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



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

St. Joseph's Notes.

Editor The Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—When a note appears in your esteemed paper from St. Joseph's it is generally to chronicle some happy event, but at present the outlook is so gloomy that it is difficult to see the silver lining. Our staple industries, the cod and lobster fisheries, are almost a total failure to date and denot average one half of leave year. do not average one half of last year catch. In the spring herring had been catch. In the spring herring had been hard to obtain, and the caplin proved even more elusive then ever before. The small catch of fish is mainly attributed to the failure of these bait fishes to make their appearance in the coves, where they can be seined and taken for use as bait.

Failure of caplin to come to land is, in the opinion of fishermen, due to the scarcity of whales, the number of which is becoming smaller every

which is becoming smaller every year. When whales were plentiful, caplin and fish abounded in the shalow waters, driven landwards by the low waters, driven landwards by the monsters that preyed upon them.

Rose an Rue gets every whale that goes around Cape St. Mary's, a fisherman said, and that is not far from the truth. The question is being asked if something cannot be done to protect the few whales remaining in our waters and the presence of which is so essential to the success of the shore cod fishery. We have abundant evidence that destruction of these "fish" mean loss of our bait supply, and its consequent loss to fishermen and the country.




