





Market, broken stone, \$600. Weigh scales and conveniences Drinking fountains, \$700.

As To the Knife. These reach a total of \$31,975. Of this the improvements to the exhibition grounds amounting to \$3,000 will possibly have to be made as they are much needed. The drinking fountains were voted on last year and that item may have to go. The repairs to the courthouse are said to be absolutely necessary. With these three items out

of the way, there is still a sum of

\$26,000 which may be cut off. Then the figures of the water com mission may be pared somewhat. This year the estimated receipts will be \$29,000, but there is a sum of \$27,000 to be expended out of the revenue. 




