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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

British and Foneign Bible Sogiety.

I. The designation of the Society shall be THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment; the only copies in the Language of the United Kingdom, to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorised Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavors to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominions: and shall also according to its ability extend its influence to other countries whether Christian, Mahometan, or Pagan.

III. Each Subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a Mem-

IV. Each Subscriber of ten Guineas at one time shall be a Member for Life.

V. Each Subscriber of Five Guineas annually shall be a Gov-

VI. Each Subscriber of fifty pounds at one time, or who shall, by one additional payment increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds shall be a Governor for life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty pounds shall be a Member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds a Governor for

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six Laymen, six of whom shall be Foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing

The Committee shall appoint all Officers, except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the direction of the committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented and the proceedings of the foregoing year reported.

XII. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer shall be

considered ex officio members of the Committee.

XIII. Every Clergyman or dissenting Minister, who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of Committee; but no other person deriving any

emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the General Meetings, and at meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer; and in his absence such member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in

every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society either Members for Life, or Governors for Life.

XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating Honoraby Members from among Foreigners, who have promoted the objects of the Society.

XIX. The whole of the Minutes of every General Meeting

shall be signed by the Chairman.

REGULATIONS

ADOPTED AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY IN 1826 AND 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the

Apocrypha. II. That in conformity to the preceding resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part,

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shall be made to any Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of the Scriptures be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

Nova Scotia Bible Society.

I. This Society shall be called THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz.: to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.

II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.

III. In order to give effect to the designs of this Institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books

opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.

IV. Every person contributing annually Ten Shillings at one time, or a donation of Ten Pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society

V. A General Meeting of the members of this Society will be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.

VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

VII. Every member of this Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as lew as possible.

VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their numbers as occasion may require.

REPORT.

In the good providence of our Heavenly Father, the committee of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society are once more privileged to meet their friends and patrons.

At almost every returning Anniversary, record has been made of one or more missing from the ranks of the committee. This year forms no exception. The Hon. John H. Anderson and the Hon. M. B. Almon have fallen by the hand of death since we last met. From the maks of contributors have been withdrawn, by the same relentless hand, several long tried and warm friends. The grass withereth, the flower thereof fadeth, but the Word of the Lord endureth forever."

Your committee have to report that the operations of he Auxiliary, since last they met their friends, have been regressive and satisfactory. They have not met with my extraordinary success which they can bring promiently forward, but they can truly say that the results of heir efforts have been of a most cheering character. The mod work of Bible distribution has been going on moughout the bounds of this Auxiliary with unprecented success. Their friends in the city and among the property of the success of the success. fatigable agent, Mr. Russell, has taken his varied tours and aided in disseminating the life-giving Word.

In presenting the claims of the Institution, by encouraging those connected with the several branches to renewed energy and perseverance, our agent loses no opportunity of speaking words of comfort and of recommending the perusal of the Scriptures to those whom he meets by the way. And, best of all, a blessing from on High has attended all the committee's efforts. Our Auxiliary has prospered and has been able in some degree to strengthen the hands of those who in the Motherland and in different parts of the world are engaged in extending the sphere of that noble institution—the British and Foreign Bible Society.

As briefly as our limits will permit, your attention will be called to the operations of that Institution. The British and Foreign Bible Society's last Annual Report details the labors of the past year. It comes to us more richly laden than ever, with the interesting narratives of the toils and efforts of their devoted agents, in circulating the Scriptures. It gives us an insight into the religious state of the principal countries of the world, and leading us into many a quiet scene, many a busy mart, some carnage-covered battle fields and many an hospital, shows us everywhere the wonders which God has wrought and is still accomplishing by the influence of His Own most precious Book.

