



The issuing of standard hotel licenses one dollar each will be the chief item of business of the Ontario License Board as reconstituted under the Ontario Temperance Act. These licenses permit hotels to sell cigars, cigarettes and tobacco, soft drinks and ice cream, and conduct cafes and restaurants. It may not be generally understood that standard licensed hotels will be the only hotels under the new law with such priveleges, and so far as other hotels are concerned, will have the monopely of this business. Others who attempt to sell such goods will be liable to a fine of \$10 and costs.

It is not anticipated that there will be much trouble about the cancellation of leases on hotel property when the "dry" law comes into effect on September 16. Most hotels are leased under contract providing that in the event of the license being with held the lease may be terminated forth with.
