## CONSTITUTION AND BY-LATJS

## PROVINCE OF QUEBEC RIFLE ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION. <br> As Revised 5th May, 1881.

1. That this Association be called the "Province of Quebec Rifte Association," and shall have for its object the encouragement of rifle shooting in the Province.
2. Any person subscribing two dollars to the funds of the Association shall be a member thereof for the year in which such subscription shall be made.
3. A donation of twenty dollars in cash, at any one time, for that express purpose, or of a prize of not less value than forty dollars, to be competed for at the annual prize meeting, shall make the donor eligible for election as a life member at next annual meeting of Council.
4. Any regularly constituted Rifle Association or Corps subscribing ten dollars or upwards, per annum, to the funds of the Association shall be considered as being in connection with it, and shall be entitled to a number of memberships, for competition only, in the proportion of one for every dollar so subscribed. The Association thus affiliating is to select from its members the persons to hold such memberships.
5. There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons, named by the Council. (The Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec, for the time being, shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron.")
6. There shall be a President, to be elected at the annual busi ness meeting of the Association.
7. There shall be four Vice-Presidents-one for each Brigade Major's Division-to be elected in the same manner as the President.
8. There shall be a Council composed as follows, viz:

1st. Two members from each Brigade Major's Division, to be elected annually at the business meeting.

2nd. One representative member from each affiliated Association or Corps in this Province.
9. The President, Vice-Presidents, the District Deputy Ad-jutants-General of Militia and Brigade Majors, for Province of Quebec, shall be members "ex-officio" of the Council. Five members of Council shall form a quorum, and in the event of vacancies occurring in the elective members, from any cause whatever, the remaining members of the Council sha'l have the power of filling such vacancies. All members of Council, excepting representatives of affiliated Associations, must be individuai members of the Association.
10. Representatives to the Council shall be chosen by the Associations they represent, and the names of delegates when changed shall be sent to the Secretary at least one month prior to the annual meeting.
11. The Council shall, at its first meeting, choose from its members a chairman.
12. There shall be a Secretary and a Treasurer, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure.
13. The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually
named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shail also have the entire management and superintendence of the : ffairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts or deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.
14. The Council shall be regulated in their proceedings by such by-laws as may from time to time be enacted by them; no by-law being in any case altered or new one proposed, without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each member of Council.
15. The Annual Prize Meeting shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the Council, and the prizes shall be competed for in accordance with such regulations as may be passed from time to time by the Council.
16. An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, and shall (having been previously submitted to the Council) be published as soon after the prize meeting as may be found practicable.
17. An Annual Business Meeting of the members of the Association, for the election of Officers and Council, who shali assume office on first day of succeeding January, and th transaction of other business, shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the by-laws.
18. No alteration in the Constitution shall be made, except by a resolution duly passed at the annual business meeting or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary one month at least previous to the annual business meeting, at which the same is to be proposed, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all members of the Association of such proposed amendments, and also to post them on the bulletin board at the opening of the annual matches.

## BY-IA W S.

As Revised 5th May, 1881.

1. The Annual Business Meeting of the Association shall be held on the second day of the annual matches.
2. There shall be two ordinary meetings of Council, the first of which shall, be held immediately after the annual business meeting of the Association, and the second at such other time as the Council may then determine upon.
3. Extraordinary meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required, by any six members of the Council; notification being sent to each member of Council at least ten days previous to such meeting, and the requisition for the meeting and the notices to the members must state the object or objects of such extraordinary meetings.
4. The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings at all meetings, which shall be entered in a book, kept for that purpose, by the Secretary, open to the inspection of all members of the Council, and published with the annual report.
5. There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three members of the Council, to be chosen at their first meeting.
6. The Trea urer shall deposit from time to time, in such chartered bank as the Finance Committee may direct, all sums of money received by him on behalf of the Association.
7. All expenditure for current expenses, which may be required by the Secretary, must be authorized by the signature of a member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner. Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.
8. A detailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditures shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer.

## FOURTEENTH ANN 'AL REPORT

OF THE

## PROVINCE OF' QUEBEC RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

In issuing the various returns of the past season, it seems a suitable custom to present a report, calling attention to any matters of special interest and to any questions requiring special consideration. On this occasion such a review is most satisfactory in every respect except in regard to the Ranges.

