

the Miners' National strike. The CAPE RACE, To-day. proprietor and printers of the journal Syndicalist, were sentenced some time ago on a similar count. The fact on which the charge was based was the publication in the journal of a letter to soldiers, asking them not to shoot strikers if they should be call-ed out during a disturbance and ordered by their officers to fire, as pro-vided by the Riot Act. In addition to the publication of this circular. Mr. Mann continued to make speeches of a similar tenor. He expected to be convicted, and once the prosecution was begun it is difficult to see how conviction could be avoided. There was, however, some difference of opinion as to the expediency of instituting a prosecution for an expression of an opinion, even though it bordered on an exhortation to soldiers to disobey their officers and offend against the provisions of the Mutiny Act. But the Attorney General, Sir Rufus Isaac, had decided and strong opinions as to the necessity of this course and he stood firmly to his policy, when heck led in the House of Commons by Lab our and Radical members. Why then have Trade Unionists been angered over the sentence? It was expected and exception can hardly be taken to the justice of it. The resentment, however, lies deeper than this. WOMAN DROWNED - CHILD BURNED TO DEATH.

From Chief Steward Moyst, of the S. S. Fogota, we get particulars of week. On Monday morning last, the be discussed. 6th inst., a poor widow woman named Morgan was drowned in a brook at Seldom Come By, under sad circumstances. The woman arose about 7 o'clock and went tending the sheep which she owned and in crossing the pool of water near her home, it is believed became stricken with heart failure and falling into the water was quickly drowned. Her body was found floating in the pool which was not extra deep. When the body was found Dr. McLean viewed it and found that death was caused by drowning due to an attack of heart failure.

The second harrowing accident told our representative related to the burning to death of a little girl named Reid. This occurred at Indian Isands on Tuesday morning last. The little girl had started the fire in the kitchen stove and liberally applied kerosene oil but the wood and coa with which the stove was filled did not quickly ignite, she then added more oil, and taking off the covers of the stove she applied a match to the fuel. Instantly almost she was enveloped in the flames which shot up and the light material which she work was soon on fire. She ran outside the door screaming for help, and thus sealed her death warrant. A stiff preeze was blowing and this so fanned the flames that she was burned badly: she died at 8 o'clock the same even-

Som of these young women are quite keep when discussing this question, and i some of the views they entertain could be mutually accepted there would soon be a solution of this problem Perhaps their ideas would border or

the extreme in their own favour, and then the problem would still be unsolved: however, as there is much good logic in what some of them think we will for the benefit of any con cerned lay it before our readers. The sirls think that the division of equal, and that the hours are alto rether irregular and unnecessarily ong. They begin anywhere about (or 7 o'clock a.m. and finish at 9, 10 or 11 p.m. For meals there is little or no allowance of time, and anything

is supposed to do them. The mistress of the house is sometimes unduly exact, and none too liberal, either in payment or encouraging words Then, again, some of them lack confidence in the integrity of their servants and at very trivial offences they display much bad temper; others seem to lack system, and don't know when a thing is "good enough." The idea they have of a domestic is akin to slavery, and if she is not constantly "at it" they fear she is idling. Be cause of this idea they keep their girls "poking" and "dabbling" at

result of it all is that a spirit of dissatisfaction is engendered, and the girls, instead of continuing at house work, begin to feel around for more congenial position. Thus they turn to shops and factories, and for sake the realm that by nature and

They think that housework can be conducted on more of a business-like principle, that is, that regularity can be carried out in the kitchen, or on wash day in the house where the mistress rules, just as well as it can be done at the office, or on the wharf, or in the store where the master works They do not think that the problem of "domestic help" will ever be solved under the present management or under present usages. The average girl is too wide awake and with the advantages of education she is seeing more and more through the mistakes which exist.

Such may be accepted as a sample of what some of the girls think. Of course they did not put it just in this language, but what they meant was about the same in principle. They were not afraid of work, but they claimed the necessity of a better sys tem, and when the question is fairly and impartially considered, is there not much in the ideas which these statements contain that is both fair, nan's? Why not she have regularity n her work at home as well as her isters or brothers have it at work outside of the home? The adage that woman's work is never done" may be very good poetry, but it is not the nost intelligent practice. This is what young women are beginning to think, and it is along lines similar to these that the problem of "domestic elp" will finally adjust itself.

Wherever one turns, the question of domestic help is assuming keen proportions. From recent exchanges notice that the situation is reported as quite acute at Sweden, Norway and Denmark, where the servants are said to have organized, with offices at Stockholm, Copenhagen, and Christiania, with the following demands:

"The suppression of all night work ervants to knock off at 9 in the evenng and to rest until 7 next morning. Extra pay for servants should they e requested to work after 9.

A night out from 5 every weel Sunday off from 10 in the morning every fortnight, and a fortnight's summer holiday, the regular wage and n addition board wages to be paid. Increase of wages when the work of

the house is satisfactorily performed. The servant's room to be light and warm and to be so situated as to catch Whether any of our girls have been mbibing such views as these I do



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
