SOCIALIST AID NEEDED. Such a combination it was declered in political circles, would necessarily have to depend upon Socialist sup-port, which it was asserted, would be given only conditionally. The party's program included a levy on all forms of capital.

M. Herriot planned to see former Premier Poincare during the day but it was not known whether he would offer him the portfolio of Minister of Finance and it was not known whether Poincare would accept or not. It was known, however, that many Radicals express strong objection to the inclusion of M. Poincare in the Ministry.

MEN OF FORMER REGIME.

Assessors Board Chairman Discusses, In Informal Way, Tax Matters

UNDER pressure of inquiry from all angles of public opinion the Times-Star this morning sought an expression of opinion members of the Common Council and E. M. opinion from members of the Common Council and E. M. Olive, Chairman of the Board of Assessors, concerning proposed remedial measures in the matter of increased taxation. Mayor White and the Commissioners were in conference throughout the forenoon and Mr. Olive, though extremely busy with the beginning of the discount rush, which ends on Thursday, discussed informally and quite unofficially some of the phases bearing upon the vexed question of the hour.

THE Assessment Board chairman felt it would not be fair to THE Assessment Board chairman felt it would not be fair to ask him as a salaried employe of the city to express a personal opinion upon the workability of the present system of taxation. He was simply an instrument in the hands of the people to implement a law enacted with public consent. Neither did he consider it expected of him to point out any unfairness the taxation system might work against sections or classes of people. Other questions propounded to the Chairman might be answered by him as a citizen or official, but he would prefer not to be rushed in the matter. He would like to be given time to weigh his words and bring the matter fully before the Board of Assessors, and let them all consider the questions and answer them to the best of their judgment, in view of the hard facts existing.

RECALLED PUBLIC APATHY

MR. OLIVE says he is quite aware of the upset state of public mind regarding taxation, and nobody seeks relief from the financial stress more than himself. In a reminiscent vein he recalled the days when the present Assessment Act was being framed by Professor W. C. Keirstead of the University of New Brunswick, R. T. Hayes, then Mayor of Saint John, the late Dr. J. Roy Campbell, lawyer, and W. E. Scully. These gentlemen, after exhaustive research in the matter of taxing systems in other cities, which included visitations, conferences and successive roundtables, invited the public to a platform discussion of the proposed new law from a forum in the High School building. Mr. Olive recalled the public was most apathetic at that time and the discussion was attended by the meanst knot of people.

WHEN the Assessment Act went to the Legislature it was checked up carefully by some sections of the public and in the committee stage—before it went to a vote on the floor of the House—some radical amendments were made, which prevented drastic measures. However, the whole bill passed and has been employed ever since as a method of gathering the city's income. Chairman Olive feels just as anxious, he says, to better conditions if it is possible to do so, as any official or citizen at large. His loyalty and interests are purely local and in a casual discursory manned cited an instance of taxation problems in Massachusetts.

CITES AN INSTANCE

IN THE educational centre, Cambridge, where Harvard University is the one outstanding local industry, if it might be so termed, taxation matters were highly unsatisfactory to the people. The best economic minds, including Harvard economists, sought a remedy. The eminent Dr. Bullock was one of the advisors. The net result of the combined experts' efforts was a system which proved quite workable for the university-endowed town of Cambridge, but was considered grossly unfair and impracticable to the adjoining and sister city of Waltham, which was working out its salvation industrially and through its initiative and creative work. What was one city's meat was the other's poison.

THIS Camridge case, Chairman Olive thought, might in many ways be applied in Canada, and in the Maritime Provinces, and it might be possible the same situation would arise as between Halifax and Saint John. As concerning the agitation of the Retail Merchants' Association to have taxes paid in installments, Mr. Olive did not express any opinion. He had long since held the view, however, that to make a taxation system equitable and justly applicable to all conditions of public and private property and income, a carefully-selected composite committee of men from business bodies, public organizations such as Boards of Trade, etc., might be organized and set to work. Such a committee could analyze the situation after a comprehensive search. This was his private opinion, and it was not his desire to enter into any controversy. PROG. STATEMENT.