Or. Prize-Meeting was unusually successful. Our membership (individual and through affiliated associations) has increased, and our finances are in a satisfactory condition.
It is fair to say that these results have been achieved by the vigor and care of our executive committee and officers, to whom the thanks of our members are due.
The matter of the ranges themselves is the only one which is not in a satisfactory position; owing to the uncertainty of the renewal of the lease by the Militia Department, only the repairs absolutely necessary were made ; there is some prospect now of a fresh lease being obtained, but a very considarable expenditure will be necessary to place them in a proper condition for next season's use ; and their permanent acquisition is a necessity to the militia of this district; if, by any changes, they are lost, it will seriously affect the practical utility of the force.

## Prize-Meeting.

The prize-list presented two entireiy new features,-a match for the mounted services and a " military" match, both at moveable targets. With the experience gained this year, these competitions may be still further improved, and such matches should be encouraged as they are the more practical form of rifle shooting and the nearest to what is required in actual service. Our city troop of cavalry deserves much credit for the manner in which it turned out for this new practice.

Two new series of aggregates, both useful, were added this year, one for teams and one for young shots.

The circular issued before the matches showed that we offered 239 cash prizes, value $\$ 2,654$, besides cups, badges, medals and prizes in kind.

The attendance has still further improved to a total of 1,682 entries, a most satisfaetory feature ; this is an increase of 10 per cent. over last year and 20 per cent. in advace of the previous year. The larger number of prizes partly accounts for this.

The shooting has not deteriorated, as we find the high scoring of last year again improved upon.

This year the order of the various matches was somewhat changed so as to confine the shooting to four days; the system of timing was so accurately arranged that notwithstanding the difficulty of unfavourable weather and the pressure of increased entries, the matches were concluded within the time alloted.

We again opened two of the competitions to the Martini Henry rifle, one at 800 yards for that weapon only, and one at 500 yards for either Snider or Martini. The latter especially was a very popular match and induced a large entry, and it is interesting to note that the Snider held its own with the more modern weapon; this, however, was owing, in a very large measure, to competitors not being habituated to the use of the Martini.

## Improvements proposed.

The experience of the past season points to the following con-clusions:-

1. That the policy of offering numerous prizes should be continued.
2. That better prizes in kind be provided for the "Extra Series," also more target accommodation, so that competitors need not wait so long for their turn to shoot.
3. That military shooting at moving targets be further encouraged, also the match for cavalry and other mounted services.
4. That the timing system and "entering beforehand" be still more encouraged.
5. That our tenure of the ranges be more permanently secured and they then be improved and target accommodation increased.
6. That arrangements be made to have a representative always at the D.R.A. Council meetings.
7. That more systematic efforts be made to enlarge the subscription list.
8. That country associations should try to have a representative in the city to attend the meetings of Council so that their views may be expressed in regard to matters of interest.

## London Merchants' Cup.

We had the satisfaction this year of winning the Provincial team match in Ottawa; the trophy, the "London Merchants" Cup," has been confided for the year to the care of our President, the Hon. A. P. Caron, and a suitable arm badge has been presented to the members of the winning team. Our men took a fair share of the other prizes, and we shall be represented on the Wimbledon team of next year.

## Special Prizes.

Our thanks are due to the many friends who have assisted us by various donations and subscriptions, and whose names will be found on another page. His Excellency the Governor-General again presented us with his silver and bronze medals, which were won by Gr. Johnston, M. G. A., and Private Riddle, 6th Fusiliers. His Honor the Lieut.-Governor sent us his welcome gift of a silver medal, which was won by Sergt. Cole, M. G. A.

The Dominion and Provincial Governments continue their regular grants, which so largely contribute to the maintenance of the Association.

The handsome gold medal presented by a portion of the Montreal press was won at a fifth annual competition by Pvt. Neilson, 1st. P. W. R., and next year the four former winners,-Pvt. Marks, 6th Fusiliers, 1881, Pvt. D. Smith, 5th R. S., 1880, Lieut. Laurie, M. G. A.. 1879, and Sergt. Riddle, M. G. A., 1878, will have to shoot off with him for its final possession. We hope some
of our friends will replace this prize, which was given for the best aggregate shooting at 500 yards.

