Some Men and Women Who Have Risen to Eminence.

Under the most favorable circumstances life presents many difficulties, but when the individual's lot becomes additionally hard.

Arthur Cavannah, who had neither eyes nor legs, was elected to the British Parliament and was known as "The Trunk."

At this time we wish to speak more particularly of the blind, and every country has had her share of distinguished blind people.

Blind King of Bohemia had himself led into the Battle of Crevy, while Ziska, the blind Bohemian General, at a later period, personally commanded his troops in eleven engagements.

Laura Bridgeman and Helen Keller, two American girls, though blind, deaf and dumb, distinguished themselves at college.

Henry Fawcett, though blind from youth, was one of the most successful Postmaster Generals Great Britain ever had.

Thomas P. Gore, one of the ninety-six senators composing the upper branch of the United States Congress and who represents the State of Oklahoma, has been blind from boyhood.

While in our Maritime Provinces we have Sir Frederick Fraser, Principal of the Halifax School for the Blind, and Michael Kelly, well known as the mental calculator and temperance lecturer.

There are only a few of the many distinguished blind, who, in spite of their terrible affliction, have risen to positions of eminence.

ENORMOUS REVENUE FROM MOTORISTS

Quebec Derived \$8,000,000 in Past Six Months, From Tourists.
(Montreal Gazette.)
Visiting tourists from the United States to this province in 1920 have nearly doubled the figures of 1919. To be exact, last year 18,105 American cars visited the province of Quebec. From the opening of the motor season this year to the first week in October 30,297 American cars have been recorded, bearing registration plates from over 28 States in the Union, and many more will come before the end of the season. The average number of cars per diem from across the border is 200. In 1915 the average number of American cars visiting this province was 19 per diem. This is truly a remarkable increase. A reasonable estimate of the amount of money brought into the province by way of actual travelling expenses for the past six months is \$8,000,000, excluding probably a similar amount expended in furs, jewelry, linen, etc. and other products which are sold for medical, artistic or industrial purposes. This large increase in traffic is well in keeping with the predictions of the Automobile Club of Canada, made last year, and an officer of the club predicts at least 50,000 visitors for 1921. Quebec's improved highways are mainly responsible for this large amount of business.

The Tourists' Bureau of Montreal is well pleased with the results obtained during its first year's effort on behalf of the tourists induced to visit this city and district that it is not only going to carry on next year on a much larger scale, but has under advisement a novel plan of extending a special welcome to each visitor, in the shape of a souvenir which carries with it special privileges during the sojourn in the city.

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JUDGE McLATCHY MAKES STATEMENT

Tells Why He is Unable to Re-count Ballots Cast in Recent Election.
His Honor Judge McLatchy opened his court at M. A. Kelly's office this morning to issue his statement in reference to the Restigouche county recount.
His Honor read a lengthy statement reciting many sections of the election act covering the case, as well as giving details of the count as proceeded with.
We publish a portion of the statement which will give our readers some idea of the findings.
In the matter of the New Brunswick Elections Act and of the election of two members of the Legislative Assembly for the County of Restigouche.
And one of the duly nominated candidates for the election of two members of the Legislative Assembly of N. B., to represent the County of Restigouche in the said Assembly, I gave notice that I would on Tuesday, the 26th day of October last at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon, at the Court House in the town of Dalhousie proceed to recount the votes which were cast at the election of two members of the Legislative Assembly for the said County of Restigouche held on the ninth day of October.

The said application for a recount was made to me by M. A. Kelly, Esq., for and on behalf of the said Stubbart, S. Harrison.

At the Court House, Dalhousie on October 26th last at 11 a.m. I attended pursuant to notice given to recount the votes cast at the said election held on the ninth day of October last.

(Here followed lengthy extracts from the election act and a record of the recount proceedings, figures of which are published in another column.)

From the foregoing it is clear that the returns of the Deputy Returning Officers in most instances were most unreliable. Either the poll books were inaccurately kept or all of the identical ballot papers counted and rejected by the Deputy Returning Officers were not in the boxes when opened by me. Take as an instance of this "No. 12. A to M" Kedgewick. The poll books shows 223 electors voted, but there were only 220 voters envelopes with ballot papers returned. Every voter uses an envelope. What became of the "three missing envelopes"? Which of the candidates would lose by a recount in this case?

And again take "No. 8, Campbell." I actually did recount the ballots of this polling sub-division. The poll book showed 172 votes polled. The total number of ballot papers counted was 175, three more than the poll book.

In scarcely more than one polling station where the envelopes and ballots or ballot papers were counted, did the result agree with the number of votes shown to have been cast by the poll book.

