



IFIRST CONCERT SPLENDID ONE

Magnificent Rendering of "Eliiah" at Princess Rink in May Festival.

Of the three concerts of the 1905 May Festival, the hall mark of success was as surely written on the first two, as t doubtless will be on tonight's, And aside from the activity of Mr. John Pringle and the associated officers of St. Andrew's Society, there is no doubt that the name of Theodore Thomas exerted its accustomed magical effect here as elsewhere.

When a man rises to such eminence as to have his name a household word, the catholicity of his taste proverbial, his character and characteristics generally emulated, and, above all, the organization which represents mmum bonum of his life made the standard, both of comparison and emulation among 80,000,000 of people, then it is not to be wondered at that Theodore Thomas should affect the

And the meaning of "it"—the name "Theodore Thomas"—to the musicians of this district was that for our own education and instruction we should 'eat of the fruit of his labor," taste what had been ripening under his cul-tivation for 20 long years.

That there should be an impression of incongruity when a pupil attempts to fill the place of the dead master is not to be wondered at. But it is the greatest fault of Mr. Stock that he is "his father's son," that he plays with something of hesitation upon the harp so carefully tuned for the hands of Theodore Thomas. There is no doubt that he has in him the material for making a conductor of more than ordinary ability.
