### **BUILDING THE GRANARY**

Strength and Convenience Should be Carefully Considered.

Reinforced Concrete Is Preferable to Timber — It Makes the Granary Safer From Rodents — Roguing

(Contributed by Ostario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

No hard and fast rules can be laid down for the erection of a convenient and efficient granary. Each problem requires a knowledge of local conditions and requirements. Granaries, in the majority of cases, are built-in enclosures on the barn floor, and constructed with too little regard for strength, durability and convenience. strength, durability and convenience.
These structures should be located immediately over the feed room, each bin having a chute with a controlling slide, or a canvas distributor to convey the grain to the hopper of the grinder; or, if the grain is intended for market, to a sack placed on the scales below the chute ready to receive it. To facilitate emptying the grain, the floor of the bins should be sloping.

The important consideration in the construction of granaries and bins for loose grain is to be sure that the structure is designed with sufficient strength to prevent bulging of the sides and springing of the floor; for grain, owing to its enormous outward thrust, corresponding somewhat to that of water, has a tendency to burst the sides unless well braced or supported. Timber construction requires frequent repairs to prevent decay and general depreciation from use. It is always liable to climatic conditions. The boards will crack and shrink in the summer when the bins may be empty, and when the new grain is dumped into the bins an enormous quantity promptly disappears into the cracks and crevices and through mice holes, entailing considerable loss to the farmer, to the consumer and to the nation. Thousands of bushels of grain are, in this way, annually lost to the producers through sheer indifference to the condition of the granary. Yet this profitable waste may be easily remedied and made secure by lining the bins with sheet metal.

granaries, because it is both dampproof and rat-proof, two very essential factors in the construction of
granaries.

Concrete properly made to suit existing conditions, is absolutely imprevious to moisture, and can be kept as dry as any structure of wood ever built. The experience of many farmers is that grain mature enough to be placed in storage will not spoil on contact with concrete, nor will corn mold, provided there is good ventilation and the roof is tight. To get rid of rats and mice destroy their nesting place and to this end concrete is pre-eminently the best material and is recommended for all farm structures.

Under average, present day, conditions a reinforced concrete granary may represent an additional outlay of about 25 per cent. over that required to construct of timber, but the high efficiency distinctive of concrete quickly offsets this increased initial cost. Concrete construction has many, in short, important advantages. The contents are safe from the depredations of rodents, its damp-proof, requires neither paint nor repairs, is fireproof, the grain is perfectly preserved under ail conditions of climate and temperature, and the resulting structure is practically everlasting.—John Evans, O. In heating value one standard cord of well seasoned hickory, oak, beech, birch, hard maple, ash, elm, locust or cherry wood is approximately equal to one ton (2,000 pounds) of anthracite coal, according to estimates by the forest service, United States Department of Agriculture, However, a cord and a half of soft maple and two cords of cedar, poplar or basswood are required to give the same amount of heat.

One cord of mixed wood, well seasoned, equals in heating value at least one ton of average grade bituminous coal.

#### PLANTS FROM CUTTINGS

Plant Propagation as Described by a Master Hand.

Your Own Developer of Geran-iums—Light Fall Pruning of Orchards Is Safe—The Barberry Hedge a Spreader of Rust In Grains



Toward the end of the summer, the amateur flower grower often wonders how the stock of geraniums in the flower border can be increased and preserved by some other means than by taking up the old plants in the autumn; the last named method the autumn; the last named method not having, perhaps, proved successful in past seasons. By starting fairly early, toward the end of August, before coid chilly nights appear, a nice supply of young plants, more especially of all kinds of geraniums of the flowering kind, or those having fragrant leaves, or even the bronse or silver leaves kinds, can be had by starting cuttings or silps of these plants. First of all obtain a shallow box about three inches deep, ten or twelve inches wide, and from twelve to twenty-four inches in length; an empty haddie (fish) box will do very well. It should have some small holes bored through the bottom for drainage. Pack this box firmly with moist, clean, gritty sand; sand that will make good stone mortar will do. Then take the terminal or top part of the young growth of plants about four or five inches in length, each shoot or cutting having from four to six joints where leaves are produced. Make the base of the cutting just below one of these nodes or leaf joints, making a clean cut with a sharp knife flat across. Cut off some of the lower leaves, leaving two or three leaves at the top. Cut off all bloom buds and blossoms where possible. Make a hole or drill in the west sand deep enough to set fully the length of stem of cuttings in the sand. Water them well once, and keep the sand moist until cuttings are rooted, which should be in five or six weeks' time. The box can be set out of doors in partial shade until the first week in September when they can be taken into the window. When cuttings have roots about an inch in length dig them carefully from the sand without injuring the roots and pot them singly into small 2½ inch pots or set them shout two inches apart in well drained shallow boxes in a soil made up of one part sand, one part leaf mould, and about six parts of light loamy soil enriched with one part of dry pulverized cow manure from the pasture field. This last is one of the best possible fertilizers for soil for pot plants. Set the young plants in the window in a t

Determining the Need of Chemical Fertilizers

Petermining the Need of Chemical Fertilizers.

The appearance of the growing leaves and tissues can frequently be taken as an indicator for the presence or absence of nitrogen in sufficient quantity to satisfy the maximum demands of plants. A yellowish lings or a dull green is an indicator of abundant nitrogen. Drouth and excessive moisture may also cause the yellowing or weakening in the coloration of foliage. Failure of clover on lands that at one time produced good yields may be taken as an indication of a shortage of lime and phosphorous. A decline in the wheat grade after years of wheat production can generally be attributed to a shortage or failure in the phosphorous supply.

However, these generally observed conditions are not sufficiently accurate to be a definite guide, and should be supplemented by a miniature field test, using square rod areas with various chemical mixture applications. This is accomplished by simply staking off a representative area one rod wide and six rods long, and dividing it into six plots. This done apply before seeding on plot one, nitrosen; on plot two, phosphorous; on plot three, potash; on plot four, nitrogen and potash; on plot four, nitrogen, potash and phosphorous; plot six, potash and phosphorous. The adjoining soil will serve as a cheek plot for all areas. By watching the plots during the crop season and the following two years, a fairly definite conclusion relative to the needs of the field can be secured.

Every soil area should be studied by itself, since the requirements of one field may differ from the requirements of the field adjoining.—

The gestation period of the cow is nine and one-third months, or two hundred and eighty days. Sometimes a breeder figures it as nine months to the day, and then worries because it seems to run over a couple of weeks and the calf is not born when supposedly due. For example, a cow bred on January 1 would be due about October 7 and not October 1. A cow bred on February 1 would be due about November 8, not on November 1. The date of calving is found by counting forward the two hundred and eighty days from the date of service.
