In Massachusetts the doctrine is otherwise, and it has there been held that where there is no express promise to pay the assessments, the remedy in the first instance is by a sale of the shares, and this has been declared to be the rule in New Hampshire. Upon an examination of the authorities, and upon principle, the true rule appears to be this:—That where a party makes an express promise to pay the assessments he is answerable to the Corporation upon such promise, for pay all legal assessments, and may be compelled to its performance by action at Law before resorting to a sale of the shares. It is a personal undertaking beyond the terms of the Charter. Where, on the other hand, he only agrees to take a specified number of shares, without promising expressly to pay assessments, then resort must first be had to a sale of the shares to pay the assessments before an action at Law can be maintained. His agreement simply to take the shares is action at Law can be maintained. His agreement simply to take the shares is an agreement upon the faith of the Charter, and by it alone is to be governed so far as his shares are to be effected. He takes them upon the conditions and law of the Charter. They exist only by virtue of the Charter and are to be governed

Bay Boom Company, 10 Vict., Cap. 72, only authorise a sale of the shares in case of nonpayment of the assessments; but by the Act 11 Vic., Cap. 49, to amend the South Bay Boom Company Act, express power is given to sue the shareholders, in case of non-payment of calls. It is clear, therefore, that the particular Act of Incorporation, in each case, must be looked to for the remedy, in cases of default of payment; and I am of opinion that as the Act incorporating this Company imposes the obligation to pay, and, at the same time, directs a particular remedy in case of non-payment, the remedy so pointed out must be followed—the relation existing between the shareholders and the Company having been created by the Statute, and there being no liability independent of it.

The next question is whether the Act. 32 Vict., Cap. 54, gives a right of action.
