Thirty-ninth Annual Report

OF THE

Managing Committee of Knox Church.

In submitting their Annual Report, the Committee of Management desire to return thanks to God for the measure of success that has attended their efforts in administering the temporal affairs of the Congregation during the past year.

Commencing the year with floating liabilities amounting to \$578.04, and with the Expenditure largely in excess of the Income, the rapid increase of the debt made it apparent that special means must be immediately adopted to meet the emergency, and in the month of April the Managers felt it absolutely necessary to lay the state of matters before the Congregation. Accordingly a Special Meeting was called, and the financial position fully presented. When after due consideration a resolution was passed appointing the Session and Managers a Joint Committee to canvass the members of the Congregation for subscriptions to cover the floating debt, and also for increased weekly offerings.

The amount realized by this canvass was \$624.82, which afforded temporary relief, but on account of the excessive expenditure, and the continued increase of the debt, the Joint Committee felt themselves under the painful necessity of recommending to the Congregation a reduction of 20% on the salaries of all the officials of the Church. This recommendation was adopted at a meeting held on the 17th of May, to come into operation on the 1st of October. The effect of these measures has been to reduce the floating debt to \$464 14, at which point it stands at the close of the year, being \$113.90 less than at the beginning.

It will, however, be imperatively necessary for the Congregation to provide from \$800 to \$1000 extra during the present year, for the purpose of re-shingling and painting the Church, which should, and would have been done last year, had the state of the finances permitted.

The Managers are pleased to notice by the Treasurer's statement, an increase in the ordinary revenue of \$118.00, which although small, it nevertheless affords indication of a change for the better, and they sincerely hope the improvement may continue and increase, so that the Committee may be in a position to meet all demands upon them promptly in future.

In this connection the Managers would invite an expression of opinion from the Congregation, on the merits of the "Envelope System," as compared with other means of raising revenue.

The Committee cannot close their Report without giving expression to a feeling of regret, which they know also pervades the Congregation, at the necessity that existed for reducing the salary of our respected Pastor and the other Officials.

The Managers who retire this year, by rotation, are James McMenemy, A. A. Wyllie, C. J. Williams, and Wm. Macauley, all of whom are eligible for re-election. It will also be necessary to elect a manager to fill the place of Malcolm Isbister, resigned,

The average attendance for the year has been, officers and teachers 35, scholars 239 or a total of 274, out of a total membership on the roll of 39 officers and teachers and 375 scholars; this shows a falling off in the average attendance of 16 less than the year 1881, and 13 less than the year 1880, which we very much regret, more especially as the School Room has been made more pleasant and inviting as a place to meet in. The balance of the amount voted by the Association to assist our President the Rev. John James, D. D., in making the improvements, has we are pleased to say, been paid during the The Psalmody is still conducted by our Precentor Mr. James Johnson, who continues to take a deep interest in advancing this pleasing portion of our School exercises, and from the recent action taken by the Congregation in reference to his salary, it is a question if the School should not memorialize the Congregation to reconsider the vote passed in reference to his salary. The Library has not had any additions to it for some years past, and, in fact, is now in that condition that if no steps can be taken to procure a suitable Library to meet the requirements of the School, the Library had better be closed for the present. We would, however recommend that the Library Committee take immediate steps to furnish the School with a Library worthy of the Congregation.

During the absence of the President last summer the Teachers decided upon having a meeting once a week; on a Thurday Evening, for the study of the lesson, which meeting has been regularly held up to the present time and is fairly attended and with beneficial results to those who are privileged to be

present.

One of the most gratifying and hopeful features of the Temance movement at the present time is to be found in the fact that the Cnurch of Christ is rapidly awakening to a sense of her responsibility in connection with it, and in consequence is encouraging the organization of Congregational Temperance Societies, many of which are working with a degree of vigor and earnestness that promises the gratifying re-The pulpit also is now recognized as the great exponent of Temperance as well as Gospel principles, and is sounding forth in loud and stirring language, not only the dangers arising from the inordinate use of intoxicating drinks, but also the bounden duty of every true follower of Christ to direct his influence and his efforts against it, both reason and experience uniting their testimony that the cause of the Gospel and Temperance are identical, and that each makes progress in proportion as they are united in spirit and in effort.

This Society, therefore, recognizing its Church relationship has endeavored to carry on its operations in a manner consistent therewith, and while it has sought to make its meetings interesting and attractive, the chief object has been to render them profitable. For this purpose the best available talent has been secured, and the Society has been favored with most excellent addresses by the following gentlemen in the order named: The Rev. John Laing, of Dundas, Rev. J. W. A. Stewart, Rev. W. W. Ross of this city, Rev. R. A. Grant formerly of Ingersoll, and the Rev. Dr. James.

An attractive programme has been also rendered at each meeting, at nearly all of which large and deeply interested audiences were present.

The Society now numbers 95 members, 46 being males, and 49 females.

The Treasurer's Statement shows the finances to be in a healthy condition, there being a balance of twelve dollars on hand after paying all expenses.

The Society has lost during the year a most active and useful member in the removal of Mr. Wm. Coutts from the city, and desires to place on record its high appreciation of his valuable services as one of its founders and indefatigable workers.

Our sincere thanks are due, and are hereby tendered to the speakers already named, also to the ladies and gentlemen whose musical and literary contributions have tended so much to enhance the enjoyment of our meetings, and especially to Mr. James Johnson for his laborious and painstaking services in securing and preparing those who took part in the various programmes.

REPORT OF THE JUVENILE BRANCH.

This department of the societies work has been carried on during the year with gratifying success, the children themselves being the chief contributors to the programmes and the music. Recitations, Dialogues, &c., given have been highly creditable to them. The attendance at all the meetings has been uniformly large, and the degree of interest manifested sufficiently to them that the children not only heartily enjoyed them, but were also benefited by them.

The Committee of Management have endeavored as far as possible to combine instruction with entertainment, by placing before the children the nature of intoxicating drinks, and their destructive effects upon the physical system, believing that the best way to guard against the terrible consequences is to show them where the danger lies, and how it may be avoided; and the Committee will feel themselves richly rewarded if they shall have been the humble means of encouraging and helping the formation of temperate habits amongst the young of the Congregation, thus throwing around them in early years such a shield of protection as shall save them in after life from falling into the terrible vortex of drunkenness.
