## Japan Will Assist The Allies

Calgary, Alta., Oct. 23.—"Japan will assist on the European continent as soon as necessity exists," said Kahachi Abe, Japanese consul of Vancouver, who is visiting in Calgary. "Japan can send several hundred thousand of the very best equipped soldiers to Europe when the time arrives that seems needful. The transportation problem is a great one, but it can be solved. When the time comes Japan will be on the job. What Japan will do to help her allies, when the time comes, will astound the world," he added.

## Royal Naval Reserve

An Admiralty Telegram has been received by Commander MacDermott saying that the Trawler Othello II, had been blown up on the 21st October, and that Frederick James Butt, seaman, Newfoundland is missing and presumed to be drowned. Reservist Frederick James Butt was a son of Mr. George Butt (of Nathaniel) and Mrs. Mary Butt (of Freshwater, Bay de Verde. He joined the Reserve on January 25th, 1915, and sailed with the Scandinavian contingent. Through the courtesy of Commander MacDermott of H.M.S. Calypso, we have received the following copy of a letter from the Royal Naval Medical Information Bureau, Malta Branch, viz:— R. N. Hospital, Malta, 30th Sept. 1915. Sir, George Thompson, R.N.R. H.M.S. Grafton, was admitted to this hospital on 17th August, suffering from shell wounds in the head. He made a good recovery, and was discharged cured on 9th September. A letter was sent to his wife, giving news of his admission and the nature and condition of his wounds; this is done in the case of every wounded man brought to this hospital, by the R. N. Friendly Union of Sailors' Wives. Yours faithfully, (Sgd) MAUDE LAURENCE SMITH, Hon. Secretary. Reservist George Thompson resides at Coley's Point, Bay Roberts. He took passage to England in the S. S. Carthaginian, on November 14th, 1914.

## Army of Serb Women Will Enter Fight

Chicago—John R. Palanck, Serbian leader and editor, addressing a number of Serbians declared that an army of 50,000 Serbian women would enter the fight against the German and Austrian forces. "No women in the world are more courageous than the Serbian women," Mr. Palanck said, "and they are not going to sit at home and see their fathers, husbands and brothers driven out of Serbia. Many Serbian women have been killed fighting at the front and I have learned from our native land that it will be but a short time until the army of women soldiers will equal that of the men."

## Bulgar Leader Goes To Prison

Sofia, Bulgaria, Oct. 23, via Amsterdam and London.—A Bulgarian military court has convicted M. Stambulivsky, leader of the agrarians, of anti-militaristic propaganda and has sentenced him to imprisonment for life. Two other agrarian deputies, M. Charankoff and M. Larkisoff, were tried on the same charge. M. Charankoff was sentenced to two years' imprisonment and M. Korisoff was acquitted. M. Stambulivsky was one of a number of Bulgarian statesmen who went to King Ferdinand shortly before Bulgaria entered the war and sought to persuade him not to permit the nation to take up arms with Germany and her allies. According to press dispatches at the time they used strong words, even suggesting that King Ferdinand's throne would be endangered by such conduct. He is reported to have warned the King that a military alliance with Germany might cost him his head, whereas on the King replied, "Do not trouble about my head. My head is an old one; rather think of your own." M. Stambulivsky is said to have responded, "My head matters little, sir. I am thinking only of the country."

## WAR NEWS

The war looks gloomier than it really is; yet the personal appeal of the King to his people brings home to us the seriousness of the situation. But if it is serious for Britain and her allies it is ten times more serious for Germany and her allies notwithstanding her organization, her trained troops and any successes she may have attained so far. Germany may be near slowing up while Britain grows stronger day by day, and more successful. We can hold on, perhaps Germany can't, and we can hold on while the strain in Germany grows more and more severe.

