Bible Says the Turk Will Come to His End

(Editor of the Guardian).
The prophet Isaiah, He (the king of the world) shall plant the tabernacles of his place between the sea and the glorious holy mountain; yet he shall come to his end, and now shall help him." Dan. 11:45. This speaks of two events that all the world has looked forward to with great apprehension, and has expected to see accomplished at an early date—the driving of the Turk from Europe, and the coming to his end.
The "glorious holy mountain" is where Jerusalem is located. Zeck. 8:3. It is situated between the Mediterranean and the Dead Sea. According to the Bible, the seat of government at the time of the Babylonian captivity was to be removed from Constantinople and located at Jerusalem.
During the progress of the Balkan war in 1912, many writers in the daily papers and the magazines freely expressed their conviction that the time had come for the Turk to leave Europe. While he was driven by the Balkan allies to the verge of Europe, their hands were stayed by the conference of the European powers in London, and the Turk still holds Constantinople. Scarcely had the present war begun when it was freely predicted that this would end the stay of the Turk in Europe.
Paraphrasing the scriptures in the light of simple deductions, we have the following: The Turk shall locate his seat of government at Jerusalem, and shall come to his end, and at that time Christ shall begin His eternal reign. The time of trouble to the nations, such as never was, will follow, and at that time all God's people, whose names are found written in the book of life, will be delivered.
The thought that Christ takes His kingdom and begins His reign at the beginning of this time of unparalleled trouble to the nations may seem strange to some, but it will be seen to be in perfect accord with the scripture.

Like the muffled tread of the thief in the night, the day of the Lord is stealing upon us. More loudly than the present war broke over Europe, and with much more dire results, will the war of the great day of God break over all the world. The only safety in that hour will be found in Jesus.

The Police Search Stores For Hidden Stocks of Meat

London, May 10.—A Copenhagen despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company says:
"The police in Berlin searched the shops and dwellings of butchers to day for hidden stocks of meats. The result showed the supply of meat in Berlin was sufficient for only a few days. All butcher shops, including Wertheims, a large meat market, have been closed. Best quality meat now costs 14 marks (\$3) per kilo (2.2 lbs.)."





HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

Synopsis and Proceedings

Monday, April 17th, 1916.

Mr. DEVEREUX thought it unfair to deter large steamers already engaged in the seal fishery from continuing to sail. He did not believe that they would be prevented from sailing from Canadian ports. He thought the local shipping trade would suffer by this restriction; furthermore, all the legislation of late years providing for the comfort of the men engaged would be useless if we were to go back to wooden ships.

Mr. MOUTON was of the opinion that it was unfair to Messrs. Bowring to prevent the "Florizel" from sailing in the future. They had invested a lot of money in the country, and ought not to be unjustly treated.

Mr. DEVEREUX moved and Hon. J. C. CROSBIE seconded an Amendment which would allow large ships already sailing to the seal fishery to continue to do so; both said that the difficulty might be got over by limiting their catch. It might be very useful in saving life to have a large powerful ship within reach.

Mr. HIGGINS agreed. It was very desirable to encourage such ships as the "Florizel" to continue in the trade of the Colony.

MIN. OF PUBLIC WORKS thought the presence of the large ships was a discouragement to the smaller ones.

Mr. WINSOR was of the same opinion. The exclusion of large ships would tend to more equal distribution of the profits of this industry.

Mr. GRIMES was of the same opinion. The Committee rose until tomorrow.

The House then adjourned to tomorrow at 3 p.m.

Tuesday, April 18th, 1916.

The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Petitions were presented by Mr. Clift, Mr. Stone, Mr. Halfyard.

HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE AND CUSTOMS presented his Eighth Budget in a speech of about an hour's duration. The following extracts cover some of the principal points of interest, as showing the general financial condition of the Colony.