The Accident Insurance Co.'s Cup is still passing from one corps to another, and this year is held by the Sth Royal Rifles of Quebec.

The Dolan Cup was won by Sergt. Philips, 8th R. R., and has to be again competed for next year.

## Visitors.

We were favoured with the presence of a large number of visitors on the afternoon on which the Military match took place, and much interest was shown in the proceedings. The Grand Trunk Railway ran a special train from Bonaventure station to Point St. Charles.

We are again indebted to the various transportation companies for the usual issue of tickets to competitors at reduced rates.

## Property.

Our moveable property is increased by the addition of two targets, and a complete list of things belonging to the Association will be found in another place.

## MEETING OF COUNCIL.

Montreal, 3rd May, 1882.
Minutes of Meeting of Council, held this day in the rooms of the Militia Department.
Present: Lt.-Cols. Fletcher, (in the chair) Martin and Fraser. Majors Mudge and Blaiklock. Captain Balfour and Lieut. Hood.
The minutes of last meeting, 21st December last, having been printed in the annual report, were taken as read, and on motion were duly confirmed. Lt.Col. Martin reported verbally that a petition had been extensively signed and forwarded to the Minister of Militia, in favor of the permanent acquisition of the ranges.
Lt.-Col. Martin and Capt. Balfour were authorized to form a deputation to interview the Minister of Militia on this subject and to associate with them Lt.-Cols. Ouimet and Houde and the city members; they were further instructed to bring up the question of repairs and increasing the number of targets.
The Secretary read letters of apology from the Minister of Militia, Lt.-Cols.Straubenzie, Duchesnay and D'Orsonnens; Majors Scott and Morehouse expressing regret that they would be unable to be present at this meeting.
The Treasurer reported that he had ordered some repairs immediately necessary on the ranges, to the extent of a few dollars. It was unanimously agreed that two new targets be purchased for the new butt, and the Treasurer was authorized to pay for the same.
A letter was read from the Secretary of the 5th Royal Scots' Rifle Association, in regard to Sgt. Perry's aggregate, claiming a place and asking that the matter be reconsidered.
It was on motion resolved that this matter could not be reopened. The date for the annual matches was fixed for Tuesday, 8th August, and following days, and Lt.-Col. Fraser, Majors Bond and Blaiklock, and Lt. Hood, with the Chairman of Council and Sec-
retary and Treasurer, ex officio, were named as a committee to arrange the programme and carry out the matches.

Lt.-Col. Lyman and Major Bond, (with power to add to their number) were appointed as a committee to collect subscriptions in money and kind for the matches.

Capt. Balfour offered several suggestions, which were referred to the sub-committee on the matches for consideration and action ; the suggestions were as follows:

That a change be made in the skirmishing match; that the position at 200 yards be standing ; that badge winners be allowed free entry in the Association match.

It was moved by Capt. Balfour, seconded by Lt. Hood, and resolved that uniform be compulsory only in Battalion and Skirmishing matches.

It was resolved that the number composing the battalion teams this year, be increased to eight officers, non-commissioned officers or men.

It was also suggested, that one Battalion team from each country Association be allowed to shoot in the Battalion match; this was intended to assist those Associations which are mainly composed of one battailion, though not bearing that battalion's dis. tinctive name.

It was decided not to change the small bore match and to try to reduce the cost of printing by advertisements.

In reference to the choice of the Provincial eight at Ottawa it was agreed that the members of Council, present at the Dominion matches, be authorized to form a committee to select the team from the competitors, using their own judgment and not necessarily taking the first eight aggregates.

It was resolved to issue a circular to affiliated Associations and others, informing them of the proposed changes.

The Treasurer was authorized, in settling with last year's collector, to allow him the renumeration he considered fitting.

The meeting then adjourned.

