Shortly before the commencement of the morning service at St. Paul's Church yesterday it was discovered that the wood-work near the stove had ignited, necessitating the tearing down of some plastering, laths, etc., to get at the trouble. After the Christmas holidays, prolonged by some necessary repairs to the engine room, etc., the Archibald Bros. factory opened up in full force this morning, and we were all pleased to hear the sound of their steam whistle. The Archibald Bros. are bold men, as they are determined to "boot" every person anxious to be booted.

Our patience immediately became exhausted when we hear of cases of cruelty to poor dumb animals. When a dog or any other animal becomes vicious or over-mischievous, and it is found necessary to destroy it, that destruction should take place in such a way as to give the least possible suffering to the poor brute. A case came under our notice on Saturday where the greatest torture was meted out to a poor little dog, and that in the presence of its owner, quite a little boy. The facts are these:—A little son of Mr. P. Hyde owned a pet dog, which of late had become almost too friendly with passers-by, and a few days ago it tore a rent in the pants of a resident of the West End. He went to Mrs. Lemond for the dog, to destroy it. The dog was given him at once, and he tied his mouth, and proceeding down the Public Wharf threw the little animal overboard. As no weight had been attached to it the dog began to swim for the shore. The cruel man thereupon took a long boat-hook and actually put the poor brute's eyes out and barbarously jabbed the boat-hook into its side. This was continued until the poor dog was dead; and this took place in the presence of the little owner who with tears in his eyes watched the cruel action of the man. Quite a number of men and children witnessed this, and what a lesson it gave them. We think this should be investigated, and if found as we represent (and we have been very particular to secure our information from reliable sources) the party should be punished. Can we not get a representative of the S. P. C. A. here who would take up such cases and have the cruel perpetrators of such tortures to defenceless animals punished most severely? We certainly should.

Connaught Honored.

A public breakfast was tendered to the Duke of Connaught this morning at the Guild Hall, and an address up to a gold canker was presented to him. He received many congratulations from General of Canada, the official mounchment of which was made yesterday. The Duke spoke upon the South African tour, which had just concluded.

Street Sign Accident.

A heavy sheet metal sign was blown from the roof of a building to-day, and fell among a crowd of shoppers in Market Street, killing 3 and injuring 6.

Taft Rooms Reciprocity.

WASHINGTON, This Morning. President Taft in an address last night, commemorating McKinley's birthday, recalled the last public utterances of McKinley in favor of Reciprocity, the day before he was assassinated, in a speech at the Pan-American Exhibition of Industries. The Canadian agreement, if confirmed by legislative action, said Taft, will be a fitting close to a century's controversies, and will establish permanently good feeling and commercial union between kindred people. Canadians are our neighbours for 3000 miles. She has grown to be a great country, a nation. She does not cause to great forts or to build battleships. She does not attack us and she never will. She extends to us the hand of friendship and proposes closer relations for our mutual benefit. Ought we to decline? The last words of McKinley urge acceptance of Ohio to bring forward for effective action a measure for carrying out a policy, which he proclaimed as his own at the acme of his great career.

NEW YORK HAS GOT GRAIN TRADE.

Evidence adduced before the Interstate Commerce Commission establishes the fact that many ocean steamships leaving New York have water ballast, where once they carried grain. It was alleged that the cause of this was a discrimination by railroads in grain rates in favour of Montreal against New York. It is stated that the export grain business has already been lost by New York.

Dear Mr. Editor,—Your correspondent, "Landlord," in last evening's paper, who is so worried over how he is going to live if the taxes are collected from him instead of the tenant, would try to make the public believe that he is in the landlord business for the good of his health. As the poor man's rent in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred is paid on the monthly plan in advance, I fail to see where the loss comes to the landlord. I am a tenant, paying forty dollars per year, paid monthly in advance, by an agreement between my landlord and me, who is an all right man. I don't think he would object to taking 20 cents per month extra, which would be six per cent. on my rent, thereby securing himself and making it easy for me; or if it is 30 cents extra, if he put the sewer in, as the Council will put in the water free of cost to him, then my wife would not freeze at the tank in such weather as this. Your correspondent may try to pose as a martyr, but I think the Council is doing a very humane act in asking to have the law amended to make it easy for the poor man. Under the law as it now stands, the tenant can be brought to court at any time. Go ahead, Councillors; recommend to the Government this amendment in the Municipal Act. Taft Rooms Reciprocity.