The abstract of the Sixty-seventh Report thus opens:

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memorable likewise in regard to the amazing and unprecedented dissemination of the Scriptures. It is not merely that the area of action has enlarged in its dimensions, but the Word of God has gone forth on a scale greatly surpassing all former experience. Nor is this impulse to be traced solely to those operations which were special to the seasons and the lands of war. It can be traced in other countries as well as in France and in Denmark, Sweden, Russia, Austria, Italy, Turkey, have all put forth increased demands for the Bible; and did the resources of the Society admit of the employment of a greatly increased agency, the work could be developed in many regions far beyond its present proportions. The Committee do not wish to draw too large and unqualified an inference from the enormous issues of the year, as though the forces of error and supersition were rapidly retreating before the advancing light and victorious majesty of Inspired Truth; but it is surely a most hopeful circumstance, for which praise and thanksgiving must be rendered to God, that nearly four millions of copies of the Bible, in whole or in part, have been circulated during the year; and this simple fact, without any coloring or exaggeration, may be accepted as affording some evidence, however slight, that prejudices are abating-that hearts are yearning for the knowledge of God's Will-and that, in some directions at least, men's minds are opening to religious impression and investigation. As may be supposed, the year has proved one of anxiety and great responsibility."

Time forbids, in a Report like this, to follow the Parent Society's Report over the various sections of the globe. We shall select a few countries, and, as usual, begin with

FRANCE.—During the war, a balloon despatch announced the death of the long-tried and faithful agent of the Society in France, M. de Pressensé, who for thirty-seven years regarded the position he held as the privilege and honor of his life. But in this, as in other cases,

God buries his servants and carries on His work by other instruments.

The Report says:

"The war, while imparting new life to the work, The Committee, created also many embarrassments. were desirous that every available means should be seized to distribute the Scriptures largely amongst the soldiers. who were being hurried forward to the German frontiers. Authority was given to M. de Pressense to distribute single Gospels to any extent gratuitously, and greatly to reduce the price of the Bible and Testament in favor of the military; while, with regard to hospitals, where the sick and wounded would be accommodated, free distribution of Testaments, as well as Portions, was sanctioned. At the period of M. de Pressense's leaving Paris, he reported that 150,000 copies had been circulated in immediate connection with the war, and the circulation proceeded rapidly subsequently to that date.

"During the months of September, October and November, the issues from the Paris Depot, confined necessarily to Paris and the immediate suburbs, were 58,351, including 807 Bibles, 12,954 Testaments, 678 Gospels and

Acts, and 43,912 Portions.

"The total circulation in France during the year, through the Society's own agency, has been as follows:-Bibles, 13,368; New Testaments, 79,693; the four Gospels and Acts, bound in one volume, 10,012; Portions, 369,280-forming an aggregate of 472,353 copies."

Passing Belgium and Holland and proceeding to Germany, the Report remarks:

"GERMANY .- The statistics of circulation, which embrace the operations of the past year, combine figures such as it never fell to the lot of any agent of the Society They are given as follows: - Bibles, to announce. 72,020; Testaments, 575,495; Portions, 376,716 - the total being 1,024,230. The colporteurs' sales included 37,342 Bibles, 198,754 Testaments, and 8,481 Portionsor a total of 244,577 copies. The circulation through the

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colporteurs was very much larger than even these figures denote, as they were frequently employed in carrying out gratuitous distribution amongst the. French prisoners, as well as amongst the sick and wounded of both nations; combining these two sections of their work, the result was the dissemination of 37,384 Bibles, 274,608 Testaments, and 87,292 Portions—or a total of 407,765. The money receipts on sales have been as follows:—Berlin, £3,316 15s. 2d.; Frankfort, £3,611 7s. 2d.; Cologne, £3,144 0s.; 7d.—£10,072 2s. 11d."

And again passing Cologne and Frankfort, the Report brings us to Berlin:

"The most important division of your German work, or rather the work which has its centre of organization at Berlin-for others besides Germans have come within the range of its action—is that which relates to the war which brought two of the great military Powers of Europe nto conflict. It has been matter of very sincere gratitude to the Committee that, at such a solemn crisis, the agency of this Society could be so suitably and efficiently interposed, and the proof has been afforded more distinetly and incontestably than ever, of the immense value of your Society in having at its command large appliances which can be made immediately available to meet great and unexpected emergencies. It is not too much to affirm that the operations carried out form, probably, one of the most important works Divine Providence ever entrusted to the Society.

The war circulation effected by Mr. Davies to April 12, when it had nearly ceased, was 905,994 copies, and of these 460,421 were sold, and 445,573 gratuitously distributed amongst the sick wounded and

tributed amongst the sick, wounded and prisoners.