Application was made to me to recount the votes cast at the election held in this electoral district on the ninth day of October last at the Court House, Dalhousie on the twentieth of October last. I tarted recount proceedings. I did recount the ballots to a from the hall boxes and from seven polling stations, and I refused to recount the votes cast at Dalhousie polling stations. My reasons for the course I have followed have already given.

The Act directs me to recount the votes cast at the election complained of and upon the completion of the recount to certify the results of the recount to the returning officer.

I have been unable to complete the recount. If I correctly interpret the Act, it cannot be done.

As I have been unable to comply with the provisions of the Act in recounting the ballots, I am therefore unable to certify the result of the recount to the returning officer.

The matter was under consideration by the cabinet today and it was decided to issue a proclamation calling upon the people of Canada to solemnly observe and commemorate the anniversary of the cessation of hostilities. There had been requests from a number of cities and towns that a public holiday should be proclaimed but it was deemed advisable to let the decision rest with the mayors and municipal authorities.

EXHIBITION OF RANCH BREED SILVER FOXES
An unique exhibition under the immediate management of the Commission of Conservation of Canada, will be held in Montreal on November 24th and 25th. It will be the first international exhibition of ranch-bred live silver foxes. Fur-farming is rapidly becoming a scientific branch of animal husbandry and, although little more than a decade old, is one of Canada's most flourishing infant industries.

While the greater number of Canadian fox ranchers are to be found in the Maritime Provinces and chiefly in Prince Edward Island, there are many in each of the other provinces and the number is steadily increasing. The interest evinced in Quebec, Ontario and Western Canada generally demonstrates that many Canadians are desirous of embarking in the fur-farming of mink, beaver, fisher, marten and other fur-bearing animals.

Present advice indicates that fully 150 animals will be brought from Prince Edward Island alone. It is confidently expected that other provinces will send an equally large number in proportion to the number of their fur-bearers.

A healthy growth of the industry should do much to check the rapid industrialization of the country and to stay in the balance of the Empire for many years to come. It is confidently expected that the exhibition of November 24th and 25th will be a most successful one.

SAVINGS DEPOSITS IN CANADA HIGH
New High Level Reached in August—Sign of Prosperity.

(Montreal Gazette.)

While the September bank statement, which is reviewed elsewhere on this morning's financial pages, shows deposits of the month of savings checks at a new high level in Canadian banking history, the month's gain of some \$1.2 millions was with the exception of August, when the increase was approximately the same, the lowest for some months past.

In September, 1919, notice deposits grew by nearly \$1 million in October of that year by upwards of \$5 millions, against this year's September gain of only \$1.2 millions. What deductions are to be drawn from the showing are somewhat obscure.

It is to be hoped, however that the habits of thrift learned by the public during the war period are not being cast aside, since on the savings of the Dominion's credit structure. Already current loans in Canada exceed the total savings deposits by nearly \$50 millions, the old dead line having been passed some months ago. More than personal advantage is concerned in thrifty habits practiced; the entire commercial and industrial structure, from which source comes the wherewithal to save, is dependent upon the margin placed between the receipts and outgo of the individual.

WILL RETURN TO PUBLIC WORKS DEPT.
L. L. Theriault Now at Edmunston Will Retire to Moncton.

Fredericton, Oct. 30.—L. L. Theriault, who was formerly an engineer on the staff of the provincial department of public works, is retiring from the position he has held as town manager of Edmunston, and will resume his duties as a divisional engineer under Chief Highway Engineer B. M. Hill in the near future.

It is understood that Mr. Theriault will again be placed in charge of the North Shore division, which includes Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland and part of Kent county, while W. A. S. Melanson, who was appointed as successor when he accepted the position at Edmunston, will take charge of the same section with headquarters at Moncton.

THE POSITION OF NORTHUMBERLAND'S M. L. A.
Will Support Neither Government Nor Opposition.

(North Shore Leader, Newcastle.)

Northumberland county has elected four independent candidates. The government organs state that they will support Foster, and the opposition press claim them as supporters of Baxter. The independents were elected to work in the interests of Northumberland and the province in general. They will support all good measures introduced by either Mr. Foster or Mr. Baxter or the leader of the Farmer's party. In conversation with our representatives they stated that they would pursue an independent course, and would only divert from this stand when requested to do so by the Northumberland county independent party which nominated them. Should they deem it wise to take a side with either political party they will have a meeting of their supporters called, consult them and abide by their decision.

STRUCK BY CAR AND KNOCKED OVER BRIDGE.
Alexander Doiron's Narrow Escape from Death.

