The County of York has a good system introduced by Judge Win-chester, which this County might well afford to copy. There, an extra session of the Peace is held each year at which all the Justices of the Peace of the County are invited to be present. At this meeting the County Judge explains the different statutes, and the amendments which have been made during the previous year, making these important officers more thoroughly versed with the law which they are called upon to inter-

The High County Constable also makes an annual report at this meeting, on the work of the year, and through it the County Con-stables' list is yearly revised. The High Constable's report contains recommendations upon the men who are now sworn in as constables, and those who are shown to be incompetent are struck off and new and efficient officers are appointed. In this way the County Constables' list is kept thoroughly up-to-date, and the law is more apt to be properly enforced.

At present there is practically no system in the County Constables' department, and any department without a good working system cannot help but be inefficient and to a great degree useless. It is time that some thing were done in Kent, and if a soheme such as this were introduced, it would no doubt be instrumental in overcoming many of the difficulties at present contended with.

# THE TOILS

The Former Manager Of The Ontario Bank Jailed For The Night

ON CHARGE OF STEALING

Toroato, Nov. 7.—The re-arrest of Charles McGill, erstwhile manager of the Ontario Bank, on the charge of embezziement was the sensational dethe Ontario Bank, on the charge of embezzlement was the sensational denouement of the continuation before Magistrate Denison of the preliminary proceedings in the process of commitment for trial. Over Mr. McGill's head is now hanging a charge, recognized by the court, as much more serious than that of falsifying returns to the Government in contravention of the banking law. The ex-manager is now amenable to the criminal code, and the stubborn refusal of Magistrate Denison to allow ball emphasized strongly the nature of the position of Mr. McGill.

Spent Night In Jail.

The Attorney-General was less obdurate to the urgings of E. F. B. Johnston, K. C., counsel for the accused. Hon. Mr. Foy, agreeing last night to allow the prisoner his freedom on an additional surety of \$25,000. Bondsmen could not be found on short notice, and the banker spent the night in the jail over the Don.

It is confidently stated, however, that the required bond, which is equal to the one previously furnished for Mr. McGill's release on the "misdemeanor" charge, will be forthcoming this morning, when he will regain his liberty once more, to appear in court on Friday to answer the dual charges.

The charges against Mr. Cockburn will not be heard until after McGill is disposed of.

The information sworn out was the outgrowth of the most striking evidence in yeaterday's proceedings, that brought to light many traces of what was manifestly deliberate juggling with accounts to preserve the credit of the bank in the eyes of the world. The official blue document, read as follows:

"That Charles McGill, between the years 1900 and 1906, at the City of Toronto, in the County of York, did. contrary to law, steal the sum of \$136, 649,91 in money, the property of the

contrary to law, steal the sum of \$136,-649.91 in money, the property of the Ontario Bank."

It was the story revealed in the inspection of the bank's reserve accounts by James Bicknell that laid the basis for the charge and it was at the outset of the examination of Transfer Clerk Richard Chenoweth that the mine was sprung and the hint given

set of the examination of Transfer Clerk Richard Chenoweth that the mine was sprung, and the hint given of the cilmax that was to come three hours later in the placing of the exmanager in custody.

Star Witnesses.

There were but two witnesses during the afternoon Mr. Chenoweth and A. E. Ames, of A. E. Ames & Co., the well-known brokerage firm. The former was on the stand for almost three hours, and bore the brunt of a searching enquiry with a self-possession that was shaken only once or twice under the battering-ram tactics of Mr. Johnston, who forced the plain admission that he had altered accounts and figures with the intent of concealing the true position of the bank. It was claimed by Mr. Chenoweth, who proved an admirable witness from the standpoint of readiness to impart information, and ease in handling figures under question, that the changes were made entirely under instructions from the general manager.

Mr. Ames' evidence summed up, was

that he was unaware that his account had been written off in the bank's books, and that the bank had suffered loss through his firm, and that McGill had speculated extensively in highly-fluctuating securities, but, so far as the broker was aware, on his own personal account.

account. The Denouement.