"Mr. Chairman: In presenting to-day my eighth Budget, I desire to congratulate the Colony on the prospect that there will be, at the end of the fiscal year now only ten weeks off, a surplus of Revenue over Expenditure. This we are returning to the favourable conditions experienced by the Colony until the past two years, when, as a result, in the 1913-14, of the reduction in duties the previous session and, in the year 1914-15, of the dislocation of business consequent upon the war, deficits were experienced. Now, however, I am glad to say, the pendulum has swung back again, the balance has readjusted itself, and we can see the Colony on the up grade once more. Moreover, with the conditions as they are at present and with the prospects before the country during the next twelve months, it is not unreasonable I think, to express the hope that in the session of 1917 there will be a similar gratifying condition of affairs to announce.

"For the current fiscal year 1915-1916 I estimate a Revenue of, roughly, \$1,100,000, leaving a surplus of \$40,000, or just enough to liquidate the outstanding obligations and enable us to begin the fiscal year 1916-17 with a clean sheet.

For that year, beginning with next July, I frankly admit that, in view of war-time conditions, on the one side, and the prohibition problem on the other, it is impossible to approximate at all closely the likely outcome, but for reasons which I shall set out in detail later in this address, I look to our being able to obtain enough Revenue during that twelve months, not alone to meet our indebtedness, but to yield somewhat of a surplus also.

"The extent of our recovery the past nine months has been such as to put it beyond all question that the decline last year was directly attributable to the war. For virtually every week of the nine months that have now passed of the present fiscal year, there has been a substantial increase in the Customs Revenue, totalling \$757,788 63 up to March 31st. The barometer of Customs Revenue for the past five years tells the story more clearly. The figures of the duties received from imports during these five years are as follows:

1910-11	\$2,898,615.25
1911-12	3,184,633.90
1912-13	2,283,304.35
1913-14	3,089,627.53
1914-15	2,744,567.85

The actual Customs Revenue for the nine months of this year was \$2,712,000, or almost exactly the same amount as was received for the twelve months of last year. This clearly proves that when the war broke out importers, instead of renewing their stocks, abandoned importing in a large measure and tried to utilize the goods they had on their shelves. Thus our imports contracted largely in volume, and our customs receipts were diminished, but now, having sold out these goods, dealers are having to import largely, and as they have to pay a much increased price for the commodities over last year, the Revenue is gaining in two ways, first, by the duty on the increased quantity of imports and, second, by the additional amount obtained from the increased cost of goods themselves.

"The most perplexing problem which confronted the Finance Ministers of every country--even of neutral nations--during the first year of the war, was the dislocation of trade conditions which prevailed everywhere and which made it difficult, if not impossible, for even the most careful observer to forecast the trend of commercial activity and the magnitude of its swing. For Newfoundland the balance swung against us very decidedly, causing a shortage in the Revenue of \$750,000, but this year perfectly

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Evolutionary transformation has been effected, and the pendulum has swung back again even more decidedly. Despite the disadvantages which now confront us in the increased cost of many articles of commerce required by the Colony, in the growing difficulty of obtaining others, in the grave features of the tonnage problem, which has resulted in warehouses in New York, Halifax and Montreal, and in the railway yards at North Sydney, being crowded with goods from Newfoundland during the winter, which could not be got forward; we have been able, as a result, first of the increased returns from ad valorem duties; and third, of the war taxes imposed by the Legislature, to increase the Revenue for the current year, with out any serious hardship to the people, to almost \$4,200,000.00, and the commercial, financial and industrial circumstances of the Colony, moreover, make it manifest that we are entitled to look forward to the coming fiscal year to maintain this very satisfactory condition of affairs if not, indeed, materially better.

We feel, too, we ought not, if it can be avoided, attempt the imposition of further taxes on the people of the Colony at the present juncture, and we are confident that if matters can be continued until the end of the year, we will be in a better position to work out a plan, and the public will have a better appreciation of the reasons that actuate us, than if we were to come forward with proposals now for the collection of Revenue, which may not be needed in part, if at all, because it may prove that under the operations of this Act, on the one side, and under the changed conditions which the close of hostilities in Europe will bring about on the other side, matters will so transform themselves in this country that it will be possible for us to get along without imposing any new taxes. As evidence that this is by no means an unlikely contingency, I would point to the fact that, whereas in 1908, there was a deficit of \$200,000, we had in the following year a surplus of \$420,080, representing a difference of Revenue in one twelve months of \$620,080, and that even now in the Budget I am submitting to you, we look to make up in the present year not alone the deficit of \$750,000 on last year's account, but also enough, in addition, to meet the increased expense of the public service and to give us a surplus as well, or roughly, a change of over a million dollars this year. Hence, I do not think it is too much to ask the House to consider that we are reasoning fairly when we submit that there will be no necessity to impose additional burdens because of the adoption of the prohibition policy.

