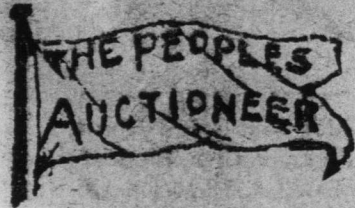

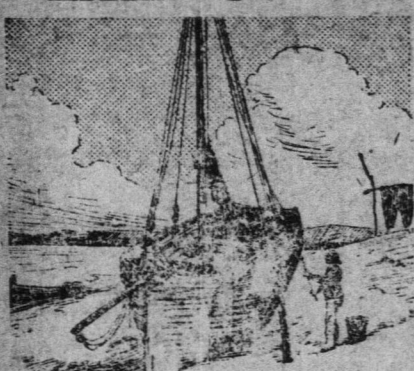

The girl looked round quickly, and, as if in response to her look, the woman said, but with a slight hesitation:

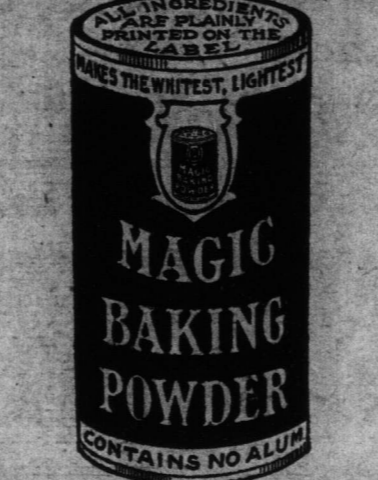
"It is late and very rough. You wouldn't be able to find the road; besides, you are hurt."

"Some water," he said; and he knew that his voice was faint.

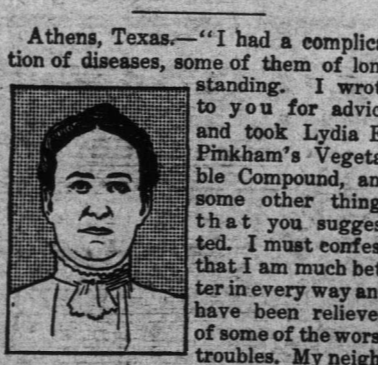
The woman shook her head.

Household Notes.

Paint wooden pails and tubs with glycerine to prevent shrinking.

Polish mirrors with methylated spirits and polish with a touch of blue powder.

One tablespoonful of ammonia to a quart of water will clean gold or silver jewelry.

Place all cakes to cool on a wire sieve and never put them away in tins till perfectly cool.

Ordinary wallpapers may be cleaned with dough, or rubbed with a soft, clean flannel dipped in fine oatmeal.

Slices of lemon, topped with grated horseradish, make a tasty and pleasing garnish for veal served in any form.

Candles used for lighting the dinner table will not drip if placed, on ice for two or three hours just before serving the meal.

Do not throw your worn-out hot-water bag away, but cut it in round or oval pieces and use them as mats to put under flower pots.

Coffee stain, even with cream in it can be removed from the most delicate silk or woollen fabrics by brushing the spots with pure glycerine.

For dusting women's heavily trimmed hats the best brush is a cheap shaving brush, as it is both stiff and small enough to reach every crevice.

Fill a bottle with hot water, place the splinter over the mouth, press tightly; the suction will loosen it, and it will be an easy matter to remove it.

A simple way of repairing a rent in an umbrella is to use a piece of ordinary adhesive plaster. If the plaster is not black, it may be easily colored.

After shampooing blonde hair, half the juice of a lemon, squeezed in the last rinsing water, will cause the hair to dry more quickly and with less snarls.

Sew matting with raffia and prevent unsightly stitches of thread. Raffia is very strong, and may be

bought to match almost any kind of matting.

When next creaming carrots, add half a teaspoonful of onion juice and a dash of grated nutmeg to the white sauce. Add the boiled diced carrots and serve.

Nails used in bathrooms and kitchens, on which damp cloths and towels may be hung, should be painted with enamel, so that they do not leave rusty marks.

There is a very important point in regard to making scallops. That is, after the scallop is made and cut out, go all over it again with a tiny button-hole slitter.

Instead of throwing away the soiled envelopes that bring circulars cut off the gummed strips and save them. They will serve a hundred household uses.

If half a bottle of olives has been used, and you wish to keep the rest, add a pinch of salt to the brine, pour a teaspoonful of olive oil in the liquid and replace the cork.

A delicious filling for layer cake is made by mixing a pound of finely minced shelled almonds with two eggs, a cupful of confectioner's sugar and a teaspoonful of vanilla.

In making sauces, use clarified fat from the soap kettle as the medium for cooking the flour, then beat in a few tiny bits of butter to the finished sauce for the flavor.

When you need a cold cloth and haven't ice, try wringing a cloth out of cold water and shaking briskly in the air. The rapid evaporation will give you almost an ice-cold compress.

Sir William Wallace



This is the 608th anniversary of the death of Sir William Wallace, a Scottish hero who made several attempts to throw off the English yoke but only succeeded in being hanged at one end. Sir William's death was very sudden and was the result of being drawn and quartered with great thoroughness and severity at the request of the English king, Edward, who sought by this means to curb his pretensions. King Edward's experiment proved an entire success, as Sir William did not take any further part in the proceedings, owing to the royal policy of segregation then in force.