"To what extent gratuitous distribution should be effected was left very much to the discretion of your agent, but he was anxious to draw a line between the healthy soldiers and the sick, wounded and prisoners. The former were required to pay for the Bibles or Testaments they might wish to possess, though at greatly reduced prices; and there was not the slightest difficulty in carrying out this plan, as the German soldiers were most

willing, and even impatient, to buy copies, and their desire was not quenched or abated by the consideration

of money.

"Your Committee had given instructions that the sick and wounded should be furnished with the Scriptures gratuitously; and the volume thus acquired brought comfort to many a sad and troubled spirit, feeling, perchance, the burden of sin, and the need of a Divine comforter in The prisoners of war formed a the prospect of eternity. very large class in Germany; and these had a full share in your free distribution. The Scriptures were received with evident delight, and proved a wonderful alleviation amidst the sadness of a prison life, especially to such as came wearied and worn out in spirit after the disasters of defeat.

" Another section of the great work called forth by the war has been commenced and is still in progress. The Committee favourably entertained a proposal to present a copy of the New Testament with the Psalms to the widows and parents of the fallen. Four thousand copies of the book in question had been issued by the early part of February. Additional copies have been subsequently furnished, and very many more will yet be required as

the actual deaths come to be ascertained."

What a change in Spain now from the state of matters little over three years ago. Regarding it the Committee

say:

"The sales of the year have comprised 18,162 Bibles, 10,556 Testaments, and 53,849 Gospels, &c., making the total 82,567. The colportage system of dispersing the Scriptures is found admirably adapted for Spain as for other countries; and experience testifies that your chief reliance for effective and penetrating work must rest on this arm of your operations. During the year, Mr. Corfield has had twenty-five men employed wholly, or for a time merely, in the service of the Society, and he closes the year with a staff of sixteen."

Of Italy, the Committee say:

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Italian work during the year is that which found its utterance in those most welcome words, 'Rome open to the Bible.' It is an epoch much to be remembered, and thanksgiving to God ascended from many hearts that the city of the Popes, which had so long and so inexorably excluded the Scriptures, had become free for their introduction.

"It gives the Committee special satisfaction to state that last year the entire issues were larger than those of the preceding year by 5,381 copies, amounting in the whole to 31,257. This total is composed of 5,448 Bibles, 14,389 Testaments, and 11,420 Portions.

"It was of much importance to obtain a visible and recognized position in Rome, as soon as possible, by the opening of a public Depot for the sale of the Scriptures. Premises in the Corso were secured for a term of years; and there the Bible in various languages is exhibited, and the words of the blessed Saviour are inscribed in the window, so as to attract every eye: 'Search the Scriptures.'

"There are several colporteurs employed in and around Rome. Mr. Bruce has printed at Rome, with the sanction of the Committee, an edition of 10,000 copies of the Gospel of St. Luke and the Epistles of St. Peter."

In Austria the good work goes on Of the success that attend colportage efforts, the following are presented as specimens:

"At M—, Colporteur N—, attending the market, met a man to whom he had five or six years ago, at another place, sold a Bible. He was a Roman Catholic, and had read the book with profit. As soon as he saw N— he began to tell the people standing about what a blessed book this was that our colporteur was selling. Friends,' he cried, 'buy this book, it will do you good.' And thereupon he cited verse after verse, to the amazement of all the bystanders. The consequence was that our colporteur sold ten copies on the spot.

"Colporteur N— relates the following remarkable story:—"At Z— there lived a rich Rouman farmer, who formerly had led a wicked life—his dishonesty was a

notorious fact. At a later period he was chosen curator of the church, and this laid him under some restraint. By the providence of God he was led to visit a family of the Reformed faith, one of those rare ones where the Bible is often read. This appears to have made a deep impression on him, for he begged one of the family, a youth fourteen years of age, to come over to him every Sunday with his book, to read him a portion. The boy did not relish the task, and consented only when the farmer, who was unable to read himself, promised him twopence and a dinner for every visit. This went on for After that the farmer was taken ill, and his two years. desire for the Word of God grew so strong that he induced his reader to come every day, for which the rich man had to give a calf over and above the usual terms. The end came at last, and it is generally said in the village that he prayed without ceasing, and departed happily in the faith of the Redeemer.'

