THE TESTING TIME

What is the value of a man's life? Is it to be measured by length of days, or by quality and purpose?

At last night's recruiting meeting on King Square, Sergt. Knight lashed the shirkers as with a whip of scorpions. Only a man who had himself looked death in the face in the struggle that involves the fate of his country could afford to say all the things he said, but he had earned the right to speak plainly to men as fit or fitter than himself, and with no incumbrances, who are igno-

But is the liberty to live worth having on such terms? We recall the words of a New Brunswick soldier whose brother was killed in action. He wrote home that he would rather be his brother in an honored grave in Flanders than a shirker here in New Brunswick.

Last night on King Square, when the meeting closed with the National Anthem, and the vast assemblage unworried as a token of respect for that which the National Anthem represents, there were a few persons here and there whose hats were not lifted. In every case they were young men of recruiting age, who perhaps were restive under the plain speaking of Sergt. Knight, and took this method of asserting their independence.

But St. John is deeply moved. Last night's immense crowd in King Square proved it. Results are certain to come. The leaves are working. More and more the young men are asking themselves if the other claims upon them are of as much importance as the claim of their country in this great crisis in its history.

This war has cut across the hopes and plans of millions of men and women, and the things that are of ultimate value are thrusting themselves upon the attention of the people in such a manner as never before in the world's history. They cannot get away from that picture of ravished Belgium, that story of the babes of the Lusitanas, the killing of women and children by German Zeppelins, the danger that threatens the world in the possible triumph of Germany in this war.

THIS IS MORE DEFINITE. An announcement in the Standard this morning may solve a question that has been the cause of some discussion at the meetings of the general recruiting committee. When the recruiting campaign was begun, men were needed for the 85th Battalion and the filling of the ranks of the 64th had only begun.

It is no doubt quite correct to say that Mr. Hasen has come to St. John on business. If he wanted a holiday he would surely seek it far from the mad-dog crowd's ignoble strife over patronage.

The recruiting campaign in St. John will be continued. In fact it has only been settled in this way. Lieut. Col. Fowler would be a popular officer, and it is desirable in recruiting to have definite information as to the unit and the commanding officer.

MR. HAZEN AND MR. CLARKE

The Fredericton correspondent of the Times reported yesterday that Hon. Mr. Hasen had a conference there with Premier Clarke. Evidently the correspondent was misled, for the Standard says Premier Clarke was not at the capital yesterday, but at Salmon River and St. John.

There are many things in which they might be expected to have a mutual interest. Perhaps they will hold the conference in St. John today. There would be nothing improper about it, and nobody would be surprised. In the event of such a meeting each would no doubt manifest a polite interest in the health of the other. There would also be, we may assume, some comment on the weather.

Ex-Attorney Gen. Wickersham said at a dinner in New York, apropos of Germany's slow and graduated reply to the American note: "Germany, with her various preliminary steps, reminds one of the dentist to whom a patient said bitterly from the chair: 'Ouch! That wasn't the tooth I wanted pulled.'"

Not long ago a legal light in Washington had occasion to call upon a certain official of the Treasury Department whose softly modulated voice has gained him the designation of "the silent one." The messenger to this official stopped the lawyer as he was going into the room, saying that his chief was "not in."

St. John should have a visit from Mrs. Netta Brown, who so thrilled the women of Fredericton last night that a great mass meeting almost unanimously adopted this resolution: "I solemnly pledge myself that from this time until England and her Allies are victorious in this war to use all my influence for recruiting, and I will not seek in any way whatever to hold back any man from giving himself to his country in this time of need."



A total of sixty-two men signed, and in uniform, is the record of St. John for the last week in recruiting activities. Seventeen men were added yesterday. MRS. BROWN'S APPEAL TO FREDERICTON WOMEN

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 10.—Mrs. Netta B. Brown, of Montreal, spoke to a monster meeting of ladies at the Opera House tonight and aroused them to great enthusiasm. Although the meeting was announced for 8.30, the hall was packed to the doors three-quarters of an hour earlier, and hundreds were turned away, not being able to get even standing room.

Mrs. Brown received an ovation when she made her appearance wearing the khaki uniform of the Women's Volunteer Reserve, which she recently organized in Montreal.

At the close of her address Mrs. Brown asked those who were willing to do their share to rise and repeat a solemn pledge as follows:

"I solemnly pledge myself that from this time until England and her Allies are victorious in this war to use all my influence for recruiting, and I will not seek in any way whatever to hold back any man from giving himself to his country in this time of need."

Practically the entire audience rose. There was great enthusiasm. A hearty vote of thanks was passed to Mrs. Brown. God Save the King was sung and Fredericton's greatest public meeting came to a close.

