Militia Man Dead At Capital.

Fredericton, Feb. 27.—Capt. Thomas McKenzie, one of the best known military figures in eastern Canada, died last night at the home of his son-inlaw. George Segee.

His death was the result of old age, the capitaln being in his 80th year. The end was hastened by injuries received by a fall a few days ago on a slippery sidewalk.

Captain McKenzie was born at Gibraltar, where his father who was with Wellington at Waterloo, was then serving and was 79 years old on December 3rd last. He started his military career as a mere lad when he enlisted in the 64th regiment. He later became serbeant in that regiment. He served through the Persian campaign in 1856 and the Indian Mutiny in 1857 and the Indian Mutiny in 1857 and the generals commanding these campaigns. In 1860 he was sent to this province as a special instruction for military officers. He later became caretaker of the militarly property in this city, a position which he retained until a few years ago when he retired. Capt. McKenzie in 1888 wrote a book entitled "My Life as a Soldier" and carried on correspondence at various files with many military notations.