SASKATOON, Sask., July 19—
Leaders of the Progressive party in Saskatchewan after a two-day conference here at which the political situation was thoroughly discussed, issued a statement which declared that it was the concensus of opinion in the gathering "that the extent to which the Liberal and Conservative organizations sacrificed the interests of the country for party advantage, the reveelations disclosed in the customs probe of corrupt administration and the source of campaign funds of both old parties and their domination by the big financial interests, emphasized clearly the essential need of retaining the Progressive group at Ottawa."

The meeting was attended by chairmen of constituency committees, Progressive members of the last House and Progressive candidates defeated at the last federal election.

The statement says that while no resolution was passed dealing with contesting of constituencies, "it was unanimously agreed that the absence of Progressive candidates, particularly in rural seats could only mean the disfranchisement of a great part of the electorate."

London Newspapers Regard French Cabinet Situation As Dangerous For Europe

LONDON, July 19-Deep concern is felt in well-informed British circles over the French crisis. Some of the most influential London papers regard the situation as grave—even dangerous— and derive no hope from the pos-

sible formation of a ministry by Edouard Herriot. The Times says no practical plan for the financial salvation of France has been outlined except in the expert committee's report and by former Finance Minister Cailupon this plan is indispensable to avert virtual partial bankruptcy. The Daily News regard the defeat of M. Caillaux as a catastrophe and as creating a very dark outlook for France.

The Morning Post declares that the French parliament does not possess the requisite courage to face facts and that it cannot realize the necessity of a national union which is indispensable for the restoration of the financial situation.

Mayor Thinks Inspector Under Act Will Need to be Super-Man

HIS WORSHIP ALSO **COMMENTS ON SOO'**

Frink Criticizes Permission Granted Officials to Deviate From Law

That the framers of the new building by-law evidently expected the building inspector to be "a man of sound common sense, an active personality and a super-man," was the comment of Mayor White this morning while various sections of the proposed by-law were under discussion. The by-law was the only matter taken up this morning, the time from 11 o'clock until 1 o'clock being taken up in going over chapter 1, dealing with the general provisions.

These general provisions provide the building inspector shall be responsible for the carrying out of the Act and by-law, that the by-law shall, except in special cases, apply only to buildings to be erected or altered after it has passed. It provides for a committee of five to deal with disputes between the building inspector and the owner or architect of any proposed building; that the inspector may refuse to grant a permit when the particulars supplied do not seem to him to be sufficient to enable him to decide whether the building would be safe.



OXFORD COLLEGE

Oriel University Celebrates Anniversary—Cecil Rhodes One of Its Members

LONDON, July 19—Oriel College, Oxford—one of the oldest colleges of the University—has just celebrated its 500th anniversary. It was founded by Edward II. and by his almoner, Adam le Brome, a priest and a Chancery awyer, who held the living of St. Mary's, Oxford, now the University Church.

The parsonage of this church, which hen stood on the site of the new thodes buildings at Oriel, formed, with a "great messuage" known as Senescal Iall, or "La Oriole," the nucleus of the 'College of the Blessed Mary in Oxford, commonly known as Oriel."

The college is famous as the home of the Oxford Movement—the most iniuential religious movement in the last century in this country. Keble, Newnan and Pusey were Fellows. Other amous members of the college in the past were Bishop Butler, Gilbert White, he naturalist parson of Selborne; Dean Church, the famous humanist, and Cecil Rhodes, to whose generosity he college owes much today.


"'Oriel' is a nickname," says Richard Ingrestone in a booklet on the "Oxford College mystery."





In This Country, When a Man Marries He Either Rises or Sinks to His Wife's Social Level; But While She Can Make or Break Her Husabnd, She is Rarely Influenced by Him to Change Heresy.

A CORRESPONDENT asks: Which has the more influence in the family, the husband or the wife?



The wife. In this country it is indubitably the hen that rules the roost

IN EUROPE the man is the head of the house, in fact as well as theory, and a woman's social status is determined by that of her husband. If a Duke marries a chambermaid she becomes thereby a Duchess and entitled to walk out of a room before those who were born mere ladies, but in this land of the free it is differently ordained.