SPECIAL EVENING TELEGRAM. WASHINGTON, This Morning. President Taft in an address last night, commemorating McKinley's birthday, recalled the last public utterances of McKinley in favor of Reciprocity, the day before he was assassinated, in a speech at the Pan-American Exhibition of Industries. The Canadian agreement, if confirmed by legislative action, said Taft, will be a fitting close to a century's controversies, and will establish permanently good feeling and commercial union between kindred people. Canadians are our neighbours for 3000 miles. She has grown to be a great country, a nation. She does not cause to great forts or to build battleships. She does not attack us and she never will. She extends to us the hand of friendship and proposes closer relations for our mutual benefit. Ought we to decline? The last words of McKinley urge acceptance of Ohio to bring forward for effective action a measure for carrying out a policy, which he proclaimed as his own at the acme of his great career.

NEW YORK HAS GOT GRAIN TRADE.

Evidence adduced before the Interstate Commerce Commission establishes the fact that many ocean steamships leaving New York have water ballast, where once they carried grain. It was alleged that the cause of this was a discrimination by railroads in grain rates in favour of Montreal against New York. It is stated that the export grain business has already been lost by New York.

Captain Corkum Buying Herring.

In another part of this issue will be found a copy of a letter dated Saturday last, at St. Jacques, and sent by Inspector O'Reilly to Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector. The part of the letter to which we direct attention runs as follows: "Capt. Corkum, of Gloucester is here purchasing frozen herring at two dollars a barrel, which he is storing, and will charter the schr. Coronation, owned by Tibbo, of Grand Bank, to take them to Gloucester."

It will be remembered that Capt. Corkum came to St. John's and requested permission from the Government to land up his vessel with herring in non-treaty waters. The Government refused the request. It will be remembered also that Capt. Corkum visited us in the Telegram Office and declared his determination to proceed to Fortune Bay and purchase herring for his vessel. According to Inspector O'Reilly he has carried out part of his declared intention. We are awaiting to see if he exports them.

The Bait Act empowers the Government to the exportation of herring bait or food.

(2) And even with the purchase of herring for exportation for either purpose.

(3) Placing them on board a vessel. Evidence of purchase and nothing more may be insufficient to sustain a charge under the Bait Act; and it is probable that the Government is awaiting some overt act of exportation or placing on board a vessel, as an enquiry over the phone this morning was informed by the Premier that the Government had not given any permission to Capt. Corkum to export herring.

It may be noticed also that under the regulations issued by the American Treasury, Capt. Corkum's purchases of herring would be dutiable on entry in the States just as if the purchases had been made by a Newfoundland and the freighting done by a Newfoundland vessel.

According to Inspector O'Reilly, Capt. Corkum proposes to freight the herring in Newfoundland bottoms. Under the Foreign Fishing Vessels Act of 1905, by the placing of the herring Capt. Corkum bought on board an American fishing vessel at St. Jacques, "such vessel and the tackle, rigging, apparel, furniture, stores and cargo thereof shall be forfeited."

The acts perpetrated by Capt. Corkum fall far short of his bombastic boast of loading his vessel with purchased herring in non-treaty waters, but they are in themselves interesting as giving promise of development. We propose to watch the result.

Marine Notes.

Wrestling Match Draws Big Audience.

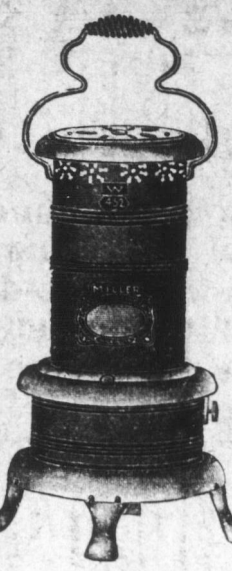
The wrestling match between Otto Oppelt and Young Olson, at the C. L. B. Armory, on Harvey Road, last night had been looked forward to eagerly since New Year by the sports and lovers of sport in the city. In spite of the fact that the walking was bad and the night stormy the building was crowded. The \$2 seat tickets in fact had all been bought up weeks ago. It is estimated that there were upwards of 3,000 spectators in the building.

Before the main bout began Andrew O'Keefe and Ernest Goodland wrestled for the Amateur Bantam Weight Championship of Newfoundland, the prize being a gold medal offered by Young Olson. They wrestled for an hour without securing a fall, but as O'Keefe had gained the most points Theo. Fitzgerald awarded him the medal.

The big bout now began. Olson came on with his seconds, J. Kennan and R. Stick, followed quickly by Otto, whose seconds were Theo Fitzgerald and Pat Neville. Mike Shallow, the referee, then took his place in the ring, and made a signal to put a stop to the vociferous cheering that shook the building for the two wrestlers. Mr. R. Dowden, of the Herald, who is well up in the athletic business, came forward and read the agreement containing the terms of the contest. He also announced that Dan McDonald, of Nova Scotia, would challenge the winner. Otto was formally introduced as the "158 lb. Graceo-Roman Champion of the World." He was greeted with wild applause. Olson was also greeted with enthusiastic cheering by his friends and supporters. Both men looked to be in good condition as they stripped and came to the mat. They showed the results of the hard training that they have been undergoing the past few weeks.