It is related of Sir William that he had a temper with the highest recorded voltage of the period. On one occasion, when a boy, a son of the English governor of the province made some derogatory remark with reference to the fit of Sir William's kilts, whereupon Sir William grabbed him by the collar and threw him out of the window. It appears to have been a vital spot, as Sir William retired to the mountains and collected a band of Scottish patriots who also had consid-

erable temper of their own.
King Edward was much put out by Sir William's actions and determined to annihilate him upon the shores of his country in which had done come to be known as two jacks of a lamb's tail. So he sent an army of 40,000 men to Scotland, where Sir William met by the river Forth and filled so full of consternation, and short, blunt arrows that most of them took up their permanent residence in the locality. When King Edward heard of this he was so angry that he became one of the most expeditious oaths in all English history and sent 30,000 more men after Sir William.
Sir William's success had provoked jealousy among the clans and people began to find fault with his temper and the sour, explosive vocabulary which he carried with him. He was attacked at Perth and later betrayed by a man he had loaned money to on several occasions, after which he was taken to London and allowed to succumb in prison. Wallace did not free his country, but he put an imperishable stain on Scottish valor that holds good to this day.

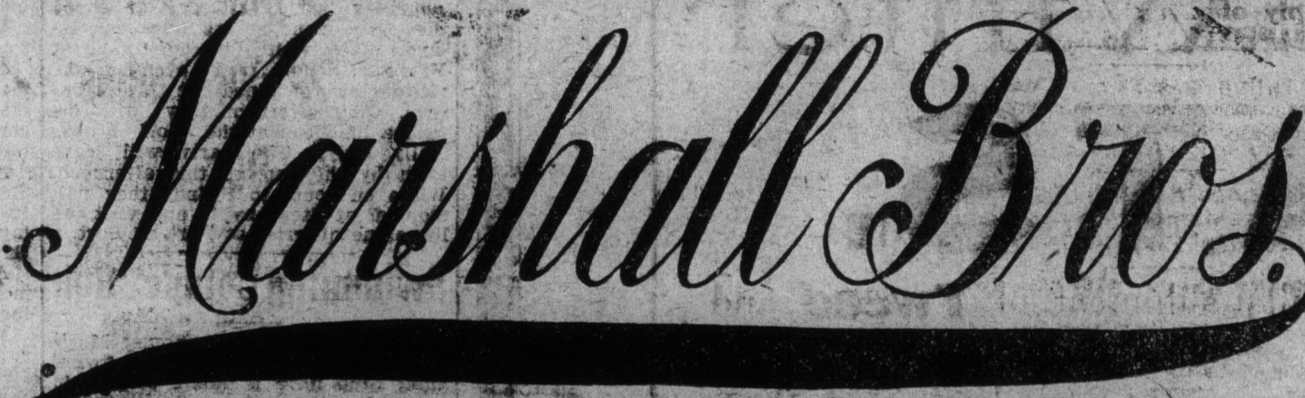

ALBANY, To-day.

He will have to adopt one or the other. Neither may be pleasant, but there can be no doubt which is recommended by humanity and common sense."

MEXICO CITY, To-day.

Fighting Nature.

What One Man's Patient Effort Wrung From a Desert in France.
In the southwest of France, between the rivers Adour and Garonne, are long stretches of pine woods, green and cool.

Where these pines now stand was a barren waste in the middle of the last century. Sun and wind vied with each other in making the land arid and dustier. Over the stormy bay of Biscay came winds that set up great sandstorms and sometimes buried whole villages. The whole region was one of hopelessness and despair. Fate was against it.

But finally there came a man who acknowledged fate only as something to be overcome. This man, one Bretonnier, was an inspector of roads. He began fencing in the desert. He built a fence and behind it planted broom seeds. Behind the broom seeds he put seeds of the pine. The fence protected the broom seeds, and the broom grew. Then the broom in its turn afforded shelter to the delicate pine shoots.

Soon the pines spread, and their tough roots bound the sandy soil together. The first step was accomplished. Then canals were made to drain the wet parts and carry water to the dry.

Thus did one man by patient effort turn a dreary desert into a home for an industrious and healthy population. It was an instance of triumph over fate. - New York Tribune.

Complains of Passenger

Editor The Evening Telegram. Dear Sir—Allow me space in your valuable paper to put before the public how passengers were treated on the Trepassay Branch of the Reid Newfoundland Company's railway.

It happened on becoming to the city on the night following Regatta night, August 7th, 1913. At Bay Bulls Station was a man, his wife and five children, the eldest 7 1/2 years and the youngest 7 months. How they were treated is up to the public to say when they read the facts.

The passengers in question were waiting at the station from 6 o'clock in the evening until 10 o'clock in the night when the train arrived and stopped for a short time. The man, as soon as the train stopped, having two other men to help him put aboard his luggage which occupied a very short time. He then got off to see how his wife, that had three ladies helping her with the children, was getting along, but as he landed on the ground from the platform the train moved ahead.

His wife during the time mentioned had just landed a fourth child in the car and was going out on the platform for the infant of 7 months as the train started. Seeing that she had not time to get the infant, she naturally became very ill, not knowing what had happened to the child. Her husband spoke to the conductor in charge calling his attention to the condition his wife was in and endeavored him to stop the train which by that time was no more than a hundred yards from the station. This he refused to do although there were two lives in danger. The condition of the other children when they found the baby had been left behind can be better imagined than described. They cried most piteously at the conductor not giving them proper notice. If it had not been for a couple of ladies and a gentleman who did all that was possible to console the mother and children, it might have been very serious for the mother.

Now, Mr. Editor, if such treatment of passengers and such a charge of human life is allowed in a civilized country, the sooner legislation is brought to bear on the matter the better for the general public.

The Atlantic ocean is fenced off from us by fools and Piccott's emissaries are sent here from Bonavista Bay, St. John's, and Placentia and Conception Bays to earn what little public funds belong to us. We are brought to the verge of starvation by persecutions numerous. Our best salmon ponds are locked from us which have been our heritage by birth and have been in our families rights for generations past, inherited by birth from our great grandfathers from us which have been in the rights of our owners, and they have robbed us of them. Our rights date back previous to us to our local Government.