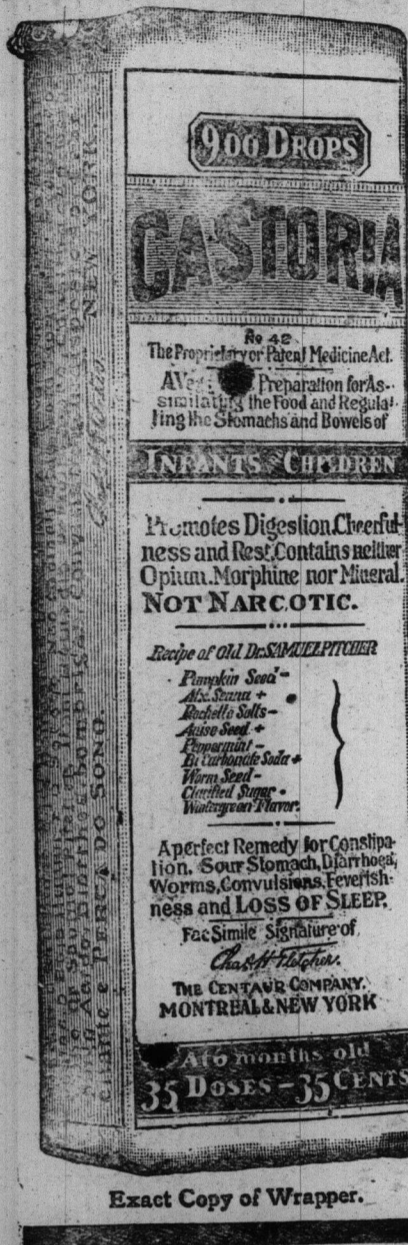

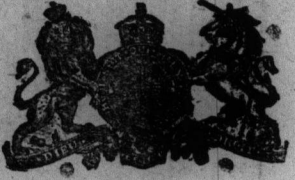

NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE. POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canada, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence. A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00. A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50. To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word. Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to apparatus equipped with the wireless stations in the route of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Bay. Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. General Post Office Rates of Commission on Money Orders. The rates of commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland to the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada and any part of Newfoundland, are as follows: For sums not exceeding \$10 - 5 cts Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20 - 10 cts Over \$20 but not exceeding \$30 - 15 cts Over \$30 but not exceeding \$40 - 20 cts Over \$40 but not exceeding \$50 - 25 cts Over \$50 but not exceeding \$75 - 30 cts Over \$75 but not exceeding \$100 - 35 cts Over \$100 but not exceeding \$200 - 40 cts Over \$200 but not exceeding \$500 - 45 cts Over \$500 but not exceeding \$1000 - 50 cts Maximum amount of a single Order to any of the above countries and at all places in Newfoundland, \$100, but a larger sum may be obtained as the remitter requires. Under the Provisions of the War Measure Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has pleased to order as follows:-

1. The Colonial Secretary may, if he considers it expedient so to do, appoint a person to be Censor of the writings, copy or matter printed or published in any newspaper, periodical, or other publication...

Published by Authority

Under the provisions of Section 6 of the War Measures Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has pleased to approve the following Rules and regulations:

1. No person shall without lawful authority publish or communicate any information with respect to the movement or disposition of any of the forces, ships or war materials of His Majesty or His Majesty's Allies...

with respect to the plans of any such forces or ships or with respect to any works or measure undertaken for or connected with the fortifications for defence of any place...

2. No person shall, without permission of the competent naval or military authority, make any photograph, sketch, plan, model or other representation of any of the forces or ships of His Majesty or of His Majesty's Allies...

3. No person shall, by word of mouth or in writing, spread reports likely to create disaffection or alarm among any of His Majesty's forces, or among the civil population.

4. Any person who attempts to commit, or procures, aid or abets, the commission of any act prohibited by the foregoing special regulations, or harbours any person whom he knows, or has reasonable grounds for supposing to have acted in contravention of such regulations...

5. No person shall, without lawful authority, sell, give, distribute or permit the selling, giving or distributing of any newspaper, tract or pamphlet or any information which is forbidden to be published or communicated under paragraph one of these Orders and Regulations.

6. No person shall, without lawful authority, sell, give, distribute or permit the selling, giving or distributing of any photograph, sketch, plan, model or other representation which is forbidden to be under paragraph two of these orders and regulations.

7. Any person contravening any of the provisions of the foregoing Orders and Regulations shall be liable, upon summary conviction before a Stipendiary Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding five thousand dollars, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding five years, or to both fine and imprisonment.

Germany's Sorry Plight

London, Nov. 1.—Germany's plans in the Riga district have been completely demoralized by the successful campaign of British submarines in the Baltic Sea, and the complete closing of the Gulf of Riga by Russian mine fields, says the Petrograd correspondent of the Post. The Germans are now endeavouring, with most feverish energy, to hasten restoration of the slender and inadequate service in their rear. This work, heretofore, has been carried on in a leisurely fashion, because of the belief that present needs could be adequately served by sea routes. This plan of campaign has been made more vital by early snow storms, which the Russians declare presage a winter of unusual severity. The belief here is that when the Germans are compelled to undergo the rigour of a real Russian winter, constantly annoyed by gasilla attacks, and with an adequate supply of facilities, they will lose more men by sickness, and suffer greater demoralization, than comes from even the worst defeats in the field.

