



The federal system was the only possible means of uniting the Canadian provinces. Sir John Macdonald. with the American civil war in mind, favored a legislative union, but he saw that conditions forbade it. In only alternative, because of the refusal of the various colonies to surrender all their self-governing powers to a central authority. In South Africa, however, a different solution is probable.

It has been argued that South Africa is not rich enough to support four state parliaments in addition to the central parliament, and that the task of distinguishing between state and federal duties would be exceptionally difficult in such a country. 

FERDINAND FEARS ASSASSINS ROOSEVELT ASKS NO PRIVILEGE

Hunting License for East African Trip.

London, Oct. 28 .- President Roosevelt not having signified his intention .of asking special privileges for his nunting trip in British East Africa through diplomatic channels, it is supposed that he will take out an ordinary £50 license from the colonial office.

This, however, has not yet been applied for, though it is always usual to demand such licenses several months in advance. Under them each hunter is limited to 60 animals, except lions, leopards and crocodiles, of which he may shoot as many as he wishes.

"As set forth in the new licenses the President may kill "two elephants, two rhinoceri, ten hippopotami, twentyone antelopes, two buffaloes, two earth hogs, two earth wolves, ten chevrotians, two monkeys, two marabou storks, two ostriches, two egrets, and one chimpanzee." Giraffes, wild asses, & Blan secretary birds and a number of other species are forbidden to any nimrod not armed with special privileges.