On time being called they met in a headlock and circled around the mat. Otto got a waist hold after a short time and brought Olson down. He tried to get a better grip on him but Olson with great activity eluded him every time. Otto at last got to a toe hold, he twisted Olson's leg to lever him over but could not do it. After about 25 minutes struggle in this way Otto got a half-Nelson on his man and out of it gained a double Nelson. He came down with full force on Olson's head but it was no go, he broke the hold and got clear, and as he did so Otto pounced on him like a "grizzly," but in his efforts to secure a toe hold put Olson off the mat. Otto then got a body hold, he lifted Olson off the floor and threw him down on the mat, but Olson landed like a cat on all fours. Otto was on him like a jaguar, and getting another body hold he threw his man down headforemost; the quick bending of his head saved him from having his neck broken. Olson was cheered vociferously by the crowd for the clever manner in which he saved himself from a fall, and frustrated every attempt made by Otto who was working so hard to get an effective grip. At times Olson would get Otto's head in Chancery, and would bear on his neck with all his strength and weight, but could not hold him; Otto would give a twist and get it out. When the hour was up both men looked played out, their bodies were steaming like the surface of the Harbour when the glass goes below zero. Each tried to secure a grip to bring about a fall but failed. They got to their feet and in the struggle that followed Olson brought down the "Graceo-Roman" and mounted his as quickly as a thirsty Arab

Tragedy at Montreal.

Woman Found Burned to Death in Her Home—Evidence of Struggle and Police Believe House was Set on Fire.

Montreal, January 24.—That a brutal tragedy had been enacted and an effort made to hide the crime by setting fire to the house was the theory of the police when they visited the apartment of Mrs. Joseph Martin, who was found burned and charred almost beyond recognition in response to an alarm sent in by neighbours. The dead woman's rooms were broken into early this morning. A cursory examination by the firemen

showed that the blaze had started in a small hall room outside the bedroom where the deceased woman slept. The body of the unfortunate woman was found huddled on the kitchen floor, some fifteen feet away, her arms crossed under her head. At her feet lay the fragments of an exploded lamp, while a cane-bottomed chair was overturned nearby.

Thick, dark clouds of blood on the walls and furniture of several of the rooms of the little flat were found by the police when an examination of the premises was made by daylight.

There was every evidence that a fearful struggle had taken place before the house was set on fire and the

woman, whether dead or alive, left a prey for the flames.

Blood covered the walls of the little passageway and two of the rooms. The railing around the stove in the kitchen, where the body was found, was covered with 11 white chairs and tables bore the terrible evidence of crime. The body was burned almost to a cinder and it is doubtful whether the doctors will be able to ascertain the real cause of the woman's death. No weapon was found in the house and so far the police are without a single clue.

STATE REGULATIONS

In Regard to the Free Entry of Fish, the Product of American Fisheries, into the United States.

(Issued by Treasury Department.)

The Treasury Department has this day issued new regulations in regard to the free entry of the product of American fisheries. The question as to what constitutes the product of an American fishery, which should be allowed free entry into the United States, has been a very difficult one and, as the instructions have not been perfectly clear and American fishermen have been in doubt as to just what their rights are, as far as the Customs regulations in this country were concerned, it has been decided to make as clear as possible what constitutes an American fishery; and what products may be entitled to free entry and, accordingly, the following regulations have been promulgated:

To collectors and other officers of the Customs:—

Paragraph 629 of the Tariff Act of August 5, 1909, provides for the free entry, among other things, of "Spencer, whale and other fish oils of American fisheries, and all fish and other products of such fisheries."

(1) An American fishery, within the meaning of said paragraph, is defined as a fishery operated under the American flag by American vessels in foreign waters, which vessels have the right, by treaty or otherwise, to take fish and other marine products. The products of such fisheries will be held to include fish, oil, bone, sponges, turtles and all other marine products.

(2) Fish taken by the citizens of another country, and purchased by the owner, master, agent of an American vessel, whether or not landed on shore prior to being taken aboard such a vessel, are not entitled to free entry as a product of an American fishery.

(3) Fish taken from the water by

members of the crew of an American vessel (who may be either American citizens or foreigners), or by foreign fishermen in the presence of such vessel, and under the supervision of its master or crew and in pursuance of an employment for that purpose, whether with foreign boats, nets, gear and tackle, or with boats, nets, etc., provided for such purpose by the fishing vessel, and brought by such fishing vessel to a port of this country, or transhipped by another vessel as hereinafter provided, will be entitled to free entry.

