report an advance and not a decrease and



pray that God will own and bless His work in our hands. Let us pray more earnestly and labor with more activity for the "King's business requires haste."

## TORONTO.

*Miss Craig.*

In presenting the fifteenth annual report of the Toronto Presbyterian Society, we do so with gratitude to God for being permitted to place the record of another year's work before Him, praying it may be blessed and used for His glory.

This Society was organized in 1885, and at the end of the first year included seven Auxiliaries and five Mission Bands; now we report fifty-five Auxiliaries and thirty-six Mission Bands, a total of ninety-one Societies.

Auxiliary reports show a decrease in membership, a source of discouragement, which is accounted for in most cases by removals; and the members who remain are reported as showing increasing interest. Many report that there is now little difficulty in getting members to take part in the meeting.

The greatest note of discouragement comes from a Society that does not take the *Foreign Missionary Tidings*. This shows the difficulty of keeping in touch with the work without information.

The reports from Mission Bands are on the whole encouraging, and show faithful work done by their leaders. Three Mission Bands lapsed in the beginning of the year through the removal, or death in the homes of their Presidents, but we are glad to say that before the end of the year they returned to the work, and start this year with brighter prospects.

We are sorry to report that two Societies have disbanded—St. Paul's, King, Auxiliary, and the Oakville Mission Band. Four Mission Bands have been organized. The offerings this year are slightly in excess of last year.

The preparing of supplies for the North-West and India is always a source of interest to the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands. Over 4,000 pounds were sent, and having been re-packed by the Committee were sent to eight stations in the North-West.

The *Tidings* is subscribed for by every Auxiliary except one, and by many of the Mission Bands. Its circulation in the Presbyterian is 2,478.

The library has been very helpful to many during the past year, and it is hoped that many more will use it in the preparation of their work.

We are now on the last year of the 19th century. Will we not all enter upon it with renewed zeal in the Master's service, asking the Holy Spirit to make us each one more faithful and earnest in His work, and use us in helping to win the "World for Christ."

## WESTMINSTER.

*Mrs. A. Land.*

In this, the second annual report from our Presbyterial Society, we have reason to thank God and take courage. Although our contributions are slightly less than last year it is not through lack of interest, and we trust that during the coming year we shall increase both in our numbers and in our gifts.

## WHITBY.

*Miss Thompson.*

In reviewing the work of our Presbyterial Society during the past year we find, in the language of one of our Secretaries of Auxiliary, "something to encourage, and something to make us consider whether we have done our best." On the whole the encouragement predominates.

From Ashburn we have the cheering news that they have been able to get into better working order than has been possible for several years, under the able leadership of Mrs. Crozier, wife of their recently settled pastor.

Most of our other Auxiliaries report prosperous conditions, in some cases shown by increased membership and attendance, as well as by increase of contribution. In others it is stated regretfully that one or more of these evidences of prosperity is absent, there being usually, however, some temporary cause which it is hoped may be overcome.

An unusually large number of our Auxiliaries speak of losses sustained by the removal or death of valuable members, in some instances telling most seriously on the working power of the Auxiliary.

To some extent this is inevitable, but it is worthy of earnest consideration, whether we are, as far as we *might* do, training up the young ladies of our congregations to fill the places of those who leave us.

We welcome with great pleasure the "Wayside Gleaners," of Newtonville, to our list of Bands, and with equal pleasure record that every one of our Bands report an increase of contributions over last year.

In the case of Orono Band, their work was done under especially discouraging circumstances, and reflects all the more honor upon them and the lady who so kindly and bravely, amid the weakness of frail health, "did what she could" in the Master's cause.

Our Auxiliary membership remains nearly the same as before, our statistics showing a decrease of five, which may be due to the losses already mentioned, or to the great improvement in the manner of reporting which has been made this year. On the other hand our

Band membership has increased by fifty, with the prospect of still further growth.

In September 740 pounds of clothing was sent to Yorkton, Assa. In furnishing this large bale sixteen Auxiliaries and two Bands took part, being a larger number than ever before.

It is with extreme regret we have to report that our contribution in money (exclusive of a legacy received last year) is less than for '98. This is in spite of the fact that from a majority of our contributors we have received the same or an increase of contribution. In several cases it is stated that temporary reasons have prevented a larger offering, and in others that the entire contribution is the result of direct giving, while previously assistance had been received through other means of raising money. From this point of view, while regretting that our offering is not larger, it is believed that we have no real ground for discouragement.