(Northern Light, Bathurst.)

Alexander Doiron, of St. Ann's, received painful injuries and had a narrow escape from death on Saturday evening when he was struck by an automobile as he was crossing the station bridge on his bicycle. He came in contact with the windshield of Mr. Brown's car and in a stilted condition was thrown over the railing of the bridge into the water. The tide was low and there was little difficulty in assisting Doiron to the top of the bridge. At the hospital it was found that, beyond some cuts about the face and head, and a general shaking up, the injuries were not serious.

DALHOUSIE, N. B., Oct. 29.—The recount of the votes cast in Restigouche county in the general provincial election on October 16th reached an unexpected climax this morning when Judge McLatchey announced that he would not make a definite declaration at the conclusion of the proceedings.

A large number of returns, involving all the ballots cast at some of the most important polls, have been thrown out as unacceptable by the court.

The reason for refusing to recount is chiefly because the ballots were not replaced in the original initialed envelopes by the deputy returning officers, or in sealed packages.

The declaration day figures are as follows:

LeBlanc, Government, 1645; Harrison, Government, 1646; Stewart, Conservative, 2109; Diotte, Conservative, 1763; LaBillette, Liberal, 1590; Duncan, Liberal, 1063.

The result as found by the judge, although not officially announced by His Honor, are as follows:

LeBlanc (G.), 525; Harrison (G.), 569; Stewart (O.), 778; Diotte (O.), 785; LaBillette (Ind.), 567; Duncan (Ind.), 240. This, of course, is only for the seven polls that were recounted.

The judge said he would give no certificate of the recount, as he had not made a recount, but would issue a statement according to his records on Thursday next.

FUNERAL OF THE LATE
REV. J. R. NORWOOD.

HUBBARD, Oct. 19.—The body of Rev. Joseph Norwood arrived this evening via Yarmouth accompanied by the deceased's brother, Rev. Robert W. Norwood, of the Memorial Church, of St. Paul, Overbrook, Philadelphia. Rev. Joseph R. Norwood was formerly rector of Episcopal Church in Eastport, Maine, but had been lately residing in Cambridge, Mass., where he died rather suddenly of heart trouble, Friday last, age 51. The Norwood family has been closely identified with Hubbard during the past twenty-six years, and it was the wish of the deceased that he be buried beside his father in the little churchyard in this village. The body was taken direct from the train to the church, which was newly filled by friends of the family, and where a brief service was held. Rev. H. Leggo, the rector, officiating. The church choir was also in attendance.

Rev. R. W. Norwood who was himself rector here in the year 1900, succeeding his late father, made a brief address feeling referring to the sympathetic welcome he received on arrival and the warm place he had in his native Province. On the other hand it is a source of gratification to Mr. Norwood's many friends here to know of his great success in a large field. An added touch of sadness in connection with this death was that Mrs. Norwood, senior, widow of Rev. Joseph W. Norwood was on her way from Hubbard to spend the winter in Philadelphia and arrived in Cambridge, Mass., just a few hours to late to see her son alive.—Halifax Chronicle.

Help every worthy man, every enterprise and encourage every good man to locate here.

WHEN WHO STEAL WIVES.

English Journal Asks: "Why Should They Go Free?"
England to-day is a land strewn with the wreckage of homes, says Pearson's Weekly.
All over the country there are signs of the breaking up of family life upon a scale greater than ever before. The ties of marriage are being treated with contempt by a type of man who stops at nothing in pursuing an attack on another man's honor.
The result is that at the present time the divorce courts are working under such pressure dealing with petitions for divorce presented by husbands who, on returning from service have found that their wives have been taken of their benches by home-wreckers.
Many people think it is a serious case in our legal system that is not only not only continuing to grow but is actually increasing. This is not only the number of cases that are being taken down for hearing but the number of men who have been let loose on the streets to go and rob the women of their wives, regardless of the fact that by so doing he is causing untold misery by breaking up homes.
The fact that there is no legal way for this sort of affair has led to a sort of law which is called "personation" which sets out to punish the offender. Several notable examples have occurred during the past few years, resulting in the loss of the home-wrecker at the cost of the husband.
To many people this may seem a sorry way of dealing with the offence, but the majority agree that, however silly the guilty one may deserve a fate, it is far more desirable that the offender should be meted out a jail term in a court of law.
Human nature is always liable to be led in the heat of passion, and in some cases the home-wrecker has actually met a just fate in others there have been grave consequences.
As the law stands at present, however, there is every encouragement for the man who has suffered at the hands of one of these scoundrels to exact his own price.
The result is that, unless something is done to remedy the evil, the country will be swarmed by more persons than ever before. The number of men whose lives have been ruined by the home-wrecker is considerably increased, and some of them, fired with rage for killing as the outcome of a wrong, will stop at nothing to wipe out the injury they are sustained.
It is worth noting the husband or wife is often at fault and the imposition of a co-respondent is merely a matter of a series of troubles. Yet from cases of this kind there emerges one fact, namely, that there is a man who looks upon every case as his own, who is prepared to go almost to any length to reach his own ends.