A Visit To The Fleet

London, Nov. 1.—Graphic descriptions of the first visit of British news paper men to Britain's Grand Fleet are published by all the morning papers. They unite in paying a tribute to the preparedness and efficiency of the British Navy, not only as to the main fighting units, but also to the less prominent, but equally important auxiliaries of various types. A naval officer, aboard one of the ships, told the correspondents that in addition to the war fleet proper, there are between 2,000 and 3,000 ships of the merchant marine, employed in transport and supply duty, and as many more engaged in patrol work or in following the destined efforts of enemy submarines. The visitors were shown the celebrated map on which are marked the places where German submarines have been captured, destroyed or sunk, and the various methods of meeting the submarine menace were explained to them. "We actually saw vessels engaged in this anti submarine business leaving port," says one correspondent; "indeed it is not necessary to go outside the harbour to understand why the blockade has failed. Here at anchor, alongside one another, lay bane an antidote." One full day of the visit was spent in inspecting the large new naval works at a place which a short time ago was a swamp, but now is a live and busy naval establishment which is to be large enough when completed to accommodate 20 dreadnaughts. The works include 3 dry docks, each capable of holding any ship afloat. The party visited the cruisers Lion and Tiger, and viewed the patched funnels and shell wounds received in the North Sea battle. They also visited the Australia and New Zealand, the Colonial contributions to the High Seas Fleet.

Proclamation

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

Whereas We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern and Northern Districts, respectively, of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden: At Flessencia, on Wednesday, the Eighth, and Thursday, the Ninth days of September next; At Channel, on Monday, the Thirteenth, and Tuesday, the Fourteenth days of September next; At St. George's, on Thursday, the Sixteenth, and Friday, the Seventeenth days of September next; At Bay of Islands, on Saturday, the Eighteenth, and Monday, the Twentieth days of September next.

And that Our said Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden: At Botwood, on Wednesday, the Twenty-second, and Thursday, the Twenty-third days of September next; At Bonaville, on Saturday, the Twenty-fifth, and Monday, the Twenty-seventh days of September next; At Trinity, on Tuesday, the Twentieth, and Friday, the Twenty-third, and Saturday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next; At Harbour Grace, on Monday, the Twenty-second, Tuesday, the Twenty-third, Wednesday, the Twenty-fourth, and Thursday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next; At Carbonear, on Friday, the Twenty-sixth, and Saturday, the Twenty-seventh days of November next; And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods herebefore prescribed, at each of the respective places, as aforesaid, provided the Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that, in the event of the Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Southern or Northern District of Our said Island being prevented, by unforeseen circumstances, from opening Our said Court on any of the days herebefore appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places herebefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and should deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those herebefore specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods herebefore stated as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Goals, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Witness Our trusty and well beloved Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our said Island of Newfoundland, and its Dependencies, at St. John's, in Our said Island, this 23rd day of July, A. D. 1915, and in the Sixth year of Our reign.

## Election Day

Nov. 4th, 1915, the day on which Prohibition of the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors was either won or lost, has come and gone. The day was dull but fine, and the weather conditions were favorable for a large vote.

At this writing we have very little information regarding the vote, except in this section. At Bay Roberts, Coley's Pt., Country Road and Shearstown, including the booth in St. John's, about 700 votes were cast, the larger number of which we believe will favor Prohibition.

This is a splendid result considering the many handicaps. The date set for the election was too early owing to the lateness of the season. The Prohibitionists were handicapped also because of the many voters absent in Canada, the United States and elsewhere. Some had not reached home from the fishery. Then there were the young men of the Naval Reserve and the Regiment at the front, and those who since 1913 have died. All these to all intents and purposes automatically voted "No," because the Prohibitionists had to roll up 40 per cent. of the total number on the Voters' List for 1913, which amounts to about 25,000 votes. We regret that the vote here was not even larger than it was, but if other parts of the Island done equally as well as this section, Prohibition is sure.

Credit must be given to the earnest and practical way in which the Campaign was conducted here, and although sacrifices of time and leisure were made, nobody we feel confident who took an active part in the matter regret the stand he or she took.

There can be no difference of opinion regarding the evil effects of the liquor traffic on hundreds of our otherwise good citizens, and if not carried now the flag is not far distant when the day of Prohibition will float over Newfoundland.

## Germans Arrested in United States

New York, Oct. 25.—Lieut. Robert Fay of the German Army, who was arrested yesterday afternoon with his brother-in-law, Walter L. Scholz, a German resident holding first citizenship papers, while experimenting with explosives in the woods at Grantwood, N. J., admitted to-day that he came to this country with expense money and a commission from the German Government to destroy munitions factories and ships carrying munitions of war to the allies. Fay denied, however, that he had blown up any munition plants or ships.

