



The British Foreign Minister, Lord Lansdowne, tells Russia some plain truths in very plain language. He uses no diplomatic varnish. In fact, the tone of his dispatches to St. Petersburg could not be more severe if the two nations were on the verge of hostilities. The correspondence has been just published in a British blue-book, and is dividing interest with the war in the Far East.

The Tibetan trouble has been brewing since 1893, when the Tibetans began to show bad faith in the observance of their trade treaties with the Indian Government. The Viceroy of India, Lord Curzon, tried to open direct communications with the Grand Lama of Tibet, but the Lama refused to receive any dispatches addressed to him, while at the same time he was publicly sending a mission to Russia. The Russian Government assured Lord Lansdowne that this mission had no political significance, but the attitude of the Tibetans grew steadily more unfriendly to Great Britain, and the Lama continued to return Lord Curzon's letters unopened. The latter, in a dispatch to Lord Lansdowne, dated Feb. 13. 1902. said:


