Mexican Insurrectos Took Their Own Way of Destroying Liquor

(Canadian Press) Douglas, Ariz., April 19—the rebel defeat at Agua Prieta was attributed wholly to the over-indulgence of the insurrecto solders in intoxicating liquors lound in the saloons and stores of the captured city, according to Col. Medina, commander-inchief of the rebel forces who fled into

washington, April 19—Dr. Vasquez Gomez, head of the confidential agency of the Mexican revolutionists here, admitted last night that a proposal for an armistice had been sent to the Mexican government and that a favorable reply had been received. It was learned that he had telegraphed the insurrecto Junta at El Paso to communicate this information to General Francisco Madero, Jr., in the field and to obtain from him at once the definite conditions upon which he would agree to an armistice.

It is said that the Mexican government will permit courtiers to pass through Juarez so as to facilitate the transmission of the messages arranging an armistice.

Agua Prieta, Mex., April 19—Shortly after daylight today a daring band of insurgentos numbering only half a dozen or so, stole into Agua Prieta and set fire to the railroad station, which was destroyed with its valuable contents. The federals fired upon the invaders and two or three of them were killed.



"Then the feed expense is way off. It figures up at 83 cents per pear a hen. No one can feed for that. Furthermore, you allow nothing for houses, nothing for labor or casual losses—and where, oh, where can you find a market that will pay 40 cents a dozen the year round. Please tell me, for I grow eggs for a living and really would like such a market myself.