MORNING WAR SUMMARY

Washington, Sept. 10.—President Wilson's request for the recall of the Austrian ambassador Dr. Constantine Theodor Dumba, has broadened into a situation involving Captain Frans Von Pape, the military attaché of the German embassy; Alexander Nuber Von Perked, the Austrian consul general in New York, and possibly Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador. The official view is that the ambassador, although technically involved, is not so seriously concerned as the military attaché, or the consul general. It is unlikely that both of the latter may be recalled, or dismissed from the country.

Coupled with Germany's disappointing and unsatisfactory explanation of the sinking of the White Star liner Arabic, after Count Von Bernstorff had given assurances that full satisfaction would be given, if it was established that a German submarine sank the ship, official Washington views the friendly relations with the German powers strained more toward the breaking point than ever before.

Petrograd, Sept. 10, via London.—The concentration of heavy Austrian forces on the Romanian frontier points to serious operations in the near future against Bessarabia and the region of the Middle Danube, in the opinion of Russian war office officials. It is reported that the concentration indicates that an offensive move against Romania is in prospect.

The officials declare, however, that it is premature to regard the Kiev-Dnieper line as endangered.

An advance from Galicia is regarded as unlikely at present, because of the recent Teutonic defeat in Tarnopol. In any event the invaders would have to move slowly, breaking down opposition at every river and on every elevation.

London, Sept. 10.—The answer of the people of London, and in the London district, to these exercises in frightfulness may be given in an episode mentioned in the Manchester Guardian, says the Spectator, in commenting on the Zappala raids of Tuesday and Wednesday nights. "A receding sergeant has been addressing crowds from a platform made from debris of ruined houses, and the results have been excellent."

Official Statements

FRENCH
Paris, Sept. 10.—The following official communication was issued this evening: "A very violent campaign is reported in Belgium, in the region of Neuport and Steenstrate, around Arras (in France), in front of Roye and in Champagne, from Auberville to Souain. In the Argonne the enemy bombarded, with very heavy shells, the gully of the Fontaine-Aux-Charmes and directed on the road from La Harazee to St. Hubert a tentative attack, which was stopped promptly. To the north of Flicy, and in the region of St. Die some artillery actions are reported. The Germans launched a very violent attack against Hartmanns-Werke, but it was completely repulsed. Two German aeroplanes have dropped a few bombs on Compiègne, especially on the hospitals. There were no victims, and only some unimportant material damage is reported to have been done. A German biplane has been forced to land within our lines near Hangest-Santerre. The aviators are prisoners. Six German aeroplanes attempted this morning to fly over St. Menchould. They were obliged to turn tail owing to the fire of our batteries."

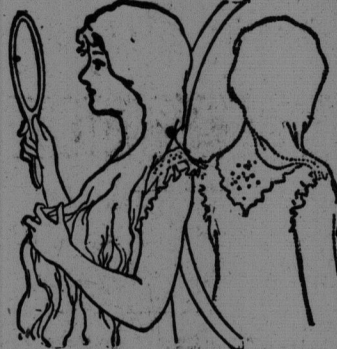
BELGIAN
Havre, Sept. 10, 8.10 p. m.—The following statement on operations of the Belgian army was issued today by the Belgian military authorities: "German artillery showed some slight activity today, directing fire one Ramscapelle, Perysae, Oudecapelle, Henninghe, Pyregate and also upon several other of our advanced positions."

AUSTRIAN
Vienna, Sept. 10, via London, 9.12 p. m.—The following Austrian official war statement was issued here today: "The Russian forces fighting in the region west of Rovno have been repulsed across the Studel lowlands. Our troops, advancing from Zalosse, repulsed the enemy in the direction of Sbarass. Near Tarnopol, Austro-German battalions repulsed several Russian attacks. The Germans captured the village of Bunlow west of the middle Sereth. Hostile reinforcements took part in the fighting, which was violent throughout. East of the mouth of the Sereth, and on the Bessarbian frontier, calm prevails. The Austro-Hungarian forces in Lithuania have crossed the broad, swampy region of the Jaslolda and Orza and have advanced in the region south-east of Rosany. Yesterday afternoon and evening the Italians attacked the bridge-head of Tolmino repeatedly. They were repulsed every time with heavy losses near our entanglements. In the Dobrodo sector our troops repulsed hostile approaches. The general position is unchanged. At sea yesterday our torpedo boat No. 51, while reconnoitering, was torpedoed by a hostile torpedo boat and damaged at the bow. She reached port."

PTE. J. G. ALLINGHAM OF ST. JOHN KILLED

The casualty list sent out from Ottawa at midnight includes among the killed Joseph G. Allingham, of St. John. He was formerly of the 9th Battalion. His street address is given as 488 Main street. He was with the second battalion when he met his death on April 28. John M. Currie, of Windsor (N. S.), is also unofficially reported killed while fighting with the 19th Battalion. He was previously reported missing.