One of our corpolteurs on his wanderings met with a young Wallachian, to whom he offered his New Testaments. 'I wish,' said the young man, 'you had such a book as I once saw—a Book of God it was called; but copies are said to be very rare.' 'What book was it?' 'I cannot say precisely, it is ten years ago since I saw it, and I was quite young then.' 'But cannot you tell me what it was about?' 'I only remember there was a story in it of a man who had been lame for thirty-eight years, and when Jesus was on earth He healed him.' The colporteur says he would not attempt to describe the scene that ensued, when he opened up his New Testament, and read out to the amazed and delighted youth the very

story to which he had referred. "Any one knowing Pesth cannot but have noticed the 'gottscheers,' the counterpart of our London costermongers. They go about the coffee-rooms and beer-stalls, hawking oranges and figs, and other fruit; and to make their trade more attractive, it is connected with a lottery. Our Pesth colporteur found out their dwelling-place, and soon sold a few copies, after which they gave him an order for some Croat Bibles, as these men mostly come from the frontiers of Crotia. Our colporteur was but too happy one day to wend his way again to their place, and to his grateful surprise he found quite a number of them

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It would be impossible even to name the various fields of the Society's operations from which interesting reports have come; but the whole may be familiarly illustrated thus:-Suppose on some distant island of the far off seas, a new branch of the family of Adam had been disovered—the very name before unknown—and some person, whom the world may call enthusiast, says: "Now I will devote so much of this world's wealth specially to put into-that portion of our fallen family's hands the Word of God, in their own tongue. British and Foreign Bible Society is the only medium by which that consummation shall be accomplished. Reason points to the fact, that the very sounds of the language have never been reduced to written characters, ar less has a grammar of the language been made; the people themselves are barbarous cannibals. faith points to what has already been accomplished, and the promise that "The earth shall be full of the knowedge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea." Prayer all continually ascend for that object among others, then the breathing of the soul goes out in "Hallowed bethy name, and thy Kingdom come." "Have respect mio the covenant, the dark places of the earth are the habitations of horrid cruelty." Ultimately men begin with each other in being the honored instruments Monveying the Word, and being the

Glad tidings to that dark, distant shore."

Now, let us give an instance in point. In 1864, the Rev. James D. Gordon stood upon this platform. His brother had filled the Missionary martyr's grave on the very soil where the honored Williams and Harries had previously fallen, and their bodies devoured by the cannibal natives.

In the Report, page 285, we have the following instances. The Rev. T. Neilson, of Tana, in remitting contributions, thus writes:

"I herewith transmit to you our subscription list for the present year, which amounts to £69 19s., the largest sum, I think, ever sent from this Auxiliary in a single

"We held a meeting of our Auxiliary at the close of the Annual Meeting of the New Hebrides Mission. At this meeting your letter was read, and I may state that the liberal offer it contained of funds and co-operation in printing the Word of God in the numerous languages of this group, was peculiarly encouraging to all of us, as we are very likely to call upon you soon for more extensive aid than hitherto.

"Mr. Gordon has received the Gospel of Matthew printed by you in the language of Eromanga. It is already in use in church and school, and will prove a valuable religious and educational help to the natives,

"Dr. Geddie goes to Melbourne at the close of this year, to carry through the press part of the Old Testament (from Genesis to Esther inclusive) in the Aneityumese language, at the expense of your Society.

"Mr. Cosh has obtained permission to carry through the press an addition of the Gospel of John in the Efatese language, and to make arrangements with your Society for defraying the expense of the same.

"Mr. Copeland and Mr. Paton have obtained permission to carry through the press editions of the Gospel of Mark in the languages of their respective islands, Futuna and Aniwa, and to make arrangements with your Society for defraying the expenses of the same.

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"This is a pretty long list for a single year, and perhaps the best news that I can give you is that we trust, in future years, to be able to enlarge it."

During the past year, portions of the Word of God were printed in seven languages or dialects, in which the Scripture was unknown before. The previous year portions had been printed in eight languages. Thus the work goes on: One laborer after another is not permitted to continue by reason of death. With regard to every Auxiliary-there may be new Presidents in the chair, (new Secretaries reading dry and uninteresting reports, and new audiences wishing the report finished). the work itself will prosper; and as in the past, so in the future, there will be men who will rejoice that they contributed to send the Gospel, of the blessed Jesus to the lands beyond, and there will be others who will take shame to themselves that they never contributed but a niggardly portion of their means to this glorious end. Much has been accomplished during the past fifty years, but "there remaineth yet very much land to be plowed," and the Master still enquires, "How much owest thou unto my Lord?"