The year now before us will be the last of the century; in all human probability for some of our number it will be the last on earth. Let us see that we make it, in service to the Master, the best we have ever spent.

## WINNIPEG.

*Mrs. C. W. Gordon.*

This Presbyterial Society has passed through the first decade of its life, and now includes fourteen Auxiliaries and five Mission Bands. During the year six new life members have been added. Two Societies mourn the loss of members by death.

There has been no increase in the number of Auxiliaries, and no growth in membership. This we feel is a discouraging feature, and yet there seems to be signs of new life and deepened interest in many Auxiliaries, and we hope for a good year. One new Society has been formed at Emerson with a membership of eleven, but the North Plympton Auxiliary has joined South Plympton owing to the removal of several members, and the others felt they could not carry on a Society.

We are sorry that in Mission Bands there is a decrease of two, but there are some vigorous Bands left. How to secure leaders for these Bands seems to be the great problem, and the success of the Band evidently mainly depends on the kind of person chosen.

The Scattered Helpers have increased over fifty per cent., and some of the Auxiliaries have carried on this part of the Society's work very successfully, under a well-organized plan.

Several changes have taken place among the Presbyterial officers. Mrs. Watt, who has been President for ten years, has resigned, owing to removal from the city. She has always given herself with whole-hearted zeal to the work of the Society, and her wise counsel is missed



by all. Mrs. McGaw, our faithful and efficient Secretary, has also left us for California.

Most of the Auxiliaries have been visited during the year, usually at the time of their Thank-offering meeting. 409 copies of the *Missionary Tidings* have been circulated monthly among Auxiliaries, and besides missionary literature is sent by several Auxiliaries to outlying points.

In regard to the new plan of furnishing clothing for the Indian schools, everything has proved satisfactory. Twenty-nine children in Prince Albert School were provided with complete outfits, and more interest has been taken by Auxiliaries than ever before. 830 pounds of clothing was sent.

Our funds have increased very considerably over last year. This we trust is a sign of the growing sense of the importance of foreign missions, and a fuller appreciation of the privilege of giving.

Before another annual meeting we shall have entered upon a new century. Let us grasp the opportunities that come in our way during the present year, that by closing well the old we may be readier for the new.

#### AUXILIARIES AND MISSION BANDS NOT IN PRES- BYTERIAL ORDER.

These widely scattered branches cover the largest area included in one report. East Indians, the Indians of our own North-West, and English-speaking people in different provinces, are all united in working for the spread of the Gospel. Once a year their names are brought together in our annual report, but their "work of faith, and labor of love" is carried on in widely-separated corners.

The reports are on the whole very encouraging, although there is a decrease in both membership and contributions. The membership of our Mistawasis Auxiliary is smaller, because this year each member paid her own fee; in previous years the officers paid the fees for some of the members. The change has proved beneficial.

Increased interest is reported from some of these Societies, and all are hopeful for the future. May each member be kept in close touch with the Master, and realize that she is working for Him.

# WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY

OF THE

## PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

(WESTERN DIVISION).

### CONSTITUTION.

*Article 1.*—This Society shall be called "THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA" (Western Division), and its central point of operation shall be in the City of Toronto.

*Article 2.*—Its object shall be to aid the Foreign Mission Committee and Board of Missions by promoting its work among the women and children of heathen lands, and for this purpose it shall receive and disburse all money which shall be contributed to the Society, subject to the action of that Committee or Board, in the appointment of Missionaries supported by the Society and fixing their salaries and locations. For the furtherance of this end, it shall endeavor to organize similar Associations throughout the Church, and these Associations shall bear the name of "Auxiliary Societies to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada," and shall report their work to this Society at such times as the By-laws may direct.

*Article 3.*—Each woman paying one dollar annually, through an Auxiliary or direct to the Treasury, shall become a member of this Society. The payment of twenty-five dollars by one person, at one time, shall constitute a Life Membership.

*Article 4.*—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of thirty-six Managers, including the President, four Vice Presidents, a Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretaries and a Treasurer. These Managers shall be elected from the members of the Society annually, by the members who are present at the Annual Meeting. These members shall also have power to elect representative Vice-Presidents. The Board shall have power to elect the officers and to appoint corresponding members when the objects of the Society shall be promoted thereby; they shall also have authority to fill vacancies occurring in their body during the year.