Circular, issued by direction of Council.
Montreal, 10th May, 1882.
I am directed to call the attention of our members, and the local Rifle Associations generally, to some of the changes which take effect in our Matches, commencing on Tuesday, 8th August next ; for example :

1. At 200 yards, the position will be standing.
2. In the Battalion Match, teams will be composed of eight members. As an assistance to local associations, it is decided that where one of these associations is composed principally of one regiment, that regiment will be allowed to compete in the Battalion Match, although the affiliation be in the name of the local association.
3. Wearing of uniform is made compulsory only in the Battalion and Skirmishing Matches.
4. The system of entering in advance will be continued this year.
5. Winners of the Provincial Badge will be allowed free entry in the Affiliated Association Match, at the first meeting they attend thereafter; five members will compose an Association Team as heretofore.
6. The Skirmishing Match is to be changed to correspond somewhat with the new system of the D. C. R. A. ; the target is reduced in size, so as to represent a file of men, appearing behind a parapet, taking aim, firing and getting under cover. The targets therefore would be about 2 feet 9 inches high by four feet wide, and remain in view about 15 seconds; the teams to consist of five N. C. O. or privates.
7. The Provincial eight for the London Merchants' Cup, at Ottawa, is to be selected according to the best judgment of the Committee of Council, and not by aggregates as in recent years.

The detailed programmes will be issued as usual in July, with as much encouragement to young shots, in the way of more numerous prizes, if the funds will permit, and at least one special match.
The annual subscription is now due, and payable to the Treasurer, Lieut.Col. John Martin, 457 St. Paul Street, Montreal-for members, two dollars ; for associations, ten dollars.
The Report of the Proceedings of last year has been issued and distributed; additional copies can be obtained on application to the Secretary.
The Council are desirous of having all the local associations affiliated with their Provincial Association, and would ask you to see that your association is so represented.

## Competition V.-The Military Match.

To be competed for by sections of five officers, non-commissioned officers or men from any Militia Corps affiliated with the P.Q.R.A. (See Special Regulation in Competition I.) Any number of sections may enter from the same corps. Uniform, as in General 'Regulations, sec. 1, par. 3. Entrance fee, $\$ 2.50$ per section. One entry for the two series. Rifles as in No 1.

## 1st Series-Skirmishing.

Distance, from about 500 yards to about 200 yards. Number of rounds, 10 , advancing. Size of target, $4 \mathrm{ft} . \times 2 \mathrm{ft} .6 \mathrm{in}$., divided into three belts-the lower belt, 15 inches deep, scoring 5 points; the centre belt, 10 inches deep, scoring 3 points; the upper belt, 5 inches deep, scoring two points. The targets will be exposed 15 seconds at a time. Two targets will be allowed each section.


## 2nd Series-Volley Firing.

To be competed for by the same sections and at the same size of targets as 1st Series. Volleys by word of command of the officer in charge. Distance, 400 yards. Number of rounds, 5 . Fosition, kneeling, in single rank. Targets will be lowered and holes patched after each round. For each shot fired out of time, 3 points will be deducted from the score of that section.


Note.-In further explanation of the Regulations and special rules for this
match, it is intended to be carried out as nearly as practicable in the following manner :-

1. The Sections will draw lots for places, after the officers, markers, \&c., have withdrawn into the Butts and signalled that they are ready.
2. The targets will be raised and lowered by order of the officer in command in the Butts ; he may raise them at irregular intervals, but they will always be up 15 seconds; the score will be kept in the Butts until all the sections have completed firing.
3. In the 1 st series, skirmishing, at about 500 yds ., the sections will be extended as far as the ground permits ; officers will accompany each section, and one officer will command the whole line; this officer will give the order to advance, after the signal is given to the Butts that everything is ready; the extended line will then advance until the targets appear, when it will halt and fire without word of command, as the targets will only be exposed 15 seconds.

The line of sections will remain halted until the officer in command gives the order to advance; but whenever the targets appear, the line will fire whether it has advanced or not ; the target will appear ten times, but each man must only fire one shot each time.

Sights may be adjusted at any time, but rifles must not be loaded until the targets appear.
4. Penalty for each infringement of any of these regulations will be 3 points

The officer in charge of each section will have to see that these regulations are observed.

Ricochet shots will be counted as direct hits.
N.B.-As this style of shooting is experimental, it has been considered advisable to try skirmishing only "in advancing," on another occasion "retiring" may be added.

## MEMBERSHIP.

Individual membership, $\$ 2.00$.
Affiliating Associations are entitled to ten (10) members' tickets and one badge on payment of $\$ 10$.

The above subscriptions must be paid on or before the 5th of August. 25 per cent. additional will be charged after that date.