A third prisoner, Paul Daeche, a German who has lived in this country three years, was arrested at 5 o'clock this morning at his home, No. 141 Hatton Street, Jersey City. He is accused with Fay and Scholz of conspiracy.

## 'The War, Cause For Optimism'

It has not been infrequently stated by thoughtful people, that Germany's present position is better than at the outbreak of the war, that the war has not yet reached her soil, that her enormous military supplies both in men and materials, have not been seriously depleted, that her food supplies still hold out wonderfully well, and that the great mass of her people is still in favour of the war and confidently expect victory.

It is true that the Allies are yet a long way from the boundaries of Germany. Not only that, but a German army overran all but a few square miles of Belgium, all of Luxembourg, part of north eastern France, all of Galicia, all of Poland, and are crowding through Riga on the north and pushing through Serbia toward the Dardanelles in the South. That is the most that can be said for Germany as to territorial gains. How about her territorial losses? All of her large and valuable colonies, outlying dominions and dependencies are gone. They are unquestionably and irrevocably in the hands of the Allies.

What about the success of the invasions of her enormous armies in Europe? In the most essential features and at the most important strategic points she has consistently failed. Did Germany reach Paris or Calais? Has she been able to launch her hordes against England from Calais? She was enormously prepared, equipped beyond our wildest dreams, but she was merely a vast intricate but powerful machine with conquest and merely destruction as her one aim. She was checked before Paris, and headed back from her drive toward Calais and now, all along the western front she is slowly but surely letting go her hold before the irresistible pounding of the Allies. We too are completing an enormous war machine, every bit the equal of that of Germany. But, in addition, we have behind it the spirit of defence, protection, and justice, a powerful and lasting force in itself. On the eastern front Russia has for some time turned the tables and is now forcing Germany back through Galicia and retaking towns and country recently taken from her by Germany. Only in the north west around Riga is Germany causing any serious trouble to Russia and even there it seems to be slowly turning in favor of Russia. The country, climate, and all natural elements are strongly favorable to Russia and even more unfavorable to Germany.

She tried tremendously hard to capture a large part of the Russian army but they always just escaped. Now she finds herself in a very bad fix, far from supplies and reinforcements and in danger of being broken and captured by the Russian forces. In the Southwest, Italy is having splendid success all along the line, continually pushing back the Austrians and daily taking more territory. In fact, the only weak spot in the whole war is Germany's momentarily successful rush against Serbia, with the co-operation of Bulgaria. The Allies are sending a force by way of Salonika to help Serbia and to intercept the German armies on their way to the Dardanelles, whether they are supposed to be headed. It is said that this is to be an expedition of 500,000 men, many of whom have already landed. It is probable that Germany will be headed off and quite possible that a large part of her armies will be destroyed in this last effort to break the ever tightening ring of the Allies. She has tried Belgium, France, and Russia and has failed in all. Now she is striking desperately at Serbia and is doomed to another failure, we may be sure.

And what of the German fleet? It is well preserved and harmless, as we all know. From the first check of the German armies before Paris there has been continual betterment and increasing strength and progress on the part of the Allies. Ultimate victory, of the Allies is daily becoming more and more clear and tangible. Certainly, there has not been greater cause for optimism at any period of the war than at the present.—News.

King George, who was recently visiting his troops in France, met with a severe accident by his horse becoming frightened. He is now confined to his bed but improving.

## Public Notice Passports

Residents of this Colony, intending to travel out of Newfoundland, are hereby notified that they may be required to produce Passports at various points on their journey. Passports are issued at the Department of the Colonial Secretary, in accordance with Rules and Regulations approved by the Governor in Council, to persons domiciled in Newfoundland, who are:—

1. Natural-born British subjects;
2. The wives and widows of such persons; or
3. Persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Colonies, or in India.

A Passport cannot be issued on behalf of a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British Mission or Consulate. Passports must not be sent out of Newfoundland by post.

Applicants are requested to have their Forms of Application (which can be obtained at this Department), properly filled in, according to marginal instructions thereon, and forwarded to the Department in sufficient time to permit of any necessary alterations being made in the same before the date upon which the Passport would be required.

The charge for a Passport is \$2.50 which covers a period of two years, after which it may be renewed for four further periods of two years each, at a charge of \$1.00 for each renewal.

Copies of Rules and Regulations, Forms of Application, or any desired information may be obtained upon request.