Here it is nearly always the wife who makes and holds the family's place in society. She determines, nine times out of ten, where and in what style they shall live and whom they shall know. She can raise her husband socially, but because he is a Steel King or a Coal Baron does not automatically make her a member of the social aristocracy.

Thus, in every community we have families

Thus, in every community we have families that are content to be rich and fat and comfortable and remain in the station in life to which it pleased fate to call them before papa made his money. And we have other families who, with every turn of the wheel of fortune, have mounted another rung of the social ladder until by the time papa gets his million they are perched upon the very roof of the country club, so to speak, and are patronizing the climbers.

And it is always mama who turns the trick. Papa couldn't do it to save his life. A socially ambitious woman with plenty of money to spend has only the sky as her limit and can fly as high as she pleases and take her family with her. But there is absolutely nothing that a socially ambitious man can do to elevate the family if he is married to a woman who has no social gifts whatever.

PERHAPS men are more adaptable than women are. Perhaps men are more easily influenced than women are. Perhaps they only follow the line of lease resistance and find it easier to give in to their wives than to resist them. But, anyway, it is amazingly true that in the great majority of marriages the husband either rises or sinks to his wife's level.

If the wife is better bred, better educated and has had more advantages than the husband has had she refines and educates and polishes him, but if the man marries beneath himself, as the phrase goes, he doesn't raise his wife except in the rarest instances. She almost invariably pulls him down.

THAVE seen—and so have you—brilliant, intellectual men who hardly read another book after they married dumb Doras who themselves never looked at anything except the birth and death notices and the society column in the daily papers and who wanted to put in every evening at the movies or jazzing.

I have seen broad-minded, generous men become as narrow and prejudiced and cold and stingy as the hard, nickel-nursing, penny-pinching wives to whom they were married. I have seen a man with the flame of genius in his soul marry a dull, commonplace woman and let her put out the fire in him and make him as stupid and uninspired as she was.

And I have seen women take a rough diamond and polish it until it scintillated. I have seen women turn boors into gentlemen. I have seen women who broadened and humanized men and brought out all that was good in them, and I have seen women actually push mediocre men into success and thrust greatness upon men who could not have achieved it for themselves.

But I have never seen a man alter a woman by a hair's breadth, except in the matter of making a clothes horse of her and dressing her up in Paris finery.

I HAVE never seen a husband whose influence over his wife was great enough to make her read if she had no intellectual yearning, or to make her control herself if she had a violent temper, or even to turn her into a good housekeeper if she was lazy and shiftless.

Therefore, as the wife's influence in the home is so much more powerful than the man's it is far more important that a man should use great wisdom and judgment in picking out a wife than it is that a woman should exercise equal discretion in selecting her husband. For the wife can to a large degree make her husband what she wishes him to be, but the woman rarely changes. What she is, she stays to the end of the chapter.

It is also far more important that children should have a good mother than it is that they should have a good father.

CHILDREN may have a very bad father, indeed. They may have a dishonest father, a drunken father, an immoral father and yet if they have a good mother her teachings will be powerful enough to neutralize the bad example their father sets them.

But if children have a mother with low ideals, a loose-living mother, there is nothing that their father can do, no matter how good and noble a man he may be, that will offset her bad influence

IT IS the mother's influence that rules the world. It is the mother who decides whether her children shall be educated or grow up in ignorance. It is the mother who instills ambition into her children and sends them out to do great things in the world or who encourages them in being shiftless

It is the mother who teaches her daughters purity and her sons high standards of honesty or to take what they can get out of life the easiest way. It is the mother who makes the atmosphere of the home clean or filthy and who puts her indelible stamp on those who go out from it.

IT IS a fearful responsibility. Let us thank God that so many women use it wisely.



RIEW YORK, July 18.—Major B. A. Logan, manager of the mapping division of the Fair-child Aerial Survey, left New York today for a treasure hunt in Nova Scotia, which he says may net him at least \$100,000 and perhaps \$2,000,000.

The treasure was the cargo of French "pay ship" which fell into the hands of the English off Cape Breton Island, about the year 1700. After various vicissitudes the crew of the French vessel managed to sink the treasure in Canadian lakes, but were prevented by the English from returning to claim it.