Firing shall commence each day at 9 o'clock precisely.
All firing shall be conducted under officers or persons appointed for the duty by the Executive Committee, and all competitors shall be under their authority.

## NOTICE TO COMPETITORS.

1. Competitors must make themselves acquainted with the Regulations, as also with the conditions of the Match for which they have entered, as in neither case will the plea of ignorance be entertained.
2. The kange Officers will decide disputes on the ground. Appeal from their decision may be made in writing to the Executive Committee, whose decision will be final and without recourse. Their decision to be given in writing to the Secretary.
3. When at the Firing point they must comply with all orders given by the Range Officer, or Officer in charge.

## 1.-GENERAL REGULATIONS.

I.-No active Militiaman shall shoot as a member of more than une corps.
II.-No non-commissioned officer or private employed by the P.Q.R.A. for duty at the firing points or in the butts, shall shoot either for a prize or for practice.
III.-In all competitions restricted to active Militiamen, or in which they shoot as such, the uniform of their corps shall be worn, viz:

1. Tunic, patrol or regulation fatigue jacket.
2. Trousers.
3. Regimental head dress, or a cap cover, with or without a cap under it.

All officers of the same corps must appear in the same order, as must also all non-commissioned officers and privates, but where a duly authorized undress for officers exists they may appear in it, although the non-commissioned officers and privates may be in full dress. Waist or cross-belts need not be worn.
4. In competitions not restricted to the Active Militia, competitors must appear either in complete uniform or wholly in plain clothes.

Any objection on the score of a competitor's dress must be raised before he takes up his position to shoot.
N.B.-Cap covers or puggarees may be worn over the regimental full or undress cap, and great coats or water proofs over uniforms.
IV.-Competitors must submit their rifles and ammunition for inspection whenever required.
V.-Hair triggers will not be allowed.
VI.-Fixed artificial rests will not be allowed, except in the skirmishing match.
VII.-Competitors may use a water-proof sheet, mat or great coat, not folded up, but laid flat on the ground; but no cork beds or elbow rests will be allowed except those furnished by the Association.
VIII.-In competitions open to "Any Rifles," the competitors may wipe out their rifles during a competition, provided they do not delay the squad by so doing. In ordinary competitions, restricted to "Military breech-loaders" this will not be allowed except between the distances in the competition.
IX.-When a muzzle-loader is used, the competitor must load in view of other members of the squad, but he must not cap until about to fire.
X.-When a breech-loader is used, the competitor must not load until he has taken his position at the firing point, and the register keeper has given the word "all clear."
XI.-Competitors may "blow-off" in the pits at the firing points only, before firing, and after the presentation of a "blow-off" ticket to the registerkeeper.
XII.-Slings may be used as an assistance in shooting for all prizes, but when the competition is restricted to military breech-loaders the slings must be of the Government length and pattern, white or black, and attached to he rifle as in Government arms.

## In Individual Competitions.

XIII.-(a) A competitor may use a bi: ocular or telescope, not mounted on any kind of stand, provided his doing so causes no delay to the shooting.
(b) After a competitor has taken his place at the firing point, no person except the register keeper or an officer on duty, will be permitted to speak to him.
(c) No coaching of any kind will be permitted in any match.

Any violation of this rule, or any part of it, must be at once reported by the register keeper to the officer in charge, who will caution the offender, and
on any repitition of the offence shall report the same to the Range Officer, to be dealt with by the Executive Committee as laid down under the head of "penalties," and the person or persons offending may be removed from the firing points.

> 2.-PENALTIES-DISQUALIFICATION.
XIV.-Any competitor-
(a) Who shall fire in a name other than his own ; or
(b) Who shall fire twice for the same prize, unless permitted by the conditions of the competition to do so ; or
(c) Who shall intentionally discharge his rifle at the wrong target ; or
(d) Who shall offer money, or a bribe of any kind to any employee of the Association under any pretence whatever; or
(e) Who shall be guilty of any conduct which the Executive Committee may consider discreditable; or
( $f$ ) Who shall be reported to the Council or Executive Committee as having been elsewhere guilty of such conduct or the aforesaid offences ; or
(g) Who shall directly or indirectly make any arrangements with any other competitor for pooling or dividing any prize,
Shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Council or Committee, or on the receipt of such report from any Affiliated or duly recognized Association, forfeit all his entrance fees and prizes, and be forever disqualified from competing at any Prize Meeting of the Association.