It was after 6 o'clock and while Mr. Ames was still on the stand, that the magistrate called upon Mr. McGill to stand up. The ex-manager rose steadily from his seat at the desk and was advised that a more serious charge had been laid against him. He exhibited no tremor during the reading of the information, and to the usual question, re-

mation, and to the usual question, replied, "Not guilty," in a low but firm voice.

The court informed Mr. Johnston that ball could not be accepted for his client. Mr. McGill's counsel took exception to the ruling in a few words, and the magistrate went on to say that ception to the ruling in a few words, and the magistrate went on to say that there was a great difference between the two charges. The first was merely a misdemeanor, the present charge was a much more serious one. It named a large amount and the act constituted a theft under the criminal code.

Mr. Johnston mildly dissented, and the magistrate referred to the "whole-sale appropriation"

Others Equally Guilty.

"What about these other men?" demanded Mr. Johnston, hotty. "They are manifestly in the same box as he is."

"Then lay an information against them," retorted the magistrate sharply. Mr. Johnston's warm rejoinder was that the evidence had "clearly showed the state of affairs," and yet an information had only been laid against his client, which was unfair.

After adjournment Mr. Johnston declared in vigorous language that there was no hope of getting justice from the court.

Maiter Chenoweth, the chief witness, has for six years been transfer clerk at the Ontario Bank, and, acting under instructions from McGill, he had been systematically jugging the figures to create deception as to the true state of the bank. He knew things were wrong, but told no one.

The August report was signed by Vice-President Donald McKay, Manager Charles McGill and Walter Chenoweth, pro-chief accountant, McGill signed it in blank, expecting to be away. The Government was deceived by false transfers to "current loans in Canada" account.

# HON.G.W. ROSS WASCARELESS

The sea covers many secrets, but none more mysterious than that of the vessel which sails from a port and is never heard of again. "Missing" is an ominous word on the shipping list, and old saits who note it shake their heads with a sigh as they recall memories of brave captains and hardy crews. Within the last twelve months more than half a dozen good sized craft, among them two deep sailers, have gone to the ocean graveyard.

South street is still talking of the ill-fated Pepe Ramirez, which sailed from New York December 13 last into oblivion. The Pepe Ramirez was a stout three-masted schooner, built at Columbia Falls, Me, in 1893, and owned by Swan & Son, of 32 South street. She earried a cargo of 600 tons of cement, bound for Brunswick, Ga., where she was to load lumber and return to New York, She had a crew of eight men, and put out on the morning of the 13th with no forebodings on account of the unlucky date, and with every indication of a successful voyage. Five days after she left New York came furious gales, and it is supposed that she foundered in one of these.

Her master was Captain Lorenzo Jordan, who had sailed out of New York for thirty-five years, and was known all along the Atlantic seaboard. Just before sailing he announced that it would be his last voyage, as his sixty-two years were weighing upon him, and he wanted to pass the rest of his life in peace and quiet at his old home in Ellsworth, Me., where he was born, and where his widow and two children still live.

children still live.

It is a curious fact that Mate John Willams, who had been in his service for ten years, was also from Ellsworth; as was the cook, who came down from Ellsworth for this his first voyage, which proved to be also his last.

Strange Coincidence.

Don Pepe Ramirez, a wealthy Spanish sugar planter of Manzanilla, Cuba, for whom the schooner was named died the same day that it is supposed the vessel went down, and the more superstitious of the South street sailormen who knew captain and crew think it is more than a coincidence. Old salts also call attention to the fact that during the same week the Old salts also call attention to the fact that during the same week the Lejox, a sister ship of the Pepe Ramirez, also built at Eliswoyth and bound for New York from Brunswick, was run into by the General Ames off Barnegat and so badly injured that she filled and was about to sink when a pilot boat rescued her, and now holds her for salvage. The Pepe Ramirez was the fourth vessel that Swan & Son have lost since they began business have lost since they began business forty years ago.

She sailed from Newcastle on Nevember 11 last, bound for Algoa Bay On the night of Christmas Eve the Coimbatore, during a storm off the coast of south-west Australia, near Cape Leeuwin, was in collision with the ship Zinita. The tossing seas threw them apart, and as the vessels were disengaging the captain of the Zinita heard the master of the Coimbatore shout, "Don't leave us; we're sinking."
