The general trend of the suggestions favpred a board for each railroad, made up of an equal number of representatives of the men and the company respectively, with a national board on which the companies and the men's unions should be equally represented, to act as a kind of Court of Appeal The witnesses objected to the appointment of an arbitrator as chairman of these boards, holding that if the men could not settle the dispute themselves, they could not be bound by Mr. A. H. Allen in Wales the casting vote of such arbitrator if the terms were unacceptable. The only point on which there was complete unanimity among the four witnesses was a demand for recognition of Trade's unions as the only method for bringing about peace in the railroad system.