"I might add that the annual report of the Colonial Savings Bank for the year ended on Dec. 31, 1915, shows that it had then on its books, deposits aggregating \$2,411,946.16, and that the four Canadian banks doing business in the Colony had on deposit at interest and in the Savings Bank, on the same date, no less than \$3,935,154.33. These figures, totalling \$12,318,108.50 are the savings of our people, and amazing to relate, have increased by nearly one million dollars, or \$912,524.26, to be precise, over the previous year."

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word.

A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany--25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

(Continued from 2nd page.)

Various questions were asked and answered.

The Pension Bill was read a third time.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on the Sealfishery Bill.

MIN. OF MARINE & FISHERIES said he thought Messrs. Bowring Brothers had acted very fairly in retaining the ships Florizel and Stephano in the local trade instead of selling them to the Russian Government at an immense profit as they might have done. He thought it would be reasonable to let them continue at the ice. The Premier agreed. The owners had put a lot of money in these ships, and it would be harsh to drive them at once out of the sealfishery. That did not apply to the ships sold to Russia, because if the owners brought them back they would do so with their eyes open. But he thought the ships which were still here might be allowed to sail. He agreed, however, that no future ships above 450 tons should be allowed to enter the fishery.

MR. LLOYD said he would not agree to this, but would resist.

HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE agreed with the Premier. The comfort of the large ships was greater, and he did not see why they should not go out if their catch was limited.

MR. COAKER said if the Florizel was allowed to go to the ice it would lead to all Capt. A. Kean's sons getting wooden ships and being assisted by him to get seals, which would be favoritism, and unfair to others.

MIN. PUBLIC WORKS was against allowing steel ships to go to the sealfishery.

MR. DEVEREAUX said that the Florizel had a few days ago enriched the country to the extent of \$140,000 in 23 days, without hindering the other ships in any way. She ought to have fair play. Capital ought not to be wantonly destroyed or attacked, or people would not invest in the country. Only a few years ago Mr. Coaker was calling the wooden ships coffins and man-traps, and now he was supporting them. It was not right to penalize a firm like Bowring's, who had for a century been foremost in all our commercial affairs, nor a man like Capt. A. Kean, who had raised himself from a fisherman to be our foremost sealing captain, and was a man of whom we should be proud. He did not believe in the possibility of going back to the old days of sealing ships. A ship built and used for sealing would be no good for anything.

MR. LLOYD said the whole object of the amendment was to give Capt. A. Kean a monopoly of the sealfishery.

MR. COAKER said Capt. Kean's success was entirely due to his having all the best ships. He hoped Capt. Kean would live a few years longer, because, as soon as he, Mr. Coaker, got into power, Capt. Kean would have to stand his trial, and might go to the Penitentiary.

MR. DOWNEY thought the action of the Bowring firm in refusing to sell their ships was meritorious, and deserved recognition. He believed, in a short time, we would have to go back on the present legislation, and admit steel ships again.

HON. MIN. OF FINANCE referred to the fact that Mr. Coaker had said some speakers of the Government side knew nothing of what they were talking about. He himself was born at the fishery, and he had forgotten more about the fishery than Mr. Coaker or Dr. Lloyd ever knew. It was a rotten and disgraceful state of affairs that Capt. Kean had been so attacked for years in the press for a misfortune that was no fault of his own. He was a man who had made his way and ought to be admired, and should not be criticized by men who did not know as much about the fisheries as they thought they did; he referred to Mr. Lloyd and Mr. Coaker. The attempt to exclude the Florizel was merely an attempt to have revenge on Capt. Kean.

MR. MOULTON said it was only common justice to the Bowring firm to allow the steamers they had paid for to continue to go to the ice.