*Article 5.*—There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the officers and four other Managers to be elected annually. This Committee shall have power to transact such business as may require attention in the intervals between the stated meetings of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

*Article 6.*—The Annual Meeting shall be held in Toronto, or elsewhere, as the Society shall from year to year determine, beginning on Tuesday, in the first week in May, when the Board of Managers shall give in their Annual Report and the Officers and Managers for the ensuing year shall be elected by ballot after nomination. The Board may, however, for special reasons, postpone the Annual Meeting.

*Article 7.*—A Special Meeting of the Society may be called at any time by the President, upon the request of three Managers.

*Article 8.*—In addition to the thirty-six elected Managers who are entitled to entertainment during the Annual Meeting, each Presbyterian Society shall be entitled to send one delegate besides its President and Secretary. Each Auxiliary shall be entitled to one delegate besides its President or her substitute. Each Mission Band shall be represented by its President or her substitute. These delegates must be members of the General Society (thus entitled to vote), and shall be provided with entertainment during the Annual Meeting. All other members of the Society shall be welcome to attend the Annual Meeting, and to vote, but the Hospitality Committee shall not be responsible for the entertainment.

*Article 9.*—The Constitution may be altered at any regular meeting of the Society by a vote of two-thirds of the members present; notice in writing of the intended alterations having been given at a previous meeting.

#### BY-LAWS.

*Article 1.*—The Board of Managers shall hold its stated meetings on the first Tuesday of each month at 3 o'clock p.m., and on the remaining Tuesdays of each month at 10 o'clock a.m., in the Board Room of the Bible and Tract Societies, or at such time and place as it shall appoint. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

*Article 2.*—The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and perform such other duties as are incident to the office. She shall call special meetings upon the request of three members, and shall be *ex-officio* a member of all standing committees. She shall sign all drafts upon the treasury before they are paid.

*Article 3.*—The 1st Vice-President shall, in the absence of the President, perform all the duties of her office.

*Article 4.*—The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair record of the proceedings of the Board, give proper notice of special and stated meetings, and prepare the Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

*Article 5.*—The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct all correspondence addressed to the Board and not included in that of the other Secretaries or Treasurer.

*Article 6.*—The Home Secretary shall correspond with branches, Churches and individuals, and extend information in all proper directions, in order to awaken an interest in the branch of the missionary work for which this Society was formed. She shall prepare the Annual Report of the Home Work.

*Article 7.*—The Foreign Secretary shall conduct official correspondence with the Foreign Mission Committee as directed from time to time by the Board of Managers, also with the missionaries, teachers and Bible readers supported by this Society, and with candidates for the foreign field. She shall prepare the Annual Report of the Foreign Work. Missionaries supported by this Society shall be required to make regular reports to her.

*Article 8.*—The Supply Secretary shall have charge of all supplies to be sent to the Indian Reserves or to Mission Stations. Any correspondence relating to the supplies and requiring to be forwarded to the Foreign Mission Committee shall be transmitted directly by her.

*Article 9.*—The Secretary-Treasurer of the Foreign Missionary Tidings shall have charge of the sending out of the Foreign Missionary Tidings to all branches of the Society. The balance in her hands as Treasurer, after paying all expenses, shall be paid into the General Fund or disposed of as the Board directs.

*Article 10.*—The Secretary-Treasurer of General Literature shall have charge of all the leaflets and helps issued by the Society. The balance in her hands as Treasurer, after paying all expenses, shall be paid into the General Fund, or disposed of as the Board shall direct.

*Article 11.*—The Treasurer shall receive, hold and keep an account of all money given to this Society and shall disburse it as the Board of Managers shall direct, and report the state of the Treasury at the first meeting of each month. She shall also obtain from the Foreign Mission Committee the expenditure for the past year and the estimates for the current year, and communicate with the Foreign Mission Committee regarding all matters connected with her department. Her Annual Report shall be examined by an auditor appointed by the Board.

*Article 12.*—The Editor shall have full charge of the FOREIGN MISSIONARY TIDINGS. All letters, items of interest or business, after being passed by the Board, shall be placed in her hands with power (if

too extended) to condense or make extracts, so that the FOREIGN MISSIONARY TIDINGS shall not exceed the specified number of pages, unless the Board specially directs otherwise.