The following will give a general idea of the work during the past year:

FUNDS.—The annual receipts from all ordinary sources were £3,312 18s. 5d. beyond those of the previous year, and presented a grand total of £178,548 0s. 2d. To this amount must be added the Special Funds, inclusive of the following items:—China, £225, Spain £1,368 2s. 10d., New Building £69 16s. 5d., Roxburgh Colportage in India £103 19s. 9d., making the entire cash receipts £180,314 19s. 2d. If the receipts of the Society have proved large beyond expectation, the payments have

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ned permishe Gospel of nds, Futuna your Society been exceptionally heavy. On general account they amounted to £187,492 12s. Adding £798 12s. 2d. for China, £139 16s. 6d. the balance of the Spain fund, and £628 18s. 6d. on the Building account, the total payments have amounted to £189,059 19s. 2d.

Issues.—The copies sent forth from the London Warehouse, inclusive of English and Foreign editions, have amounted to 2,144,601 copies. The issues from the Society's Foreign Depots have been 1,758,466, thus raising the total to the very large aggregate of 3,903,067 copies. The increase on the circulation of the previous year is 1,716,881. The total issues of the Society now amount to 63,292,738.

Turning again to the work of your own Auxiliary and the condition of Bible circulation throughout this Province, your agent, Mr. Russell's reports are ever interesting. He has been able during the past year to visit the various Branches in this Province and New Brunswick. His reports have been submitted to the meetings of Committee, and are always received with interest, showing as they do, how essential his services are to the quickening and directing the efforts of our friends in the country.

The 'Branch Societies and Ladies' Associations have rendered valuable assistance to the Committee, and deserve the thanks of the friends of the Bible.

On no previous year, not excepting the year of the Parent Society's Jubilee (1855) has this Auxiliary been the medium of transmitting more money to London.

In the Report, for 1871, they acknowledged £650 as free contributions, besides some smaller sums for special objects, and £247 4s. 4d. for purchase of the Scriptures for Nova Scotia alone.

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Our Treasurer's account shows the receipts and disbursements during the year. The following is an abstract of the receipts:

During the past year (1870) efforts were made to make a few collections within the city to fill up the blees of those who have been removed by death or therwise. Your committee regret to state that their was were but partially carried out, yet enough has sen accomplished to show that the friends of this time-mored institution only require to be called upon to be called upon to his behalf.

The subscriptions received in 1869 was \$333.75, hile that of 1870 was \$517.75, and there were only of the four Wards of the city even partially avassed.

The work in the city progresses as usual, and with but the variation. The various Public and Benevolent stitutions have been supplied with the Scriptures attituded and a colporteur of the missh American Tract Society is now constantly engaged selling the Scriptures within the bounds of the city, der the arrangement detailed in our last Report. He

has met with considerable success. A proposal to supply all the bedrooms of the Hotels and Boarding-houses in the city is now before the committee, and under consideration.

It must be gratifying to the friends of the Book to know that as there never was a time when so many of the people of this Province were able to read, so we are justified in stating that there never was a year in which there were more copies of the Word of Truth circulated within the Province, as we will endeavor to exhibit from the following figures as returned from the sales of the British American Book and Tract Society's colporteurs:

Nor is this all, as it must be still more gratifying to every lover of the Bible to know that the whole sales of the British American Tract Society, as exhibited by its last Report, announces the gratifying fact that its sales of various editions of the Scriptures, (of course, including the above) by them have been, during the year 1870, 8,413 Bibles and 6842 Testaments, being a total of 15,255.

Taking this in connection with the several other publishing houses in the city and Province—importing and disposing of the Scriptures—how much have we to be thankful for.

We give grateful thanks to the Great Author of the Book for such facts and figures, for with our valuable Free School System o Education, if we cannot have the Bible taught and read in every school, as we would earnestly contend for, let us labor, and pray, and hope to have it placed and read in every family in the Province of Nova Scotia.