In other words, the employment of foreign fishermen either as members of the crew, or under the supervision of the master or crew of an American vessel, is allowed. The purchase by the master or crew of an American vessel of fish caught by the citizens of another country in foreign waters, will subject such fish to duty.

(4) Fish taken by an American vessel in the manner described in paragraph 2 hereof and landed on shore in foreign territory to be frozen, salted, dried, or otherwise preserved for transportation by the master and crew of the fishing vessel, will be entitled to free entry, provided no persons other than the officers, master and crew of said fishing vessel, or persons employed for the purpose have been engaged in freezing, salting, drying or curing such fish on shore, and further provided the fish have not been subjected to any process of manufacture on shore.

(5) Fish imported in a vessel other than the vessel by which the same are taken, will not be entitled to free entry unless it be shown to the satisfaction of the collector of customs at the port of entry by affidavits, or otherwise, that it was impracticable for commercial reasons or because of accident, stress of weather or otherwise, for such fishing vessel to bring the catch into port.

(6) Whether such products are imported in the vessel by which the same are taken, or by another vessel, as provided in Section 5 (supra), an affidavit by the master of the vessel by which the fish or other products were taken, will be required upon entry, showing where, when, by whom and the manner in which the same were taken from the water on board such vessel, and such affidavit will be required to be verified by the affidavits of at least two members of the crew of the fishing vessel.

Free entry will be denied unless it appears that the fish or other products were taken by members of the crew of the fishing vessels, either alone or with the assistance of men, boats and gear employed for such purpose. If the fish were taken by or with the assistance of citizens of a foreign country not members of such crew, it must appear that the same were taken from the water in the presence of the fishing vessel and under the supervision of the master

or crew thereof in pursuance of an employment for that purpose, and were not purchased by or on behalf of the owner or master of said vessel. Such affidavits may be made before the Treasury Agent designated by the Department, before any United States Consul, or any Collector, or deputy collector of customs, or before any notary public, or other officer having a seal and authorized to administer oaths.

(7) In case such fish are imported by a vessel other than the one by which the same were taken, as provided in Section 5 (supra), a manifest showing transshipment from the fishing vessel by which the same were taken, certified by the American Consul at the port of transshipment, or by a Treasury Agent designated by the Department, or if there be no such officer at such port, before two reputable resident merchants in the following form must be produced on entry:

American Consul at _____ (or we _____ and _____ merchants residing at _____ do hereby certify that I am (or we are) informed and believe that the fish hereinbefore described were taken in the waters of _____ by the American fishing vessel _____, documented under the laws of the United States, and that the same have been transhipped at _____ to the _____ for shipment to the port of _____ by reason of _____ rendering it impracticable for said fishing vessel to transport the said articles to the said port of entry.

(8) In the case of transshipment of the catch of an American fishing vessel to railway cars in a foreign country for shipment to this country, the same procedure will be followed as in the case of transshipment to another vessel.

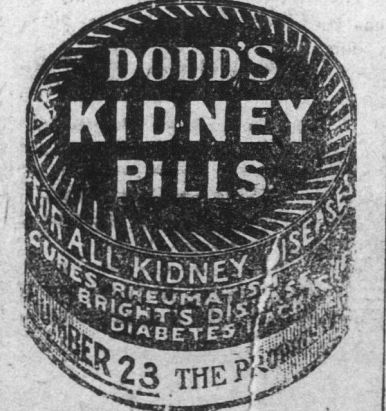

Chapter I.—General Remarks.

St. Jacques, Jan. 28th, 1911. Assistant Collector, St. John's:—

"Captain Corkum, of Gloucester, is here purchasing frozen herring at two dollars a barrel, which he is storing, and will charter the schooner Coronation, owned by Tibbo, of Grand Falls, to take them to Gloucester. The schooners 'Pearly Evelyn,' J. D. Young and 'Renown,' of Lunenburg, are ready to sail, the former two with frozen and the Renown with salt herring. The Glays B. Street, of Burgeo, has cleared for Halifax with a cargo of frozen also. Three locals with frozen western shore herring for bait have left Connaigre. The Jeanie May, of Lunenburg, the Hispaniola and Excelsior, for Job Bros. & Co. are awaiting cargoes. Herring are fairly plentiful for nets, but only one seine has any now. Will wire from Placentia Bay."

Last evening in the height of the storm Sgt. Noseworthy was told of a man who was lying on the street near his residence. He went to his aid and getting a cab, by telephone, he had him brought to the station.

At 7.45 last evening Inspector Collins found another unfortunate reclining on the ground and covered with water. He also was taken to the lock-up. Both men were drenched and had to be stripped of their clothing which was placed before the fire in the lock-up to dry, while they were placed in the cells and rugs wrapped about them.