*Article 13.*—Auxiliary Societies shall be required to make an Annual Report to the Board on or before the first Tuesday in March.

*Article 14.*—Any Manager who shall be absent from the Board for three successive months without a satisfactory explanation shall forfeit her position and her place may be filled.

*Article 15.*—These By-laws may be amended at a meeting of the Society by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, but notice of any proposed amendment must be given in writing three months before the Annual Meeting for publication in the FOREIGN MISSIONARY TIDINGS.

*Note 1.*—Any member or Auxiliary of this Society desiring to bring up matters for discussion at the Annual Meeting is requested, first, to present the same in writing to the Executive Committee of their Presbyterian Society at least one month before its Annual Meeting, in order that the Executive Committee may have time to consult the Board of Management if necessary, and after their Annual Meeting transmit the same with or without approval to the Board of Management, in writing, one month before the time of the Annual Meeting of the General Society; or, when such notice is not given, the matter will be referred to a Committee named at the time.

*Note 2.*—Should business arise at any time connected with any of the departments not specially arranged for in the By-laws, and requiring communication with the Foreign Mission Committee, the Secretary of the Department shall conduct the correspondence.

## CONSTITUTION

FOR AN AUXILIARY TO THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

*Article 1.*—This Society shall be called the \_\_\_\_\_ of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (Western Division).

*Article 2.*—Its object shall be to aid the General Society in sending to foreign fields and sustaining female missionaries, Bible readers and teachers, who shall labor among heathen women and children, and so far as possible to promote an interest in the work of Foreign Missions among the children of the congregation.

*Article 3.*—Any woman may become a member of this Society by the payment of \_\_\_\_\_ annually.



*Article 4.*—The officers of this Society shall be President, two or more Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer.

*Article 5.*—The President shall preside at all meetings and have a general oversight of the work.

*Article 6.*—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Society, give notice of meetings, conduct necessary correspondence and prepare the Annual Report, which must be submitted to the Annual Meeting for approval, after which she shall forward it and the names of the newly elected officers, together with the report of the Juvenile Mission Band (and the report of the Young Woman's Band, if auxiliary to the Society) to the Secretary of the Presbyterian Society; if none exist she shall then forward them to the Home Secretary of the General Society.

*Article 7.*—The Treasurer's duty shall be to report the state of the treasury at every meeting, and remit the funds of the Society and Juvenile Mission Band (also the funds of the Young Woman's Band, if auxiliary to this Society) yearly or quarterly to the Treasurer of the Presbyterian Society, where one exists; if not to the Treasurer of the General Society. All money must be forwarded to the Treasurer of the Presbyterian Society before the middle of February, and to the General Treasurer on or before the first Tuesday in March.

*Article 8.*—The Society shall hold regular stated meetings when all suitable measures shall be adopted to promote interest in this branch of missionary work; also an Annual Meeting to elect officers and hear the Annual Report.

*Article 9.*—The Juvenile Mission Band (if one exists) shall be auxiliary to the Society, and shall be required to report to it annually and pay to the Treasurer all moneys in hand at the close of the year.

The Juvenile Mission Band shall be represented at the Annual Meeting of this Society, by its officers, or their substitutes, and two delegates. Only members of Auxiliaries are entitled to vote at this meeting.

If the Young Woman's Band be auxiliary to this Society, they shall report to it annually and pay to the Treasurer all moneys in hand at the close of the year.

## DIRECTIONS

## FOR FORMING JUVENILE MISSION BANDS.

A Juvenile Mission Band may be formed in, or in connection with any Congregation. It may be composed of girls, or of girls and boys, who may meet together to select a name and adopt the following Constitution:—

## CONSTITUTION

## FOR JUVENILE MISSION BANDS.

*Article 1.*—This Association, composed of girls (or of girls and boys), shall be called the—Mission Band of—Presbyterian Church in—, and shall be auxiliary to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in said Church. (If none exist the Band shall then be auxiliary to the Presbyterian Society of the Presbytery in which it is situated).

*Article 2.*—The object of this Band shall be to interest children in the work of Foreign Missions, and to educate them in the grace of giving.

*Article 3.*—The Band shall meet at stated times to read the Scriptures, for prayer and praise, to receive missionary intelligence and instruction, and to contribute to the funds of the Band according to their ability. The Band shall also hold an Annual Meeting to receive and adopt the Annual Reports and to elect officers.

