In two days afterwards, Lloyd, with his little army, which Irish rumors had again swelled to the imaginary number of fifteen thousand, came to Maguire's bridge, half way between Enniskillen and Banagher, where he lay in wait for the approach of Sutherland's force.

The bombastic vanity so frequently displayed by an American neighbor, is amusing enough; and did it merely consist of self-inflation and egotism, it would only serve as matter of merriment to the looker-on. But unfortunately, the vanity of an individual is sometimes coupled with national pride, and induces them, nationally or individually, to play very dangerous pranks, injudicious on their part, and annoying or even injurious to the objects of them. Let but the American people, or an American citizen, imagine that they can do a thing, or that it will be to their benefit to do it, and they forthwith set about it, with very little regard to the principle of *non est in vobis*, the rights of nations, or of individuals, or to any abstract question of morality or policy. The Americans in the Canadian rebellion of 1837, the military invaders of Cuba, the plunderers of our Provincial fisheries, and various other such expeditions, might be cited in support of our position. One of the latest freaks of American assumption, and of a very remarkable nature, and strikingly illustrating this republican mode of rash demonstration, wholly regardless of public policy or national rights; while the manner in which the position of an individual has been identified and revealed in a large portion of the American press, and people, plainly evinces the deficiency in moral and political education, which characterizes the masses in the great republic. When the Austrian authorities captured Kezsa in Kain, they acted under the impression, that this individual, being an Austrian subject, was amenable to the laws and authorities of his country. Whether he acted right or not, is a question wholly between the Austrian and the American Governments; and if the latter had ungrudgingly visited the territory of the latter, it was to the party alone that she was answerable. Whether M. Kezsa were or were not guilty of treason or other offences against Austria, was a question solely affecting him and his own country; but if charged with any such offence, he was amenable to the laws of his country, and could be tried by no other authority. In either case, neither the American nor the Austrian Government, had any right to interfere between the Austrian authorities and the Austrian subject, unless he had given them some right, by not making any demand on his part, to assist in preventing a violation of Turkish territory. When therefore, Captain Ingraham so questionably interposed an American man-of-war in the dispute, and threatened the Austrian vessels with violence, he was, in fact, a usurper; and if he had, in fact, violated the law of nations, he was, in fact, a usurper.