LACK OF DOCTORS IN THE UNITED KINGDOM

Serious Shortage For Some Time After the War—Lancet Makes Call on the Students

London, Aug. 28.—(Correspondence)—The dearth of medical men in the United Kingdom is not only serious at present on account of the war, but it will continue for years afterward, in the opinion of the Lancet, the organ of the British medical profession. In its issue of Aug. 28, the Lancet says: "That our medical schools will go very short of students is certain, and this will mean a dangerously small list of medical practitioners to minister to the needs of the country in the near future. The position is inevitable. The spirit which will lead young men of the military age and the educated class to join the army must have this effect, but it is the duty of the medical profession to face the difficulty and to make the best of it. The great work which the medical contingent of the navy and army has accomplished in the present war will set before us a stimulus to enthusiasm for our calling, and the shortage which must occur in our ranks for the three or four years following—say, 1917, will speedily remedy itself, when our social world resumes, as far as altered circumstances will permit, the scheme which we had, with considerable lack of provision, come to regard as the normal one. The war found the number of the medical profession in this country already disquietingly low, and with indications of further sagging in those numbers. The figures indicate a serious shortage of medical men for the years following the war. Not only has a large number of young men who otherwise would be beginning or pursuing their medical studies been absorbed, but, unfortunately, a serious toll was taken last autumn of those who, being already nearly qualified, would have been able to practice their professions as qualified men in a few months. The future will see an increased demand for medical men, and their prospects of success will be so great that the aspirants will assuredly be numerous. And there will be an improvement in the conditions which have prevailed in the past, not only because the profession of medicine will share in the general progress, but because the regard of the work of medicine throughout the war has been such that it must lead to a closer relationship between the medical profession and the public. The British public are taking a more intelligent interest in these things, and the energy with which they bodies are working in co-operation with the medical profession in carrying out various schemes for the well-being of the people may be taken as an indication that the health of the nation will be a first consideration of the immediate future—which means that there will be a great demand for medical men at the close of the war. And this is the essential message to the students now in the schools. They are already wanted as qualified men, and in the near future they will be wanted even more urgently. It is a patriotic duty, imposed upon them by the conditions of the world, that they should spare no effort to pass all their tests in the shortest legal time, while by doing so they will reap the double reward of good citizenship and worldly success."

BORDEN COPP DROWNED

Hopewell Hill (N. B.), Sept. 10.—A sad fatality occurred at Waterside yesterday when Borden Copp, eighteen years of age, adopted son of Aaron Copp, fell from a sailboat, when out pleasureing, and was drowned. The young man was alone in the boat and it is thought took a fainting spell and fell over the side, as he had been subject to heart weakness. The accident was seen from the steamer Milado, which was just leaving port and a boat was sent to the rescue but the unfortunate man went down before he was reached and never came to the surface. The body was found after the tide had gone out. The young man's tragic death was a great shock to the community and much sympathy and regret is felt.

Rome, Sept. 9, 7.45 p. m., via Paris, Sept. 10.—Grand Duke Nicholas lacked sufficient energy to profit from his triumph when the Russian armies were victorious, writes General Corbi, in the Tribune. "He also lacked the influence to impress upon the emperor the fact that the bureaucracy was responsible for the insufficiency of military preparations. During the retreat, however, Grand Duke Nicholas showed a clear mind, capable of formulating precise views and reaching prompt decisions."

"Thus it was that the retreat, which might have been turned into a rout, became, through the leadership of Grand Duke Nicholas, one of the greatest military successes of history, from a strategic standpoint. It is without comparison, except for the famous retreat narrated by Xenophon."