SCHOOL PROBLEMS.

Touching the matter of teachers' salaries and the situation of affairs in relation to New Brunswick schools, a very interesting address was delivered by Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, at a Teachers' Institute in Moncton last week. There was, he said, a wide shortage of teachers in the province generally. That condition was not improving, but was being made worse by the fact that the attendance at the Nova Scotia Normal School is only half that of last year and at our own Normal School in Fredericton only two-thirds of last year's enrollment. Thus if salaries were increased at once to a scale that would attract student teachers, it would take some time to relieve the shortage of teachers. In the west the plan of providing a home for the teacher is growing in favor. In this province at present four hundred dollars is not as good as \$200 was a dozen years ago.
Dr. Carter urged the need of a more satisfactory compulsory attendance law for the province, and this is a matter the legislature should deal with as soon as possible. There are far too many literates, and too many who can barely read and write; while too many boys and girls leave school before they have passed the fourth grade. It is for the legislature to remedy this very undesirable state of affairs.—St. John Globe.

THE RESTIGOUCHE RECOUNT.

So far as his labors in reference to the Restigouche recount are concerned, His Honor Judge McLatchy has finished. His review of that work as given in his lengthy statement shows that so far as the conducting of the election is concerned we have much to learn. Out of twenty-eight polling stations only seven were found to comply with the provisions of the election act. Was this ignorance or gross carelessness?
The returning officer made some mistakes but his deputies made many more.
There has been such gross neglect and carelessness in conducting this election that it would seem as right and proper that another election be held so that the matter may be straightened out.

NO TRACE OF ZEPPELIN HAVE.

Show us some of the damage done by the Zeppelin, is the first demand of the House of Commons in the House of Commons in London. The House of Commons, Westminster Abbey, were set back to be visited over an inspection of the few remaining socks of London's great war.

Why is that all? they chorus as they gather in groups around the base of Cleopatra's Needle, on the Thames Embankment, snap-shots of the splintered bits on the granite base of the monument. Their fingers are in the metal statues that were made by using fragments.
Disappointment is inevitably expressed for the truth is that London shows no trace of the Zeppelin and Goba raids that are worth crossing the street to see. At Lincoln's Inn and Gray's Inn there are small, but not filled with any monument, but such "raids" make no appeal to the imagination.
Out in the working-class suburbs, where small houses were blown to bits, the damage was worse, but even there does not all the misery and the homeless horror of the invisible death that hovered nightly over nine million people, and that why the tourists go on to France convinced that "bomb-shattered" London is a reality.
Another source of disappointment is that there are no genuine souvenirs of the raids that are worth a small trade to be done in the inevitable "raids," which some of the people living in the bombed districts have collected, with an eye to the American demand.

Prince Albert.

BIG REDUCION IN LUMBER CUT

Will Only be About Fifty Per Cent. of Last Year's.

The quantity of lumber cut in New Brunswick during the coming winter will be less than fifty per cent of this year's amount. The principal reason is served as it was served in 1793, men who have been in Fredericton the past few days.

On the North Shore, it is said reductions are even greater than elsewhere and the curtailment will result in the cut not amounting to but little more than one third in some cases of this year's output according to lumbermen who have been in Fredericton the past few days.

CONTINENTAL LUMBER CO. Adjustment of the insurance losses on the plant of the Continental Lumber Company at Charlo, N. B., destroyed by fire on September 24th, discloses the fact that the fire was most costly from an insurance standpoint in New Brunswick in recent years. The total insurance carried was about \$425,000 and in the adjustment which has just been completed from the insurance loss was placed at approximately \$365,000, or nearly eighty-six per cent of the amount carried.

The approximate individual losses are as follows: Continental Lumber Company on the plant and contents, other buildings and contents and lumber on the premises, \$230,000, or about 94 per cent. Goodday and Company, Ltd., Quebec, on lumber, \$49,000, or about 75 per cent. Montreal Lumber Company Ltd., Montreal, on lumber \$17,350, or about 76 per cent. Brownlie and Company, Ltd., Glasgow, Scotland, on lumber, \$65,500, or about 51 per cent.