*Article 4.*—Any girl or boy may become a member of the Band by payment of an annual fee of—to the Treasurer.

*Article 5.*—The officers of the Band shall be a President (who must be an adult and a member of the General Society), two or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

*Article 6.*—The President, or in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside at all meetings and have a general oversight of the work.

*Article 7.*—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Band, give notice of meetings, conduct necessary correspondence and prepare the Annual Report. This Report must be submitted at the Annual Meeting of the Band for approval, after which the Secretary shall forward it and the names of the newly elected officers to the Secretary of the Society to which the Band is auxiliary.



*Article 8.*—The Treasurer shall receive and keep an accurate account of all funds and report the same each month to the Band. She shall also prepare a complete statement at the end of the year, to be submitted at the Annual Meeting of the Band, after which she shall forward it, together with all moneys in her hands, to the Treasurer of the Society to which the Band is auxiliary. The Treasurer shall also keep a roll containing the names of the members of the Band.

*Article 9.*—An Auditor shall be appointed by the Band to examine and verify the Treasurer's accounts before they are submitted to the Annual Meeting.

## CONSTITUTION

### OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY PRESBYTERIAL SOCIETY.

*Article 1.*—This Society shall be called "The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbytery of——."

*Article 2.*—The officers shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer—all to be elected annually, and to hold office until their successors are appointed.

*Article 3.*—The affairs of this Society shall be conducted by a body of Managers, viz.: The officers of the Presbyterial Society; the President, two Vice-Presidents, the Secretary, the Treasurer or their substitutes, and two delegates from each Auxiliary; the President, or her substitute, and two delegates from each Young Woman's Band; and the President, or her substitute, from each Juvenile Mission Band.

*Article 4.*—The object of this Society shall be to promote the formation of Auxiliaries to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in all the congregations of the Presbytery, to diffuse intelligence and excite missionary interest among the women and children of the Church.

*Article 5.*—The Society shall be Auxiliary to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (Western Division.)

*Article 6.*—The Presbyterial Society shall hold its Annual Meeting at——meeting of the Presbytery, and the Presbyterial officers shall meet in session with the Managers previously for the election of officers for the ensuing year and the transaction of all business connected with the Society. Five members constitute a quorum.

*Article 7.*—The President and Secretary of the Presbyterial Society, with the President of the Local Society where the meeting is held, shall be a Committee of Arrangements, selecting topics for discussion, and devising means to make the meeting interesting and profitable.

Article 8.—Reports shall be sent to this meeting from the Secretary of each Local Society.

Article 9.—A short abstract of these reports shall be sent to the Presbytery in Session, to be read, if approved, at their public meeting. It shall be followed, it is hoped, by at least one address upon this branch of work.

Article 10.—This Constitution may be altered at any regular meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, notice in writing of the intended alterations having been given at a previous meeting.

CONSTITUTION BY LAWS.

OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY PRESBYTERIAL SOCIETY

Article 1.—The meetings of this Society shall always be opened with the reading of the Scriptures and prayer.

Article 2.—The President (or one of the Vice-Presidents) shall preside at all meetings, call extra meetings when requested by three Auxiliary Societies, and shall aid in forming congregational Auxiliaries when desired. She shall also take the general supervision of the work of the Presbytery, visiting every Auxil' y Society in the course of the year, and holding meetings with the ladies of as many of the unorganized churches as possible.

Article 3.—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Society, give notice of meetings, and prepare the Annual Report. She must keep the Home Secretary of the General Society informed of the condition of the Presbyterial Society and shall forward to her annually a list of officers, together with the Annual Report of the Secretary and Treasurer, and shall attend generally to the correspondence of the Society.

Article 4.—The Treasurer shall receive the contributions of the congregational Auxiliaries in the Presbytery, and shall forward them to the Treasurer of the General Society before the first Tuesday in March.

Article 5.—The Presbyterial Society shall hold its Annual Meeting at the meeting of the Presbytery, and the Presbyterial officers shall meet in session with the same, and be previously for the election of officers for the ensuing year and the transaction of all business connected with the same.

MEMORANDA

Any rules relating to the local affairs of the Society may be adopted, providing they do not conflict with the Constitution and By-Laws of the General Society.

Do not interfere with other organizations. Make no appeal that shall conflict with the duties of Church members to any other benevolent work.