MR. GRIMES opposed letting the Florizel sail.

The Committee rises until tomorrow. The House adjourned until tomorrow at 3 p.m.

Wednesday, April 19th, 1916.

The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

Petitions were presented by Mr. Targett and Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs.

Bills were introduced and read a first time to amend the Law relating to Exportation of Timber, and Regulation of Saw Mills.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on the Seal Fishery Bill.

MR. JENNINGS expressed his agreement with the section preventing the "Florizel" from going to the ice. The House divided, and Mr. Devereaux's amendment permitting the "Florizel" to go and to bring in 35,000 seals, was carried. An amendment punishing officers who send men on the ice if bad weather is coming, and an amendment to enable the men to sell their own share of seals where they liked, both proposed by Mr. Coaker, were accepted.

The Bill then passed Committee.

The House adjourned to Tuesday next, at 3 p.m.

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

The War

General Townshend and his troops have surrendered to the Turks at Kut-el-Amara, the British finding it impossible to send them help. They were besieged for 143 days.
The submarine controversy between Germany and the United States has again been settled, Germany saying she won't attack passenger vessels any more with out giving them proper warning.
The Irish Rebellion has been quashed. The subject of executions has been brought before Parliament by Nationalist members, and Mr. Asquith thinks that executions are now ended. Numbers have received terms of imprisonment. Case ment will be tried on Monday next. Herbert Samuel, the Home Secretary, says "The Irish uprising was foolish because its leaders rashly put faith in German aid."
The German losses in April are estimated at 91,162. Since the beginning of the war their casualties have been 2,822,079.
In reference to the Sinn Fein rebellion and the protests made by Irish members against putting to death of the leaders, the Home Secretary said the Government would have been guilty of an pardonable weakness if it had not meted out stern punishment to the guilty.
Although the fighting was most severe around Verdun during the week, comparative calm now prevails. The British troops now

hold 90 miles of the Western front. The White Star liner, Cymric, 15,000 tons, was torpedoed by a German submarine off the West coast of Ireland, and sunk before reaching port. Five of the crew were killed.
The United States are mobilizing all her troops for the Mexican border service. It is feared the Mexicans are going to give the United States trouble.
Constantinople says the Turks have defeated the Russians in Asia Minor.
Premier Asquith has gone to Ireland to look into certain matters. The Lord Lieutenant of Ireland has resigned.
The Nationalists demand a rigid enquiry into the recent rebellion in Ireland. The German Government now admits responsibility for sinking the Sussex. Up till now they denied it.

H. M. S. Grangemouth, c/o G. P. O., London, England, April 4th, 1916.
Dear Mother, I am pleased to write you in answer to your welcome letter, which I received the 3rd of April. I was glad to hear that you and all the family were well. I am well at present and enjoying good health.
Well, mother, Alex Mercer left the 3rd of April. He was gone before I got your letter. He left in the morning and I got your letter in the evening and a letter from Maggie and George. I miss Alex very much, as we have been together ever since we left home. He will tell you all about me when he gets home and how he and I enjoyed ourselves together.
Joe Norman, Mark Norman and Joe Snow is on the H. M. S. York. We and they go to sea together and go into harbor together, so you see I got chums from home to go ashore with me. You said you were sorry for me joining on for the end of the war. Well, mother, I thought it was a cowardly thing for me to do to come home when my year was up and the war on at the present time. I thought it my duty to join on to do my best to keep you in safety and to keep peace and happiness in that small colony of ours.
England is determined to gain this war or she will fight till the last man is on the field. Her Navy is ruling the sea to day. Britannia says while she has a ship and a boy in Blue to man

them it is just as well for the Kaiser and the German fleet to be where they were before the War started.
Well, mother, I must tell you not to be worrying and thinking about me for I am all right and expecting to see you and all the family again if I am spared to see this War over. I know it will be a great time for us and all the people at home the day of our return.
You said you had a very frosty winter home. We haven't seen any thing frost past over here this winter. Like summer all the winter months through. Give my love to all friends around. I must now close, wishing you and all the family good health until we meet again. I remain, your loving son, TED.
