The Elections.

Now that the main battle of ballots is over, and from a cursory review of causes and effects, we cannot believe that any reasonable man will deny that the unfortunate multiplicity of candidates and a division of forces and methods on the part of the opposition in this county is entirely responsible for the election of the government candidates. We believe this notwithstanding the fact that no such outrageous system of bribery was ever before promulgated in this or any other county in the province as was exercised by the friends of the Murray government from the first. The government was thoroughly discredited throughout the whole valley and especially in this county, and a most desperate defense of the administration's strongholds was expected, but nothing so barefaced, so general, and in such dimensions could have ever been anticipated by anyone. In this county not the slightest pretense of secrecy was manifested. Rum was forced upon the unwilling, and the willing only had to ask for it, and a very conservative and moderate estimate has been made by a gentleman not connected with the campaign, but who has been over the entire county, who says that more than \$25,000 in cash was used in the purchase of votes only, besides which commissions or promises were as thick and plentiful as were the wants of the electorate. Besides the immense patronage of two governments was issued to the capacity limit, and no attempt was made to confine this all powerful element to the humble farmer and artisan, but its virtues were exhibited when brought to play upon the aristocrat and opulent citizen.

The Temperance Alliance has done noble pioneer work for temperance, independence and morality, and not withstanding discouragements and the sneers of the forces of iniquity, their ideals are bound to triumph. We all have seen the wicked in great power, and spreading himself like a green bay tree, yet he will pass away and be 'not.'

For those citizens of this county, even of Wolfville, who have supported candidates for whom they had no word of approval and for whose candidature they expressed great disapproval, and yet who for party and partisan reasons supported, we have nothing but entire sympathy. If their consciences are clear, then their sense of business. We are proud to feel that we do not belong to that class of political states of thought, we have graduated from it, and sympathize with the undergraduates.

For the man or men of position, influence, standing in the community, who for fancied needs and exigencies sold themselves to vote for what they despised, we have only the most entire contempt, and for ourselves we would prefer the humblest and most retired position in society and life, than to stand in their shoes and feed at the political trough from which they have been feeding in recent days, and from which they anticipate great fullness and satisfaction.

The election of representatives to the House of Assembly of this province on Wednesday resulted in the return to power of the Murray government by a decreased majority. The opposition carried eleven seats: two in Colchester, two in Cape Breton, one in Pictou, one in Hants, one in Annapolis, one in Queens, one in Lunenburg, one in Antigonish and one in Yarmouth. Three members of the government went down to defeat: Hon. Christopher Chisholm, commissioner mines and works, Hon. B. F. Pearson and Hon. H. S. LeBlanc. Mr. C. E. Tanner, the clever leader of the conservative party in Nova Scotia, is among those elected, and his return to office will not only greatly strengthen the opposition but be of great value to the people of Nova Scotia. Mr. Tanner is acknowledged to be the best informed man on provincial affairs in the province, and all patriotic citizens of both parties will rejoice at his election. In Lunenburg Mr. J. W. Margeson, a native of this county, and a graduate of Acadia, is among the successful ones. He will be heard from in the new house. Taken altogether, the opposition will be a strong one, and the interests of the province should be well safeguarded.

The electors of Kings county have shown base ingratitude to Mr. Charles A. Campbell, who has so faithfully represented the constituency during the past five years, and deserve to be represented by Covert and Wickwire, to whom they have transferred their support. They will probably have ample time to repent as leaders.

Mr. Campbell has no reason to be ashamed of the showing which he made, considering the influence at work to bring about his defeat. The result shows that there are yet a goodly number in Kings county who refuse to bow the knee to Reid.

Mr. Reid put up a splendid fight and the result in Wolfville especially demonstrated his popularity in his home community. Had the game been played out according to the rule there can be no doubt but that he would have been elected.

Wolfville was one of the places that supported Reid well at the recent election. Mr. Reid had a clear majority of twenty votes, and the fact that he went to Mr. Parker in an open fight would have placed Mr. Campbell at the head of the poll.

Town Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held at the new Town Hall on Thursday evening, June 11th, with the Mayor and all the Council, except Coun. Sleep, present.

Written reports were presented by the Water and Finance committees, the other committees giving verbal reports through their chairmen.

The Water committee reported a new hydrant opposite the residence of Mrs. Eastwood, on Main street, new water boxes on Main street from Linden Ave. to the campus; service pipes renewed to T. E. Hutchinson's, A. V. Rand's store, R. E. Harris' store, C. E. Starr's store, and residences of William Chipman and C. R. Bill. Also connection with three lots of R. W. Starns on Main street, lots of A. J. Woodman and W. B. Hardwick.

The Finance committee reported the receipts for month of May \$1091.01, and a credit bank balance of \$176.13. A communication was read from Arthur Roberts, Secretary of N. S. Municipalities, announcing that a set of standard by-laws was in preparation and requesting a copy of all by-laws of the town. The clerk was directed to comply with this request.

A letter from E. E. Archibald requesting sewerage for Kerosene Hill and enlarged water service was read and supported by Mr. Archibald who was present. It was decided to refer the matter to the Water and Sewerage committee for immediate investigation and report.

Bishop 12.83 The Streets committee reported that the new steam roller had been tested and accepted and that the crusher had also been tested.

Some discussion ensued concerning the fire in Chipman Hall on the night of June 7th, and on request of the Fire Co. through Coun. Hales, it was resolved that the Fire Co. be authorized to purchase some additional supplies as suggested at this meeting, such as hose expanders, hose carriers and ladders, quantity to be left to the discretion of the committee.

Class Banquet 1891.

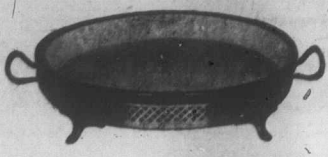