## EXCLUSION FROM FURTHER COMPETITION DURING THE MEETING.

XV.-Any competitor-
(a) Who shall fire when the danger signal is up ; or
(b) Who shall discharge his rifle on the range except in accordance with the regulations for shooting; or
(c) Who shall be found with a loaded rifle except when at his proper firing point and engaged in competing ; or
(d) Who from a proper want of care discharges his rifle accidentally. (If such discharge is due to a defect in his rifle, an ample and satisfactory explanation must be given) ; or
(e) Who shall fire a pool shot before delivering his ticket to the register keeper ; or
( $f$ ) Who shall alter or make any erasure on his firing ticket; or
(g) Who shall act in any way that might prove dangerous,

Shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, be excluded from all further competition at the meeting, and shall forfeit all his entrance fees.

## DISALLOWANCE OF SCORE.

XVI-Any competitor-
(a) Who shall fail to comply with the conditions laid down for any particular prize; or
(b) Who shall infringe on any of the instructions and regulations for the conduct of the meeting while shooting for any particular prize; or
(c) Who, when competing for an aggregate prize shall omit to enter, or shall enter incorrectly his previous score or scores on the register or ticket provided for that purpose, shall, on the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, have his score for that particular prize disallowed.

## FINES.

XVII.-Any competitor-

Who, in "blowing off" shall fail to go close up to and point bis rifle into the pit provided for that purpose ; or who shall accidentally fire at the wrong target, shall be fined one dollar, to be paid forthwith to the range officer.

In cases where a competitor "is excluded from further competition," or where his "score is disallowed," for any particular prize, the circumstances only under which the penalty was incurred shall be posted on the notice board, as a warning to others, without the name of the individual implicated.

In cases of "disqualification" the name of the offender as well as the particulars of the case shall be posted on the notice board.

## MITIGATION OF PENALTIES.

XVIII.-The Executive Committee shall have power to mitigate or remit any of the above penalties.

## 3.-PRIZE WINNERS.

XIX.-Unless otherwise specified, no one will be allowed to take more than one prize in any compotiaion.
XX.-Winners of prizes must apply for their certificates at the statistical office, and on signing the receipt attached thereto will receive the amount or amounts due to them from the Treasurer of the P. Q. R. A.

## 4.-DISTANCES AND TARGETS.

The Ordinary Targets, divided into three classes, shall be of the following dimensions:-

5.-MARKING.

1. The marking will be as follows :
a. Bull's Eye

White disc.
b. Inner. ... ..... . . . . ........ . Red disc.
c. Magpic...... ............. . . Black and White disc.
d. Outer. . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . Black disc.
e. Misses will not be signalled; but if a target has been lowered under the impression that it bas been hit, and if no hit is found on it, after raising it the marker will wave a red flag, which will signify a miss.
2. When two shots strike a target simultaneously, that which has the highest value will alone be marked with the marking disc, and the competitor whose proper turn it was to fire at the target will be credited with that shot, provided he has fired.
3. On a target being lowered, the position of a hit, if any, and its value will be shown by the spotting disc when the target is again raised.
4. The marking when signalled shall not be questioned, but if a shot is not signalled, and the officer in charge of the firing points be satisfied that a reasonable doubt exists as to whether the shot may not have struck thé target, he may ask the officer in charge at the butt to examine the target, the result of such examination as signalled shall be final. Any competitor challenging a shot shall deposit the sum of twenty-five cents with the officer in charge at the firing point, which shall be forfeited in case no hit is found on the target.
5. All alterations of the registers must be initialed by the register keeper making them, but no alterations, except in the case of a clerical error, shall be made without having first signalled to the butt.
6. No person will be permitted to go and examine a target during the meeting, except the Range Officer or such person or persons as he may duly authorize to do so in his behalf.

## Military Match Targets.

(4 feet 2 in. by 2 feet 6 in. high : 3 Divisions.)

1. Lower belt 15 in . high, score-value 5 points.
2. Middle belt, 10 in. high, score-value, 3 "
3. Upper belt 5 in . high, score-value, 2 "
In Skirmishing.