Very friendly interchange of reports and correspondence have been held with all the Auxiliaries in the Dominion. The correspondence has been submitted to the meetings of Committee during the past year. This feeling of mutual counsel we wish to encourage, for surely there could be no better standard around which to rally than the "Word of God, without note or comment."

As already noticed, we have to deplore the loss of the

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Hon. M. B. Almon, the Hon. John H. Anderson, from the Committee, and the name, among others, of S. N. Binney, Esq., from the list of Subscribers—all of whom contributed to the funds of the Society for the past forty-five years—the names of Almon and Anderson, being the first in alphabetical order, stood at the head of the subscription lists, side by side they occupied their places on the Committee for thirty-nine years. The name of the late Stephen N. Binney first appears among the Annual Subscribers, 1823, where it has been repeated ever since, and by his demise, in 1871, he left a handsome legacy to the funds of the Auxiliary, which has been paid and will be acknowledged in the present year's accounts.

Another warm friend and for long years a zealous worker in the Bible Cause has been called away. ISAAC SMITH, Esq. has frequently travelled through every portion of this and the neighboring lower Provinces. pleading the claims of the Bible Society. places there are Branch Societies, organized by him, laboring with us in our blessed work, and wherever our Report is read there also will the memory of Isaac Smith be cherished. About ten years ago, failing health compelled Mr. Smith to discontinue his labours as travelling Agent of this and the N. B. Auxiliary Bible Society, but he never ceased to feel the deepest interest in the work. And now he has left us. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, yea saith the Spirit for they rest from their labours and their works do follow them." "Be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh."

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MR. RUSSELL'S REPORTS.

THE NOVA SCOTIA THE COMMITTEE OF AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY:

In compliance with your directions, on Thursday, January 19th, (having been then travelling for the New Brunswick Auxiliary) I left St. John for Portland, thence to Montreal, to attend the Jubilee Meeting of the Auxiliary Bible Society. I had learned that the meeting in Montreal had been fixed for the evening of January 25th, and I reached that city on the Saturday previous. I was provided with lodgings, as were also the other delegates, by the Committee of the Montreal Auxiliary, and I may here say that nothing could exceed the kindness with which I was treated during my sojourn there. There is in Montreal a week in January, each year, devoted to holding the anniversaries of several religious societies-the Bible Society among others. In this week, each morning, there is a Union Prayer Meeting; each evening, except Saturday, a public meeting. "Sunday School Association," the "Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society," the "French Canadian Mission," the "Tract Society," all held their anniversaries within one large building, the Wesleyan Church, Great Saint James Street, the week I was in Montreal.

I attended nearly all the prayer meetings, and the first three anniversaries. All week the weather was intensely One morning the Thermometer was thirty degrees below zero, still the attendance at each meeting was large—at the Bible Society meeting, especially so. There

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were at least two thousand present, who listened for three hours with marked attention to the reading of an excellent Report, and to the addresses delivered by various speakers. The Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society is doing a good work in circulating the Word of God in the Province of Quebec.

I was called on to speak at the Anniversary. briefly of what Nova Scotia had done and was doing in helping on the great work of the British and Foreign I mentioned that the first Bible Society formed in British North America—and with two or three exceptions the first formed on this continent-was organined in Nova Scotia. I spoke of the number of our Branches, and the aid rendered to the Parent Society. I stated that besides what had been remitted from societies in Pictou County of direct contribution, more than £10,000 stg., of legacies had been remitted to London nom that one County. I related some incidents in the early history of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society, articularly of the Bible given by "Bishop Black" (as was familiarly termed) to the wild sailor lad, a risoner on Melville Island; how that Bible was, under od, the means of that sailor's conversion, and how he came "Father Taylor," the celebrated sailor preacher Boston. I concluded by referring to the efforts which ad been made, and were still making, to have the Holy briptures circulated in Nova Scotia, and by conveying, directed, to the Montreal Auxiliary the fraternal rectings of the sister societies which I represented. Next afternoon, the Committee with the delegates met

Next afternoon, the Committee with the delegates met deliberate about the proposed Bible Union of the mous Auxiliaries of British North America. With the ber delegates, I considered the projected Union very simble, but none of us were authorized to pledge the utiliaries we represented to any action on the matter.

Signed, and the suggestion met the approval of all sent, "that each Auxiliary should send a copy of its mual Report to all the other Auxiliaries," and I

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pledged myself that the Annual Report of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Auxiliaries should be thus forwarded.

