CINCINNATI, Aug. 16.—One of the attractions at Coney Island yesterday afternoon was a balloon ascension by Miss Annie Harkness, whose home is in Terre Haute, Ind. The young lady has acquired some distinction as an aeronaut and had made a number of daring parachute descents from balloons. Yesterday afternoon a large crowd of pleasure seekers thronged the grounds to witness the ascension.

At the appointed time the young lady came forward and stepped into the car. The ropes were loosened at once and the balloon rose rapidly. The eager throng stood with bated breath gazing upward at the daring aeronaut. The hum of excitement grew louder as preparations for the descent were made. At an elevation of about 500 feet the parachute was let go. The buzz from the gazing multitude was at its height. The onlookers watched with trembling delight. The parachute slowly began to unfold. Suddenly there was a dreadful hush like the silence of death. The parachute had closed and with its human burden was falling with frightful velocity. Then the silence was broken by the shrieks of fainting women, of children wailing and crying, and men turned away their faces to shut out the awful sight. Faster and faster descended the parachute. More intense and terrible became the strain upon the madly-excited crowd, as horrostricken it stood awaiting the fearful end. Suddenly there struck upon the ears a dull sound—the end had come. A life had gone out in the midst of pleasure. Quickly a sympathetic crowd gathered about the lifeless, mangled form of the poor girl as she lay in a crushed mass upon the ground. SERIOUS SITUATION

Resulting From the Russian Ukase Regarding Grain.

The Measure Viewed Almost as a Death Sentence.

Distress Among the People of Man Prussia on the Increase.

Levdon, Aug. 15.—The Russian abase prohibiting the export of grain is hourly assuming more importance in the public estimation. It is regarded there as an entirely political act and one that cannot well be met by a counter movement. The Times' St. Petersburg correspondent voices the prevailing opinion here. He says it is declared in well informed circles that the prohibition of rye exports was not warranted by the condition of the crops and that the ukase was a political move directed against Germany and Austria. One of the first results of the prohibition is an advance in the price of maize. As a matter of course American corn will be in great demand, as it is the only possible substitute for rye in those countries, like Northern Germany, where rye bread is the staple of the people's food. There has been a sudden change in the tone of certain German papers toward the United States since the Russian prohibition. The writers now generally look to the United States for relief, not only for the present but in the future.

The news from Eastern Prussia is of the gloomiest character. The people regard the rye ukase almost as a death sentence. The scenes described are sheartrending. The scenes described are sheartrending. Numerous applications have been made to the local authorities for relief, and they are fast consuming the money devoted to the sustenance of the poor. There is some talk of petitioning the Prussian Government to issue army rations to the distressed. In the manufacturing centers, especially Chemnitz, Playen and Greiz, the distress of the people is increasing. Among the peasantry in Silesia the general feeling is that of apathetic despair. The prevalent distress reacts on the Jowish refugees, and everywhere along the the border they are being turned back unless absolutely equipped with funds to take care of themselves.

Amsterdam, Aug. 16.—The world's convention of Young Men's Christian Associations continued Saturday. The topic, "The Association Secretaries, Their Work, Their Positions, the Best Means of Training Able, Consecrated Men to fill This Important Position," was opened with papers by Herr Helbing, of Germany, by Karl Fries, of Stockholm, and Edwin F. See, of Brooklyn, N. Y. Mr. See's paper showed that there are 1.186 secretaries, assistants of Brooklyn, N. Y. Mr. See's paper showed that there are 1,186 secretaries, assistants and gymnasium directors employed by the American associations, au increase of about 40 per cent. since the last world's convention. In it reference was made to the importance of the association training schools at Springfield and Chicago, and to the fact that many secretaries are entering the work from the college associations. Special emphasis was laid upon the spiritual life of the secretaries and the growth in Bible study among American young men under their direction. The paper was placed in the hands of the delegates in English, Dutch, French and German, and it excited much interest.

No Bail for Handcock - Sunday Dis-turbances in the Park.

Toronto, Aug. 16.—Mr. Justice Street on Saturday stated to counsel for Edward Handcock, committed for trial for the murder of his daughter Sophia, that he could not overstep the usual practice and liberate Handcock on bail. 


