The French artil-lery is reported to be more powerful and effective than that of Germany, and the spirit of the French troops much more confldent than that of their foes. No event of great importance has transpir-ed along the western battle front for several days, but the situation is every-where satisfactory to the Allies. London, March 28-The battles for the Carpathian passes continue with extreme violence, this being the only region where, for the moment, fighting on a large scale is taking place.