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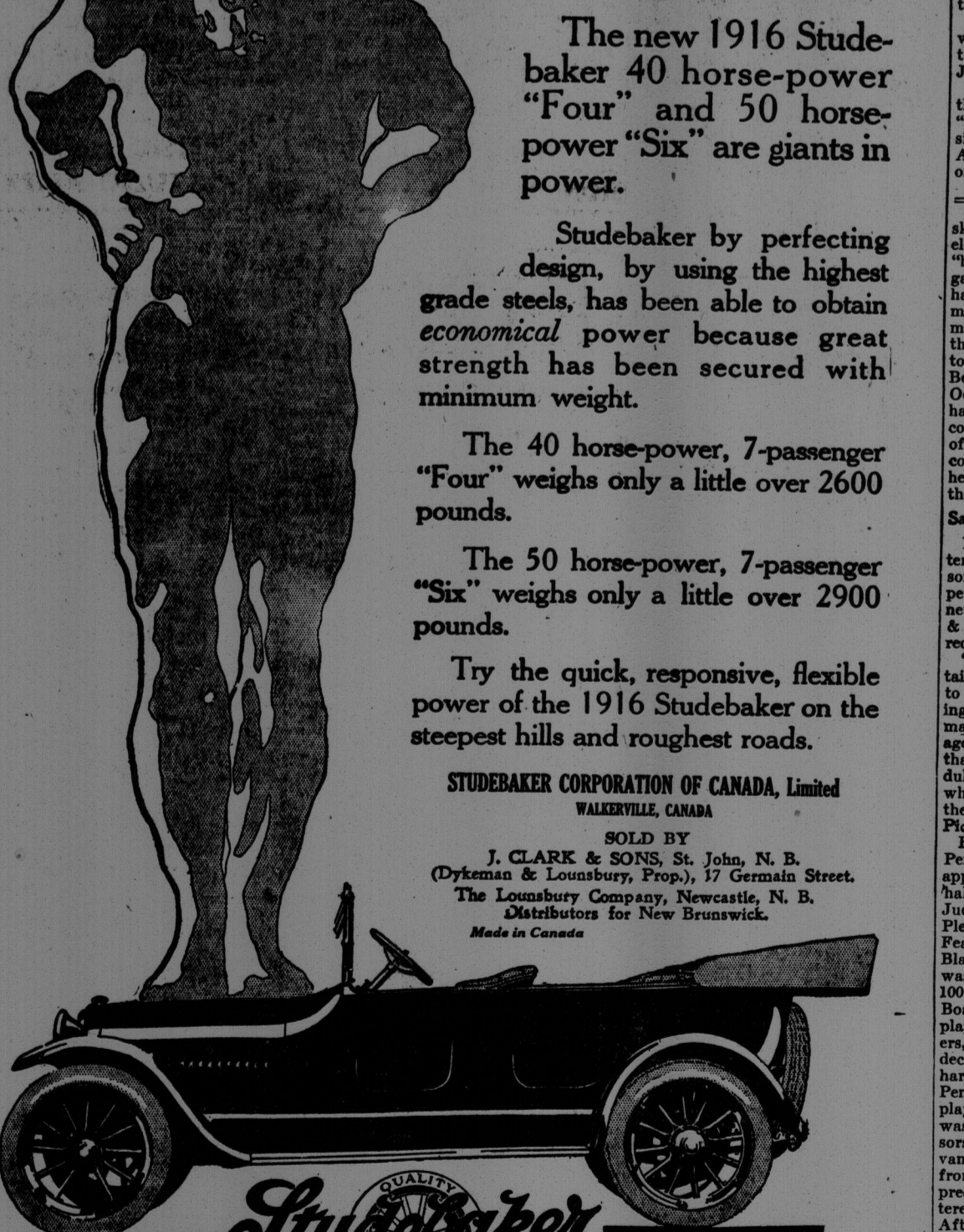

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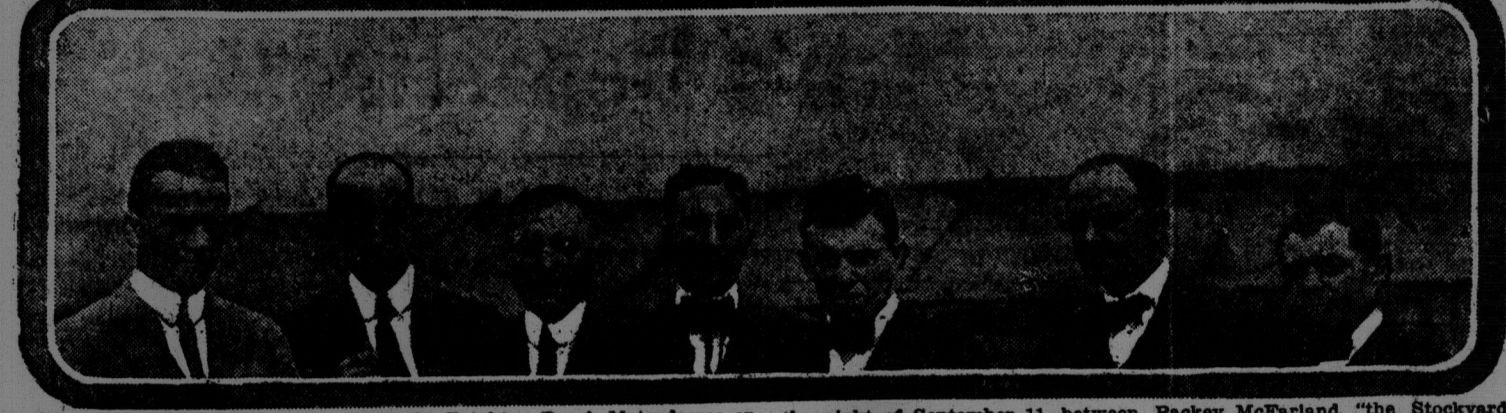