When the number of hits counted on the targets exceeds the number of shots allowed in the competition, three marks shall be deducted for every such hit in excess of the number of shots, unless it be proved that such hits on the targets in excess of the numbur of shots allowed could only have bean made by competitors in the squad firing more than their authorized number of rounds, in which case the squad shall be disqualified.
6.-RIFLES.

The rifles shall be classed as follows:-
CLASS I.
Military Breech-Loaders.
Snider and Martini-Henry rifles, either of Goverement issue or of bona fide Government pattern, and bearing the Government viewer's mark.

1. Weight of Snider not to exceed, without Bayonet, 9 los. 12 oz . Weight of Martini-Henry, without bayonet, not to exceed $8 \mathrm{lbs}, 12 \mathrm{oz}$,
2, No pad or shoe for the heel plate of the butt will be allowed.
3, Minimum pull of trigger 6 lbs .
2. Sights to be strictly in accordance with those of the Government issue. riled sights will not be allowed.
(a) All sights may be temporarily blackened or whitened, but no application of a permanent nature will be allowed. No shading of sights will be permitted.
(b) The back sight may be tilted forward or backward, or supported at an angle by any extemporized means.
(c) The sliding bar may be reversed, and used on either side of the uprights. One permanent centre line for the Snider and three for the MartiniHenry will be allowed, and temporary marks or lines of any kind removable at pleasure may be used.

## CLASS II,

## Any Rifles.

1. Weight-Maximum, 10 lbs.
2. Pull of Trigger-Minimum, 3 lbs .
3. A pad or shoe for the heel plate may be used.
4. Any description of sights, exceipt telescope and magnifying, may be used.

## 7.-AMMUNITION.

1.-In Competitions Restricted to "Military Breech-loaders."

Competitors must provide their own ammunition, which may be purchased on the ground at twenty cents for ten rounds Snider; 30 cents for ten rounds Martini.
2.-In Competition open to "Any Riffes."

Any ammunition may be used, to be provided by the competitor.
No restrictions will be made as to the arrangement or composition of the charges or cartridges, provided that, in the case of Breech-loading Riftes being used.
(a) No part of the charge is inserted at the muzzle.
(b) That the rifle is not loaded until the word "all clear" is given.
(c) That no time is lost, and
(d) That no dangerous practice is resorted to.

## 8.-POSITION.

Unless otheiwise specified, the shooting at all ranges shall be from the firing points, and may be in any position, with the head to the target.
N.B.-In small-bore match any position allowed as at Wimbleton.

## 9.-ORDER OF SHOOTING.

1. When a competitor has joined a squad he shall not leave it until he has retired or completed his firing, without leave from the register keeper; any competitor losing his turn, or being absent without leave, or who does not hand
his scoring ticket to the register-keeper within a reasonable time at the firing point to which he is squadded, will be disqualified for the match and lose his entrance fee.
2. In all competitions, except those open to "Any Rifles," competitors shall, when possible, be formed up by files, and fire shot and shot alternately.
3. Where but one competitor is present, he shall fire his shots without undue delay ; but the officer in charge of the firing point, or some person named by him, must witness the shooting, and countersign the register. Failing such verification the score will be invalidated.
4. In competitions open to "Any Rifles," the competitors shall be formed in a squad, and fire shot for shot in the order in which their names are called.
5. No one shall be allowed to join the squad after the commencement of the second competitive round.
6. Leave may be given by the officers in charge to any competitor who, when firing with a muzzle loader, may find it necessary through a mistake in loading to fall out for the purpose of "blowing off."
7. No two competitors shall shoot in any competition with the same rifle, excepting with Martini-Henry; nor shall a competitor change his rifle at any range during a competition, unless his first rifle should become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified through the officer in charge.

## In Competitions open to "Any Rifles."

The competitor must, after delivering each shot, pay attention to the score called out by the register keeper, and himself see that such score is correctly entered on the register, so that any objection to the score recorded may be investigated before the next shot is fired.

## In Ordinary Competitions.

Any person present whom the competitor may name will watch the score recorded and if need be raise objection before the next shot is fired.
N. B.-The right of objection in either of the above cases only extends to the registration of score by the register keeper, and not to marker's signals.
10.-TIES.

Ties shall be decided as follows :
A.-In Individual Competitions for a Series of Prizes .