From Montreal I went to Woodstock, Ontario. there, on two occasions, I endeavored to plead the claims of God's Word, and its circulation the world over, before pretty large audiences. I was gratified to find an awakened interest in the good work.

Returning, by way of Boston, a lady there-quite unexpectedly-handed me a contribution to the N. S. Bible

Society.

I reached Saint John on Tuesday, 9th of February, having been absent less than three weeks, and resumed

my labors in New Brunswick.

Having returned to Nova Scotia on the 1st of April, I attended the Quarterly Meeting of Committee on Monday, The remaining days of that week held meetings at Middle Stewiacke, South Branch, Stewiacke, Village The roads were bad. The weather, and Springside. part of the time, very unfavorable, yet the attendance was encouraging. In Middle Stewiacke about \$16 were paid at the meeting, and more will be obtained and forwarded. At South Branch (where 1 had never before presented the claims of the Society) about \$3 were received and more will be collected.

The Treasurer of the Village Branch handed me the handsome contribution of \$77, which had been collected, one friend having given \$20 of the above sum. This Branch has recently lost a warm supporter by the decease of the Rev. Dr. Smith. For forty-one years he was its President, and during these years a contribution was This year it is larger than any invariably forwarded. previous one. It cheered Dr. Smith, lying on his sick bed last April, when I referred to this increased liberality. The circulation of God's Word throughout the world lay

near his heart.

The meeting in Springside was well attended. Rev. Mr. Sinclair and Hon. S. Creelman took an active par

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in the proceedings. The annual contribution had been forwarded to Halifax. At the close, a friend handed me

Next meeting-rather a small one-was held in Clifton, Rev. Mr. Bayres presiding. About \$12 were received, and collectors were appointed to gather up more. Next meeting was held in Lower Stewiacke; Rev. Mr. Haire presided, who warmly advocated the claims of the Bible Society. About \$12, partly old, and partly new, subscriptions were received, and collectors were appointed to secure more. Next evening attended the Annual Meeting in Truro. It was very small. abours of the week were closed by holding meetings in Five Mile River and Maitland. Both meetings (considering the state of the roads) were satisfactory.

Next week, meetings were held in Lower Salmah, attendance fair; in Noel, larger than the previous year; in Walton, very few out; in Chivires, good audience, and greater interest taken than formerly; in Burlington, hardly any present. Another meeting that week had been appointed for Avondale, but a severe rain storm prevented it. The two or three friends who assembled, advised to have another the following week. Fortunately, it was in my power to comply; but another rain storm caused a thin attendance. The Avondale Branch has lost a warm friend by the demise of its President, the late Nicholas Mosher, Esq. One laborer after another is called home; but the Master remains, and his work advances. Next meeting, a very good one, was held in Brooklyn.

Commenced work on the other side of the Bay during the week, beginning May 14th, in eight different places: Mass Town, Folly Village, De Bert, Acadia Mines, Great Village, Portaupique, Bass River, and Economy, before pretty large audiences pleaded the claims of the Bible Society. In the three first named places collectors will go round. At the Mines a collection of \$4 was taken, and, with another dollar which a friend added,

At Great Village collectors were appointed. handed me. At Portaupique one or two subscriptions were paid and collectors will gather up more. At Bass River several sums were paid. It was pleasing here to witness many of the young people come forward and give their contributions. One little girl, not yet seven years old, has for at least the two past years been present at the Bible Last winter, a relative in meeting, and contributed. California sent her a gold dollar as a Christmas box. She resolved-no one urging, and so far as I am aware not even suggesting it—to keep/ it for the Bible Society. She attended the meeting, having taken an hour's sleep beforehand that she might keep awake. At the close of my address, when others were coming to the table where I sat with their subscriptions, she handed up her gold dollar.

The meeting at Economy was good. Some subscriptions were paid, and more will be gathered and forwarded.

From Economy went to Five Islands, where I obtained a good meeting. Proceeded to Parrisboro', where a better meeting than I had obtained for years was got. From both places, subscriptions were received.

