R., which as compared with earn-ings of \$3,845,000 for the same period in 1918, show a decrease of \$365,000, equal to 12.2 per cent. Grand Trunk earnings totalled \$1,681,711,0015 in 1918, or a decrease of only 7.5 per cent. A falling off of \$25.5 per cent. is shown by the C. N. R. on earnings of \$386,200, as against \$578,000 in the corresponding week a year ago. The aggregate loss of the three roads for the last ten days of August is \$680, 064, which is equal to 12 per cent.