1. If at more than one distance, by the range totals in inverse order.
2. By the fewest outers.
3. By the fewest magpies.
4. By the fewest inners.
5. By the valu? of each shot in inverse order.
6. For Money Prizes, by Division.
7. For Prizes in Kind, by shooting off, as in Clause B.
8. In the case of a Prize Part in Kind and Part in Money, by shooting off for the Prize in Kind, and dividing the Money.
N. B.-In all competitions the order of the winners shall be decided by the foregoing rules if possible, but in the case of absolute ties the names shall be arranged alpha betically and bracketed.
B. -In Individual Competitions for a Single Prize.
9. By the aggregate score in three rounds at the longest distance.
10. By firing single shots until decided.

Absentees shall forfeit their claim to shoot.

## C.-In Team Competitions.

1. If at more than one distance, by the aggregate range totals in inverse ordes
2. By the fewest outers.
3. By the fewest magpies.
4. By the fewest inners.
5. By the highest score in each team shooting off, as in Clause B.
D.-Aggregate.

Ties for the first place to be shot off, as in Clause B.
For other places :-
By the aggregate total of each range in inverse order, viz :-

1. By the total scores at 600 yards.
2. By the total scores at 500 yards, $f c$.
E.-In cases not met by the feregoing.
3. By any special rules attached to the conditions.
4. By the fiat of the Executive.

## 11.-ENTRIES.

1. Entries, accompanied by the fees for the first eight matches, must be made on or before Saturday, 5th August, addressed to the Secretary, P. O. Box 1137, Montreal. After that date, 25 p. c. extra will be charged.
2. Every competitor shall enter and shoot under his own name, and not oftener than once for any prize, unless specially allowed by the terms of the competition.
3. To meet the case where difficulty may be experienced in selecting the actual competitors in sufficient time to make the required entries by the 5th August, Officers commanding corps and Secretaries of Local Associations will be permitted to send in their applications for
(State No.) competitors, accompanying such application with the amount of the entrance fees; and to postpone the rendering of the actual names of those for whom they make the entries until the selection of the competitors is
definitely made. In such case the Register tickets shall not be issued before the nominal return is handed to the Secretary. Any payment made for entries in excess of the number of competitors nominated will be returned in full, as provided for under paragraph 12, (a), Return of Entrance Fees.
4. Entrance fees must be paid at the time when entries are made.

The register tickets will be issued on application at the Secretary's Office on the range.

The Executive Committee reserve to themselves the power of refusing any entry, either for Volunteer or All Comers Prizes, or of cancelling, at any moment, any entry that may have been previously accepted.

## 12.-RETURN OF ENTRANCE FEES.

1. Entrance fees in full will be returned to those-
(a) Who are prevented from being present at the meeting; or or
(c) Whose entries the Executive Committee may have cancelled.
2. Claims based on other considerations than the above will, if allowed, be subject to a penalty of half forfeit.

## 13.-SQUADDING.

1. In the case of competitors classified as ordinary entries, arrangements will be made and details published on the range, of the day and target at which each competitor will be required to attend to fulfil his engagements.
In the case of post entries, competitors must await the squadding of ordinary competitors before being assigned to any target.

## 14.-ALTERATION OF SQUADDING.

Any alteration which the Executive Officer may find it necessary to make will be duly notified on the notice board, and such notice shall be a sufficient authority for the change. In the absence of such notice, tickets will be available only for the target for which they were originally issued, and any erasure or alteration will cancel the ticket, unless verified by the initials of the Executive Officer.

## 15.-REGISTER TICKETS.

1. Should a competitor lose his ticket, or omit to take it to the firing point or fail to attend at the hour detailed, or give a wrong ticket, and so by his own neglect miss the opportunity of competing for the prize for which his ticket was issued, he shall forfeit his claim on the Association, and no duplicate ticket shall be issued to him except under special circumstances.
2. Any erasure or substitution of one name for another shall invalidate the ticket.

## 16.-SIGHTING AND FOULING.

Tickets for sighting shots, 10 cents, and for fouling shots, five cents, can be obtained at the Secretary's office. They must be deliverd up to the register-keeper-two of the former and one of the latter allowed at each range before a shot is fired. Such tickets to hold good in any match during the meeting.

The Executive Committee reserves the right to alter, amend or rescind any of the foregoing regulations as circumstances may require.