The mill which was recently wiped out was one of the most up-to-date in the province, having been constructed in 1914 to replace one which was destroyed after having been struck by lightning. The owners have decided to rebuild immediately and already the foundations are being laid for a new mill.—Canadian Lumberman.

The charges that were made against me during the election were answered by me at the fourteen public meetings I addressed during the campaign, and in spite of the support that was given to my Liberal opponent by four prominent members of the Provincial government, plus Michael, M.P. for the united counties of Restigouche and Gloucester, Mr. McAllister, M.P. for the united counties of Gloucester and Kent, with the assistance of an army of Road and bridge officials, I polled 1500 votes to Mr. LeBlanc's 1615, and I really believe that if the present of the ballots was conducted in the same manner, as took place in the City of St. John, where, ballots with the X were counted, I would have led Mr. LeBlanc by a fair majority.

The statement that the disappointed candidates are trying to impress on the electors, that I was in the field to assist in the election of Conservative candidates, is as false as all the other canvasses circulated about me. As I state in a letter to Premier Foster, My conscience told me, that in view of my long experience in public life, I felt it my duty to offer my services to the electors of my native county, and I was going to be nominated and no inducement would deter me from that decision and as a liberal and supporter of this government.

The great vote I polled in all parts of the county against such terrible odds is a great credit to me. The great courtesy that was extended to me in all the parishes and towns, is very pleasing to me, and in my native town, in which I have resided continuously since Sept. 1881, (when I came from New Richmond, P. Q.) and in which I am known as a citizen, a merchant etc. I not only led the poll, but I took a majority of 122 votes over Mr. LeBlanc, who during four years, had distributed the government patronage.

My accusers say that I should go before the courts to establish my innocence of charges made. I have been before the greatest court in the province, the whole county, another Not ten persons in the county, take any stock in what has been said and as for a new charge made since the election "That I did not accept the unionist nomination, at the last federal election, because I was not offered enough money, is as false as any charge can be. The three gentlemen who offered me the nomination, on behalf of the unionist convention, can verify the fact, that I declined without offering any condition whatever.

Messrs. LeBlanc and Harrison, defeated candidates, who had great assistance in their campaign, should bow to public opinion, should take their medicine as Mr. Duncan and I are taking it. They should not try and disfranchise the whole county, another style of attacking his opponents instead of rendering an account of his own stewardship might be adopted in the future on the hustings. He may not relish the idea of hearing about some of his weak points as a politician. My course ever since I offered my services to the electors of my native county in June 1887, was to announce my own programme and never to try and win a vote by decrying my opponent. That is the esteem of the people at large. I acted in the same way during the recent campaign, and although a loser I am well satisfied with the result, considering that outside of the assistance I received from Mr. W. D. Duncan and his talented daughter, Miss Duncan, and a speech made at Flat Lanes from Mr. Joseph Duncun, I fought the whole election alone, and with no other expense than half the cost of halls and printing besides my own travelling expenses.

If my accusers are very anxious to have another trial at election business, let them bring on another election in Restigouche County. Another lawyer besides Mr. M. A. Kelly will be asked to prepare my nomination paper.

In the meantime I thank those who voted for me. I thank all for the courtesy extended to me during the election. It was a great pleasure to meet many old friends and former supporters. It was a delight to become acquainted with many citizens I had not had the pleasure of acquaintance before, and the great comfort enjoyed by the people of our growing and prosperous county, which I witnessed personally, during my travels through Restigouche, more than recompensed me for my work and expense during the campaign.

LARGE INCREASE IN INLAND REVENUES

\$8,000,000 More in Oct. 1920 Than in Oct. 1919—Due to New Taxes. OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—An increase of \$8,966,775.74 in the inland revenue returns for the month of October as compared with the returns for October 1919 is shown in the monthly statement of the department of inland revenue. The total for the month just closed was \$12,412,242.43 as against \$4,774,466.69 for October 1919. Chief figures in the summary issued by the department were: Excise, October 1919, \$3,692,244.15, against \$3,290,734.77 for October, 1920. Excise seizures, October 1919, \$19,978.35, against \$14,174.46 last month. War tax, October 1919, \$1,000,097.07, against \$9,575,298.56 in the month just closed. The revenue from the methylated spirits in October 1919 was \$41,885.65 as against \$20,374.40 last month. The increase in war tax revenue over the corresponding month of last year was \$3,475,671.49 and the net increase for the month of last year was 8,475,271.49 and the net increase for the month of October, \$8,966,775.74.