Crossed the Bay in the Packet, and, after a brief rest, set out on a tour through the Counties of Kings, Annapolis, Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne, and Queens, holding meetings in each of these Counties entered Kings, I tried, but failed, to obtain a meeting in Windsor. I regretted this; I feel anxious to see an awakened interest in this thriving town. present is done for the Bible Society. The subscriptions are increasing year after year. The amount stated above is the largest I have yet obtained; and it is most gratifying to know that in many cases a revived interest in religion has led to increased liberality in efforts making to circulate the Word of God.

After a few days' rest, visited Musquodoboit, and held meetings in Little River, Middle Musquodoboit, the Flat, and Upper Musquodoboit. These meetings, on the whole, were encouraging. Subscriptions to the amount of between thirty and forty dollars were received,

and more will be obtained and forwarded.

Proceeded next to Halifax, to attend the Annual Meeting, and spent the greater part of the remainder of the week preparing subscription lists, & ., for the Annual Report. On Saturday went on to I menburg town, and spent about a fortnight holding resetings in the The meeting beld in the Prest terian Church, in Lunenburg town, was excellent. Rev. Messrs. Duff and Owen took an active part in the promedings. That evening and next day, through the kindu ss of Stephen Finck, Esq., who, as usual, accompanied me in collecting tour, above \$70 was obtained, besides ten from the same gentleman for the fund to supply the bereaved families in Germany with the Word of God. This year, in Lunenburg, as last year, no one who was asked to contribute refused. Next meeting, not a large one. (owing to the cold which had suddenly set in) was held in the Wesleyan Church, Lower LaHave, Rev. Mr. McMillan presiding, who, along with Dr. McGregor, aided largely in the good work. Collectors were appointed, who will go immediately round A very small meeting was held next afternoon at Kinsburg, and I had arranged to address a meeting in New Dublin at night, but the day throughout was so stormy that it was impossible to cross the ferry. Next day, Friday, Dec. 1st, it also blew hard, and I could not, in consequence, cross to Petite Riviere, as I had purposed. Went on to Bridgewater, where, on the following evening, I addressed a small meeting. Aided by Mr. Gow and Dr. Calder, I gathered up above \$66 of subscriptions in this village. On Monday afternoon went to Mahone Bay. A violent

storm prevented the holding of a meeting, but collectors will go round. Proceeded next to Chester Basin. A small meeting was held. Went on to Chester and had a good meeting. Rev. Messrs. Shreve, Skinner, and Ross took part in the proceedings. Above \$25 of subscriptions were paid, and something more will be obtained.

Returned to Halifax and went on thence to St. Mary's, Guysboro' Co. At Glenelg and in Lower and Upper Caledonia had opportunities of pleading the claims of From the Secretary of the Ladies' Bible God's Word. Society in St. Mary's received \$30, and two friends handed me respectively \$4 and \$1 (old cy.) additional. Went on to Sherbrooke and proceeded to Wine Harbour. I had never held a meeting in the latter place. evening was not favorable, but a considerable number attended, and I received above \$11. In Sherbrooke and Goldenville, addressed large audiences on the work of the Bible Society. From both places received about Went on to Guysboro, by coach, through roads \$45. Reached Guysboro' very late on unbroken for 35 miles. Tuesday night, intending to proceed to Cape Canso the following morning; but the weather was so threatening that I concluded not to go. Held a meeting in Guys-The evening (Thursday, Dec. 21,) was exceedingly cold, and the attendance was small, but the interest taken in the Bible Society is unabated. From the Ladies' Bible Society, I received above \$19 (old cy.); from the other Society, \$20. On Friday proceeded to Antigonishe, where a meeting was held, though the at-With the kind assistance of tendance was rather small. Mr. Beck, gathered up nearly \$40, and from collections taken on Sunday evening in the Presbyterian and Baptist Churches, above \$17 were afterwards added to this sum.

Came on Christmas morning to Truro. Thence went to Halifax, and made the final arrangements about subscription lists, &c., for the Report.

During the past two months, I have, in prosecution of work, travelled by rail, coach, &c., 1359 miles, walked

In every respect, this year has been the most satisfacfactory I have spent. I think I can see, more than ever, God's blessing resting upon the labours performed, and while my journeyings have been longer, the number of meetings larger, and the toil greater than in any previous year, it is most gratifying to see increasing success and to be enabled, however humbly, to do anything to help on the Saviour's kingdom.
